Until noon Thursday, June 8, about 350 ministers and laymen from 297 churches in Texas and Louisiana will hear reports, plan program, and vote on recommendations. Business of the Synod of Texas includes hearing and reacting to plans for a new four-state regional synod, including Oklahoma and Arkansas, of which the Synod will be a part in January, 1973. Tablak, general secretary of the Council on Church Support of the United Presbyterian General Assembly, will speak to the Synod Wednesday evening on "Interpretation and Stewardship."

The turnout of voters was exceptionally good last Saturday for the second Democratic Primary with two races being settled on the local level of particular interest. A total of 1106 votes were cast in the county. Gene White was elected County Commissioner of Precinct No. 1 by a 34 vote margin. He received a total of 211 votes to Doyce Graham's 177. In the other race of local interest, John Deaver unseated incumbent Jack Boone for the office of District Attorney. This is Boone's first regular term of office. Over the five county district, Deaver polled a total of 3901 and Boone received 2905. Here in Donley County, Deaver received 601 and Boone 474. In the U. S. Senate race, Barefoot Sanders defeated Ralph Yarborough. In State races, Dolph Briscoe defeated Frances Farenthold and will face the Republican candidate in November. Bill Hobby was elected Lt. Governor and Robert S. Calvert was re-elected Comptroller of Public Accounts. Only two votes were cast in the Republican Primary here Saturday with Grover receiving both votes for Governor. Here is how the voting went by voting places for the County Commissioner of Precinct 1 position: Jericho - White 1, Graham 21; Martin - Ashola - White 14, Graham 40; Old College Bldg. - White 152, Graham 103; Howardwick - Goldston - White 44, Graham 13.

CHS BAND SEXTET IN STATE UIL CONTESTS

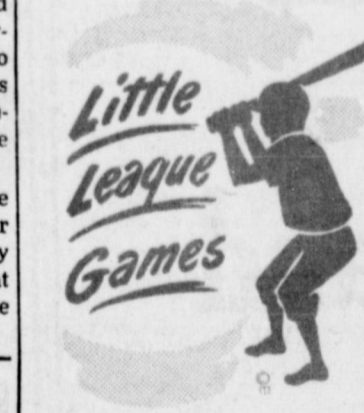

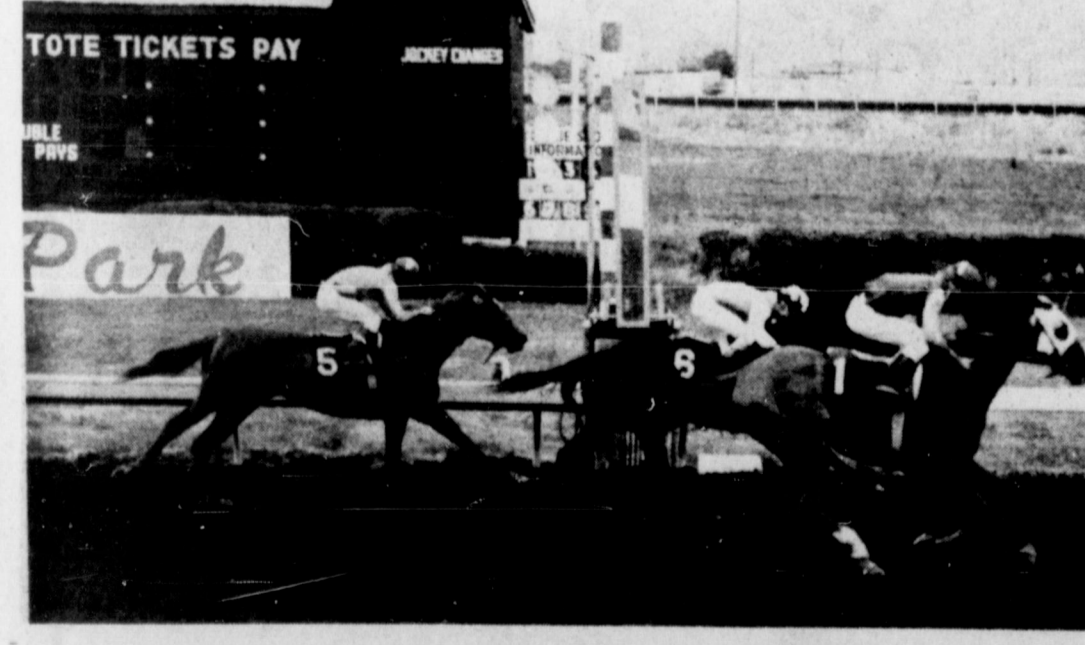

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

Forecast for the State Democratic Convention at San Antonio June 13 grows steadily stormier. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, who already had announced as a candidate for convention chairman against Roy Orr of DeSoto, the state Democratic executive committee chairman, received backing of National Committeewoman Mrs. Carrin Patman, Ganado.

Mrs. Patman accused Orr of "wrecking the party" and predicted a "disastrous blood-letting" at San Antonio if he presides. She said Orr won't abide by the rules he helped write himself, and that giving him the convention gavel would "sabotage chances of the Texas delegation's being seated at the July 10 national convention."

Supporters of Sen. George McGovern for president agreed Orr should not be chairman and that White is a "fair man." However, they contended, an endorsement on their part would be "premature."

Also under fire is makeup of the convention credentials committee named by Orr. Critics claim it isn't representative of presidential preferences and age and ethnic groups.

Orr earlier fired back that "liberals" are trying to take over and run the show, and he isn't

going to permit it if he can help it.

Some observers have calculated the convention delegate spread is actually pretty close, with backers of McGovern, Gov. George Wallace and Sen. Hubert Humphrey all claiming a sizeable chunk of the votes. To gain as much strength as McGovern and Wallace on the 130-vote Texas delegation to the national convention, Humphrey would have to pick up most of the uncommitted delegates.

Republicans see only harmony for their state convention in Galveston June 13. They are even scheduling beach parties.

AUTO RATE CUT SEEN — The State Board of Insurance will meet July 24 for its annual hearing on auto insurance rates, and Chairman Larry Teaver thinks a reduction is in order.

A 2.8 per cent increase approved last year was blocked by a presidential wage-freeze. Rates have been in effect since Jan. 1, 1971, when a 14 per cent boost was approved. There has been no reduction since a fractional cut in 1967.

Teaver said profits from underwriting nationally are at an all-time high, as are investment profits of auto insurance companies. He plans to submit a "personal injury protection" proposal to the Board as a substitute for no-fault auto insurance. The Teaver recommendation includes liberalized medical benefits on a no-fault basis, income replacement and life insurance instead of uninsured motorists and medical payments coverage. Conceivably, Teaver could be out of a job before the July hearing. The Legislature convenes in special session June 14, and Teaver's appointment to the Board is pending in the Senate.

DRAFT PLANS TOLD — About 400 men from Texas are expected to be inducted into military service during the month of July, although no quota yet has been assigned the state.

State Selective Service Headquarters has announced that young men with lottery numbers of 50 or lower in the year's first priority selection group will get their induction orders next month.

Those with numbers of 90 or lower may get pre-induction physical examinations during July.

Col. Melvin Glantz, state director of Selective Service, said 30 days' notice is planned for all induction orders.

COURTS SPEAK — Farmers can sue cattle feedlot operators for damages due to offensive odors even if they don't live on their land, the State Supreme Court held.

To properly assess whether movies are obscene, judges and juries must see the entire films, the Court of Criminal Appeals ruled.

A 300-year prison sentence assessed a Wichita County man for selling heroin was reversed because he didn't get a court-appointed attorney until the day of trial.

A federal district court ordered the State to make payments to Wichita County for aid to families with dependent children, even though it lacks control over welfare personnel employment there.

SMITH SEEKS FUNDS — Gov. Preston Smith went to Washington in search of federal matching funds for social services to welfare beneficiaries.

He said the federal government now pays states \$3 for every \$1 they spend on social services, but the White House's

proposed new rules would prevent Texas and other states from considering work by some agencies.

An aide to the governor said the state is not getting federal matching money for counseling, family planning and homemaking assistance to the needy.

COLLEGE FUNDS AVAILABLE — More than \$13.2 million is now available on a formula basis for 17 universities to construct buildings, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert announced.

Calvert said these sums are available to the following institutions:

University of Texas at Arlington, \$635,198; Texas Southern \$233,087; University of Houston, \$1.15 million; Texas Woman's University, \$225,596; Texas A. & I., \$803,969; Texas Tech, \$723,226; Lamar, \$1 million; Midwestern, \$205,822; Pan American, \$586,169; East Texas State, \$614,673; North Texas State, \$1.1 million; Stephen F. Austin, \$1.6 million; West Texas State, \$289,710; Angelo State, \$396,200; Sam Houston State, \$1.3 million; Southwest Texas State, \$2 million and Sul Ross, \$109,952.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held the state's 1970 contract to purchase 3,965 acres of Mustang Island at \$1.2 million for a park is a binding obligation. Opponents on the Parks and Wildlife Commission insisted the Commission still revoke the contract, although Martin indicated the state may be liable for a lawsuit if that happens.

In another recent opinion, Martin held the Parks and Wildlife Department cannot contract for sale of water to a private individual whose property adjoins a state park. A Grand

Prairie man had sought a permit to tap the water line in Eisenhower State Park.

DANIEL CLAIMS SPEAKER-SHIP — Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty claims 85 firm votes for speaker of the House of Representatives next year.

Present Speaker Rayford Price of Palestine faced a strong runoff challenge for re-election in his home district.

Daniel said he would not be a party to any movement to oust Price as speaker during the June special session.

ETHICS BILL PLANNED — A House committee on rules reform scheduled a June 8 meeting to write an ethics bill requiring full financial disclosure by members of the legislature, the governor and lieutenant governor.

Rep. Guy Floyd of San Antonio said the committee will offer reform rules to the special session. Floyd said he envisions an ethics bill requiring reporting of stock and land transactions annually as well as all income sources.

The long-awaited special session of the Texas legislature has been called for 10 a.m. June 14.

Gov. Preston Smith issued the official proclamation last week, stating repeatedly he plans to present a 1973 budget which will require no new taxes.

The governor, who has implied he would veto a tax bill, said he does not think lawmakers can pass one without his placing the subject of revenue on the special session agenda.

Under the proclamation, Smith will allow legislators to consider "such other subjects as the governor may submit from time to time."

However, he made clear the

does not plan to open the call to any other business until the 1973 budget — financing state operations from Sept. 1, 1972—August 31, 1973—is finally passed.

Smith vetoed all 1973 fiscal year appropriations adopted by the legislature during the 1971 regular session. In anticipation of more federal aid (that never was received), the Legislature did not enact a 1973 welfare budget—which made a special session inevitable even without the governor's veto.

A proposed state officials' code of ethics and a recommendation for repeal of a controversial new trailer brake law are among items to be offered the special session for action after passage of the appropriations act.

There is some speculation Smith may try to avoid the need for new taxes by proposing a welfare program finance act covering less than a full fiscal year. This would leave the balance of 1973 welfare appropriations as emergency business for the regular session next year.

COURTS SPEAK — The State Supreme Court dismissed the appeal of a Dallas man who sought a reduction of the \$250,000 fee awarded his ex-wife's attorneys in a divorce action.

The High Court upheld a Houston court of civil appeals finding that high fees collected by a woman in an insurance case were the result of the insurance company's prolonging litigation. National Life Insurance Company protested that legal fees ran five times as much as the insured collected.

In another case, the Supreme Court agreed that the state is immune from damages after a blind San Antonio boy drowned in a Texas State School for the Blind pool.

\$25 MILLION IN BONDS SOLD — A total of \$25 million in bonds have been sold to municipalities under the state's new financial assistance program for improvement or construction of sewage treatment facilities.

Texas Water Quality Board reported it has received 106 applications for loans of water quality enhancement funds amounting to \$28.77 million, and 72 applications totalling \$24.63 million have been approved. Thirty-four applications are pending in the amount of \$4.1 million, and \$4.2 million has been transferred to 16 projects where bids have been approved and cities are ready to start construction. Loans went to Atlanta, Borger, Clarksville City, Cleburne, Conroe, Dallas (four projects), Iowa Park, Mineral Wells, Montgomery County FWSD No. 2, Nueces County WCID No. 4, Rosenberg, Seagoville and Wortham.

The program makes it possible for cities to make improvements at about 25 per cent of project costs to themselves. Bonds provide the state's share, and the federal government pays the rest.

AG OPINIONS — A \$1 special fee is applicable to all delinquent tax receipts and certificates issued by county tax assessor-collectors for special districts and should be included in a "state cost" item on forms furnished by the comptroller, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

A requirement that portions of tuition fees be placed in a scholarship fund applies to charges for vocational-technical courses at public junior colleges. Up to 10 per cent of the fund may be paid to out-of-state students.

Collin-Denton County Water and Sanitation District has constitutional power to collect and dispose of garbage.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith appointed H. Deskins Wells, Wellington newspaper publisher, Interstate Compact Commissioner for the Red River, succeeding William R. Elliott of Sherman.

Smith appointed Graham Bruce of Orange 128th district judge, and he picked B. R. (Pat) Puller, former Eagle Pass and San Marcus city manager, to head the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

William J. Pitstick is new chairman of the governmental operations committee of the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. George Schrader of Dallas is chairman of the TACIR information services committee.

GUARD CALLED OUT — National Guard units from San Antonio and Austin were called out by the governor in a pilot traffic safety effort over the Memorial Day weekend.

The Guardsmen rode as second man in highway patrol cars or manned Guard trucks and jeeps

on "lifesaving" patrol.

If the experiment proves successful, Smith said he may call Guard units to special duty during other holiday weekends.

Meanwhile, law enforcement officers and traffic court judges were urged to "handle traffic violators in the full measure which our laws provide."

LEGISLATORS HIT — A former state legislator received a four-year prison sentence for using state stamps to buy a second-hand pickup truck, and four other present or former lawmakers were indicted.

Ex-Rep. Walter Knapp of Amador drew the prison sentence. Former Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford and Rep. John Allen of Longview were indicted in a scheme to hire each other's children as legislative aides without requiring them to work. Rep. Tom Holmes of Granbury faced indictment for allegedly using House postage stamps to pay off a \$6,000 bank loan.

Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith, who prosecuted former House Speaker Gus Mutscher, handled all the investigations and vowed to crack down on any legislator who gets out of line if he can make a case.

Patients at more than 100 VA hospitals may now study college level courses at the hospitals or nearby universities and junior colleges.

VA guaranteed \$1,200 home loans to veterans in the first quarter of 1972, a 123 percent jump in the number recorded during the same period last year.

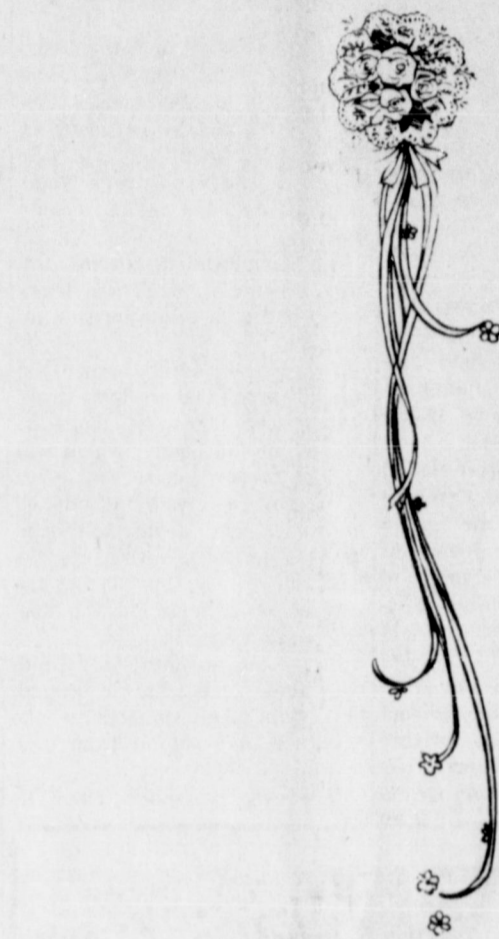

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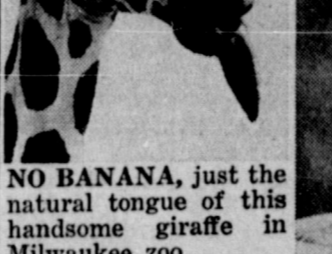

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Watch Out For Windstorms!



Windstorms—from hurricanes and tornados to severe thunderstorms and high wind gusts—are among the most common and most dangerous weather phenomena.

Windstorms lash at everything in their paths, and everyone should be familiar with safety precautions for those common to their area. However, windstorms are particularly dangerous to mobile homes. Statistics show that almost 13,000 mobile homes will suffer more than \$1,000 each in damages from hurricane winds alone in an average year.

According to the Mobile Living Communications Center (MLCC), one of the most effective means of reducing mobile home wind damage is to install tie downs. Tie downs are a system of steel straps or cables which connect the mobile home to anchors imbedded in the ground. A combination of over-the-top ties, which pass over the home, and frame ties, which attach to the I-beam of the frame, is usually used.

Allen Pearson, Director of the National Severe Storms Forecast Center, says, "Almost any time a windstorm strikes, the mobile home court or park where preparations have been inadequate becomes a scene of utter devastation. And it's unnecessary. I believe that 90% of all wind damage to mobile homes could be prevented by solid construction and proper tie down."

To encourage mobile home owners to tie down their homes, the Mobile Living Communications Center has designated June as "Tie Down Month" in thirty-six states registering high windstorm damage to mobile homes in the last decade.

The down equipment should be selected according to the size of the mobile home and to soil type and windstorm conditions in each area. It can be installed by contractors or by mobile home owners. Cost for equipment ranges from \$90 to \$150 in most states. Contractor installation costs vary with location.

Q—Are rental units in a multifamily dwelling in which the landlord resides exempt from rent controls if the landlord owns more than four such units in this building and another building?

A—No. Such units are not exempt if the landlord or members of his family own or have an interest, directly or indirectly, in more than an aggregate of four such units, or if the units are not rented for a term longer than month-to-month.

Q—Is an ambulance service considered a noninstitutional provider of health services under the stabilization regulations?

A—No. While an ambulance service may in fact provide health services, these services are incidental to its primary job—furnishing emergency transportation. Since ambulance services do not provide health services as their primary function, they may be considered noninstitutional providers of health services under stabilization regulations. However, they would qualify as a service industry and would be governed by regulations applicable to services.

No Insurance For Credit Card Holder

Hang on to that credit card! "A few years ago credit card insurance to protect against losing your cards and then having someone run up a large bill was really an important part of any insurance program," said Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

The companies selling this type of insurance did very well in the early years of the credit card boom, until a new credit card regulation went into effect to protect the card holder. "To begin with," the specialist explained, "since January 24, 1972, for all credit cards no matter when issued—a cardholder is liable for unauthorized use only if the card issued has provided a method by which the user of the card can be identified as the person authorized to use it."

This means the card must have some means of identification such as the signature, photograph or fingerprint of the legitimate owner.

Secondly, the card must have been accepted. (That is, the card must have been applied for, received or used before unsolicited cards were banned.) There's a ceiling of \$50 liability on charges made with a lost or stolen card.

That liability exists only if the card issuer has furnished a self-addressed, postpaid envelope or card for notification of loss or theft. The unauthorized use of the card must occur before the cardholder has notified the issuer of the loss or theft.

The stipulation on some cards that "the holder agrees to pay for all purchases made by any user of this card until the company has received notice of theft or loss" is now illegal.

Some companies estimate that they'll come out ahead if they don't notify cardholders of the \$50 liability or furnish the postpaid mailer. They've decided to take their chances that the card will be found or taken care of.

"At any rate, unless you have several credit cards which haven't met all the requirements of your liability of \$50, you don't need insurance for protection," Mrs. Myers advised. "It's wise to check up on your potential liability to use if you do need this protection."

Accent On Health LABELING OF PRODUCTS

When was the last time you read the list of ingredients on that package of instant casserole or off-brand can of beans you've been buying at the local supermarket lately? Chances are you haven't. But you should, for the label on that jar of orange juice or that package of fresh oysters could tell you a lot, whether it is frozen juice or imitation orange drink, or if those oysters were prepared and packed by a manufacturer approved by health inspectors working for the state or federal government.

The Texas Health Department has long had food and drug inspectors who take seriously their responsibility of protecting the consumer through enforcement of food and drug laws. The purposes of these laws are to protect the consumer against adulterated or misbranded foods, drugs, and cosmetics, and to require informative labeling of substances intended for household use.

Texas Health Department official James M. Doughty believes there is a growing trend in this country to put greater emphasis on the importance of labeling on all consumer products, especially food and drugs. He is watching with interest federal efforts to draft a new national policy concerning labeling, one that also sets guidelines for particular key nutrients and how much of each one should be, and how much actually are, included in such class of food.

For an idea of the effect better labeling might have on the food industry, consider what has happened to hot dogs. Back in 1969, the U. S. Department of Agriculture set 30 percent as the maximum permissible amount of fat in frankfurters. Those of you who were buying hot dogs back before World War II may remember when you could get the all-American food with as little as 17 percent fat content. But then certain manufacturers pushed the content up until it reached 51 percent by weight—and over 80 percent by caloric proportion. Now if frankfurters had been labeled in terms of percent protein, percent fat, and total calories the government probably wouldn't have had to impose the 30 percent limit. Competition would have taken care of the problem, before the eyes of a weight-conscious nation.

Competition would probably also affect the proportions of saturated or polyunsaturated fats if quantities were stated on food labels, as would probably be the case with chemical preservatives and other synthetic chemical additives.

Famed Park Pool Opened May 6

The Balmorhea State Park swimming pool, one of the largest outdoor pools in the world was opened to the public on May 6, say spokesmen for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

During May the pool will be open only on weekends, but from May 29, Memorial Day, until Labor Day, Sept. 4, the site will remain open on a daily basis.

Taxpayers Ask IRS Questions & Answers

Q—Do landlords need approval from the Internal Revenue Service before increasing rent?

A—Aside from requests for exceptions to the rent regulations, landlords must obtain approval of rent increases in only one case. That is where the rent increase is based on a capital improvement not required by local law or the terms of a mortgage or deed of trust and 1 1/2 percent of the cost of the improvement allowable to the residence would result in an increase of over 10 percent in the monthly rent. Approval should be obtained from the landlord's District Director of Internal Revenue.

Q—Will the import surcharge have to be refunded to customers at all levels of distribution?

A—No. The lifting of the import surcharge imposes no requirement that refunds be made. The surcharge paid on inventorial items is an allowable cost and may be considered in pricing.

Q—Are cost increases as a result of the revaluation of the dollar allowable?

A—A company may apply its base period markup to the inventoried cost of imported items plus transportation costs of such items. Since the cost of items added to a company's inventory may vary to reflect the revaluation of the dollar, there may be like items of inventory which differ in price, depending upon whether the company seeks to pass through the costs it paid as a result of the revaluation of the dollar. Tier I firms must prenotify before raising prices to reflect these revaluation costs.

Q—Can an employer take advantage of the Pap Board's exception for cost-of-living increases by giving his employees such increases any time he chooses?

A—No. such a benefit is available only if the cost of living increase is pursuant to a generally accepted escalator formula. It cannot be subject merely to the whim of the employer. Moreover, such an exception would be subject to prenotification requirements for Category I

Cotton Bale Packaging May Be Problem

Rapid growth of forward contracting in cotton - the producer's selling his crop in advance - may have added to the perennial cotton bale packaging problem, according to a report received at the Donley County ASCS Office.

It has been reported that a significant quantity of inferior quality and inadequate size nonspecification bagging has been sold to ginners this year supposedly for wrapping cotton that has been sold under crop contracts.

Ginners and producers should be aware of the possible consequences that may result from the use of inferior quality bagging and ties that do not meet CCC specifications. In the first place, the use of such material could result in higher handling costs in compressing, storing, and shipping the cotton. Secondly, damage to cotton quality attributable to inferior packaging materials could result in

claims being asserted by the using mill against the seller of the cotton. Claims asserted under any of these situations could be assessed against the producer and/or ginner. Further, if the market price of cotton at harvest time is less than the contract price, and if the bales are packaged in inferior materials, the buyer may have a legal excuse for refusing to accept delivery of the cotton against the contract. Any of these actions could result in expensive and time-consuming litigation. In addition, the bales of cotton packaged in nonspecification material would not be eligible for CCC loans. As a requirement for CCC loan eligibility, cotton must be packaged either in experimental materials identified with the experimental programs or the Joint Industry Bale Packaging Committee.

Because of this, it is important that farmers and ginners evaluate the quality and dimensions of bale packaging materials carefully to assure that they will not find themselves in one or more of the above situations because of the use of nonspecification bale packaging materials.
