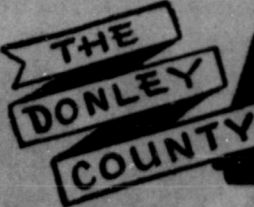

### Allotment Preservation

Producers who have cropland in an annual cover crop or one of a more permanent type, and do not plan to plant wheat for 1972 may request allotment preservation. This request must be made by December 1.

### County Committee Election

Remember that October 27 is the last day for accepting petitions for County Committee elections.

### 1971 Cotton Production

Producers will be required to bring in cotton production records again this year. If this information is not furnished to establish a yield, the farm will be credited with no production for this year. Production evidence shall include sales documents, settlement sheets or warehouse receipts. Ginners certification of gin numbers and bale weights will not be acceptable this year.

If your cotton is destroyed or production reduced because of adverse weather conditions, this should be reported to your county ASCS office. The County Committee will be permitted to make an adjustment because of adverse weather conditions; however, this adjustment is not automatic. You will need to come to the office and file a request for adjustment. When the cotton has been abandoned, a farm inspection will be required.

**Reap**  
If you have an approval for seeding rye, or other practices, report completion as soon as possible. Furnish sales receipts or cancelled checks to verify purchases.

### Final Boll Weevil Spraying October 20

The final spraying in the diapause boll weevil control program will begin Wednesday, October 20, weather conditions permitting, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

The cut off time to sign up for this final spraying is Tuesday, October 19 at 5 p.m. The office for the spray program is at the Paymaster Gin in Clarendon. Cost of the spray application is 86 cents per acre.

Many cotton fields that have not been sprayed have several thousand live boll weevil per acre and spraying in this diapause control program would greatly reduce the number of boll weevil going into diapause and overwintering. Good participation in this final spraying will help keep the diapause boll weevil control program going for next year and would greatly reduce the number of boll weevil overwintering and infesting the 1972 cotton crop, Gooch said.

Funeral services for William Burton Ayers, 89, a longtime Donley County farmer and stockman, will be held at 2:00 p.m. today, Thursday, October 14, 1971 in the Church of Christ with Robert C. Jones, retired Church of Christ Minister, and Tom Waters, Minister of the Church of Christ, officiating. Interment will be in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Ayers died at 12:15 a.m. Tuesday, October 12th, in Hall County Hospital in Memphis after an illness of several weeks. He was born March 13, 1882 in San Saba County, Texas and came to Donley County from Kent County in 1908. He was a farmer and stockman, living near the Lelia Lake Community until 1955, when he moved to Clarendon. He was a member of the Church of Christ in Clarendon.

Officers to serve are W. L. Mosley, president; W. W. Farris, vice-president; and Mabel Bridges, secretary-treasurer.

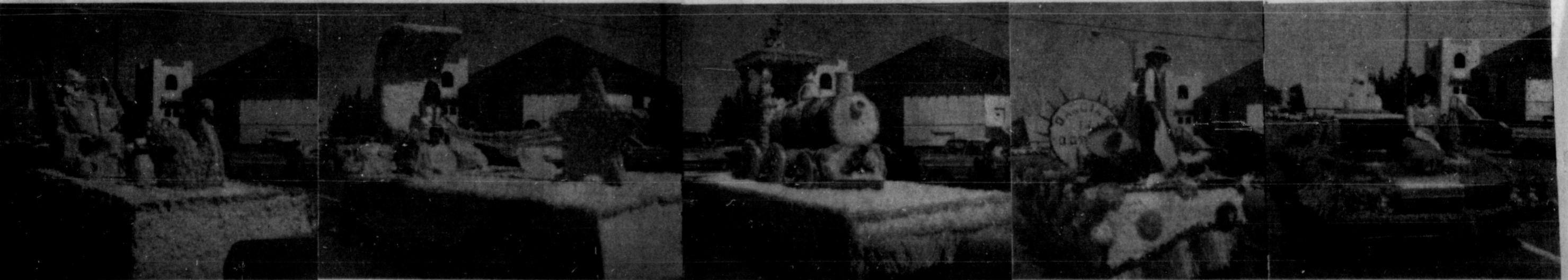
The meeting was adjourned with the group singing "God Be With You 'Till We Meet Again."

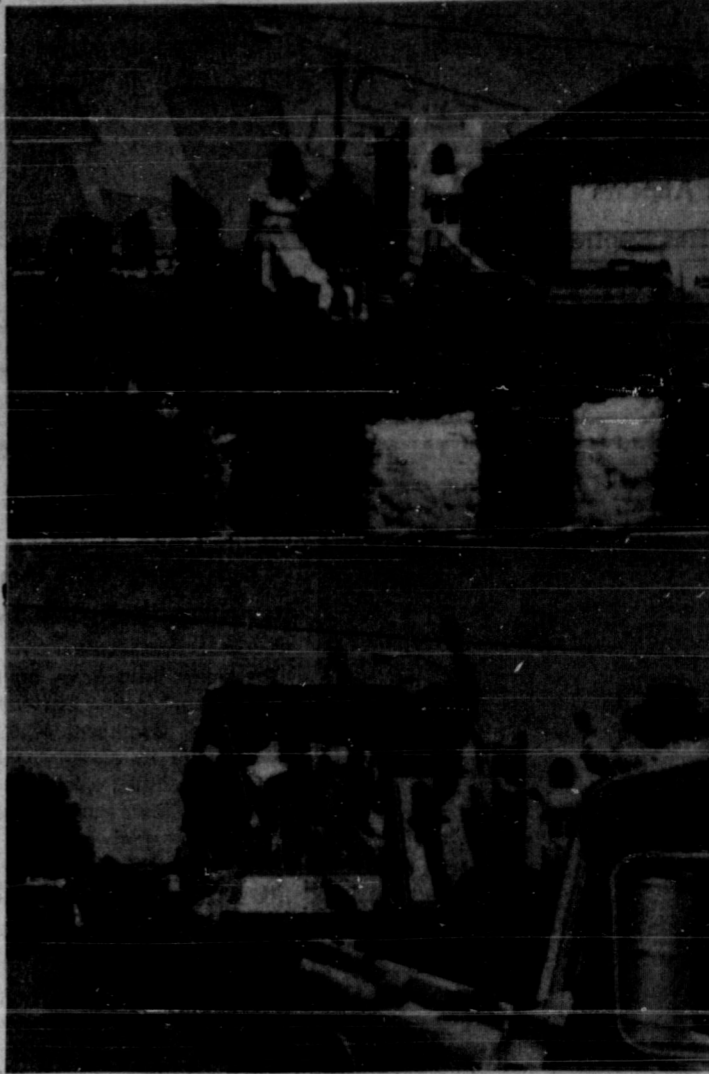

### Social Security

Q—When I reach age 65, my company will allow me to continue working until the end of this calendar year. I had planned on filing for social security and Medicare at that time. I read somewhere that I needed to get signed up for Medicare when I was 65. What are the advantages of this?

A—To take full advantage of Medicare, a person should file in a month before the month he is age 65, or some benefits may be lost. In your case, you should get evidence of your age and earnings for 1970 and contact your social security office either by phone or in person at least 3 months before age 65. This will assure getting your Medicare card by the time you are age 65.

Q—I will be retiring within the next 6 months and want to know what proofs I will have to have to establish my entitlement to social security. I have a son age 18 who is still in his last year of high school.

A—We will need some evidence of your age, preferably a birth certificate, school record, or insurance policy, or some document to show your correct date of birth. You need to get these documents together now to insure prompt payment when you do retire.

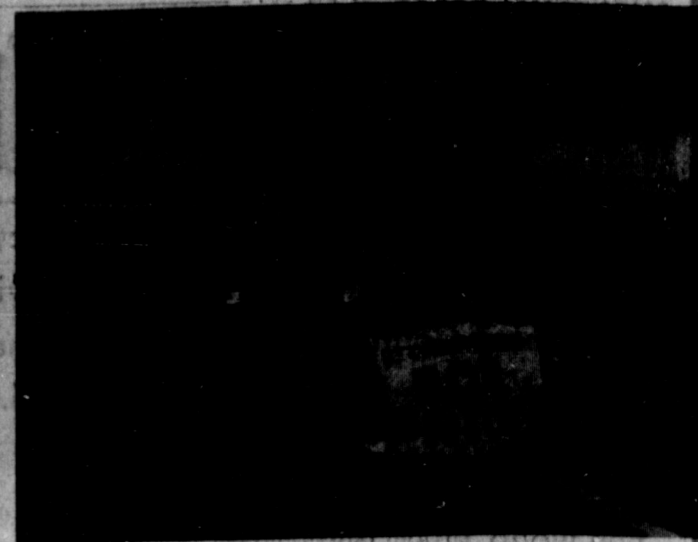

## Teacher Permit Policy Changed

Emergency permits to teach in Texas public school classrooms who hold at least a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university, beginning January 1, 1972.

A new stiffening of requirements, which will apply to renewal as well as first-time permits, was approved Saturday (September 11) by the State Board of Education.

Exceptions will be made only for teachers hired for bilingual programs and for certain groups of vocational personnel and for military instructors assigned to Reserve Officers Training Corps units, under the new rules drawn up by the Texas Education Agency.

Teachers in bilingual programs may be granted an initial permit if they have a minimum of 90 semester hours of college credit. They may request two renewals

while they complete work toward a degree.

Also beginning January 1, all Texas teachers employed on an emergency permit of any kind will be required to complete all requirements for certification within three years after the first emergency permit was issued, according to Dr. L. Harlan Ford, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for teacher education and instructional services.

"These new requirements are part of a total effort to upgrade the preparation of teachers for Texas public schools," Dr. Ford explains.

"We are working in many areas, including the actual course work offered and the whole stu-

dent teaching process, to bring better teachers into Texas public schools."

Texas teachers applying for emergency permit renewals must now complete at least six semester hours toward full qualification in their school assignments and fill a college plan showing how they intend to fulfill all academic requirements within two years.

Emergency permit rules will be tightened still further on July 1, 1972. Applicants for permits to teach in secondary schools will then be required to have the minimum qualifications for one teaching field as detailed in the Standards for Teacher Education in Texas.

At the same time, elementary

permits will be issued only to persons who have completed at least 12 hours in elementary education. A certified teacher must have completed 18 hours.

During the 1971-72 school year, 16,223 teachers will hold emergency permits, including 10,599 first-time and 5,624 renewals. More than 12,000 teachers hold at least a bachelor's degree, but are teaching outside their original fields in such critical areas as kindergarten and special education.

Some 2,000 have earned master's degrees outside the field of education and at least five hold the doctor of philosophy degree but have not had any formal teacher training.

A new year-round voter registration law went into effect for Texans on October 1. Predictions are that it will make significant changes in the political structure of the state. New rules governing the operation of political party conventions also will begin operating next year.

These major provisions in the voter registration act are noted: Voters can register at any time (except for a temporary cutoff 31 days before each election). Registration is good for three years, and is automatically renewed by participation in an election during that period. The old registration period, one of the shortest in the nation, was October 1-January 31.

Eighteen - to - 21 - year - olds may register and are eligible

to vote in local, state and federal elections under a new U. S. Constitutional amendment.

Roving or resident registration deputies may sign up voters anywhere - apartments, union halls, club rooms, dormitories, industrial plants, office buildings, supermarkets or private residence. The law provides that "no voter registrar shall refuse to deputize a person." This is expected to increase sharply the use of deputies to round up voters.

Predictions range upwards of five million total eligible voters in 1972, an increase of a million over 1970.

Voters must have resided in the state a year and in a county for six months to qualify for local election participation. Those who have lived in Texas more than 30 days but less than a year before the November 1972 general election can vote for presidential and vice presidential candidates under special residency registration with county clerks.

tonio who resigned. In other recent appointments, Smith picked: Jimmie Joe McCuan of Pasadena to the Industrial Accident Board.

Marshall Formby of Plainview and Richard S. Siocomb of Galena Park to the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. He reappointed Harvey Weil of Corpus Christi, Newton Gresham of Houston, Jack Arthur of Stephenville and Wayne E. Thomas of Hereford (chairman).

Jimmy Powell of Ft. McKavett to the State Senior Colleges, Board of Regents.

C. C. Bentley Jr. of Abilene (reappointment) for a new term on the Finance Commission of Texas, Building and Loan Section.

Doug Crouch to succeed Frank Coffey, who resigned, as Tarrant County (Fort Worth) district attorney.

Drs. Walter H. Fischer of Temple, Sterling H. Pruitt of Fort Worth and Harvey H. Kennedy of Longview to the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

Lt. Col. Belisario D. J. Flores of San Antonio as chairman of statewide Veterans Day activities October 25.

John W. Cardwell, former Georgetown newspaperman, was named deputy director of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, holding Azle had not proved its jurisdiction over the property.

Lawrence Miller Jr. of Dallas is new chairman of the Texas Real Estate Commission.

Joe Teller, Texas Water Quality Board deputy director, was selected for Water Pollution Control Federation of America executive committee.

STATE TO FIGHT FOR TREASURE - The state is prepared to go to the U. S. Supreme Court to get title to all artifacts recovered from Spanish galleons which sank off Padre Island more than 400 years ago.

Texas Antiquities Committee was told a decision is near by Brownsville federal court in a long legal dispute over the treasure. Platoro Ltd., a Gary, Ind., salvage firm, recovered the valuables in 1967 and proposes a 50-50 split with the state which

demands the entire treasure.

Meanwhile, Committee learned an underwater archaeologist has agreed to help set up a program to recover artifacts from another ancient Spanish galleon near Padre Island next year.

COURTS SPEAK - The Supreme Court dismissed the appeal of relatives of Clyde Barrow who lost a suit against Warner Brothers Studio claiming character defamation in the movie "Bonnie and Clyde."

In a pile of other decisions released after a summer recess, the High Court:

Set a November 17 review of a San Antonio district court ruling which the Alcoholic Beverage Commission maintains would rob it of its power to suspend dealers' licenses for violations.

Upheld an injunction against a Tarrant County dentist who allegedly claimed he could diagnose and treat cancer.

Said the Texas Railroad Commission has power to change natural gas prices covered by contracts between cities and pipeline companies when it finds a change is in the public interest. The case grew out of High Plains Natural Gas Company's effort to get a price increase for gas sold to the city of Perryton.

Turned down city of Azle's appeal from the 1969 incorporation of Sanctuary in Parker County, holding Azle had not proved its jurisdiction over the property.

Booked November 3 hearing of Denton County case in which a father sued his son who backed a car into him for negligence.

Held parents can collect damages for pre-natal injuries to an unborn child hurt in an auto collision.

Scheduled a hearing on an appeal from granting of a charter to Modern Savings and Loan Association, Pasadena.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed and sent back for a new trial the conviction and 100-year sentence of a Dallas man for robbery by assault.

AG OPINIONS - Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held a new statute attempting to exempt churches and veterans organizations from lottery laws is uncon-

stitutional.

In another recent opinion, Martin interpreted incidental expenses which the comptroller may pay employees in connection with their travels as those "reasonably necessary to performance of official duties" while away from their desks. A \$35 a day limit is set for travel expenses outside state boundaries.

Special rangers hired by state-wide organizations to promote cooperation with law enforcement agencies are peace officers and must meet minimum standards of selection and training established by Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

TRIAL DATES SET - House Speaker Gus Mutscher pleaded "not guilty" to making false statements to the State Board of Insurance and has a January 24 trial date set.

Mutscher tried to get a trial setting in November. He will apparently continue, for time being

**BIOLOGISTS STUDY ANTELOPE JAWBONES**

Don't worry, hunters. That fellow asking for an antelope jawbone isn't collecting items for some witch doctor's potion.

He's a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist conducting a study to determine the age of antelope by examining the jawbones.

The collection of jawbones is one of the final steps in a study which started with tagging antelope fawns whose ages were known. Comparisons are made between the jawbones of these known-age antelope and other antelope. Tooth wear tips off the biologists as to the age of the animal.

More than idle curiosity prompts biologists in this study. They need to know what age classes make up the bulk of the harvest to correlate with herd production for proper issuance of buck permits.
