1972-73 School Term To Open August 14

Clarendon School faculty will begin a 5-day series of inservice workshops Monday, August 14th preparing for the 1972-73 term of school.
High School seniors will enroll on Thursday morning, August 17th, followed by the Juniors who will enroll that afternoon.
High School sophomores will enroll on Friday morning August 18th, followed by the freshmen that afternoon. A \$2.00 Library fee is necessary for each High School student.
All Elementary and Junior High students will enroll on Friday, August 18th. Parents are reminded that all beginners must show their birth certificate attesting that they are 6 years of age or older before September 1, 1972.
Also, all students' medical records will need to show that they have been properly immunized for DPT, both measles, and for polio.

Special Attention Parents

Mrs. Edna Osburn, Donley County Community Action Coordinator, is requesting that all parents of children who need immunizations to start to school get in touch with her at the Center or go directly to the Housing Project in Memphis, Texas August 17 (Thursday) from 1 to 4 p.m. Mr. Jerry DeSha, Public Health Investigator from the Bi-County Health Department, related this information to this office Tuesday afternoon.
Mr. DeSha said because of circumstances beyond his control there could be no Clinic in Donley County before September 1. This applies to children in all areas of Donley County. He urged Mrs. Osburn to refer these children to Memphis until further arrangements can be made.

Fall Registration At Clarendon College Set September 5-6

Registration of all students at Clarendon College is set to begin at 8:30 a.m. September 5th and 6th. Classes will begin September 7 at 8 a.m. with the last day to register for the Fall Semester to be September 22, 1972. Move-in of all Dorm Residents will start at 2 p.m. September 4. Pre-registration and Pre-counseling for entering Freshman students planning to attend Clarendon College for the Fall Semester of 1972 will be between August 28 and 31, 1972 as announced by Mr. Leonard Selvidge, Dean of Students for Clarendon College. It is requested that all Freshman entering Clarendon College report on one of the above dates.
Mr. Selvidge also advises that the pre-counseling and pre-planning sessions are most important in the lives of beginning Freshman. Many of the small problems facing the beginning student are eliminated at this time.

GENE ALDERSON AIDS IN CHEVY RECORD

Moto-Cross Races Held Sun., Aug. 6


Though Sunday afternoon was pretty warm out, attendance was good for the Moto-Cross Races at the pit east of Greenbelt Lake Dam on Highway 70.



BUSING VOTE The House Rules Committee has voted to bring the proposed Constitutional Amendment, which prohibits forced busing, to the House floor for a vote.

I strongly support this amendment which is similar to one I have sponsored. I am opposed to busing of school children just for the sake of a numerical balance dreamed up by some statistician.

Quality education took a back seat on the bus under this program and it is now evident that such a program destroys the concept of the neighborhood school and parental support for that school.

It has also become evident that using the color of a person's skin to determine assignment to a particular school is in itself discrimination.

There are those who argue that it takes too long to get two-thirds of the Congress to approve such a measure . . . too long to get three-fourths of the States to ratify. However, I feel as other parents, do, that an amendment is the only guarantee we have that the courts will not be running our schools.

This issue will come up for a vote within the next week . . . it is imperative that it pass.

FEDERAL BUREAUCRACY DECREASES

The number of persons on the Federal payroll is gradually decreasing under the Nixon administration. At a high of 2.6 million in 1969, the number of government employees now stands at 2.5 million.

This figure would decrease even more when the Nixon plan for reorganization to cut out duplication and overlapping is put into effect.

Thus far, however, the President has been stymied in this effort by an opposition - controlled Congress which continues to implement more federal agencies.

Social Security \$86,000 A Month In Donley County

Social security benefits were being paid to 897 residents of Donley county at a rate of \$86,000 a month at the close of 1971, Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo, reports.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Donley county, 634 are retired workers and their dependents, 184 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, 65 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents, and 14 are receiving special Age 72 benefits.

Briggs pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60. In Texas, 355,662 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. Nearly 202,000 are under age 10, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the 35,349 beneficiaries in Texas between 18 and 22 years of age, are getting student's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to age 22, if the child is attending school full time.

Also in this 18-22 age group, Briggs said, are some other type of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that the social security program provides workers of all ages. Some are children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 18 and who will probably never be able to work and become self-supporting. The monthly benefit

fits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely. Benefits are also payable to the mother if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

Briggs said that another relatively small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving benefits as disabled workers. Social security disability payments can be paid to a person who becomes disabled for work even if he has less than 5 years of work under social security. As little as 1 1/2 years of work is required in the case of a worker who becomes disabled before age 24, Briggs said.

Lakeview Watershed Project Up For Bids

The sponsors of the Lakeview Watershed have been notified that bids for Site No. 4 are being accepted, according to the District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service of Clarendon, Monty Sowers.

Contracts for construction work on Site 4 of the Lakeview Watershed project, the largest structure of those being built, will be signed at the State Office of the Soil Conservation Service.

The Site 4 project located on

the Hagy Ranch south of Clarendon calls for moving 500,000 yards of dirt and when completed will hold about 200 acre feet of water at the principal spillway. The primary purpose of the Lakeview Watershed is to control flood damages to cropland, rangeland, pasture land roads and towns. Secondary benefits derived from the project may be recreation, park areas, and fishing.

Sowers further stated, "Construction of Site 4 will be a significant part, though only the beginning of a massive project which will have 25 retention struc-

tures and 19 miles of stream channel improvement."

Fertilized Pastures Are Still Green

Adequately fertilized pastures are staying green and providing good quality grazing despite the strenuous summertime temperatures.

"The additional plant food supplied by fertilization increases both the quality and quantity of most pasture grasses," contends Dr. Neal Pratt, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has shown that fertilized grasses can produce three to four times as much forage with the same amount of rainfall as grasses which have not been fertilized. This is especially important during the hot Texas weather when rainfall is often limited."

Added bonuses from fertilization come in the form of more palatable and more nutritious growth of grasses. The improved nutrition is due to the higher level of protein usually found in fertilized grasses, points out the Texas A&M University specialist.

"Plant food encourages a healthy root system of grasses," says Pratt. "Such root systems are capable of obtaining both nutrients and moisture at greater depths than otherwise possible. Thus, an out-reaching plant is able to use moisture more effectively and water losses are minimized."

Improved pastures and better grasses mean increased returns on livestock. And boosting livestock profits is a mighty good reason to fertilize, believes the

agronomist. For further information on pasture grasses and forage production, Pratt suggests that producers contact their local county Extension office.
