NIXON WINS BY LANDSLIDE

Dr. Prospects Look Better At Present

The Donley County Hospital District Board of Directors met last Saturday in a special called meeting at which time Dr. Claude B. Stinson, D. O. of Benson, Arizona met with the board.

Dr. Stinson stated that he and his two associates, Dr. Jim Shy, D. O. and Dr. Thomas Marshall, D. O., were interested in moving to Clarendon and setting up practice in the former Stewart Clinic. They requested that they be granted staff privileges in the Medical Center Hospital. They also requested that if they did come to Clarendon, the Board would not permit a physician to set up offices in the Medical Center for the private practice of medicine. Their move here would be at no expense whatever to the Hospital District or Medical Center.

According to Wes Langham, Administrator, the board now has two choices of physicians, Dr. Stinson and his associates from Arizona or Dr. R. D. Bobbitt, M. D. and his fly-in group from San Antonio who would move to Amarillo and commute to Clarendon; There would be a total of three physicians coming from Amarillo every third day. They would work 24 hours a day then be off 48 hours. The tentative contract would call for a salary of each of the doctors at \$35,000 a year plus the going rate for office calls. This would total \$105,000 plus what each doctor made from office calls. The benefit to the Medical Center would be from the Lab, X-Ray etc.

The Hospital Board is scheduled to meet again sometime this week to come to some decision as to which group can serve our community the best and within the means and bounds of the taxpayers who will be paying the bill. Talk to the Board Directors this week and let them know what your personal thinking is. It will help them make a suitable decision.

Rev. W. R. Lawrence Submits Resignation

Reverend W. R. Lawrence, pastor of the First Baptist Church here, announced his resignation as pastor to become effective January 1, 1973 at Sunday morning services, November 5. He officially submitted his resignation Wednesday night of this week. Rev. and Mrs. Lawrence are working in their fourteenth year in Clarendon having moved here in April of 1959. Both have been active in work for the betterment of our community and have rendered service where needed. They are beloved by all who know them. They moved to Clarendon from Dalhart and during Rev. Lawrence's pastorate here members realized a "dream come true" in the construction of a new Church.

Rev. Lawrence, in submitting his resignation, stated that he and Mrs. Lawrence planned to travel and supply interim type work. They also plan to work in the Mission field in the northwest.

We at the Leader office have enjoyed our association with these two fine people and feel that we and the community have benefited from their presence. We wish them happiness and success in their future endeavors.

President Richard Nixon swept to towering re-election Tuesday night, burying Democratic challenger George McGovern in one of history's greatest landslides. At last report, Nixon carried all but one state and the District of Columbia.

Back on the state level, Henry Grover was giving Dolph Briscoe a run for the Governor's office with latest reports putting Briscoe ahead by a small margin.

John G. Tower was garnering a substantial lead over Barefoot Sanders to return him to the U. S. Senate and latest reports showed Cong. Bob Price with a good lead over Purcell. State Representative Phil Cates appeared the winner over Tom Christian.

Here in Donley County, voters favored Nixon, Tower, Price, Christian and Briscoe.

The overall picture showed the Texas Election Bureau to be further behind in returns than usual with a possibility of some changes in vote totals.

The latest report showed the following Constitutional Amendments being defeated state-wide: No. 1 and 11.

Wintering Of Beef Cattle Discussion Tonight, November 9

All Cattle Producers are invited to attend a meeting Thursday night, November 9, tonight, at 7:30 p.m. in Room 102 of the Classroom Building at Clarendon College at which time the "Wintering of Beef Cattle in Donley County" will be discussed. Dr. Cal Parrott, Area Beef Cattle Specialist, will be speaker.

At 7:30 p.m. "Nutrient Requirements of Beef Cows and How These Requirements May Be Met", will be taken up. A coffee break will be taken at 8:15 p.m. and at 8:30 p.m. "The Feeding of Stocker Cattle on Small Grain Pastures and Stalk Fields" will be the topic for discussion.

There are many kinds and methods of feeding cattle during the winter available to the cattle producer. These include cake, cubes, liquid feeds, salt "licks", cottonseed, blocks, small grain pasture, etc.

This meeting should be of help to cattle feeders aiding you to decide what and how much to feed to bring cattle through the winter in good condition for the lowest cost in feed and labor, stated Ronald Gooch, County agent.

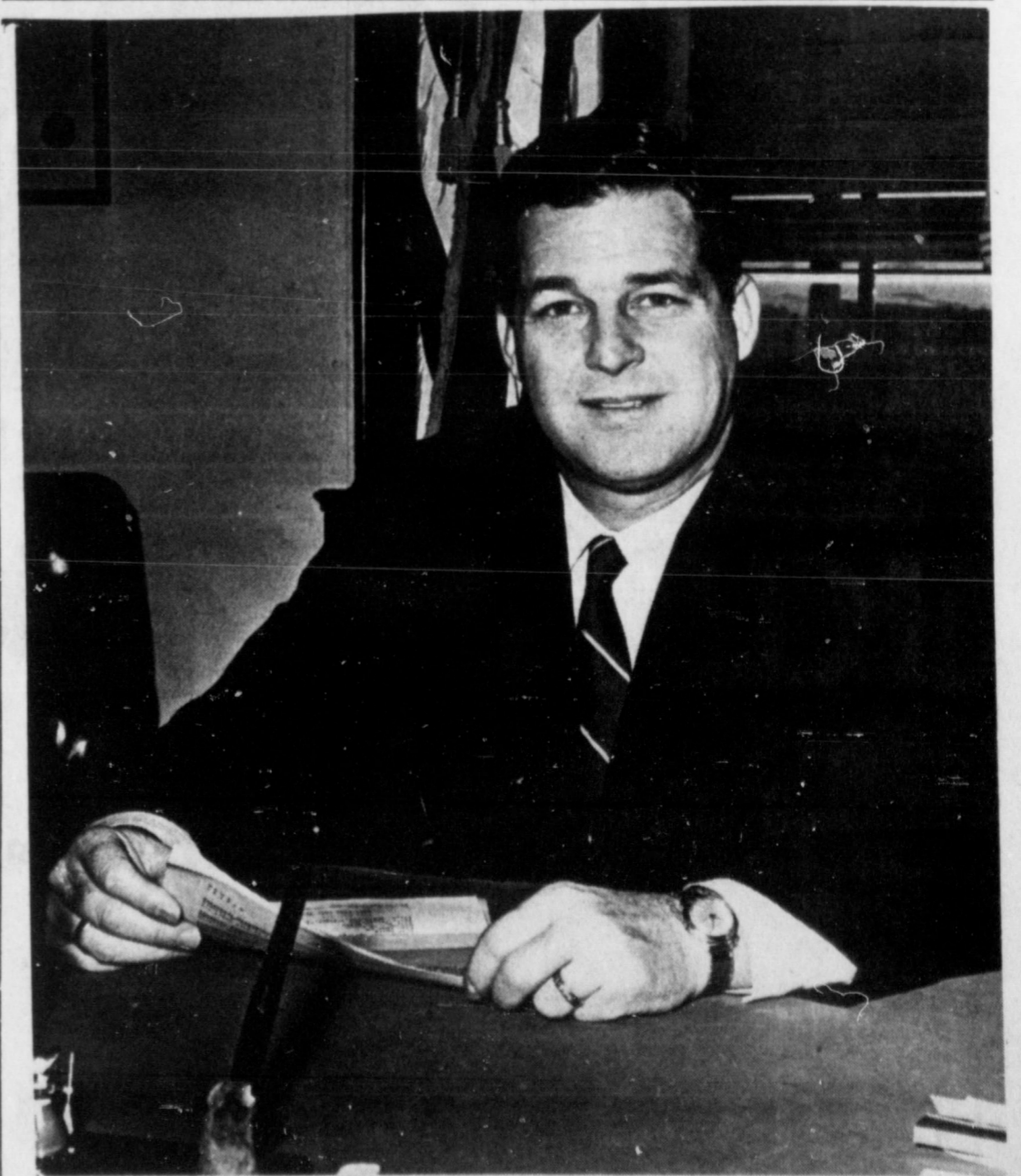
Colts To Play Final Home Games Of Season Thurs., Nov. 9

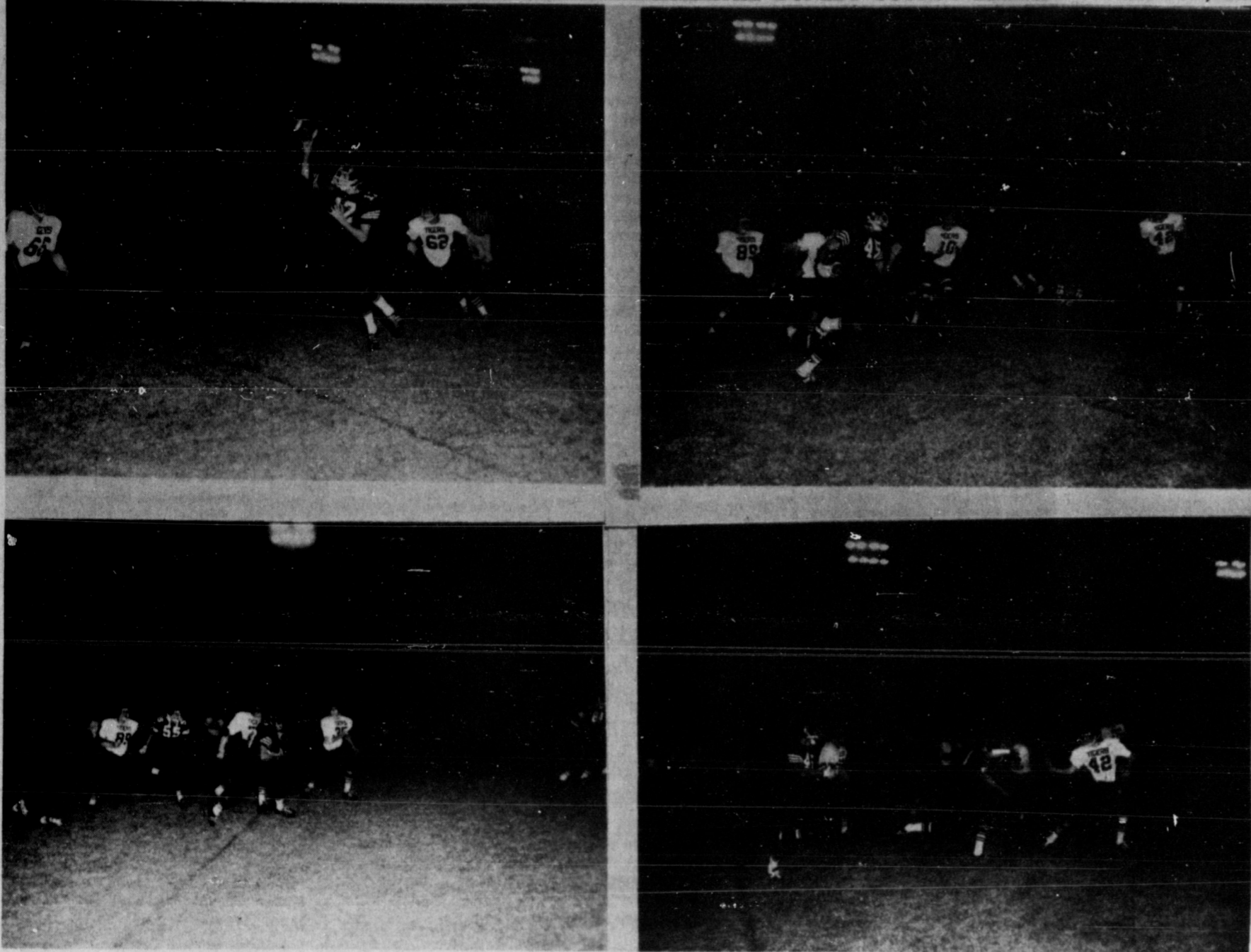

The Informed Consumer

by Attorney General Crawford Martin

"DO YOU KNOW THE UNIT PRICE?"

Nearly everyone has at some time pondered the value difference between the three pound economy size of "Whats-it" for \$1.08 and the 3 1/2 ounce Jumbo size of the same product that sells for 61c. To add to the confusion even more you may find a 20 ounce regular size box available for 43c. Most people can figure out the size that offers the best cost per ounce value, but it takes time.

The unit pricing system aids in solving this type of problem for consumers. Unit pricing is a subject which has been written and talked about a lot. Several state legislatures have introduced unit pricing laws. New York City supermarkets are now required to comply with unit pricing regulations. Some Texas stores have adopted unit pricing systems. But many consumers still ask "what is it?"

Unit pricing is simply a plan in which the price of the merchandise is shown on the package in two ways. The total price of the item is shown, but in addition there is a price per unit shown. For example: If a one pound package of shelled pecans sells for \$1.60, this price would be shown on the package. Additionally the unit price of 10c per ounce would be shown on the package. If a ten ounce package of pecans sold for \$1.10 the package would show the total price of \$1.10 and it would also disclose the unit price of 11c an ounce. You could see at a glance that the pecans in the one pound package cost one cent less per ounce than the pecans in the ten ounce package. The unit pricing information gives shoppers a chance to quickly and easily compare the relative unit cost of different size packages.

Of course the price per unit does not take quantity needs into account. If you need only ten ounces of pecans and the other six ounces would spoil before you could use them, the smaller size would be the proper one for you to purchase even though it costs more per ounce. Neither does unit pricing consider brand or quality differences. Assume that a box of Brand X contains 12 ounces of a product at a unit price of 3.5c per ounce and a box of Brand Y contains 14 ounces of a like product at a unit price of 3.8c per ounce. If your family likes the taste of Brand B better you might still prefer to buy that product in spite of its higher unit price.

But if you simply want to get the most economical price, unit pricing makes your task much easier. You aren't faced with

A—On-the-job training may last up to two years—apprenticeship programs up to three years.
Q—Is my father eligible for a VA pension if he served in the U. S. Army on the Mexican border before World War 1.
A—He may qualify for disability pension provided he served honorably for 90 days or more in one of the following areas: Mexico; one of the adjacent states; Guatemala or British Honduras; or at sea in the area of Mexico. Full details are available at VA office nearest your father.

Accent On Health

They're here—those crisp, cool days which mean only one thing to almost a million people in Texas: it's hunting season.

Dove season brought a gleam to the eyes of hunters, but it is November which puts that extra bounce in their step, sends them into the hills and valleys and into marshes and timbered country for deer, javelina, duck, geese, quail and turkey.

Previews of the season have already been obtained by bow hunters, who took advantage of the special archery season which began in October.

In addition to the hunting season, most real fishermen are keeping their gear in shape for the excellent fishing which continues through the fall and winter in Texas.

What you have in Texas now—in addition to the exhilarating thrill of being out in the open hunting, camping and fishing—is the chance for accidents. Good health and hunting safety go together, says the Texas State Department of Health.

While most hunters look on themselves as Daniel Boones, far too many should never leave their television sets and comfortable arm chairs. They are the people who are out of shape, out of practice in handling their rifles and shotguns, and out of touch with good safety habits.

Safety in the field is a vital part of any hunting trip, and it takes some thought and planning to make sure that your trip doesn't end in tragedy. How many people do you know who carry loaded guns in their cars . . . climb into their deer blinds with guns loaded . . . walk around with the safety of their rifles or shotguns off and a shell in the chamber . . . point their weapons at others . . . bring their loaded guns into the camphouse.

Caution is something which all persons should exercise throughout every day of the year, but extra precautions against injury—and perhaps death—should be taken when you're outside of your natural element. Safety authorities strongly recommend the use of blaze orange clothing as a safeguard against becoming a statistic. Too many hunters are mistaken for game by over-anxious, careless hunters.

You can follow the following safety rules:
When handling and demonstrating a gun, treat it as if it were loaded. Keep the muzzle pointed in a safe direction. Remove the clip if there is one. Open the action and leave it open.
If you're practicing with an empty gun, be sure it is actually empty. Check every gun you pick up. Even with empty gun, aim at a safe backstop.
When cleaning a firearm, the same safe handling rules apply. Keep others away when you're cleaning a gun.
In transporting guns, break them down whenever possible. Keep guns in a case or securely wrapped. Carry all ammunition separately. Always transport guns unloaded.
In practicing, know the potential of your gun. Make sure you have an adequate backstop. Keep the firing line and shooting area restricted.
Always store guns out of reach of children, unloaded and uncocked. Store ammunition separate from firearms and also out of sight.
Keep the gun safety on until ready to shoot.
Agree beforehand on the area each hunter will cover.
Unload gun before crossing a fence and pass gun under first. Never climb into a stand, a tree or over obstacles with a loaded gun.
When duck hunting from a boat, two hunters should face in opposite directions. Never lay a loaded gun in the boat.
Fall is a wonderful time of the year in Texas. And you can make it a productive one and a happy one by thinking safety—first, last and foremost.

DRIVING WHILE DRINKING

Driving while drinking is involved in nearly 40 percent of the rural highway deaths, according to records compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Texans for Traffic Safety" says watch out for the drinking driver and, above all, make sure you're not one of them.

Statewide Crop Harvest Ahead of Last Year . . . Cattle Sales Up Five Percent . . . Broilers Increase, Turkeys Decrease, Egg Production Declines . . . Fire Ant Program Progresses . . .

Texas farmers are ahead of harvest of the 1972 crops compared to 1971, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Cotton harvest is a third complete now; last year at this time, harvest was less than a fourth completed. Harvest will be underway in the High Plains as soon as weather conditions permit.

Corn harvest throughout the state is virtually completed. Less than five percent of the crop has yet to be gathered.

Grain sorghum harvest is two-thirds finished. Both dryland and irrigated grain sorghum yields are reported as excellent in the High Plains region. Soybean harvest is a third complete. Harvest of the second cutting of rice is making good progress, while peanut harvest is three-fourths finished.

Wheat planting for the state is more than 85 percent completed. Irrigated wheat is making good progress. Pecan harvest is gaining momentum and should be at its peak by the end of the week.

MODERATE to heavy rains are increasing range and pasture prospects. Fair to good grazing is available in most areas on native pastures. Livestock condition for the state is rated good to excellent.

SALES of cattle, calves and sheep increased throughout the state during September, while sales of goats and hogs were down. Cattle and calves marketed through Texas auctions numbered 705,000; this is five percent above a year ago.

Sheep sales were two percent above a year ago. Hogs sold totaled 45,000 which is 32 percent below a year ago.

EGG production in Texas totaled 199,000,000 during September, down six percent from a year ago and seven percent below last month.

The 11.1 million layers averaged 59.6 eggs daily per 100 hens. This was below the national average of 61.2 eggs daily per 100 hens.

Hatch of egg-type chickens was up two percent from a year ago; the total turkey poult hatch was down 30 percent from a year ago.

A NEW record number of people visited the Food and Fiber Pavilion during the recent State Fair of Texas. Almost 1,500,000 persons went through the Pavilion. Plans are already underway for the 1973 version of the Food and Fiber Pavilion. The pavilion is operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture marketing division.

COOLER weather has slowed to some extent the screwworm infestations throughout the northern part of the state, but a freeze deep into South Texas will be needed to halt the worst recurrence of the pest in more than a decade.

More than 85,000 cases of screwworms have been reported to the screwworm fly factory at Mission this year. Officials with the program are continuing to urge producers to submit samples to the fly lab for verification.

SPRAYING of Mirex-treated bait over Fort Bend County to control imported fire ants is about half completed, delayed somewhat by bad weather. The program was begun earlier in October under sponsorship of the county, state, and federal governments but fog and rain have delayed the four twin-engine planes flying out of Hobby airport from making the runs over Fort Bend County.

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Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

"There were 55,000 criminal trials pending in district courts and 216,000 civil cases pending on dockets in Texas at the beginning of 1972," former Texas Chief Justice Robert Calvert told those attending the Governor's fourth annual Traffic Safety Public Support Conference in Austin.

This "crisis in our courts" has been caused by the constitutional restrictions on the Judicial Article, Judge Calvert explained.

The "crisis is approaching a judicial scandal," he quoted Judge Truman Roberts of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals as saying.

Judge Calvert outlined problems in the present judicial system in Texas — explaining that they were analyzed by the 1972 Chief Justice's Task Force for Court Improvement.

The major problems are (1) docket congestion and trial delay; (2) proper administration and (3) proper election of judges.

Proposals for complete reorganization of Texas courts will be presented to the 1973 Texas Legislature," the former Chief Justice continued. "Opposition will come from elected officials who are afraid it will affect their jobs."

"Judicial reform is doomed for this generation if public support does not overcome the opposition to these proposed changes in the Judicial Article of the Texas Constitution," he concluded.

A citizen's conference to gain support for the proposed judicial reform will be held in Austin on November 17 — at which time specific legislative proposals will be outlined for the public and press.

REVENUE SHARING COUNCIL FORMED — The Texas Department of Community Affairs has been designated as the agency to provide information and aid to local governments in federal revenue sharing implementation.

Designation of the agency for liaison between state - federal and local governments was agreed on at a meeting of the new Texas Revenue Sharing Council.

Texas is expected to receive about \$245 million during 1972 under the new federal revenue sharing program. About \$645 million of that will go to local governments, and \$81.5 million to state government.

The council, said Gov. Preston Smith, is not to interfere with individual decisions of local governments. Its purpose is to assist the local units with legal constraints and federal rules and regulations.

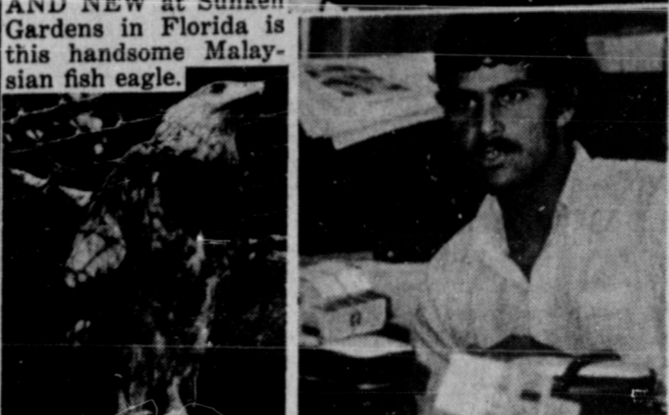
Council members directed the Department of Community Affairs to establish and man an office of Revenue Sharing Assistance in local governments. The department, Texas Association of Counties and Texas Association of Counties will assist the Treasury Department in completing lists of eligible governments and their officials.

Texas was termed "best prepared" of any state to begin implementation of revenue sharing. Members of the Revenue Sharing

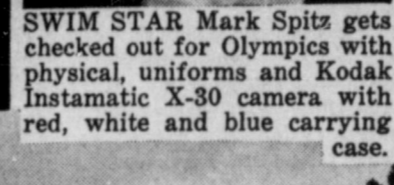

AG OPINIONS — Results of blood tests of drivers suspected of intoxication do not have to be disclosed to insurance companies and credit associations, Attorney Gen. Crawford Martin held. In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

A retired judge may be appointed a Court of Criminal Appeals Commissioner on his consent.

A bill appropriating funds for establishment of an occupational extension center of a public junior college is constitutional.

A state employee who resigns or is dismissed must be paid for all duly-accrued vacation time.

Texas Real Estate Commission may require licensees to use a specified contract form when acting as real estate brokers or salesmen.

The 15 cent special county road and bridge tax fund levy and the farm-to-market and lateral road tax fund may not be transferred into the general fund or used for any purpose other than roads and bridges.

Bell County commissioners have no power to make the county maintenance fund a single fund collected and spent countywide without regard to precinct lines.

A member of the state Board of Physical Therapy Examiners may not hold the position of executive secretary of the board.

THEFT, LITTERING CONTROLS PLANNED — The Department of Public Safety announced plans to combat commercial motor vehicle thefts and to check littering on highways.

DPS has created a specialized task force to coordinate a statewide effort against auto theft. The 15-member group will investigate thefts of autos, boats, motorcycles, heavy equipment, mobile homes, travel trailers and boat power units. Members will be stationed at strategic locations over the state.

DPS patrolmen in all uniformed services, meanwhile, have been ordered to watch closely for motorists and others who throw litter on the highways or right-of-ways. Fines from \$25 to \$200 may be assessed for littering. DPS actually made 841 littering arrests in 1971 as compared with 225 in 1960.

About 50,000 motor vehicles were stolen in Texas last year, an increase of 17 per cent over 1970. Losses were estimated at \$35 million.

MINERAL VALUE UP — Texas mineral production rose 6.3 per cent last year to a value of \$6.8 billion.

Texas was the country's leading producer of petroleum, natural gas, natural gas liquids, natural graphite, magnesium metal and recovered sulphur. Large quantities of helium, Frasch sulphur, lime, gypsum, clays, sand and gravel, salt, metallic sodium and uranium were also produced. Value of mineral fuels mounted to \$6.3 billion, more than 93 per cent of the total value of Texas minerals.

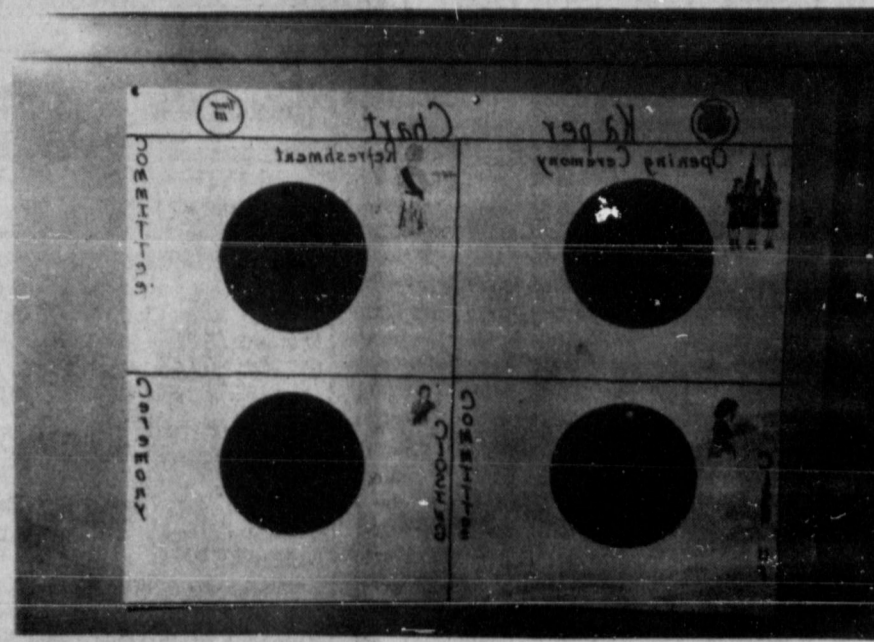

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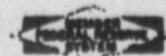

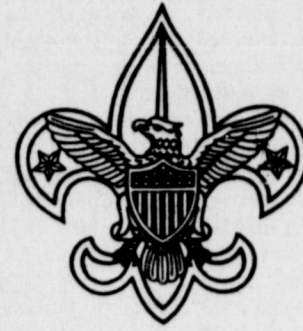
The Memphis Classing Office began receiving samples on November 1, 1972. There were 144,396 cotton samples classed last season.
