### Federal Help To Drought Sections

Farmers who are following a balanced plan of operation are in a much better position to withstand the onslaught of a drought which is spreading into many large areas over the Great Plains region, according to L. H. Hauter, regional director of the Farm Security Administration, with headquarters at Amarillo, Texas.

At a meeting last week in Amarillo, FSA field employees gave reports on conditions which leads many Department of Agriculture officials to believe the drought may become as severe as the one in 1935.

"Those farmers," Mr. Hauter said, "who are dividing their operations into various sources of income have experienced the fastest recovery from the last period of crop failures and depressed prices for farm products. It is reasonable to assume that those families having more than one source of income will fare better than those who are dependent on a one-cropping system."

Welfare Board Says Those Drawing \$6 or Under Will be Dropped

Reduction in old age pension checks ordered last Friday by the Texas Public Welfare Board, will mean a loss to Donley county pensioners of the Texas Old Age Assistance commission of \$2,039.

The slash becomes effective with the issue of checks for October. Checks for September have already been sent out. In Donley county there are 199 persons on the old age pension rolls, and the monthly amount paid them has been approximately \$3200. The September total was \$3233, but some months the total drops to around \$3100.

The State Board announces that those receiving \$6 or less in the past, will be dropped from the rolls. Those who have been receiving more than that amount, will get the \$6 for October.

### Shelterbelt To Be Wider Area

#### Tree Plantings Show Nominal Loss Despite Severe Drought Season

More land owners are to take advantage of the shelterbelt opportunity offered land owners the coming season than ever before, so stated Roy B. Morgan, junior forester of District One who was here Tuesday. His headquarters office is in Shamrock.

Mr. Morgan has over a hundred applications on file for the free tree planting which he stated would begin about the first of December. Applications for current planting will be accepted up to December 15th, he said.

Considering the drought and the rodents, the plantings are showing up well. Rabbits did more damage than any other pest, and they have been held in check by proper means used under the direction of the forestry department.

Several hundred miles of trees were planted in Donley county last season. D. S. Miller, squad foreman located in Clarendon, has been out with a crew looking after the care of the trees all summer.

"We find more people willing to keep their trees free of weeds in this section of the southwest, than any other part of the country," Mr. Morgan stated.
