GMO Staff Stretched During Deer Season

The 302 game management officers of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department were hustling Nov. 18 to keep up with the state's 500,000 opening-day turkey and deer hunters.
Consequently, there was not much time for patrolling the thousands of miles of lakes and rivers to enforce the Water Safety Act.
In addition to the 1,100 game and fish laws in Texas, all GMO's have the responsibility of enforcing water safety laws.
The primary purpose of the law is to reduce the number of drownings and loss of property on our waterways.
To enforce the law, the Parks and Wildlife Department has added \$1.6 million to its annual law enforcement budget for water safety equipment and operation expenses.
An additional phase of training was added to the Game Management Officers Academy at Texas A&M University in 1965. The extra, but necessary, responsibility expanded the GMO force by 50 men and increased the annual budget by some \$175,000.
Two-thirds of the total law enforcement expenses are paid from hunting and fishing license revenues. The remaining one-third is derived from water safety funds.
It's simple to tally the number of drownings each year but difficult to count the lives saved through the Water Safety Act.
Ask the residents of San Marcus, New Braunfels and Seguin what they think of GMO water safety training after the spring floods on the Gaudaloupe. Ask the sailors who were pulled from Lake Travis July 4 in the aftermath of a thunderstorm. They will probably tell you that it was money well spent.
The Veterans Administration says about 2.2 million veterans with service connected disabilities received 10 percent increases on their September compensation checks as a result of Public Law 92-328.

Hunters Should Keep Safety In Mind

The "in" color for the hunting season is hunter's fluorescent orange, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.
A matching orange cap and vest is more than just fashionable. It will help hunters prevent what is considered a sartorial faux pas in the hunting game — bullet holes.
Parks and Wildlife Department officials point out that fluorescent orange is probably one of the most unnatural colors one could bring into a forest and that's a big plus in its favor.
There is no mistaking an orange vest coming through the woods for anything but man, so there is less chance of getting shot by some one who is a little too anxious to bring home a trophy.
Here are a few more safety tips from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department which should help hunters enjoy open seasons for years to come.
—Make sure of your target. Never shoot at something you can't see. Know where your bullet is going if you miss.
—Carry only unloaded firearms in a vehicle. Keep the actions open and the firearms in a carrying case.
—Take a little time when crossing fences. Lay your firearm flat on the ground on the other side of the fence and then crawl through.
—A firearm should never be used as a club. Wounded game should be finished off with another bullet or with a handy stick or rock.
—Use the right ammunition for your firearm. Using the wrong size shell is inviting disaster.

ORDINANCE CALLING SPECIAL ELECTION FOR ADOPTION OF LOCAL SALES TAX WHERE PAPER BALLOTS ARE USED NO. 19

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE TOWN OF HOWARDWICK, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THERE FOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF HOWARDWICK:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the Town of Howardwick, Texas, on the 21st day of December, 1972, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said Town, for their action thereupon, the following propositions: "FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city." "AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said Town, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit: The Canteen Presiding Officers Mrs. John McVickers Presiding Judge Mrs. Melville Mills Alternate Presiding Judge The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint 2 clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the Town of Howardwick, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT INSTRUCTION: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officials shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation within said Town, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place for such election in the Town not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that there is no newspaper of general circulation which is published within said Town; and it is hereby found and determined that the Donley County Leader, published in Clarendon, Texas, is a newspaper having general circulation within the Town of Howardwick, Texas.

Section 7. The fact that impingement of this ordinance is vital to the economic welfare of the city, then there is created an emergency and imperative public necessity requiring the suspension of the rule that all ordinances shall be read at three meetings of the Board of Aldermen.

Said rule is therefore hereby suspended and this ordinance is put upon its final reading and passed and adopted by a vote of 4 ayes and 0 nays, on this the 18th day of Nov., 1972. PASSED AND APPROVED, this

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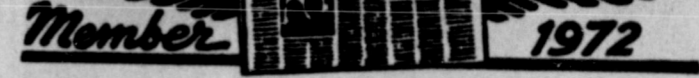

Highlights and Sidelights

FROM YOUR State Capitol

December 31 is the deadline for owners of advertising signs along major interstate, U. S. and state-numbered highways to apply for permits under the new Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act is designed to control all outdoor advertising from big billboards to fence signs along the right-of-way line.

It requires that no sign can be erected within 660 feet of an interstate or federal-aid primary highway without a special \$25

outdoor advertising license. An additional \$5 permit is also required for each sign.

On-premise signs — those advertising on the land or offering the property for sale — are exempt.

The law, passed and made effective last June 29 to avoid loss of federal road-building aid, will be implemented in stages. License applications, first stage in the process, must be accompanied by a \$2,500 bond for each county in which signs are located up to a \$10,000 maximum for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Permits will be issued for signs in place prior to June 29 whether they conform to the law or not, and these will be allowed to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal. New signs must conform to the law before permits are issued.

The Highway Department also

has begun removal of abandoned and illegal signs on controlled highways.

Those planning to erect new signs on controlled highways are advised to check with Highway Department district offices to determine if the location conforms to the law. Property owners have also been advised to contact the department's district offices concerning signs located on their land without permission.

LEGISLATORS BRIEFED — State legislators received briefings last week on three major issues to confront them in January.

A pre-session legislative conference at the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs of the University System here provided details on:

—Need for judicial reorganization. The court system was termed a hodgepodge of independent operations with "nobody minding the whole store."

—Federal revenue sharing and its impact on state and local finance. Legislators were advised Congress and taxpayers will be looking over their shoulders to see that new federal windfalls are wisely spent.

—Property taxation and school finance. Major overhauls in the system of financing public education and in property tax administration are needed, tax authorities said.

AG OPINIONS — A recent opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford

Martin warned that closed meetings of governmental agencies with attorneys and staffs can be held only for limited purposes.

Martin's opinion, requested by Beaumont Criminal District Attorney Tom Hanna, said agencies can meet privately with attorney only to discuss pending or contemplated litigation. It concluded the agencies can meet with staff members only to discuss matters of internal administration. Martin delivered a detailed interpretation of the state open meetings law in response to Hanna, who inquired whether county commissioners can meet in private to discuss legal matters with their attorney.

In other recent opinions, Martin found:

The state may sell or rent property bought in delinquent tax sales before expiration of the two-year redemption period.

A law making it a penal offense for any bond seller to make a financial contribution to a State Board of Education candidate is unconstitutional.

Parks and Wildlife Commission has no authority to issue licenses for hunting from aircraft.

COURTS SPEAK — Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a 1,000-year sentence assessed a Dallas black for raping a white girl, overruling a defense complaint that no blacks were on the trial jury.

The State Supreme Court affirmed a Plainview jury and Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals finding that an insurance company owed damages for accepting health insurance premiums from an old couple without intending to pay claims.

A Tyler man lost an appeal to the Supreme Court in a suit for \$25,000 in insurance on his wife who died of gunshot wounds nine days after she applied for coverage.

The Supreme Court agreed Baytown Savings Association was entitled to a charter to do business.

CANDIDATES SPEND MILLIONS — U. S. Sen. John Tower and Governor-elect Dolph Briscoe spent a record \$5 million in their campaigns.

Tower, best financed congressional candidate in the country, reported expenditures of \$2.1 million.

Briscoe reported he spent \$2.4 million.

Tower's Democratic opponent, Barefoot Sanders, said he spent \$625,674. Briscoe's Republican opponent, State Sen. Henry Grover, reported outlays of \$1.2 million.

Tower listed contributions of \$2,597,466 and debts of \$19,371. Briscoe itemized contributions of \$1,939,896, indicating he picked up a \$500,000 deficit.

NEW WELFARE PROGRAMS ORDERED — The State Board of Public Welfare ordered staff members to begin developing programs to comply with requirements of Social Security amendments.

Amendments require the federal government to assume financial responsibility for aid to all adult categories not eligible for state welfare assistance are permanently blind, needy aged and permanently and totally disabled. The state must establish a program for continuous review of welfare recipients hospitalized or in nursing homes or mental institutions. The Board also directed that persons moving into the state must live in Texas 90 days before they are eligible for assistance.

A Board legislative proposal would allow garnishment of wages in child support cases.

BENEFIT COMPLAINT LOGGED — The State Insurance Board heard a complaint that a federal law to boost workmen's compensation benefits for longshoremen and other harbor workers is unrealistic in defining workers covered.

A Houston insurance agent said the new higher premium rates for coverage would extend to all employees of a shipyard, including cafeteria workers, parking lot attendants and gate guards. The agent said an employer with a \$15 million annual payroll would have to spend \$1.5 million in workmen's compensation premiums. Benefits would scale from \$167 a week to \$267 in 1975.

The Informed Consumer

CHILDREN'S SPENDING
"But Mommy, why can't I have this toy? I have three pennies and a nickel to pay for it." Perhaps you've heard this naive plea from your youngster. Television, radio, and newspapers keep the young under constant pressure to buy, buy, buy. It is consequently essential that a child learns the wise use of money from his earliest years. Money is like any other tool; using it intelligently comes only from direct experience. Even before children reach school age, they have many occasions to use money - for toys, gifts, snacks. It's a good idea to take your preschooler along on shopping trips and allow him to make a small purchase of his own. Let him give the money to the salesperson. It's also useful to explain the relative value of different coins. During the years of 6 through 12, a child should be guided to plan his spending and set short-term goals for savings. At this age, your child's attitudes toward money and how it should be spent are influenced greatly by his friends. He may also go through phases, such as penny-pinching one month and splurging the next. For teens, it seems everywhere they turn requires money. Social life and school life are well mixed-up with the dollar sign. Give your teen greater responsibility in planning for his personal needs and wants, as well as allowing him to participate in family financial discussions. You can help him understand the use of cash and credit by setting up a spending plan to meet daily needs and a saving plan to meet future goals. A weekly allowance is a good idea and it's never too early to start. Let your child be responsible for as many routine expenses as he can handle - lunches, school supplies, grooming aids, snacks. It's important for him to make mistakes early, so let him spend the money as he wishes. Jobs around the house, such as washing the dishes or taking out the garbage, should not be paid for. They're part of the family responsibility. The allowance is not a wage, but a device to teach your child how

to manage his money. Money should be emotion-free and not influenced by other factors. It is a sign of approval or punishment.

Set a good example and re-examine your own money habits. Your children will be smart consumers tomorrow if you teach them proper money management today. When your child leaves home, he should know how to deal with dollars and sense. If he's ready or not depends largely on you.

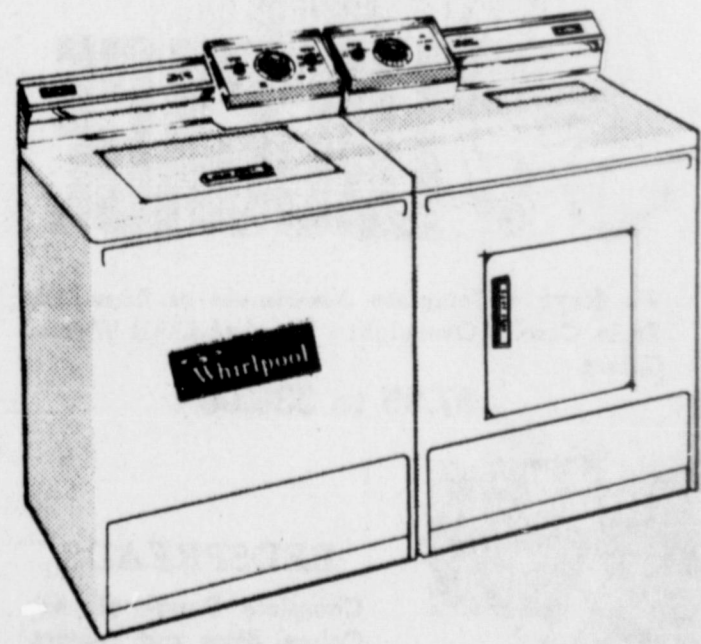

Classing Office

Harvest in the Memphis, Texas area was held up all week by light snow and rain according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, Agriculture Marketing Service, Cotton Classing Office.

The Memphis Office classed 1900 samples this week to bring the season total to 14,000.

Cain urged farmers to wait until both cotton and stalks are dry before resuming stripping operations. This would help avoid rough preparation and "barky" samples.

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Low Middling light Spotted (42) with 45 percent followed by Low Middling (51) with 22 percent and Strict Low Middling (41) with 21 percent.

The predominant staple classed was 31 with 45 percent followed by staple 32 with 37 percent and staple 33 with 13 percent.

Micronaire readings showed 88 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Presley, strength, tests showed 93 percent of the samples tested 75,000 psi or higher.

Market prices were steady to slightly higher this week as a few lots sold late in the week averaging 22.00 to 24.00 cents per pound.

Demand remained steady to strong for Low Middling (51) and better grades, 32 and longer staples, 3.5 to 4.9 mike. Demand weakened for 3.4 and lower mike cottons.

The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was \$47.00 per ton.

Six Rural Accidents Reported By DPS

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Joe Rex Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first ten months of 1972 shows a total of 49 accidents resulting in eight persons killed and 37 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in October, 1972 of 605 accidents, resulting in 20 persons killed, and 280 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 565 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This is 10 more accidents, one more fatality and 14 less injured in 1972 at the same period of time.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that the winter months of cold weather are close by and the traveling conditions are more dangerous at this time of year. Allow a following distance of one car length for every 10 mph of speed between you and the vehicle ahead.

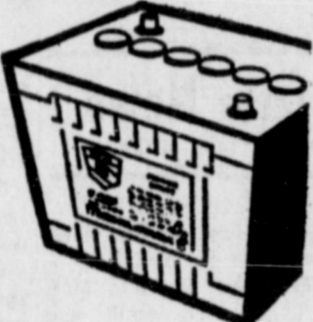

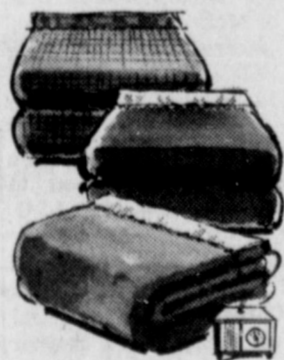

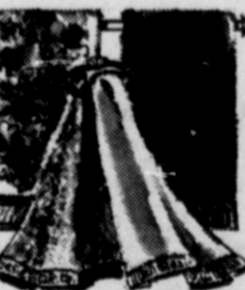
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
