With the enrollment of Clarendon College in 1961 at 189 students the constant increase, though not large, is a healthy sign of growth and progress in the community.

The total number of students for the Fall enrollment of 1972 stands at 434 which is an eleven student increase over last fall. With exact figures of other area colleges not available except thru area news media we have no comparison to make at this time with other two-year Colleges.





UNLAWFUL DERT COLLECTION TACTICS

Credit purchases have become way of life with most of our Texas families. When the debtor refuses or is unable to meet his payments when due, his accollection agency.

Most of these agencies use reputable collection methods but unfortunately some agencies choose to resort to other means which are unethical and sometimes illegal. This article will deal with abusive collection tac-

tor. This letter informs him that that payment in full is demanded.

The first letter is usually mild. but subsequent letters become progressively threatening. Also, the intervals between such letters also become shorter.

After a while, the collector may do any or all of the following: (1) he may send telegrams and registered letters; er; (3) send messages that suggest legal documents; or (4) make direct personal contact with the debtor by telephone or personal

The law, of course, does not condemn debt collection per se. Collection simply must be conducted legitimately, without harassment, coercion, or intimidation, or by the use of any means which are deceptive. Even delinquent debtors are entitled to know the source of letters which (2) contact the debtor's employ- are sent to them, and while they may owe money, they deserve the protection of the law just as do other citizens.

letters which have the tendency Push Made To Move Cotton Into Export

Texas Farm Bureau President J. T. (Red) Woodson of Fannin County on Sept. 18 asked the federal government to help move cotton into export as a means of alleviating current depressed cotton prices.

The president of the 130,000member farm organization said cotton farmers face a severe hardship because of the present price situation. Cotton prices are now 6-10 cents a pound below the level of one year ago.

"Buyers who contacted earlier for limited supplies are now holding off buying during this current harvest season," Woodson said in a telegram to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz. "This factor, together with lower grades resulting from adverse weather, has ruined our domestic market for cotton.

"We urgently request that you undertake immediate steps to increase exports of cotton under Title 2 of the Public Law 480 program as a means of alleviating depressed domestic markets.

"We applaud your recent successful efforts to move wheat into new markets, and trust that you will do everything in your power to help cotton growers." the farm leader said.

In the past nearly all cotton shipped under P. L. 480 has been under Title 1 of that law. This is a program in which foreign countries buy U. S. goods in their currencies. The United States then uses the money to pay its bills in those countries - bills associated with common defense efforts, expenses of U.S. embas-

Under Title 2 of P. L. 480, all commodities are owned by the USDA's Commodity Credit Corp. The Title 2 program, which involved shipment of some \$350 million in commodities last year, is for such purposes as disaster relief and economic aid.



The special session of the Legslature got off to a bumpy start last week with Gov. Preston Smith's proposals facing tough criticism.

Critics of the governor's competitive insurance rating bill charged it repeals some of the best provisions of the Texas insurance code.

Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas and others insisted on a stateset ceiling if competitive rating is passed. Senate sponsor, Sen. Mike McKool of Dallas, indicat-

ed he would go along with that. The governor's budgetary control bill met a mixed reaction in its first committee test. Proponents said it would help put "fiscal responsibility" in state government, but opponents claimed it would make the governor a fiscal "czar." The latter were particularly critical of a provision that would let the governor altar agency budgets when he found "evidence that the expenditure is not necessary."

Smith assured another lively appointments hassle in the Senate when he nominated his secretary of state, Bob Bullock, to the State Board of insurance.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes denied reports that he was trying to line up votes to block Bullock's confirmation by the Senate.


