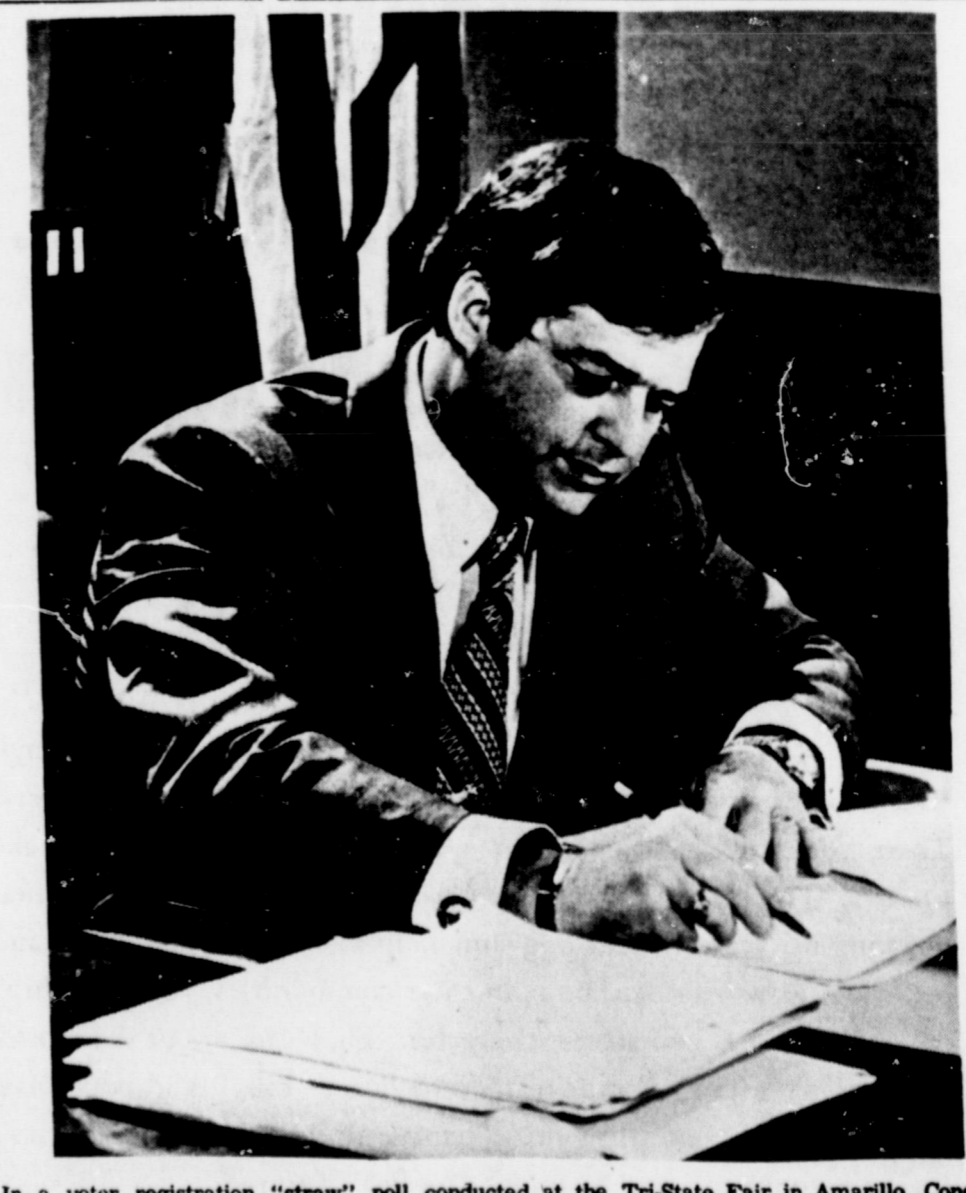

In a voter registration "straw" poll conducted at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo, Congressman Bob Price bested his opponent almost 4 to 1. The actual percentages were 71 percent for Price and 29 percent for Purcell. The poll also showed President Nixon leading Senator McGovern 82 percent to 18 percent, and Senator Tower leading Sanders 70 percent to 30 percent.

The registration drive and "straw" poll were conducted by the League of Women Voters and by Amarillo Radio Station KIXZ. Over 4,000 people participated in the sample balloting and approximately 500 people were registered to vote.

The Nixon-Tower-Price ticket has led the McGovern-Sanders-Purcell ticket in previous surveys conducted, but never by such large percentages.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

Senate rejection of Secretary of State Bob Bullock to the State Insurance Board amid the special session's bitterest infighting opened new speculation as to who may get the job.

Sources close to Gov. Preston Smith appeared to be deliberately encouraging rumors that former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough would be the Governor's next choice for the Insurance Board.

Yarborough himself said he had never been offered the post by the Governor or even felt out on his availability by intermediaries. AFL-CIO President Roy Evans and State Sen. Oscar Mauzy formally urged Smith to designate Yarborough, and Mauzy predicted the former senator could get state confirmation where Bullock and Larry Teaver failed.

Would he take the job if offered? Said Yarborough "That's entirely too 'iffy' a question."

Senators voted 19-11 (with one abstaining) for the Bullock confirmation. Eleven opposition votes can block any appointment.

Bullock promptly blamed Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and the insurance industry lobby for his defeat.

Smith chastised the Senate, charging the body "apparently will not permit a person who is committed to protecting the insurance consumer serve on the State Board of Insurance."

Bullock foes claimed the Governor had used some persuasive tactics of his own, dangling the prospect of submitting pet home district projects to the Legislature for senators who would support Bullock.

The Secretary of State said he now intends to remain in his present job through the Smith administration.

SESSION SUCCESS DOUBTED — Some legislators are doubting if the special legislative session really is going to come up with a competitive rating bill, the subject Smith called them to work on.

Senator Mauzy of Dallas, one of the bill sponsors in the Senate, says he doesn't think a competitive rate bill can be agreed on because of House opposition. Mauzy charged the House committee hearing the rate measure is lobby dominated.

Conflicting testimony was heard on advantages vs. disadvantages of free competition in rating during week-long testimony by out-of-state experts.

At the end of the period, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes acknowledged: "I have never been so much in the dark on legislation. People want to vote for a bill, but proponents have not done a good enough job convincing people competitive rates would be beneficial."

AGENDA BROADENED — A special session that started off confirmed to insurance and broadening the governor's fiscal powers has three times been expanded.

Smith earlier submitted trailer-brake-light exemption, school disannexation, exempting aviation schools from the proprietary school act, and reimbursement of medical schools for \$13.5 million in funds "borrowed" to avert a 1970 welfare crisis.

Last week, he asked the Legislature to define the state's role and responsibility in developing deep draft offshore port facilities.

The next day, he proposed an appropriation to the governor for emergency use, authority for the chief executive to meet certain fiscal emergencies from the fund, a \$365,000 supplemental appropriation to finance this year's primary elections and permanent statutory establishment of the Texas Film Commission as a division of the governor's office.

HIGHWAY FUNDS SHORT — Demand for better highways is running ahead of state ability to pay for them, Highway Commission Chairman DeWitt C. Greer says.

Highway work pending ranges in need "from immediate to desperate," according to Greer, and there is no money in sight.

An adequate program for next year, with maintenance and operational costs, would carry a price tag of \$1.2 billion, Greer estimates.

Highway Department met in the next 12 months is estimated at about \$482 million. Greer cites these factors in the financial squeeze:

It now takes \$1.58 to buy highway construction that cost \$1 only 10 years ago.

Release of money from the federal highway trust fund has been spasmodic for several years. This year, Texas anticipated about \$283 million from the trust fund — derived from federal highway user taxes. Actually, prospects are the state will receive only about \$189 million from the federal trust fund.

Greer says the Highway Commission has pending requests for highway projects totalling about \$2.7 billion. The Commission is pushing for a gasoline tax raise next year.

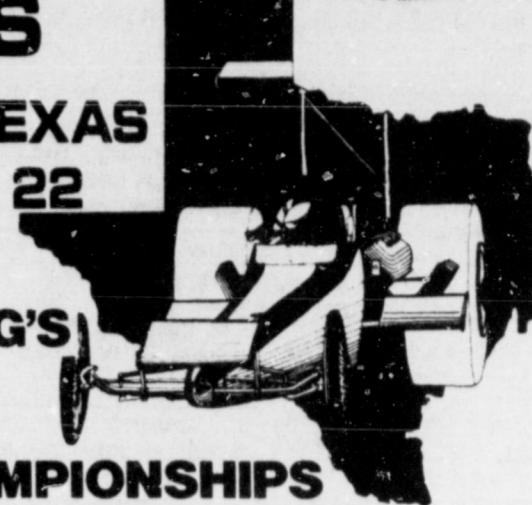

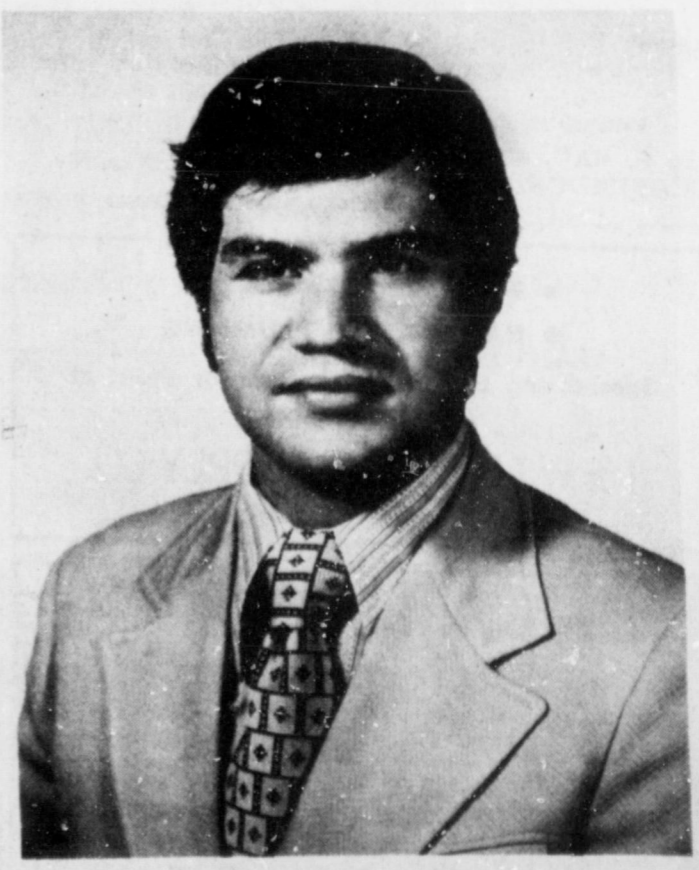

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### Accent On Health

#### RHEUMATIC DISEASE

This is a story of drama, mystery, pain, hope, frustration, and miracles. It's a story that directly concerns 40 million or more Americans, the story of rheumatic disease, among the greatest cripplers of mankind.

These cripplers are gout, arthritis, rheumatic fever, and a host of allied ailments that affect joints and muscles. They claim 12 million victims in this country by medical estimate.

Today arthritis and other rheumatic diseases are among the greatest causes of chronic disability in the United States. The total number of victims is as great as the total population of the State of Texas. Of the 12 million estimated to be ill, a quarter-million are completely disabled.

Rheumatism and arthritis rarely kill. But this family of diseases includes rheumatic fever, one of the biggest killer diseases among children 5 to 19 years old.

The word "rheumatism" refers to the pains and aches that result from a good many different causes. It includes several kinds of arthritis—rheumatoid, osteoarthritis, and arthritis due to injury and infections. It also includes gout, and rheumatic fever, and rheumatic diseases of tissues other than joints.

More than four million Americans suffer from rheumatoid arthritis, in many ways the worst of the rheumatic cripplers. Eighty percent of the cases of this disease occurs between the ages of 25 and 50, and it usually starts between 35 and 40.

Rheumatoid arthritis also afflicts children, and sometimes waits until after middle age to strike. It is three times more common among women than men.

This type of arthritis is a chronic inflammation of the connective tissue of joints and their sheaths which bind muscles and other tissue together. The tissue lining the joint cavities seems to be particularly affected, and the gristle becomes diseased and may be destroyed. Bony growths sometimes occur on joints and nearby tissues, causing more stiffness and pain on movement.

The spine may be involved, leading to stiffness or curvature. But it is not just a disease of joints. Rather it is a general or systemic illness, and may involve the heart, nerves, muscles, and other tissues. Often the first complaints in this disease are tiredness or exhaustion, loss of weight, and muscular stiffness.

And what is the cause? Researchers are working hard to find out. There are many theories. One is infection, but the guilty viruses have not yet been identified. Another is that it is a change in metabolism — the way your body uses foodstuffs and carries on its work. A breakdown in the complex balance of body hormones also is suspected.

According to other theories it is a disease of blood vessels in the affected areas, a disease of the nervous system, an emotion-spawned or psychogenic disease, or some kind of hypersensitivity or "allergy." Many things are known, but we do not yet know all the facts.

Of all the peculiar things about rheumatoid arthritis, some physicians were struck by two facts over the years. One was that the disease disappeared in women when they become pregnant, although it would reappear after each birth. Another was that the disease usually disappeared in people who came down with jaundice.

Some change in the output of one or more body hormones—the chemical controllers produced by body glands—was suspected. And the evidence pointed to one of the hormones from the adrenal glands lying over the kidneys. One of these hormones, made synthetically after years of work, is cortisone. This discovery has proved effective in the treatment of arthritis and other rheumatic disease. But much more work and research is still to be done.

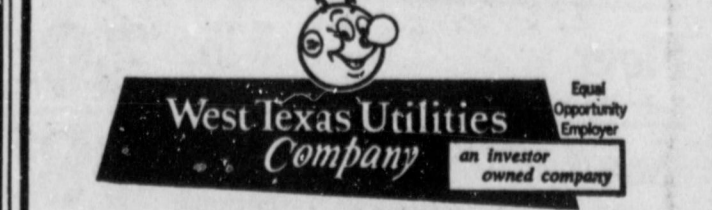

### Domestic Council Committee On Aging Announces A "Rent Watch" For Elderly

At a recent meeting, the Cabinet-level Domestic Council Committee on Aging approved a "rent-watch" plan to protect elderly from unfair or unjustified rent increases that might result from the 20 percent Social Security increase that will take effect in October.

In October, many elderly will receive a substantial increase in their monthly income. One of the real fears of the elderly is that commensurate with that rise will be large increases in their rents. The current Phase II rent con-

trol should prevent this occurrence since rents may only be increased under certain circumstances as provided under the Rent Stabilization Regulations. However, to ensure that the elderly are protected from unfair or unjustified rent increases, the following 4-point program will be undertaken:

1. A press release will alert elderly tenants to unreasonable increases in rent during the coming months. Further, it will warn

landlords renting to the elderly that the Economic Stabilization Program will be closely monitoring the effect of the Social Security increase on the rents elderly pay.

2. Articles will be published in magazines read by the elderly describing in simple terms and layman's language the provisions of rent controls which affect them. The articles will stress proper notification of a rent increase, and how an older American can exercise his rights through the field offices of the Internal Revenue Service.

3. Local releases by District Directors of the Internal Revenue Service alerting the elderly about rent increases will ask the elderly to report an unreasonable rent increase to the Service, and provide quick follow-up and investigation. This special handling of elderly complaints should encourage the elderly to exercise their rights, minimize their fears, and put landlords on warning that their rental units will be watched.
4. Spot checks will be initiated in October by the Internal Revenue Service on buildings occupied by and which cater to the elderly.

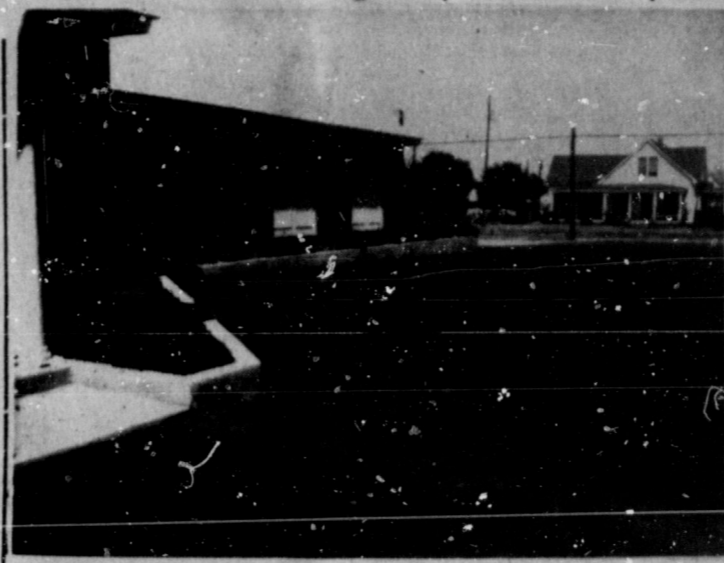

A House Bill to have spray dipping approved as an alternative to total submersion in the treatment of cattle for scabies control has been recommended by both the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lt. Governor for inclusion in the call of the Special Session. Co-sponsor of the bill is Rep. Tom Christian of Claude.

At present, the Texas law recognizes total submersion as the only acceptable method of treatment for cattle scabies. However, cattlemen are now leaning toward the spray dip method, saying that it is more satisfactory, easily adaptable and would produce the same results.
