Cauble Enterprises of Houston is drilling a wildcat well in the Palo Duro Basin which is known as the company's No. 1 Charlotte Molesworth Adams. The test, located on the Molesworth Ranch southeast of Clarendon if proposed to 8,500 feet and will be a basement test.

There is no nearby production to the location. It spots about 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Maynard Oil Co. No. 1 Molesworth which was plugged and abandoned at total depth 6,675 feet in the Ellenburger on September 25, 1969. Bearden Drilling Co. is contractor and was reported drilling below 3,000 feet this week.

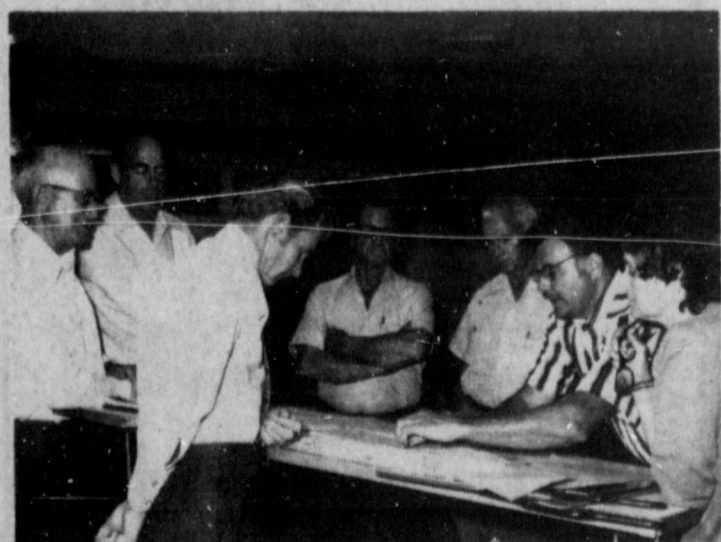
Harold Childs, president of the corporation, stated that control of the Mall will be equally distributed between 700 people, no one of whom can own over 35 shares of stock which is available to Sherwood land owners only. Shares will be \$10 each.

The first official stockholders meeting will be held at 4 p.m. following the groundbreaking. All persons who have purchased stock prior to that time will be eligible to cast their vote. Stock is going fast at this time, Childs added.

The Architect is working on the plans for the Mall at the present and the date for actual construction to start is August 1, 1972, Childs concluded.

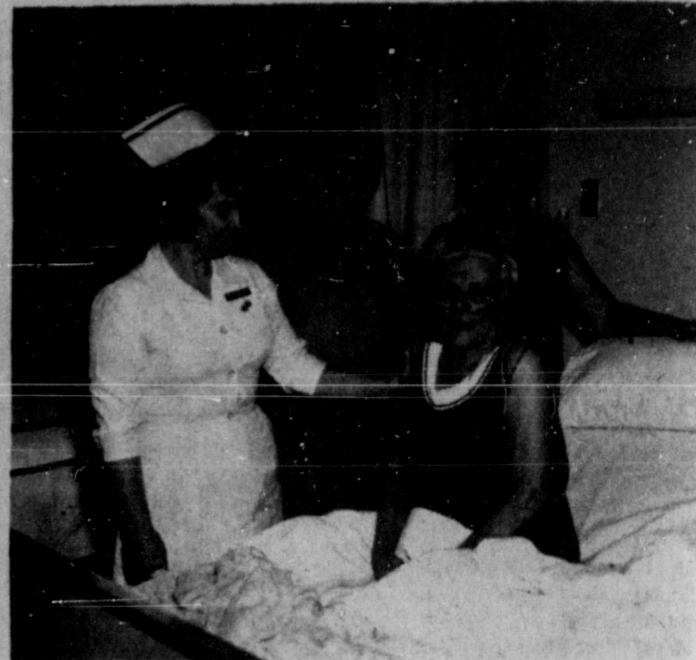

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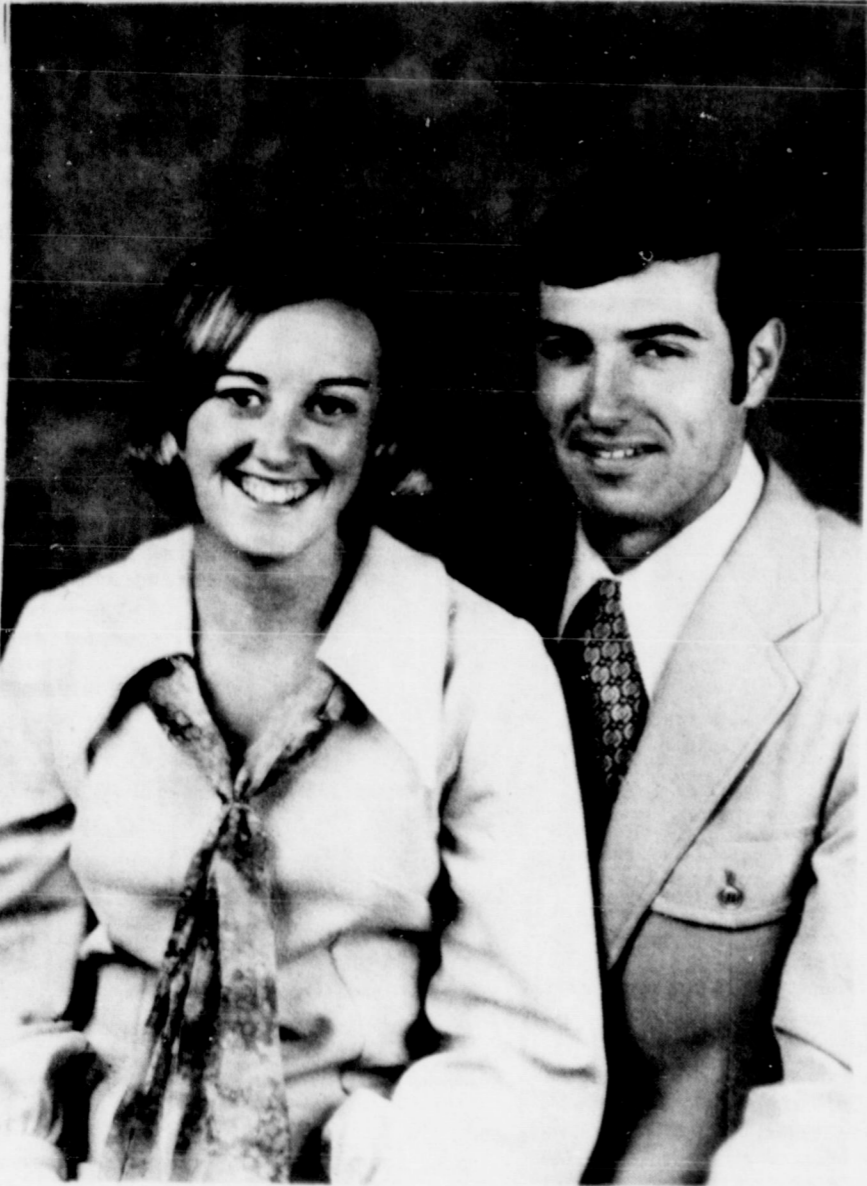

The third called session of the 62nd Legislature was gavelled to order by Speaker Rayford Price. In keeping with its difficult creation, the Legislature was addressed in Joint Session by a lame duck Governor, Lieutenant Gov.

error and Speaker. In addition, for roughly half of the House and Senate returned as lame duck members.

In addressing this session, the Governor proved to be his unpredictable self by limiting the call to appropriations in an attempt to stem the latest state financial emergency. In so doing, the Governor laid groundwork that covered the statewide application of the Food Stamp Program through welfare and small communities.

I was disappointed that the Governor did not see fit to make any mention of the trailer brake and light problem which has caused so many hardships for the 66th District. I intend to officially request that this matter be included in the call.

Most of the conversation in the halls of the Capitol pertain to the upcoming Speaker's race and speculation as to the unholy coalition of Mutscher Lieutenants such as ex-Appropriations Committee chairman Bill Healy backing liberal AFL-CIO, labor supported Price Daniel, Jr. son of ex-Governor Price Daniel, Sr., currently serving on the Supreme Court of Texas. It was under his term as governor that Texas first adopted a sales tax.

I regret very much that in my opinion Representative Daniel has seen fit to substitute principals for power. Price Daniel, Jr., who originally ran as a reform candidate, released the following prepared statement on June 21, 1971:

"It matters not so much whether I am elected Speaker, but it is vital to this State that the people become involved and elect candidates who will vote to oust the present Mutscher-Healy regime which relies on government by intimidation and enact laws which will keep their type of high-handed and dictatorial power from ever existing again in this State."

It disturbs me to have an active candidate for Speaker who was publicly endorsed by the official publication of the Texas AFL-CIO, TEXAS LABOR, March 1972 issue, as follows:

"For the first time in its history, the Texas AFL-CIO COPE made a recommendation in the race for Speaker of the House, with the delegates endorsing State Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty.

"The Speaker is not elected by the voters, but is elected at the start of the Regular Session by the members of the House of Representatives.

"The COPE leadership, however, felt that the office is of such importance in achieving labor legislative goals that the organization should seek to actively participate in the process.

"COPE recommended that House of Representative candidates be encouraged to support Daniel's candidacy, and that no financial assistance be given any candidate who does not pledge himself to support reform rules such as those proposed by Price.

"Following the resignation of Gus Mutscher as Speaker, Rayford Price was chosen Speaker

for the Special Session by a narrow margin. Daniel was not a candidate in the Special Session."

It appears that the same old special interest team is still operating. First, it was the Mutscher-Healy team, then it was the Hale-Healy-Mutscher team and now the Texas House is facing the Daniel-Healy team.

I am extremely disappointed that a Supreme Court Justice would violate the spirit of our state nepotism law and the separation of constitutional powers by actively involving himself in the inner workings of this legislative body (by calling bankers and prominent businessmen to solicit support for his son.)

Since I have been in the Legislature, I have taken a stand against the personal income tax. In each session I have served, Labor has extended all of its resources for the passage of this tax. I would have to assume that Price Daniel, Jr. favors such a tax or he would not have received such a glowing endorsement. Therefore, I hope that each Texan will closely examine each candidate involved in the important task of electing a new Speaker and that all Texans might be aware of what the future holds. A vote for Price Daniel, Jr. is a vote for a personal income tax, a vote for a corporation tax and a vote for the same old business as usual at the same address.

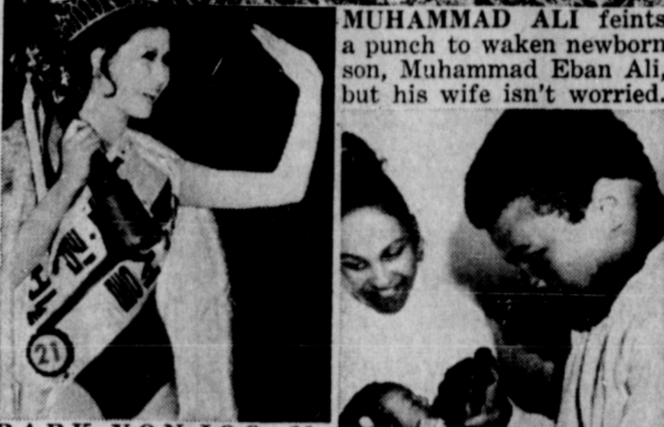

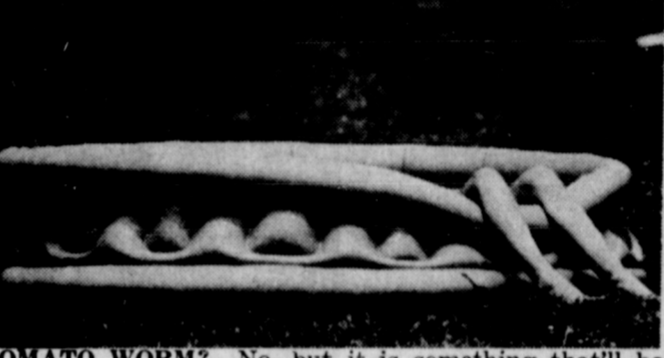

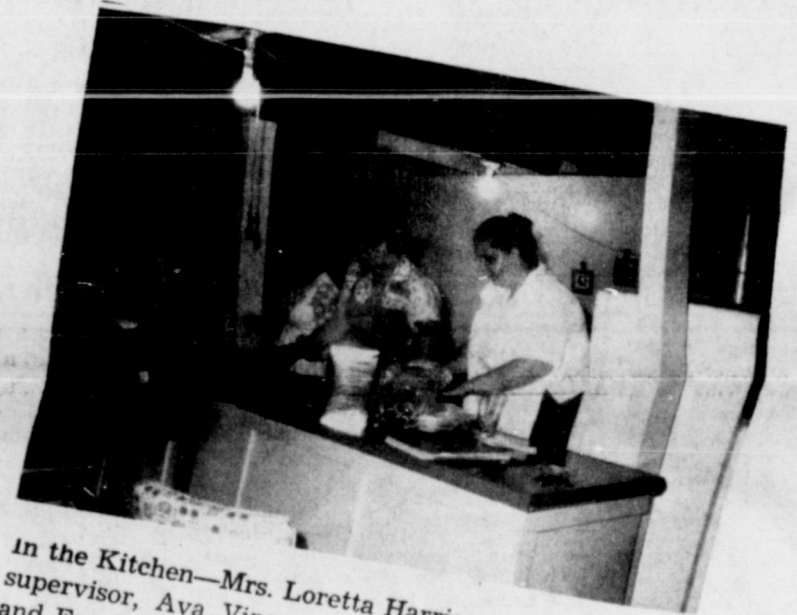

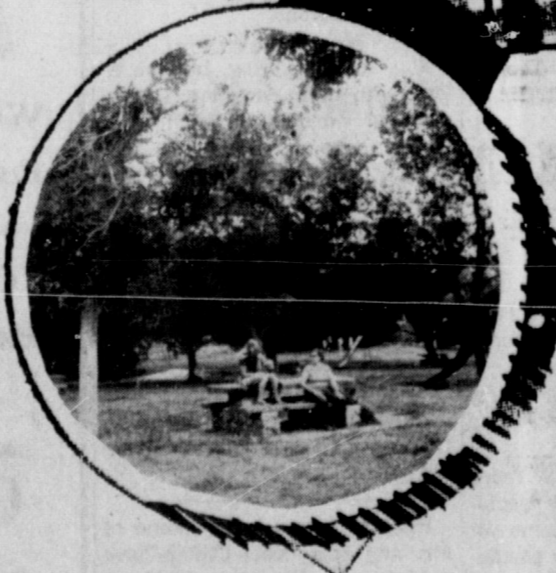
