## Memorial Day driving

Memorial Day holiday is the first holiday of the year where traffic using the highways of Texas will increase considerably.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety cautions motorists of the increased dangers of holiday traffic. "Memorial Day holiday signals the beginning of summer fun and outdoor activities. It also signals the beginning of more traffic on our highways. Along with increased traffic, the danger of more accidents and more deaths always follows," he said.

He noted that heavy holiday traffic will bring out the best and worst driving habits. Some drivers recognize the hazards and compensate for them, while others become frustrated or angry. The frustrated or angry driver then becomes a hazard that can kill or maim others.

Major Cawthon advised, "Traffic and activities around our recreational areas will be heavy. It seems when people are enjoying themselves in these areas, alcoholic beverages play a big part in their enjoyment, so drivers need to be especially observant for the drunk driver."

The Department of Public Safety Troopers will especially be on the look out for the speeder and the drunk driver as these two violations kill over half of the people killed in traffic each year. As a precaution, slow down, wear your seat belt, and don't drink and drive to insure your safe Memorial Day holiday.

## Girl Scout Day Camp 1985

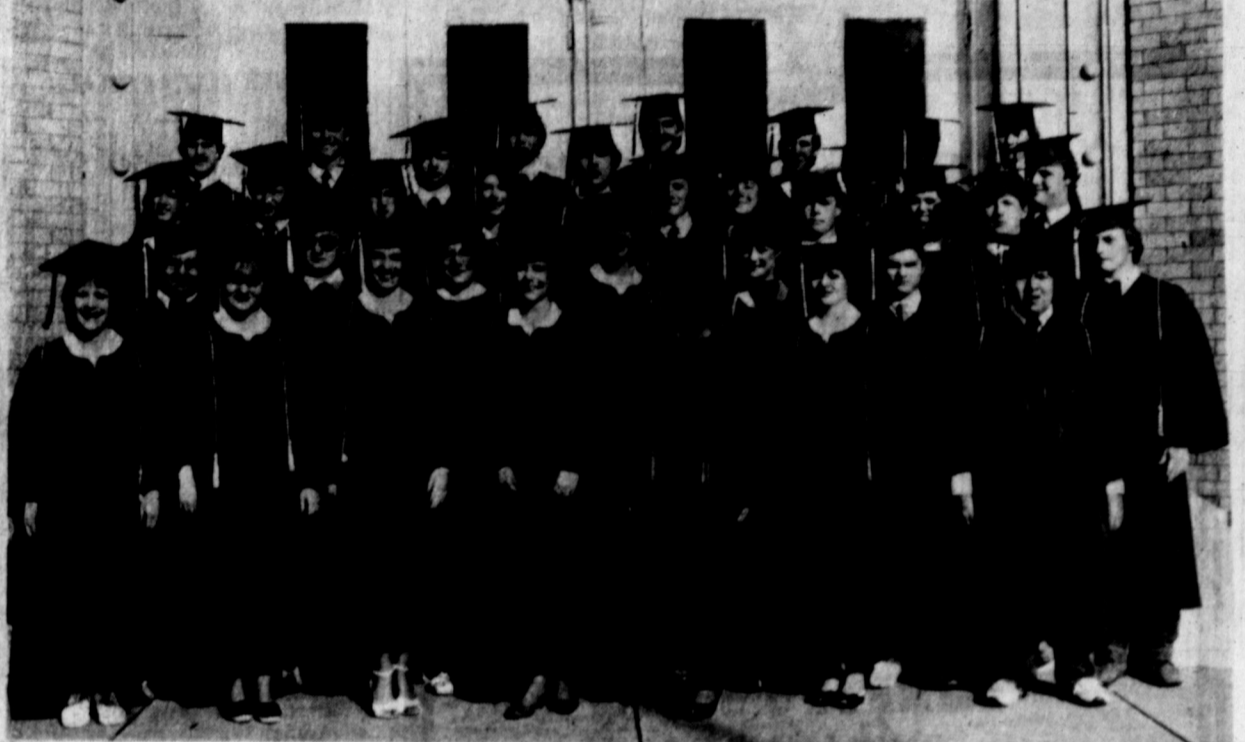

## K-9 Korp Rabies Clinic

The Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp, in conjunction with the City-County rabies clinic and Deyhle Veterinary Service, will provide a heart worm exam and dipping service.

The clinic will be held Friday, May 24, 1985, at the County Jail facility from 3-5 p.m.

The cost of the services are as follows: 1. Dipping - \$8.00 Ex-Par, 21 day residue, kills fleas, ticks, and lice; 2. Heart worm direct exam and filter exam - \$7.00; 3. Rabies - \$6.00 vaccination, plus \$1.00 for City tags, for a total of \$7.00.

The Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp will receive a generous portion of the proceeds for co-sponsoring this clinic. The Korp will use the money to go to the Texas State Dog Show held in Victoria, Texas, in August.

Do your dog a favor: Have him checked for heart worm, dipped for ticks, fleas, and lice. Do yourself a favor: Have him vaccinated.

All Donley County residents are encouraged to take advantage of all of the clinic services for your pet, and support your local 4-H K-9 Korp to State!

Heartworm disease was considered a problem in Southern areas only at one time. The disease is now found in all areas of the U.S.

Only mosquitoes have been shown to incubate *Dirofilaria immitis*, the cause of heartworm disease. Mosquitoes become infected upon ingestion of blood from an infected animal. When the mosquito feeds on a susceptible dog, the cycle is complete.

From the time a dog is bitten by a "carrier" mosquito until circulating heartworms (immature forms) are observed, a period of 8-12 months is necessary.

Young dogs may show up as negative to the heartworm test when in reality they may be positive at a later date.

Comments: It is essential to check animals (blood sample) to determine

the status of infection before treatment or preventative medication is started.

The disease is treatable. Negative animals are given preventative medication (Filaribits) on a daily basis according to body weight starting one month before the be-

ginning of mosquito season and continued daily during mosquito season. Daily treatment should be continued for two months after mosquito season is over.

Puppies can be started on preventative medication at two months of age.

## DPS cautions drivers to watch for children

Schools Out! The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind motorists to be especially watchful all day long for children playing in or around the public streets and highways.

"Schools out, warm weather is here and longer hours of daylight all signal the start of summer fun for our kids," warned Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock. He said, "Kids will be out from early morning to late at night and drivers must be especially watchful in areas around parks and playgrounds for a child to dart into the street after a ball or frisbee."

Bicyclists need to be aware of laws regulating their using the public streets or highways. As more

bicycles than ever will be on our streets or highways now that school is out. Bicyclists are required to obey all the laws that drivers of cars have to obey. They must stop for stop signs, and red lights, yield at yield signs, make legal turns, and ride in the same direction as vehicular traffic.

Major Cawthon cautioned, "Motorists should be on the lookout for the kids on bicycles and be prepared to give the bicyclist the right of way to save a life."

Now that school is out pedestrian and bicycle traffic will automatically increase. Drivers must be more watchful and alert for these dangers. Be prepared to stop all the time to avoid an accident with our children.

# From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



Last week we began to discuss the "Rapture". We want to continue this week by talking about three

outstanding truths about the Rapture that will make this event a joyful occasion for us Christians.

1. The dead are resting. For believers, death is not final. Those who have died in Christ are only asleep. In fact, only their bodies are asleep, for they are with Christ (2 Cor. 5:1-8; Phil. 1:21-23). And they will return with Him when He comes to resurrect their bodies: "For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so God will bring with Him those who have fallen asleep in Jesus" (1 Thess. 4:14).

Paul wrote to the Thessalonians because they were not sure whether saved loved ones who had died would experience the Lord's return. Paul assured them that those who had died in Christ would indeed be involved in the Rapture; in fact, they would rise first.

It will be a great resurrection. The bodies of the dead will rise, transformed and glorified. "The dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed" (1 Cor. 15:52).

Two events are involved. One is the resurrection of the bodies of dead believers; the other is the transformation of all believers' bodies.

The transformation of the living believers is in itself a kind of

resurrection. In Romans 7:24 Paul writes, "Wretched man that I am! Who will set me free from the body of this death?" He gives the answer in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18. The Lord Himself will transform our bodies of death into living, glorified bodies.

2. The Lord is returning. Paul assures us, "The Lord Himself will return from heaven with a shout" (1 Thess. 4:16). He will return personally to receive us, just as He promised: "If I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you to Myself, that where I am, there you may be also" (John 14:3).

What a blessed hope! He will not merely send for us, call for us, or let us come to Him-Christ is coming in person to receive us.

3. The promise is reassuring. Paul's message to the Thessalonians substitutes two facts about the Rapture.

First, it could happen at any moment. It may seem hard to believe that an event Paul was expecting at any moment almost 2,000 years ago might still be imminent, but it's true. Although no one knows the time of the Lord's return, it is the next great event on God's prophecy calendar.

Second, the promise of the Rapture indicates that believers will miss the Tribulation. "For God has not destined us for wrath" (1 Thess. 5:9). Knowledge of the Rapture wouldn't have comforted the Thessalonians if they knew they would have to endure such persecution. Paul couldn't tell them to encourage each other with those truths if he knew they were facing the threat of the Tribulation.

As believers, we are to be watchful and faithful, living lives that are pleasing to Christ.

#### COLD FIGHTING TISSUES

Results of tests at the University of Wisconsin Medical School may have a dramatic effect on the future spread of cold viruses. The research involved two similar groups of volunteers who played cards together for 12 hours. In one group, half of the persons were experimentally infected with rhinovirus (a type of virus that can cause the common cold). At the end of 12 hours, 52% of those who met receive the virus experienced "caught" colds from those who received the virus experimentally. In the second group, individuals who received the rhinovirus used a specially treated

tissue to blow or wipe their noses. Not a single person in this group "caught" colds from their experimentally-infected neighbors.

As a result of this research, Kimberly Clark has developed a tissue that is designed to kill cold viruses before they spread to others. The virus-killing layer of the tissue is treated with citric acid, malic acid, and a detergent. The company is quick to point out that these tissues do not cure the common cold. Larger studies involving individuals who actually have colds will determine if such tissues have a role in the prevention of the common cold - one of man's most persistent ailments.

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## City Minutes

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on May 14, 1985, in the Board Room, City Hall at 7:00 p.m., to conduct a public hearing prior to submitting application for a Texas Community Development grant.

Smith, David Jones, Dora Weatherthon, Easie Jean McCampbell, Walter McCampbell, Roger Weatherthon, Louisa King, Walter King, Peggy Smith, McKinley Smith, Mrs. Eddie B. Weatherthon, Corriee Giddings, J.C. Giddings, Howard Weatherthon, McKinley Louis, Bobbie Louis, E.W. Smith, Buford Holland, C.W. Cornell, Murrell Whitaker, M.O. Weatherly, Otis S. Holland.

Minutes of the April 9, and May 5, 1985 meetings were read and approved.

The 2nd public hearing was then conducted to receive any questions or comments pertaining to the proposed application to be submitted for a Texas Community Development grant. Following this motion was made to pass a resolution authorizing the filing of the grant application and authorizing the Mayor to act as the City's chief executive officer and authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the City's participation in the Texas Community Development Program.

### RESOLUTION

Whereas, the City has identified a need related to public facility improvements; and

Whereas, the provision of water lines and fire protection and sanitary sewer service and sewer lines will assist in meeting such need; and

Whereas, it is necessary and in the best public interest that the City avail itself of the Texas Community Development Program for Small Cities under Title J of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended; and

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Clarendon desires the Mayor to act as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative;

Now therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas:

1. That the City submit an application for funding under the Texas Community Development Program to be considered under the Community Development Project Fund Regional Allocation under the terms and

conditions of the State of Texas and agree and understand the assurances contained in said application.

2. That the City Council endorse the activities as set forth in said application and more fully described above.

3. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this application and the City's participation in the Texas Community Development Program.

Passed and approved this 14th day of May, 1985 by the vote all ayes and no noes.

Judge Christal met with the Board to inform them of the findings of Merriman and Barber Engineering Company concerning the location of the roll-off container site to be used by the County. According to the engineer, this site should pose no problem for the adjoining airport, so the County and Board of Aldermen decided to leave the roll-off site at its present location.

Bids for the City's trash trucks were then opened and read. The bid of \$1500.00 from Jack Clifford for the 1974 Chevrolet side load trash truck was accepted.

Discussion followed regarding the rates to be charged to contractors hauling to the City roll-off container such items as roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone, dirt or soil or other bulky materials. Also, in accordance with the City ordinance, any individual resident or business, which is not a contractor producing roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone, dirt or soil or other bulky materials in the normal course and scope of their employment or business operation shall not be allowed to dump more than one (1) pickup load of such materials in any given ten (10) day period without prior consent of the City office and paying the disposal fee. Motion carried to set the rates at \$5.00 for a pickup and \$30.00 for a truck per load.

Approved sending four firemen to fire school in July at the cost of \$350.00 each. Bills for April 1985 were presented and ordered paid. There being no other City business at this time, meeting was adjourned.

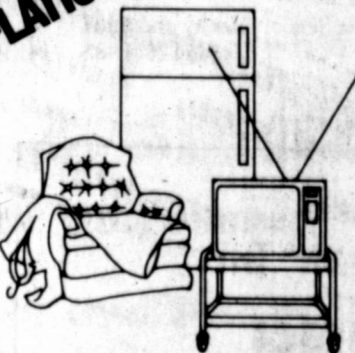

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**ORDINANCE #253**

**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF GARBAGE CONTAINERS WITHIN THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS AND THE DISPOSAL OF ROOFING MATERIALS, CONCRETE AND OTHER COMMERCIALY PRODUCED BULKY MATERIAL.**

Whereas, the City of Clarendon has contracted with Browning-Ferris Industries for the establishment of a containerized garbage disposal service; and

Whereas, the landfill previously operated by the City of Clarendon and the County of Donley is to be closed; and

Whereas, there are no ordinances or regulations controlling or regulating the use and maintenance of new garbage collection system; and

Whereas, this City has the right and duty to adopt and enforce such regulations as are necessary in order to control the use of such garbage disposal services and facilities, and to protect the health and safety of the community;

**IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:**

**Section 1:** No burning of garbage, leaves, tree trimmings or other refuse within the city limits shall be allowed without the prior written consent of the city fire marshal. Under no circumstances shall any person burn or cause to ignite the refuse contained in any garbage or refuse container provided by the City, or by any person or business entity which provides such containers.

**Section 2:** No side loading garbage container provided by the City, or by any person or business entity providing such containers, shall be filled with roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone dirt or soil, stoves, refrigerators, water tanks, washing machines, or other similar bulky materials.

**Section 3:** The disposal of roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone, dirt and soil, and other bulky materials by contractors shall be made into the roll-off container provided by the City. Prior to disposing of such materials, the contractor shall contact the City office to obtain permission to dispose of such materials. At that time, the contractor shall inform the City office of the nature of the materials and the approximate weight and volume. Upon payment of a disposal fee to the City office, and approval by the City office, the contractor shall be allowed to dispose of such materials. The City shall maintain a fee schedule in the City office, which schedule shall be by resolution of the City Council, and amended from time to time as the City Council deems necessary.

**Section 4:** Any individual resident or business, which is not a contractor producing roofing materials, construction materials, concrete, brick, stone, dirt or soil or other bulky materials in the normal course and scope of their employment or business operation shall not be allowed to dump more than one (1) pickup load of such materials in any given ten (10) day period without prior consent of the City office. Any such individual or business desiring to dump more than (1) half-ton pickup load of such materials in any given ten (10) day period shall pay a disposal fee to the City office and receive approval from the City office prior to disposing of such materials. The City office shall maintain a fee schedule for such disposal, which schedule shall be set by resolution of the City Council, and amended from time to time as the City Council deems necessary.

**Section 5:** All garbage, trash, brush and trimmings which are placed in sideloading containers shall be no more than four (4) feet in length.

**Section 6:** The use of the roll off container provided by the City is reserved for use by city residents only. County residents desiring to dispose of garbage in City containers shall obtain permission from the City office prior to dumping. The City shall maintain a fee schedule in the City office, which schedule shall be set by resolution of the City Council, and amended from time to time as the City Council deems necessary.

**Section 7: PENALTIES.**  
Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the ordinance hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, shall severally for each and every such violation and non-compliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$10.00 dollars nor more than \$200.00 dollars. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten (10) days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

**Section 8: REPEAL OF CON-**

**FLICTING ORDINANCES.** All former ordinances or parts thereof conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**Section 9: VALIDITY.** The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

**Section 10: PUBLICATION.** The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to order publication of the descriptive caption of this ordinance together with the penal provision for the time and manner provided by law, and an alternate method of publication.

**Section 11: DATE OF EFFECT.** It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its date and approval.

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**LAWN & GARDEN ALMANAC**

**HOW TURF GRASS GROWS**  
By Jack Chapman, Agronomist

Meristem tissue is that part of the plant where the cells can divide. This is how plants grow. All plants grow because the plant cell divides (one cell becomes two, two become four and so on).  
But not all parts of the plant have this ability. The area where growth occurs is commonly called the growing point.  
With plants like beans, tomatoes, trees and shrubs the growing point is called a terminal and is near the end of a branch. Plants in the grass family have their meristematic tissue at the base of the leaf blade.  
This is the reason why mowing the grass should not remove more than the top 1/3 of the plant. When we cut off the leaf below the base of the leaf blade, a new shoot must come from the crown.  
This is why you can lower the mower before spring green-up and during the season it can be raised. But once the level of the leaf blade is established only the tip of the leaf, that portion beyond the base of the leaf blade, should be removed by mowing.

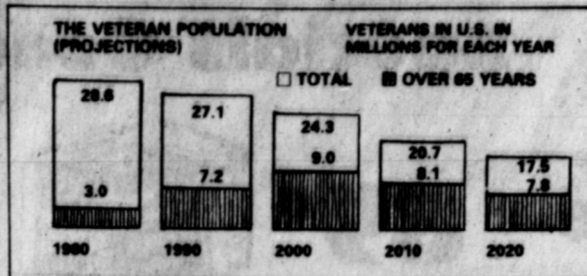

**The Veteran Population**



There are expected to be nine million veterans over 65 by the year 2000.

In the last census, it was determined that of the 28 million veterans in the United States, some three million were over 65 years old. By projecting that figure it has been determined that by 1990, 7.2 million veterans will be over 65 years old and by the year 2000, some nine million will be over 65.

Some apparently well-meaning people have suggested America "save" money at the expense of her own veterans. The Grace Commission, for instance, said funds for Veterans Administration hospitals should be deleted from the budget. The Congressional Budget Office suggested hospitals run by the VA be dismantled by the end of the decade.

The Veterans Administration health care budget has fallen from 12.5 percent of the total VA budget to an estimated 8.6 percent from 1975 to 1985. According to the House Veterans Affairs Committee, "There is evidence that an artificial 'cap' has been placed on the resources available for outpatient treatment, resulting in a denial of treatment to eligible veterans in some cases, and in other cases resulting in inappropriate admission as an inpatient, an

opinion shared by the Veterans of Foreign Wars."

At its 85th National Convention, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, resolved to prevail upon Congress to pass a

budget and appropriation for the Veterans Administration which will fully fund and maintain the integrity of the benefit and entitlement programs and an enhanced Veterans Administration hospital and medical care system.

According to Cooper T. Holt, Executive Director of the VFW, veterans deserve this because of past sacrifices. "They were subjected to military law and were a special breed, committed to fight to the death for the ideal of freedom around the world. The veteran could not be flat footed nor lame—he could not be uncertain or short of vision. He had to be as perfect as possible—not only physically perfect but mentally alert. He had to be smart; he had to be able to read and write; he had to have some talent. Objectors such as David Stockman were excused. Furthermore, the veteran had to be morally fit—no criminal record; he could not

be perverted; he could not be unstable. Only the brave were selected and only a nation of ingrates would forget their sacrifices."

Many Americans feel that veterans who have earned benefits should not have them taken away. They are writing their opinions on this issue to their legislators at the House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515, and the U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510.

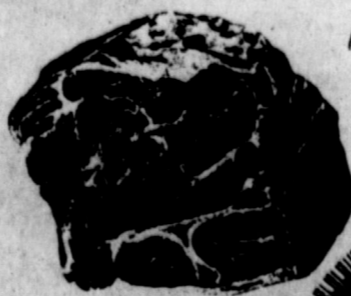

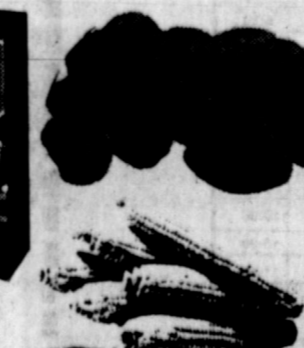

Weightmen were Dan Nichols, Bret White, Russell Alexander, Don Brogdon and Derek Howard. Chris Downer and Dewey Mincey pole vaulted. Dewey cleared 13 feet and finished 4th at Regional.

The 400m relay team consisted of Leland Howell, Marcus Smith, Dewey Mincey, and Rodney Smith. Finishing in the top three of every meet they participated in and running a 3:25.9 at Regional, the 1600m relay team was very successful this year. The best splits turned in by individual members of the mile relay team are as follows: Robert Youngblood - 52.5, Leland Howell - 52.8, Rodney Smith - 49.4, Trent Sharp - 48.7.

The Broncos should be very tough and fun to watch next year as they return many key members. The graduating Broncos wish good luck to next years team.
