Leonard Selvidge, Dean of Students of Clarendon College, announced that at the end of registration on September 17, 1971 the total enrollment at the College this year was 423 students with 419 of these attending school last year this shows an increase of 12 students but an increase of 27 students on a full time basis or an increase of 8.4%.

The Administration and Faculty are well pleased with the caliber of students this year with many departments showing sizeable increase. Agriculture, Business, Education, Pre-Law, Physical Education, Speech and Drama, and Science reflecting the major interest of the students.

The enrollment represents 278 Freshmen and 145 Sophomores with the attendance showing 275 Male students and 148 Female students. Donley County accounts for 74 students of the total with Hall, Grey, Childress, Collingsworth, Hardin, Wheeler, Moore, Ochiltree, and Briscoe counties following. Farm News

In the past, Donley County has been divided into eight com munities - A through H. Three community committeemen and two alternates were elected from each community. The three committeemen served as delegates to the county convention to elect the County Committe.

We are now approved to be one-community county. The coun ty committee will also serve as the community committee and

will be elected by popular vote. For 1972, it is necessary to elect one regular member to the ASC county committee for a three year term. This is the place now held by Lacy Noble, whose term will expire at the end of 1971. It is also necessary to elect a first and second alternate for a one year term.

The county committee election this year will be held on December 1. Ballots will be mailed about 12 days before the election

A slate of at least four nominees will be developed for the county. Voters have the right to nominate by petition. Blank for nominating by petition may be obtained here at the office. Each petition submitted must

1. Limited to one nominee. 2. Signed by at least 3 eligible

voters in the county. 3. Include a certification that he nominee is willing to serve

4. Received at the County AS-CS Office not later than October

If four or more eligible candidates are nominated by proper petition, no further nominations will be made. If less than 4 are nominated by petition, the present County Committee will add WTSU Buffs Win the number of nominees needed to complete the slate of four.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. In general, a farmer is eligible to be a County Committeeman if he lives in the couny and is eligible to vote.

MOISTURE TOTAL GROWS AND MORE IN PROSPECT

More good, soaking rain was received this past week to bring the September total to 2.28 so far and more rain is in the present forecast. This brings the year's total to an even 16 inches which brings us up close to normal for the year.

The moisture was needed for crops that were beginning to suffer from the 100 degree temperature a short time ago but the quite cool temperature is not helping very much at present. Indications right now are for an early frost or freeze and we certainly don't need anything like that until late in the fall.



Under the Agricultural Act of 1970. actual yield for 1971 will be used in computing the pay ment base for 1972 and '73. This is an additional incentive for individual producers to do a better job on all production practices, particularly harvesting efficiency

Secure cotton markets require a dependable source of raw materials for spinners. Thus, keeping a complete inventory of the various lint qualities in sufficient supply is a necessary part of a stable cotton industry. Efforts by producers to increase yield will therefore add to the stability of the cotton industry of the future, the Director asserts.

The Extension Service is cooperating with producer organizations, mass media, lending agencies, the National Cotton Comwith the industry to emphasize the need for better cotton yields in 1971. This effort will be supported by news releases, radio tapes, field demonstrations, county meetings for producers, area meetings for ginners and special publications that are available

Teenagers May Prefer Odd Breakfast

Do you have a normally active enage girl in your home-one vho doesn't like to eat a con ventional breakfast?

She could choose to eat a sandich for breakfast, according to Frances Reasonover, Extension oods and nutrition specialist at Texas A&M University. Why not? Miss Reasonover says

the important point is that you eat as you like, as long as the foods you choose for the entire day include specified amounts from the basic four food groups, and as long as you meet calo-

She explains that a day's eating might start like this: a cheese sandwich for breakfast along with a banana and a glass

of milk. If that doesn't appeal, you may want to begin the day with spaghetti, chili, baked beans or deviled eggs. For a normally active girl of

average height-5 feet 3 inches eighing 117 pounds, multiply 117 by 20 calories and you find that she needs approximately 2,300 to 2,400 calories each day. Her food intake should include 4 cups of milk or the equivalent 4 servings of fruits and vegetables, making sure to include 4 or more servings from the bread-cereal group; and 2 serv-

ings from the meat group. The guide is flexible. The specific foods chosen from each group and the time when eaten. either as meals or snacks, is largely a matter of food preferences and family meal routine,

But, the specialist adds, remember to choose right and maintain a desirable weight.



A big push is on from the top to bring about drastic revision in the state's auto insurance system which is the subject of increasing criticism as rates go up nearly every year.

Gov. Preston Smith at the recent national governors' conference in San Juan, Puerto Rico, once more reaffirmed his support of competitive rates and 'no-fault' insurance.

State Insurance Board Member Larry Teaver at the same conference announced a wide-ranging survey will get under way with a view to switching to competive rates and "no-fault."

The survey will be financed with a \$175,000 appropriation to the Insurance Board for research purposes. Treaver said out-ofstate specialists with no industry connections will be called on to advise the board.

"I want the study approached from a consumer standpoint and not for the companies' benefit," Smith announced.

Under no-fault insurance, insured victims are compensated regardless of who was at fault. Instead of having liability insurance to cover losses of others, a driver under the no-fault system buys coverage that pays for his loss in spite of who was

at fault. Pennsylvania Insurance Commission Herbert S. Denenberg told the nation's governors in their recent conference that the federal government will move to set up a national no-fault system if states don't act to create a reasonably uniform and adequate network of laws.

Massachusetts Gov. Francis W. Sargent claimed the plan saved motorists \$76 million in premium

charges in his state this year. American Trial Lawyers Association members oppose no-fault as reducing legal rights of accident victims to sue for fair recovery of all losses.

OIL ALLOWABLE DOWN AGAIN — For the sixth straight month, Texas Railroad Commission lowered the state's oil al-

October production maximum was set at 63.2 per cent of potential compared with 65.1 per cent for this month. Maximum production for October is estimated at 3,131. 217 barrels daily, a reduction of about 78,861 from the September top.

Commission Chairman Byron Tunnel said Texas crude supplies total 102.9 million barrels, a decrease of about 5.4 million barrels from last year.

Eleven of 15 major crude oil purchasers asked for the same allowable in October as in September. Three requested less and only one wanted more.

Mauzy said if the Board does not do the job, a special legislative session will be required, or lawmakers would have to run statewide at large. October 23 is the Board's deadline for action. Legislative candidates must establish residency by November 7 for the 1972 elections. Mauzy wants the Court to order the Board to create single-member House districts in the metropolitan counties






