Funeral services held for Allen Homer Estlack, Sr.

Funeral services for Allen Homer Estlack, Sr., age 70, were held at 3:00 p.m. on Friday, July 26, 1985, in the First United Methodist Church of Clarendon with Rev. James T. Carter officiating. Masonic graveside services and interment were in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Estlack died at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, July 24, 1985 at the Donley County Medical Center. He was born January 19, 1915, in Eunice, New Mexico. He moved with his family to Clarendon in 1919 where he attended Clarendon Schools and Clarendon Junior College. He married Athlyn Drennan on June 27, 1936. He owned Estlack Machinery in Clarendon for more than thirty years. He had worked for Becknel Wholesale Company of Lubbock for seven years and was Executive Director of the Clarendon Local Housing Authority at the time of his death.

He was a Methodist and a member of Clarendon Masonic Lodge, Al Morrah Shrine Club and the Khiva Temple. He was a member of the Clarendon Lions Club for 45 years with 39 years of perfect attendance. He was named "Man of the Year" in 1973 and received special recognition

from Lions International in 1978 for recruiting 75 new members and at the time of his death had recruited in excess of 100 new members. He was a Past President and was currently serving as Secretary. He was on the Clarendon School Board for twelve years and served as its president for a number of those years.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Athlyn Estlack of Clarendon; a son, Allen Homer, Jr., of Clarendon; a daughter, Donna Hicks of Clarendon; two brothers, George Wayne of Clarendon and Eugene of Austin; and four grandchildren, Kyle Allen, Kari Hodges, Roger Estlack and Russell Estlack all of Clarendon.

Casket bearers were Willard Hudson, W.T. Weatherly, Tommie Saye, W.W. Lovelady, Walter B. Knorpp, and James Bain. Honorary bearers were Lee Bell, Bill Greene, members of the Lions Club, and members of the Masonic Lodge.

The family requests that memorials be to the Homer Estlack Memorial Scholarship Fund, which is a fund for Clarendon High School seniors planning to go to Clarendon College and which is being established at the Donley County State Bank, or to the First United Methodist Church of Clarendon.

Dr. Rex Fuller has been associated with the Christian Law Association since it was organized in 1977. In their defense of church schools, their attorneys have called upon him to serve as an expert witness in several court cases. Dr. Fuller has extensive training in the field of education. He graduated from Miltonvale Wesleyan College in Miltonvale, Kansas. He received his Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees from the Kansas State Teachers College in Emporia, Kansas, and his Doctorate in Educational Administration from the University of Kansas in Lawrence, Kansas.

Dr. Fuller's experience includes 15 years in public education where he worked as a classroom teacher, school principal, director of university reading and curriculum laboratory, and director of a federally-funded E.S.E.A. Title III program serving 12 school districts in Kansas. Then God burdened his heart with the necessity of Christian education for his children and the call to serve Christian schools. From 1973 to 1983 Dr. Fuller served as the superintendent of the Fellowship Baptist Schools, which include four church schools in the Kansas City area. From 1975 to 1983 he also served as a regional coordinator for Accelerated Christian Education in Lewisville, Texas.

Dr. Fuller and his wife, Charlotte, have experienced the blessings of Christian education upon their family. Their son, Edwin, is the pastor of the Flint Hills Baptist Church in Osage City, Kansas. Edwin and his wife, Sandra, have been blessed with two daughters. Their daughter Cindi and her husband, Kevin Metsinger, are serving the Lord in the Christian education ministry of the South Knollwood Baptist Church in Topeka, Kansas. Through them God has blessed the Fullers with a grandson.

Dr. Fuller has visited hundreds of church schools in America and witnessed firsthand much of the conflict which has taken place as churches have endeavored to be obedient to God. He is well qualified to present the issues facing churches and church ministries today.

Dr. Fuller will be speaking at the Calvary Baptist Church, Highway 287 & Jackson, this Sunday, August 4th at 10:00 a.m. His topic will be "Standing for the Cause of Christ." Pastor Pinion invites the public to hear this dynamic speaker.

Efficient irrigation systems save soil as well as water

Irrigated acres have the potential for serious erosion problems, says Wilson Scaling, Chief of USDA's Soil Conservation Service. As much as 70 tons of sediment yield per acre has been measured on some furrow irrigated fields, which is 20 times above acceptable soil erosion for those soils.

Fortunately, the potential exists on irrigated lands for soil and water savings, says Scaling. SCS is helping irrigators, especially in water-short

or highly erosive areas, to evaluate the efficiency of their irrigation systems and is recommending ways to improve them.

Any irrigation system should be part of a complete conservation plan, District Conservationist Jim Donaho said. Improved irrigation practices, conserve and protect water as well as soil. And soil erosion is being recognized more and more as a problem not only on the farm, but beyond the farm gate too.

Tuesday, August 6th at 9:00 a.m. there will be a field tour of minimum tillage cotton and peanut farming using Ro-Till tillage equipment. The tour will be held on the Joe Ike Clay and Billy Shannon farms in Motley County between Flomont and Quitaque. Clay and Shannon have used the Ro-Till equipment for the past two years to prepare the seedbed, tertilize, incorporate nematicide and plant in one operation. This technique when used in wheat stubble leaves all but the planted furrows undisturbed and wind erosion problems are practically eliminated. All interested persons are invited

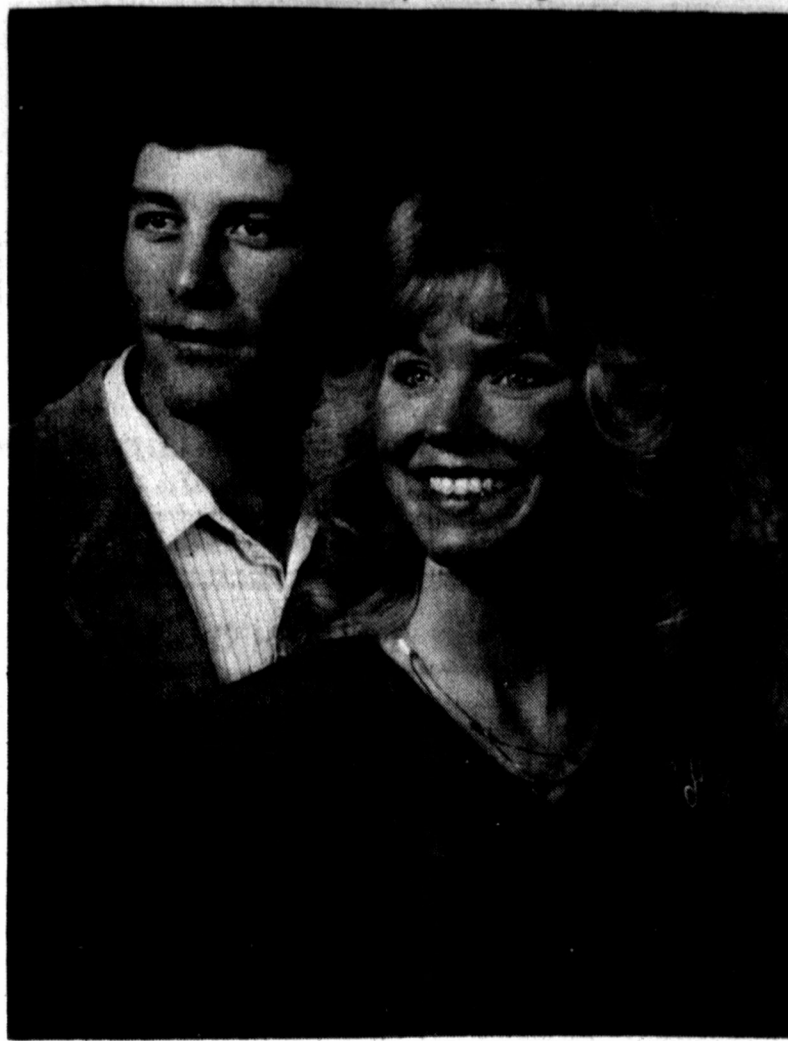

LET'S KEEP OUR DOCTOR

Residents of Clarendon and Donley County are in danger of losing Dr. Carl Hudson, not because he does not have the patient load but because of lack of payment for services rendered.

Dr. Hudson cares for most of the residents of Medical Center Nursing Home, and in addition to office practice, is on call 24 hours a day, makes house calls when necessary, and responds to emergency calls. Medicare payments are slow if at all. Maybe the Hospital District Board could help with this problem.

If we are to keep him in Clarendon, a fund is going to have to be set up to supplement his income to a manageable level. He has asked that he be assured of an income equal to that of our football coaches, some \$28,000 a year. He has been trying to maintain his office expense and living expenses on some \$13,000 a year...a near impossibility.

Should he leave and it be necessary for the community to raise money to encourage another doctor to settle here, the cost will be much greater. Other areas are offering up to \$60,000 and still have no doctor. Prospects of a much larger income encourage doctors to establish practices in cities.

Dr. Gilkey has served our area well but he is not physically able to take on an additional load.

Our community has always responded to the needs of others and

has worked toward the betterment of the area.

If all of the organizations, governing entities, clubs and individuals would unite their efforts perhaps a fund could be set up at each of the banks to assure that we are able to keep Dr. Hudson.

In talking with Dr. Hudson he stated that he would like to remain in Clarendon. He likes Clarendon and its people. The problem is purely one of economics.

The Estlack family has recently experienced sorrow. It is comforting to know that Dr. Hudson, our wonderful paramedic team, and the staff of nurses at Medical Center were there to do everything humanly possible for Homer. My Mother, who is visiting me from Arizona, needed medical care Friday, the day of Homer's Memorial Service. Dr. Hudson was there to help out.

Prospective Industry, new residents, community growth...among the first questions to answer...What kind of medical care is available?

It is time to act. Perhaps the Chamber of Commerce, a committee within the Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Board, Lions Club, or some other organization will start this project. We sincerely hope so. Individual contributions are going to be necessary. Speak up, citizens, and let your voice be heard. Call members of your Hospital Board, Chamber of Commerce Directors, Lions Club Directors, heads of organizations. Your help is needed.

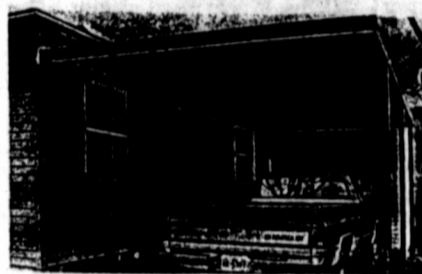
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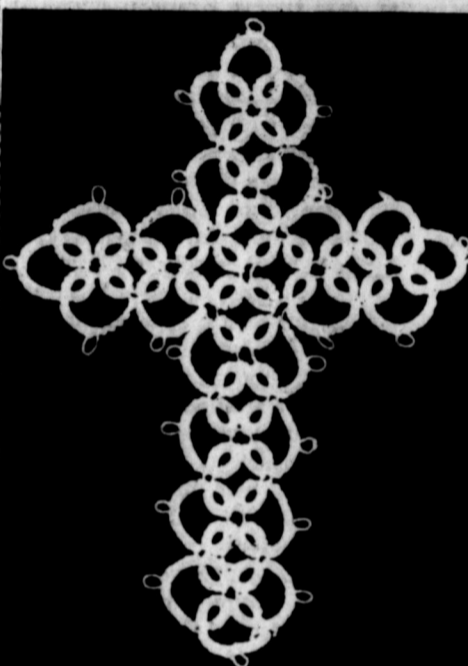

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From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



As we continue our study of "Three Classes of Men" we want to finish up last week's article in which we began to discuss the natural man. Our key text will be I Corinthians 2:14.

The unsaved man, though educated with all of "man's wisdom," and though religious and attentive, is blind to the gospel (II Corinthians 4:3,4) and if called upon to formulate a doctrinal statement, will naturally formulate a "new theology" which is so "re-stated" as to omit the real meaning of the cross with its unfolding of the "deep things of God." The cross, as a substitution-

ary sacrifice for sin, is "foolishness" unto him. His very limitations as a "natural man" demand that this shall be so. Human wisdom cannot help him, for "the world by wisdom knew not God." On the other hand, the boundless "deep things of God" are to be "freely" given to the one who has received "the Spirit which is of God." The true child of God may, therefore, be taught the divine revelation, having received the Spirit. A trained mind, it may be added, divine revelation, having received the Spirit. A trained mind, it may be added, will greatly assist; but apart from the presence of the indwelling Teacher, a trained mind avails nothing in coming to know the spiritual meaning of the revealed things of God.

Measureless evil has arisen through the supposition that because a man is well advanced in the "wisdom of this world," his opinions are of value in spiritual matters. The "natural man," with all his learning and sincerity, will find nothing but "foolishness" in the things which are revealed by the Spirit. The knowledge of science cannot be substituted for the indwelling of, and right relation to, the Holy Spirit of God. Apart from the Spirit there can be no regeneration, and the "deep things of God" are unknowable. When an unregenerate teacher openly rejects the vital saving truths of God's Word, those truths will usually be discredited and discarded by the pupil. This is the colossal blunder of many students in universities and colleges today.

It is too generally assumed that the teacher or preacher who is an authority in some branch or branches of human knowledge is, by virtue of that knowledge, equally capable of

discernment in spiritual things. It is not so. An unregenerate person (and who is more assuredly unregenerate than the one who denies the foundation and reality of the new birth?) will always be incapable of receiving and knowing the simplest truths of revelation. God is not a reality to the natural man. "God is not in all his thoughts." The unsaved man is therefore distressed and burdened to dispose of the supernatural. A baseless theory of evolution is his best answer to the problem of the origin of the universe. To the regenerate man, God is real and there is satisfaction and rest in the confidence that God is Creator and Lord of all.

The ability to receive and know the things of God is not attained through the schools, for many who are unlearned possess it while many who are learned do not possess it. It is an ability which is born of the indwelling Spirit. For this reason the Spirit has been given to those who are saved that they might know the things which are freely given to them of God. Yet among Christians there are some who are under limitations because of their carnality. They are unable to receive "meat" because of carnality, rather than ignorance.

There are no divine classifications among the unsaved, for they are all said to be "natural" men. There are, however, two classifications of the saved, and in the text under consideration, the "spiritual" man is named before the "carnal" man and is thus placed in direct contrast with the unsaved. This is fitting because the "spiritual" man is the divine ideal. "He that is Spiritual" (I Corinthians 2:15) is the normal, if not the usual, Christian. But there is a "carnal" man and he must be considered.

We will learn more about the carnal man next week.

W.L. and Faye Armstrong spent twelve years in North Sumatra as missionaries of the Methodist Church, working among the Batak people from 1964 through 1976. Faye will help in family life seminars as well as in rural health and hygiene.

W.L. and Faye are being sponsored entirely by the Northwest Texas Annual Conference. All funds are handled through the Conference treasurer.

W.L. and Faye visited the United Methodist Church at Hedley on July 24 and gave a program about the work they will be doing in North Sumatra. They expect to leave in October.

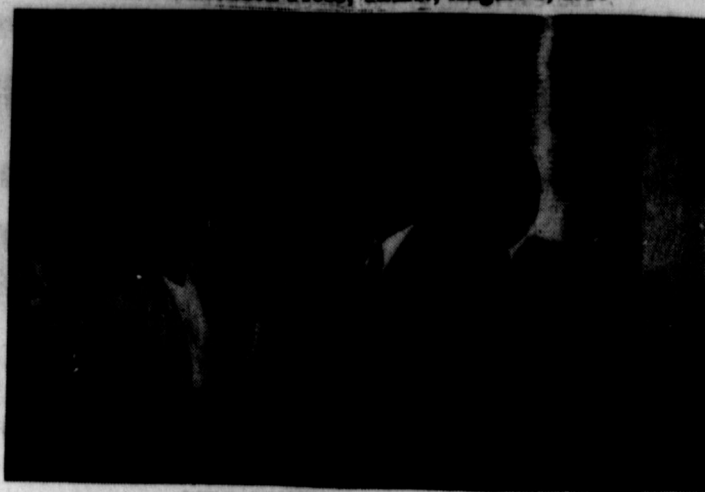

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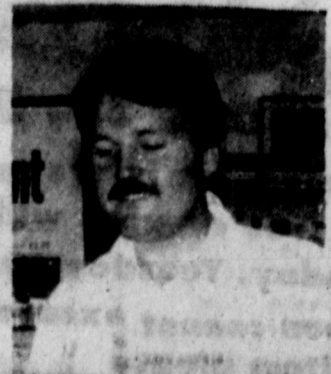
SUMMER SHADES

Americans spend \$900 million for sunglasses each year. Many pairs are obtained from pharmacies. And although some persons think of sunglasses as devices intended primarily to improve one's appearance, there may also be health benefits. For example, some eye authorities believe that long-term exposure to ultraviolet light (the kind we cannot see) can damage the retina and, also, lead to cataracts. It is wise, therefore, to select sunglasses that are likely to filter this invisible and potentially damaging light. Suggestions for selection of

"new shades" offered in a recent issue of HEALTH magazine include:

- *avoid blue- and rose-tinted colors that do not tend to filter UV light; select amber, brown, gray, or green.
- *consider polarized lenses for use around the glare of sand, water, or snow.
- *select sunglasses that filter at least 95% of UV light (label or tag may so indicate).
- *do not confuse "high price" with "quality"; inexpensive sunglasses are often effective in filtering potentially damaging UV light.

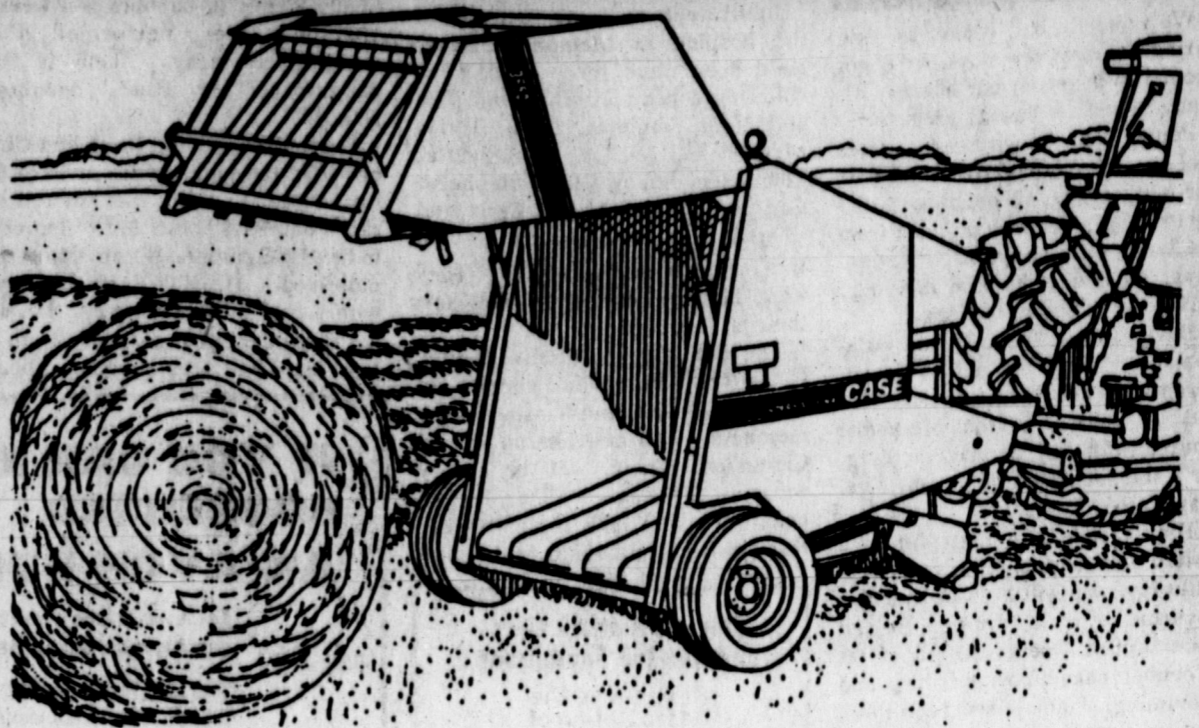
