
At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Clarendon Independent School District Tuesday, March 7, 1972 contracts for Administrators and teachers were renewed.

"The best time to remove thatch is in late winter or early is past," advises Novosad. The proper use of a powered

machine (rake, vertical mower) designed to remove thatch is probably the best way to alleviate this problem, says the agronomist. Scalping the lawn with a rotary mower set to mow as low as possible is also helpful. However, when scalping or dethatching St. Augustinegrass, do not allow the machine to go lower

"Use a power rake or mower annually to prevent thatch buildup, suggests Novosad. But be sure the soil is moist when removing thatch so as to prevent mechanical injury to grass."

According to the agronomist, hatch buildup can be due to several things, including mowing too high (frequent shorter mowing is helpful) and returning clippings. Also, some lawn grasses naturally accumulate more thatch than others.



The label can be lifted off the form it came on and placed on the Form 1040 that you file.

IRS Answers To **Taxpayers Questions**

Q-Are hospitals, doctors and other persons furnishing health care services subject to price

A-Yes. Under Price Commis sion guidelines, physicians and other "non-institutional providers" of health care are subject to an average 21/2 percent limitation on price increases which must be justified by increases in costs.

For institutional providers such as hospitals and nursing homes, price increases will be permitted only when justified by allowable costs, adjusted by productivity gains and limited where appropriate by base period profit margins. Excessive cost increases above the guidelines will not ordinarily be considered as allowable costs. These institution al providers may increase prices up to 21/2 percent without prior approval. Allowable price increases over 21/2 percent and up must be reported to the Internal Revenue Service and the Medicare intermediary with cost justification. Any increase in excess of 6 percent must be treated as an exception and filed with the Internal Revenue Service.



The High Court, not unexpecteedly, concluded that Secretary of State Bob Bullock could not order public financing of primary elections without prior legislative authority.

Smith conceded that apparently left him no alternative but to summon lawmakers back to work in advance of the May 6 primaries. He said he wanted to postpone the unhappy deed as long as possible and was not prepared to say when he would have

Meanwhile, to help Smith with his decision, Bullock's staff compiled data on estimated costs of the May 6 and June 3 elections when the bills would fall due.

Most legislators faced with election campaigns hoped the session would be limited to the primary finance issue alone - or perhaps that and highway billboard controls. The latter legislation is needed soon to avoid a threatened \$24 million cut in federal road building funds allocated Texas.

A-Yes. Under Price Commission guidelines, physicians and ers" of health care are subject to an average 21/2 percent limitation on price increases which must be justified by increases

For institutional providers. such as hospitals and nursing homes, price increases will be permitted only when justified by allowable costs, adjusted by productivity gains and limited where appropriate by base period profit margins. Excessive cost increases above the guidelines will not ordinarily be considered as allowable costs. These institutional providers may increase prices up to 21/2 percent without prior approval. Allowable price increases over 21/2 percent and up must be reported to the Internal Revenue Service and the Medicare intermediary with cost justification. Any increase in excess of 6 percent must be treated as an exception and filed with the Internal Revenue Service.





> The tuberculosis Register is used for maintaining current metuberculosis requiring some type to the heart. of supervision. It is used as a basic tool for identifying all cases of tuberculoisis in Texas and all the medical services rendered to these cases. The Register reflicts each individual patient's case supervision, pointing out medical treatment and follow-up of all known cases as long as may be necessary to prevent spread of the diseases. It also identifies all close contacts with persons having tuberculosis, thus allowing preventive public health machinery to go into operation.

At the beginning of 1972, the State Health Department had entries on approximately 59,190 individuals on the tuberculosis Register. Information on each newly diagnosed tuberculosis case has been entered into the Register since January 1966. In 1970 the Register recorded an additional 2,889 new active cases of tuberculosis in Texas and 304 reactivations of previously reported cases.

This new preventive public health tool now handles some 200,000 medical records per year for those individuals on the Register. This information is being computerized for instant recall. Much of this information is me dical data of a privileged nature, and only a few individuals are qualified to have access to the computer. As the need arises for following services, regional or local health personnel are notified of the proper course of ac

The Texas Tuberculosis Regis ter maintains contact with tuberculosis authorities in other states so that proper follow-up can be given tuberculosis patients coming in or going out of Texas. This interstate notification amouts to 2,600 cases a year, of which approximately 300 are migrant referrals and 290 are

In 1965 the Texas Legislature unified all tuberculosis control programs in Texas under the jurisdiction of the State Health Department. The tuberculosis Register plays a key role in the overall program and will hasten the eventual eradication of tubeculosis from Texas from a public health standpoint.
