

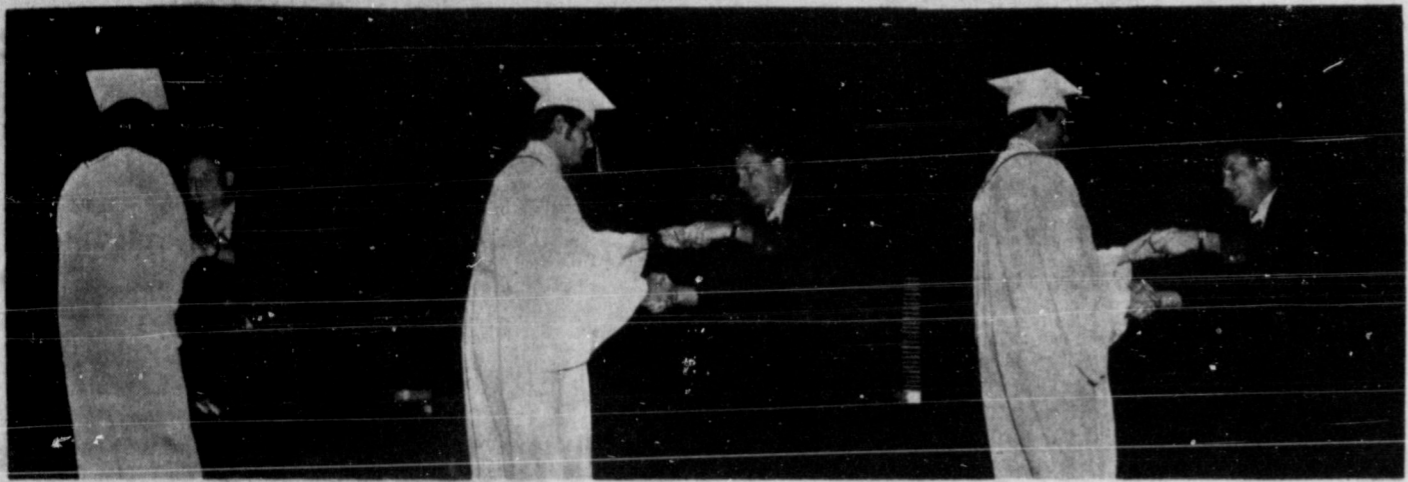

55 Absentee Votes Indicate Big Turnout Of Democratic Voters

Elizabeth McGarity Awarded Presbyterian National Scholarship

Lois Elizabeth McGarity, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Owen McGarity of Clarendon, has won one of the National Presbyterian College Scholarships which are awarded to young people from all sections of the nation.

Winners of National Presbyterian College Scholarships have just been announced by the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. The winners, eighty-one in number, will be entering in September thirty-one colleges related to the denomination's Board of Christian Education. The winners come from twenty-three states in all parts of the country.

The well-known scholarships are funded from two sources, the Board of Christian Education and the particular college to which the student is going. The students whose scholarship are funded from the first source, who are known as Board-sponsored Scholars, number twenty-five. Those whose scholarships are funded from the second source, known as college-sponsored Scholars, number fifty-six. Scholarship winners funded from either source meet identical eligibility requirements, are chosen by the same national selection committee, and are selected according to the same criteria of academic and personal merit.

Miss McGarity has chosen to attend Trinity University, San Antonio. Her brother, Arthur, is presently a student at Trinity.

Although the list of candidates was cut down to just a few in the first primary election, it looks like a big turnout of voters for the second primary election this coming Saturday, June 3 with the remaining races being hotly contested from U. S. offices down to the local level. 55 absentee votes have been cast with 20 voting Tuesday.

We have only one race in the county and that being Commissioner of Precinct No. 1. The run-off candidates are Doyce Graham and Gene White.

Of other local interest especially is the District Attorney race between incumbent Jack Boone and John Deaver.

For United States Senator, Ralph W. Yarborough and Barefoot Sanders are really slugging it out as the time draws nearer for the vote counting.

The surprise candidate in the Governor's race is Mrs. Frances Farenthold who seems to be holding her own with Dolph Briscoe. Mrs. Farenthold seems to be gaining strength each day and certainly has a good chance of going in as the next governor of Texas.

Other state candidates are: Wayne Connally and Bill Hobby for Lt. Governor and Robert S. Calvert and James Wilson for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

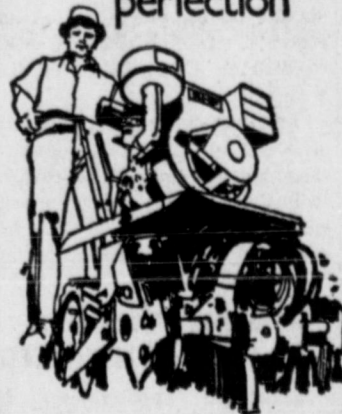

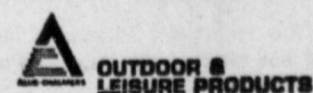

Roddy said he expects that one hundred boys from this area will register for the competition.

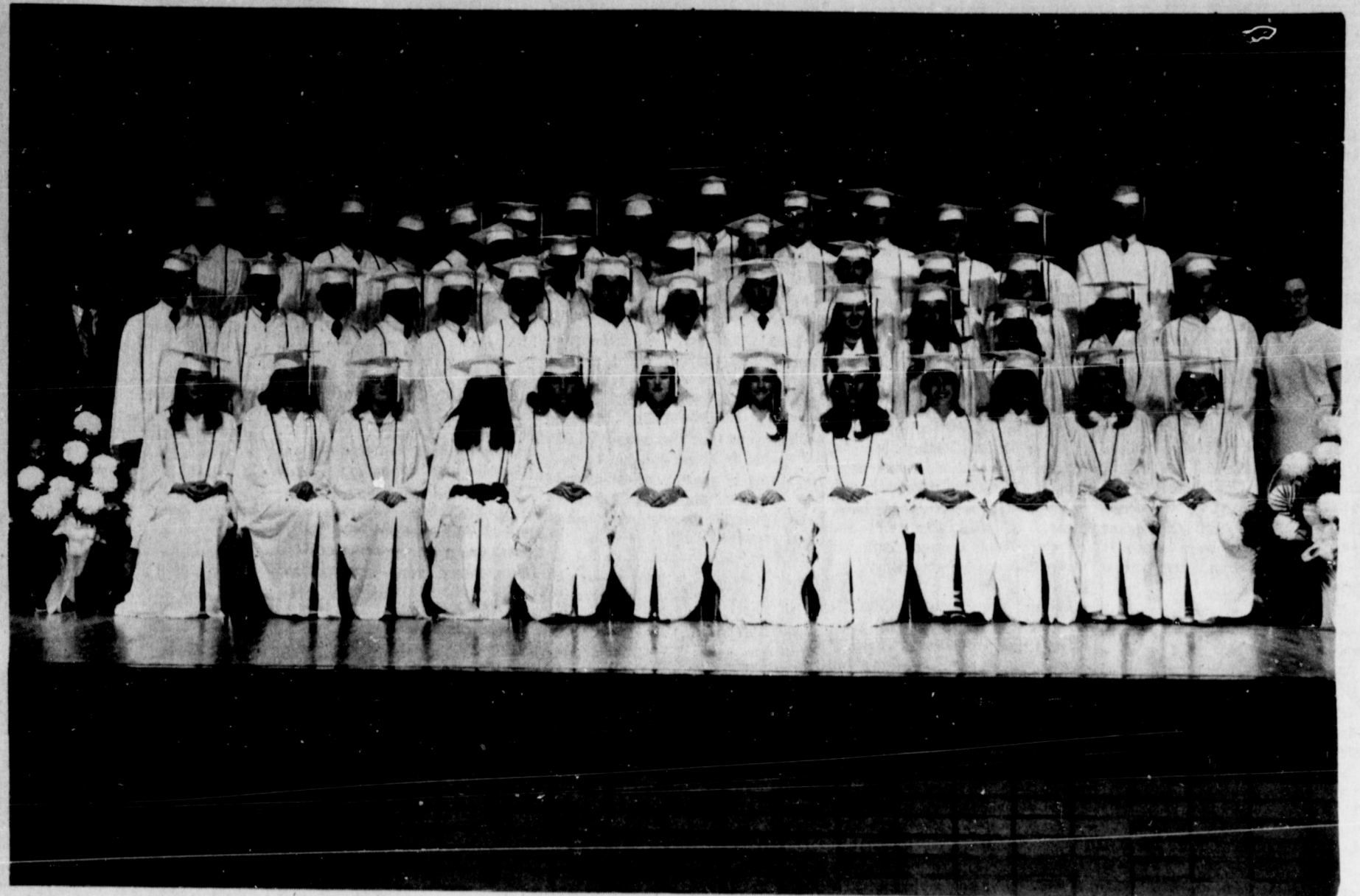
Each boy competes with boys of his own age in three events — pitching for accuracy, hitting for distance and throwing for accuracy. Winners are determined on the basis of total scores.

Voters Reminded To Vote Same Party In Second Primary

Voters in the June 3 runoff elections were warned Tuesday by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."

"Judging from reports several county clerks are receiving, it looks like many Republicans are being tempted to switch over and vote in the Democratic runoff on June 3," Bullock said.

"Every voter needs to know that if they voted in the Republican primary on May 6, they cannot vote in the Democratic runoff. And if they voted Democratic the first time, they cannot switch and vote Republican on June 3."

"We want the public to know that this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of

from \$100 to \$500.

"We know that this type of voting has taken place in the past. A survey by State Senator Oscar Mauzy in 1968 showed that there were some 1,300 crossover voters in his district alone.

"Certainly, any crossover voting would distort the true strength of a candidate in the other party. I think the low-key campaign by the Republicans lends itself to making a Republican want to switch over, if only for excitement's sake.

"We hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting. If we find that it still takes place, we will have no alternative but to pass this information along to the proper prosecuting authorities," Bullock said.

"We want election officials to know that there is a law behind them and they should not permit this practice. This will be the only way we can preserve the integrity of the Texas election process."

Bullock said he wanted the voter to know that it is also against the law for a voter to cast a ballot in two different precincts, even within the same party.

"We know that there were instances of this reported during the May 6 primary. Like crossover voting, this dual voting practice is against the law and simply cannot be tolerated.

"I want the local election officials to bear down and make sure this doesn't happen in the runoff," Bullock said.

Crop Questionnaire Basis For Planting

During the last half of May, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas, according to County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry — agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

MRS. FARENTHOLD AND AGRICULTURE

I am deeply disturbed by the declining economic position of Texas's family farmers and ranchers. Our nation lost 123 farms per day last year. This includes many Texas farms.

When a man and his family cannot live on his land and make a decent living, something is wrong with our society. Due to big government and big business that controls our state government, the farmer and rancher has suffered along with other Texans, who foot the tax bill for big government.

To correct this situation I propose -

Develop programs returning political power to local communities and areas instead of running everything from agencies in Austin.

Have a land use management program for Texas as recommended by the state farm and ranch organizations and other friends of agriculture.

Promote research to help rural areas.

Make sure that there is ample health services in rural areas.

Provide for better rural schools through a fairer tax system.

Continue to fight against over control of rural business as I did when I voted against the trailer brake bill.

Secretary Of State Makes Statements In Connection With "Freedom Of Press"

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said Friday that the editor of the Austin American-Statesman executed a politically motivated hatchet job that threatens the basic tenets of freedom of the press with the firing of its Capitol Bureau Chief, Glen Castlebury.

"It is tragic that Austin has only one daily newspaper, but it is even more tragic that the editor of the Austin American-Statesman would summarily dismiss one of its most competent reporter-columnists for purely political reasons.

"Glen Castlebury was fired because he attempted to do his job—write factually and honestly about the candidates and the current elections. Because the facts, as reported by Castlebury, did not conform with the political endorsements of Sam Wood, Editor of the Austin American-Statesman, he was fired.

"Apparently Sam Wood would do anything, including censoring reporters to see that his hand picked candidates, from the Courthouse to the Governor's Mansion, receive only favorable publicity.

"This is no way to run a newspaper. But then again, few knowledgeable people have accused this sad rag of being a newspaper or Sam Wood of being an enlightened editor.

"I have not always agreed with Castlebury's opinions, but when he has written opinion, it has been

confined to his weekly column. He has refused to be muzzled and to disguise editorials for certain of the management's sacred cow candidates as news stories and rightly so.

"It is difficult to understand how Mr. Wood who through the course of his unimaginative career has freeloaded hunting trips and the like from the state's top politicians can criticize a reporter for bias on one hand and maintain there is still freedom of the press.

"Because of Sam Wood, Austin is suffering a blackout of the same magnitude that New York City suffered not long ago only for different reasons. The blackout in New York was a power failure. The news blackout in Austin is a Sam Wood power play.

"It is unfortunate that the Austin newspaper's absentee landlords are so out of touch with the realities of state government that they are embarrassed by accurate reporting."

Unique Roping Event At Perryton, June 3-4

Entries have been received from 27 of the world's top ropers for the June 3-4 "World's Most Unique Roping Event" scheduled at the Fairgrounds Rodeo Arena in Perryton.

The list of entries is headed by Olin Young of Peralta, N. M., who won the World Steer Roping title at the National Finals Rodeo in Pahasuka, Okla., last fall.

The event is unique because each roper will tie down two steers and two calves on each of the two days of the event. Usually the steer ropers and calf ropers stick to one or the other

event. Other top ropers entered in the contest are Walt Arnold of Silvertown, Texas, who was runner-up for the National Title last year; and former champions Sonny Davis of Kenna, N. M., and Ronny Sewalt of Chico, Texas.

The roping contest will be held at 7:30 p.m. Saturday night, June 3, and at 2:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon, June 4.

On Saturday night there will be a youth pole bending contest in two age groups, 13 years and under and 14-18 years.

On Sunday afternoon there will be a youth barrel race for the same two age divisions.

An open youth horse show will be held on Saturday, June 3, beginning at 10:00 a.m. Admission is free to the horse show.

The roping contest is sponsored by the Sports Committee of the Ochiltree County Chamber of Commerce.

"Although this is a non credit seminar, each teacher - participant will be awarded a letter certifying successful completion as evidence of professional interest and growth," Thomas said.

This non-credit Seminar will be conducted Monday through Thursday from 9:10 a.m. to 10:40 a.m. in the Old Administration Building except the program will begin on a Tuesday and end on a Friday. Dr. Travis McBride, head of the government department, will serve as a participating professor.

Farmer Certification is Key To Set-Aside Program Payments

Farmer certification is the essential step preceding set-aside payments to producers participating in the U. S. Department of Agriculture 1972 set-aside programs for corn, grain sorghum, barley, wheat, and cotton, according to Jerry Gage, local farm program official.

He urged farmers who have questions about certification to call or come in to their county office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

"It's important that a farmer know exactly what he is certifying before he signs his name," said Mr. Gage, County ASCS Executive Director.

Final certification date this year is August 1, but certification may be made as soon as a farmer has his program crops planted and knows he is in compliance with the programs.

As soon as a producer certifies, the County ASCS Office begins processing the data for payment which will be made soon after July 1.

"While it speeds payments to get certifications in early, producers should also remember that mistakes can be costly. A farmer has to be in compliance with program regulations when he certifies. That's why we're urging producers to call or come in now if they're not sure about what is required for certification," Mr. Gage said.

When a producer certifies, he reports exactly what acreage he has in set-aside land and what acreage he has in the program crops he signed up for. He also certifies he has complied with all program regulations and will continue to comply throughout the year.

An error in certification can result in loss of some or all of the set-aside payment. Spot checks are made each year on farms participating in the programs.
