

The Office of Consumer Credit Commissioner was created in 1967 to administer and enforce. the provisions of the Texas Consumer Credit Code. This is the law regulating the majority of the consumer credit transactions in Texas. The Commissioner has the responsibility of issuing lic enses to those in the business of loaning monies, and, in general, to supervise and regulate the activities of the licenses. Persons making cash loans or selling goods under installment sales agreements fall under the Commissioner's regulation. If you borrow money from
