Statewide Crop Harvest Ahead of Last Year ... Cattle Sales Up Five Percent... Broilers Increase, Turkeys Decrease, Egg Production Declines ... Fire Ant Program Progresses . . .

Texas farmers are ahead of harvest of the 1972 crops compared to 1971, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes

Cotton harvest is a third complete now; last year at this time, harvest was less than a fourth completed. Harvest will be underway in the High Plains as soon as weather conditions permit.

Corn harvest throughout the state is virtually completed. Less than five percent of the crop has yet to be gathered.

Grain sorghum harvest is two-thirds finished. Both dryland and irrigated grain sorghum yields are reported as excellent in the High Plains region. Soybean harvest is a third complete. Harvest of the second cutting of rice is making good progress, while peanut harvest is three-fourths finished.

Wheat planting for the state is more than 85 percent completed. Irrigated wheat is making good progress.

Pecan harvest is gaining momentum and should be at its peak by the end of the week.


