## Who's Who

A total of 6 students from this area have been included in the 18th annual edition of WHO'S WHO AMONG AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS, 1983-84.

WHO'S WHO, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are selected by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extra-curricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99% of WHO'S WHO students have a grade point average of "B" or better and 97% are college bound.

The 18th edition of WHO'S WHO, published in nine regional volumes, features 392,000 students, or 6% of the nation's 6,500,000 high school juniors and seniors. They represent 18,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the country.

WHO'S WHO students also compete for over \$50,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The book is distributed on a complimentary basis to over 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities, and public libraries throughout the country.

### Annual income questionnaire readied for VA pensioners

Nearly two million Veterans Administration pensioners received the agency's annual income questionnaire around November 1 to determine their future eligibility for the VA needs-based program.

According to VA Waco Regional Office Director Stephen Lemons, the questionnaire, required by law, must

be completed and returned to VA by January 1, 1985. Pensioners who do not return the questionnaire may have their monthly checks stopped.

The questionnaire will go to all persons receiving VA pension payments or Parents' Dependency and Indemnity Compensation benefits, the VA director explained.

"Pensioners will receive a worksheet to assist in completing the form, which may also be used as a record of information they report," Lemons said. "Help in completing the annual income questionnaire is available from this office or from the major veterans organizations."

Pension is paid to wartime veterans with limited income who are permanently and totally disabled from reasons not traceable to service. At present more than 29,319 Texas veterans receive pension benefits from the VA.

Director Lemons said veteran pensioner recipients can call his office toll-free by using the number listed in the local telephone directory.

If you have received a Veterans Administration questionnaire, these must be filled out and returned by January 1, 1985, or it may seriously disrupt your veterans pension, your VA Service officer will help you fill out this form if you are in need of assistance. I will be at the county courthouse on Monday, December 17, 1p.m.-5p.m. If you can come by, please bring your necessary information such as your yearly medical expenses, which include insurance premiums. You have a work sheet that was mailed with the computer card please fill out the work sheet before you transfer it to the A.I.Q. computer card.

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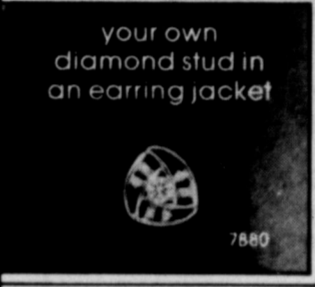

contribution to this worthwhile program."

Lone Star started the program in the 1982-83 heating season to help persons living in the company's service area who were having difficulty paying their heating bills. During the two years it has been operating, Project HAP'N has channeled nearly \$354,000 to help pay all types of heating bills for the needy.

Locally, Texas Community Action Corp., P.O. Box 32150, Amarillo, Texas 79120 will provide assistance in Donley County. The coordinating agency is Community Council of Greater Dallas, which will oversee assistance provided, based on a case-by-case determination of need. Project HAP'N assistance funds can be used for any type of heating bill.

An estimated 18,400 people--4,600 families with an average size of four--were helped during the program's first two winters. Public awareness and support of the program have increased during the time it has been in operation, with private donations growing from 35 percent of the total amount raised the first year to 52 percent the second.

Persons who wish to contribute to Project HAP'N should make checks payable to "Project HAP'N - Community Council" and mail them to "Project HAP'N - Community Council, P.O. Box 243, Dallas, Texas 75221." All contributions are tax deductible.

"We will continue to work with various other social service agencies and through government programs to assist our customers," said Winsor. "Project HAP'N expands these efforts."

### Beware of holiday goodies, TCOM nutritionist warns

The holiday season can be dangerous to your diet. For all those people trying to lose weight this December, beware! Irresistible, high-calorie foods lie ahead. If you can't take a detour and avoid exposure to over-eating, it may be necessary for you to take steps to reduce your risk of "plumping-up."

Ann Blankenship, Ph.D., nutritionist and director of a 16-week weight-loss program at the Institute for Human Fitness at Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine, has a variety of helpful dieting tips to help weight-conscious people get through the difficult holiday period.

"Enjoy the season, the friends, family and conversation. Let this be your focus. Pause from eating to enjoy the people at the table, and let your eyes do part of the feasting," Dr. Blankenship advised.

The nutritionist warned dieters to avoid extreme eating patterns. "Try to eat at regular mealtimes during the holidays. Going many hours between meals increases your likelihood of over-eating. So never skip a meal. If you are hungry, eat with control."

When cooking at home for a party, Dr. Blankenship cautions the cook against tasting, which can add up to 200-300 calories. She suggests sipping low-calorie drinks or chewing sugar-free gum when in the kitchen. Other tips Dr. Blankenship recommends are:

- \*Get support from family members and friends.
  - \*Coffee and alcohol stimulate hunger -- sip low-cal drinks instead.
  - \*Load up on salad but skip the dressing.
  - \*Skip the bread entirely.
  - \*When eating out, order one or two appetizers instead of a large main course.
  - \*Taste a teaspoon of everything and leave the rest.
  - \*Eat slowly and you will feel satisfied with less.
- Dr. Blankenship reaffirms that the dieter is in control. "Don't let others try to influence you. No one can make you eat. You are the sole determinant of what goes into your mouth."

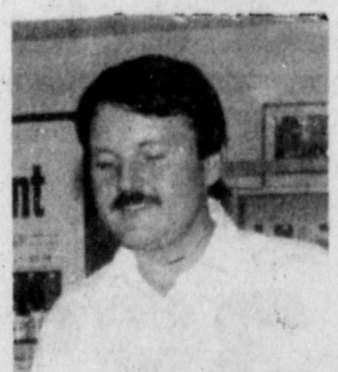
### JUST ASK

These individuals were asked to place all of their medicines [prescription and nonprescription] in a bag and take them to specific pharmacists for comprehensive medication counselling. The study was called the "Brown Bag Prescription Project." The pharmacists inspected each product in the bag and interviewed the program participant regarding product use. Common problems for which help was needed included: [1]

taking the same drug product under more than one name; [2] taking more or less medicine than was actually prescribed; [3] experiencing side effects and drug interactions; [4] confusion regarding two drugs having similar names; [5] taking medicines at the wrong time of day; [6] taking old medicines with expired dates; and [7] not knowing the use of medicines.

The pharmacist-researchers concluded that "approximately 86% of the patients needed some level of professional help." You don't need to wait for a "brown bag" study to obtain information and help from your pharmacist. When you need assistance, just ask.

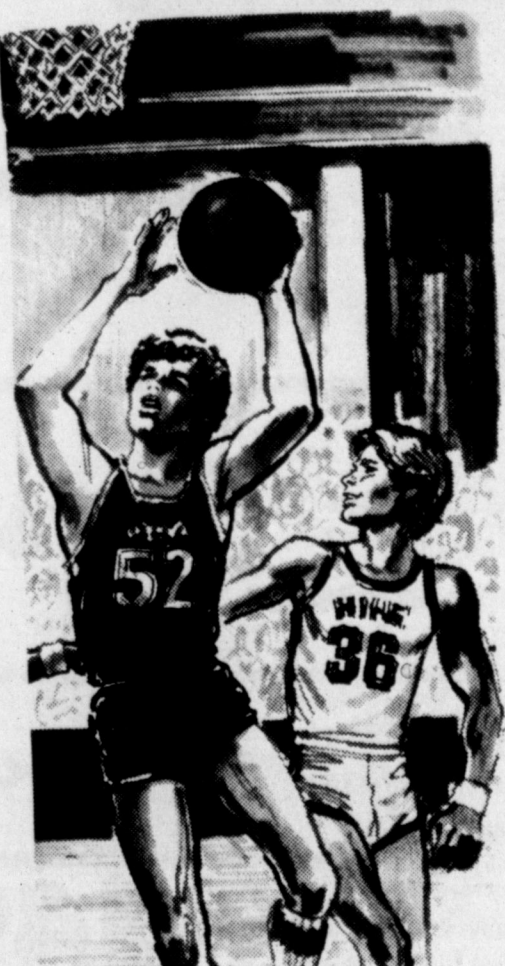

## Santa Fantasy good for kids

Do you believe that there really is a fat, jolly old man who lives at the North Pole with his wife, several dozen elves and nine reindeer and delivers gifts to children all over the world once a year?

If you don't believe it now, chances are you probably did believe it when you were a child. And it was good for you, too.

"Fantasies serve many purposes," explained Jerry McGill, Ph.D., a psychologist at Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine. "It is part of a child's normal growth. Children use fantasies as a way of acting out a fear and coming to terms with it."

Dr. McGill explained that young children do not understand the difference between fantasy and reality. "Children 3 to 6 have a fluid reality. They don't make a distinction between what is imaginary and what is reality. They test to learn

what is imaginary and what is not." Dr. McGill feels that Santa fantasy is neither good nor bad in itself, but if used properly can be a positive experience for the child. "There is nothing wrong with it when a parent structures it. It is a fantasy that the family collaborates in. It can become a plaything for everyone."

The psychologist suggests that parents let the fantasy evolve naturally. "You don't have to destroy the fantasy for the young child nor should you go to extremes to support it. You can watch it evolve. A 6-year-old begins to see little clues and to suspect that there really is no Santa, but he will still hope there is and even leaves out the milk and cookies. He also knows if he plays along he'll continue to get gifts on Christmas Day." Dr. McGill explained that usually around the age of 9, the child lets the fantasy go entirely.
