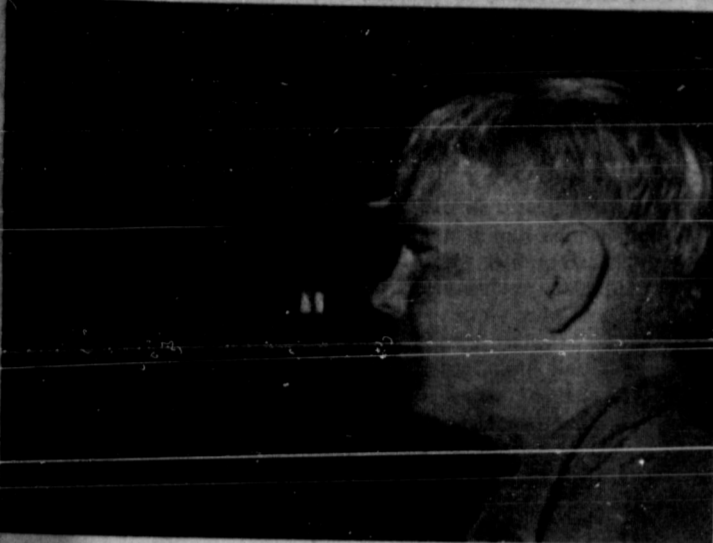

Federal Funds To Plains Community Action Ass'n, Inc.

Governor Preston Smith has announced approval of a community action grant of some \$50,000 in new federal funds to South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. in Levelland for CAA Administration.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act and is effective from July 1, 1971 through February 29, 1972.

This program will focus on the development of manpower programs for rural area in West Texas including five state regions among them the Panhandle Regional Planning Ass'n of which Donley County is a member.

Immediate activities under this program are to help those who are unable to accommodate to manpower training because of low or no formal education and geographic dispersion of those needing manpower training.

New Brand Law To Go Into Effect Soon

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be recorded with the County Clerk after August 30 according to a new law passed during the last session of the state legislature.

The new law is a result of efforts by state, county clerks, and farm organizations as well as the locally organized High Plains Association of County Sheriffs and Cattlemen.

The organization, formed early this year, applied pressure to state legislators to get better and more uniform brand laws passed. Several were considered by the last legislature, including the County Clerk's bill.

Producers will be given a six-month period (Aug. 30, 1971 through Feb. 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using. After this time, any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first come, first served" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have it recorded in his name.

It will be illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and or marks which may be recorded in a county by a single person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law.

The County Clerk must assure that no more than one brand of a kind is recorded on the same location of the animal in each county. Therefore no two persons in a county may record the same brand in the same location. Also, it is the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than \$50.

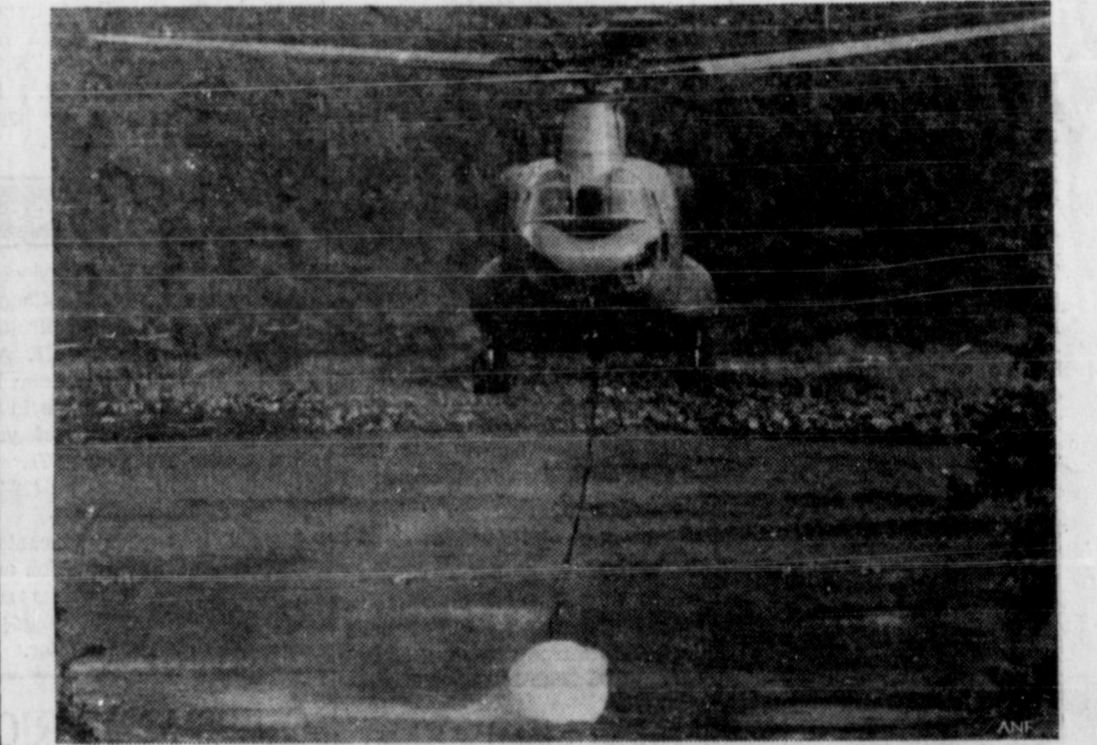
SGT. J. W. ROBERTSON TO SPECIAL PROGRAM

1972 Wheat Program

Major provisions of the 1972 wheat program have been announced. The program provides for an acreage set-aside requirement equal to 83 percent of the farm domestic allotment. It was further announced that the program will again allow the substitution of feed grain for wheat; that soybeans will be a substitute crop next year; and that barley will be included in the 1972 feed grain program. No limit on wheat acreage will be established for 1972. There is no change in the previously announced 1972 domestic wheat allotment of 19.7 million acres or in the loan rate of 1.25 per bushel.

Haying and Grazing Set-Aside And Cap Acreages

Authority to graze or harvest hay from these acreages has been extended through December 31, 1971. Any set-aside or CAP acreage may be grazed or harvested for hay without any cost to the producer. You do not need to sign a request for haying or grazing unless you will let the permission to a third party. In this case, you do need to sign up and there is a maximum amount you are allowed to charge.

Final Date To Certify

August 15 is the final date to certify your program acreages. If you are not sure you have done this, check with us.

1972 Cotton Yields

1972 Cotton Yields—The procedure for determining 1972 payment yields is being changed to

encourage farmers to carry poor crops to maturity. If a farmer does not produce the 1971 expected production, the payment yield for 1972 will be protected in the proportion that the 1971 production is of the 1971 expected production if this proves to be more advantageous than computing the 1972 yield on the basis of the three year average.

Rural Environmental Assistance Program

Construction or Enlargement of Livestock Ponds — An increased cost-share rate of 80 percent of the actual cost has been approved for construction or enlargement of livestock ponds in our county. This practice is for range or pastureland in designated areas. If you have need of this practice come to the office and make application BEFORE work is started.

NEWS FROM

Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

It has been brought to my attention that there might be some confusion as to how long I will be the Representative of the present 18th Congressional District.

The new re-districting legislation, as passed by the State Legislature, will change our present district boundaries but will not become effective until January 1, 1973. Therefore, as the duly elected Representative of the 18th District, I will, to the best of my ability, continue to represent the 18th District until January 1, 1973. I hope this clarifies any questions that anyone might have on this subject.

APPROPRIATIONS BILL

Two appropriations bills and one appropriations authorization bill were approved by the House last week. I supported these bills, after unsuccessfully trying to amend them to delete some of the funds which I felt were unnecessary. However, the bills do contain the money necessary to continue many worthwhile programs.

A bill authorizing appropriation of \$800 million in grants for economic development areas was adopted. Moore County will be eligible for some of these funds because of the abrupt rise in unemployment there due to the closing of the zinc smelter.

PUBLIC WORKS

I supported one of the few bills to actually appropriate less than the amount of money requested by the President. The \$1.576 billion for public works and related water resource programs and the Atomic Energy Commission was \$39.9 million below the budget request.

PANHANDLE AREA APPROPRIATIONS

Three items of particular interest to our area were included in the Public Works Appropriations:

West Texas - Eastern New Mexico Water Import — \$440,000 was appropriated for the final phase of a study to determine the feasibility of importing water from the Mississippi River to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. The Army Corps of Engineers is expected to make their final report in late 1972 or early 1973.

Lake Meredith Study — I am pleased that the Committee approved my request for \$25,000 to study means of preventing salt water from flowing into Lake Meredith.

Red River Salt Study — Also included was \$300,000 for planning the salt water dams which have been proposed for the south-eastern part of the Panhandle. The purpose of these dams will be to prevent salt water from polluting the Red River.

ATOMIC REACTOR

Appropriated in the bill was \$258 million for continued development of an atomic fast breeder reactor. Although this fast breeder reactor is being designed primarily as a clear, efficient, and economic means of producing electricity, one of the important by-products is expected to be an economical means of desalting sea water. I will be assisting groups in our area who wish to obtain some of these funds to expand their own research efforts in this very important field. This could possibly be a solution to our future water supply needs.

HEALTH AND HOSPITAL APPROPRIATIONS

The largest appropriation bill of the week was for \$20.3 billion for Health, Education and Welfare, the Labor Department and related agencies. This is in addition to a \$5.1 billion education bill adopted several weeks ago. The total is \$321.5 million more than requested by the President.

Funds in this bill will go for manpower development and training activities, grants to the states for unemployment compensation, and for various other Labor Department activities. A total of \$581 million will be devoted to mental health research and care.

Many hospitals in the 18th District have taken advantage of funds available under the HILL-BURTON program. President Nixon has changed this from a direct loan plan to a plan whereby the government guarantees loans made by private investors for hospital construction. As a

result of this change the government will guarantee \$20.3 million in loans in fiscal 1972 compared to \$5 million in direct loans in 1971.

I have watched these appropriations grow by leaps and bounds since coming to Congress. I personally feel that there are many unnecessary tax dollars spent in these bills; however, manipulation of legislation makes you take the bad with the good. If this continues, I believe there will be a time in the near future when I will be forced to withdraw my support from this type of legislation.

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

Competition is shaping up in the top two state races for 1972. State Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso emerged recently as a possible candidate for the Democratic U. S. Senate nomination.

Christie, a 38-year El Pasoan, said he would be reluctant to abandon his state senate place, but he is keeping a close eye on U. S. Senator John Tower's activities in the Senate and considers him vulnerable to contest by a strong Democrat.

Christie's statement was seen as a trial balloon aimed at detecting just how serious Democratic leaders are about fielding a candidate against Tower — and whether they would consider him as the man to unite behind.

Meanwhile, Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde is declaring his candidacy for governor and asking support in a series of statewide speeches.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, of course, announced his candidacy for governor in mid-June, and already is campaigning (with time out to get married; to the former Mrs. Nancy Sayers of Austin, a longtime friend).

Former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough is still leaving the door

open for either a senate or gubernatorial race.

Gov. Preston Smith hints, from time to time, he may seek reelection.

Houston Post President William P. Hobby is the only announced candidate to succeed Barnes as lieutenant governor, but a lot more are expected to follow.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court upheld an intermediate court finding that an individual has no vested "property rights" to welfare aid.

In other recent decisions, High Court held: A 1966 constitutional amendment does not outlaw use of market value to determine tax value of agricultural land. Kerr County ranchers had contented valuation should be determined on net income per acre from agricultural use only.

Beaumont Baptist minister of a church moved into a residential neighborhood cannot be held in contempt of a court order which blocked construction of an animal health clinic on same site.

Texas law does not require a father to support his illegitimate children. (Only one other state fails to provide for such support).

Contractors cannot collect on an insurance policy as the result of fire at a missile site near Abilene from which they had been hired to move property.

Austin district judge cleared the way for an appellate court test of whether the legislature in effect repealed penalties for possession of LSD and certain other illegal drugs.

Driver who failed to prove the other party in a traffic accident was not insured cannot collect on his uninsured motorist policy.

EXAMINE HUNT LANDS — Parks and Wildlife Director James U. Cross and Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong made a helicopter tour of the Candidate River bed to inspect an area involved in a controversy over free public hunting.
