Graveside Services Held Here Wed. For Mrs. Helen Officer

Graveside services for Mrs. Herbert George Officer, 77, a member of a pioneer Clarendon family were conducted Wednesday, August 16, 1972, in Citizens Cemetery, Clarendon. She resided in Clarendon from 1896 to 1919 and died in a Long Beach, California hospital Friday, August 11. She had lived at Long Beach since 1968. Previously she had lived in Tulsa, Oklahoma for more than 40 years.

Mrs. Officer was born Helen Bugbee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Sherman Bugbee, April 20, 1895 in Kansas City, Missouri. The next year Mr. Bugbee established headquarters for his extensive cattle holdings in Clarendon. She attended grade schools in Clarendon (the old St. Mary's), Kansas City, and Galveston and graduated from Long Beach Polytechnic High School in 1912. She later attended the University of Southern, California.

In 1919 she married Herbert George Officer of Conway, South Carolina in a June 12 ceremony. Mr. Officer, a mining engineer and geologist, died in 1937 and is buried in Citizens Cemetery.

Besides her husband, she was preceded in death by two brothers, her parents, and four sisters: Mrs. William H. Patrick, Mrs. George Cook, Mrs. Kate B. Carroll, and Mrs. Wesley Knorpp.

Her survivors include her children: Mrs. Lincoln P. Rosay of Santa Ana, Herbert George Officer, Jr. of Houston, and Thomas Bugbee Officer of Fort Worth; seven grandchildren; and a sister, Mrs. Stella B. Hearne of Long Beach.

Other survivors in the Panhandle are B. Knorpp, and Carroll Knorpp, nephews, all of Clarendon; Mrs. Guy Sackett, a niece, of Amarillo; and Mrs. Thomas Everett Bugbee, Jr., the widow of a nephew, of Claude.
