Funeral services for Thomas Arthur Nelson, 75, of the Ashtola Community, and a resident of Donley County for the past 33 years, were held at 4 p.m. Monday, August 21, 1972 in Murphy Memorial Chapel with Rev. Bryan Knowles, pastor of the Martin Baptist Church, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Nelson was dead on arrival at Medical Center Hospital at 9:55 p.m. Saturday, August 19th, after suffering an apparent heart attack earlier at his home in Ashtola. One of the latest expansions is in the Donley County Feedlots, Inc. headed by Charles H. Payne, president of the firm. By the end of the year Payne expects the number of cattle to reach near a 12,000 head capacity. Present expansion includes a new 100 foot feed mill, new water wells, and a new automatic, electronically controlled feed distribution system. The mill is expected to mix 85 tons of feed

The feedlot buys more than \$1 million in gainr and hay, all grown locally, and at the present time has a payroll of \$100,-000 per year.

Operation Motorcide Labor Day Weekend

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that statewide traffic accidents over the Labor Day weekend will claim 48 lives.

The Labor Day holiday, as set by the National Safety Council, is a 78-hour period from 6 p.m. Friday, September 1 to midnight Monday, September 4.

At the close of the Labor Day period last year, a DPS tabulation showed that 41 persons had died in 34 traffic accidents. Late deaths pushed the toll to 43 persons killed in 36 accidents.

Speir said the DPS and local law enforcement agencies would be taking all possible steps to reduce the holiday death toll. A special "Operation Motorcide" will be in progress over the Labor Day weekend and tabulations of rural and urban fatal wrecks will be reported to the news media of Texas three times daily.

As is customary on major holidays, all available DPS patrolmen will be placed on duty throughout the state. They will make full use of radar and breath testing instruments in an effort to curtail the major causes of fatal accidents - excessive speed and drunk driving.

"These educational and enforcement programs will have an impact, but a great deal of the responsibility for accident reduction rests in the hands of individual Texans. I am appealing to all our citizens to join with us in saving lives by 'Driving Friendly,' both during the holiday and throughout the remainder of the year," Speir said.

One of the major risks bicycists take is failing to follow the same rules as motor vehicles. Riders must stop for all stop signs and obey all traffic lights and

Far too often you see bicyclists riding on the wrong side of the street facing traffic. Like automobiles, the bicycle should keep to the right. If walking a bicycle, you should walk facing traffic as if you were a pedestrian.

A bike rider should travel as directed on one-way streets and avoid weaving in and out of traffic. And when you're at a corner, don't crowd into the space between a car in the right lane and the curb. If that car turns right, you may get caught in a





mond W. Vowell attributed the reversal to a number of factors. ncluding tighter controls on AF-DC program eligibility, vocationcare programs to help mothers get to work.

The decline was the first in AFDC caseload since July, 1969. Drop-off was from 447,967 recipients to 466,412.

A steady increase in recent years has been attributed to liberalized eligibility standards as ordered by federal courts and tin Garcia of Raymondville, Neal altered federal regulations. In Clark Jr. of Cameron County, late 1970 and early 1971, AFDC rolls swelled at a rate of 10,000 to 12,000 recipients a month. Growth slowed significantly in recent months.

Vowell directed caseworkers to return to the practice of holding personal interviews with AF-DC applicants and recipients, verifying income, child support, domicile, household composition, and other factors affecting eligibility and the amount of assistance granted.

A massive recertification ef fort also has been ordered by which AFDC cases are being checked individually to determine whether a family situation has changed so as to affect the monthly assistance payment. A new policy also has been instituted requiring applicants to provide documentary evidence of child eligibility by birth or bar tismal certificate or hospital re-

"Snack foods may fill you. but provide little nutrition unless you choose your snacks in the same way as you would plan a well-balanced meal - with common sense," Miss Springer said. Between - meal snacks can make a difference in the way you look and feel, according to the Texas A&M University em-

"Every bite you eat becomes a part of you." she said. "Since you don't always eat all your food in three meals of the day, snacks should be a part of your food plan. By choosing your snacks in relation to foods eaten at mealtime, you get extra health insurance.

Unlike most snacks, they're high in nutritional benefits but low in calories. Try carrot curls, celery sticks, radishes or raw cauli-

flower. "The best way to have healthy snacks is to plan for them when you do your weekly shopping," Miss Springer suggested. "When planning, choose those snacks which provide at least one of these nutrients - protein, riboflavin, vitamin C, vitamin A or calcium.


