The 302 game management officers of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department were hustling Nov. 18 to keep up with the state's 500,000 opening-day turkey and deer hunters.

Consequently, there was not much time for patrolling the thousands of miles of lakes and rivers to enforce the Water Safe-

In addition to the 1,100 game and fish laws in Texas, all GMO's have the responsibility of enforcing water safety laws.

The primary purpose of the aw is to reduce the number of drownings and loss of property on our waterways.

To enforce the law, the Parks and Wildlife Department has added \$1.6 million to its annual law enforcement budget for water safety equipment and operation
