## Clarendon and Howardwick receive over \$10,000 in sale tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$58.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

June checks represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

Clarendon received \$5,413.85 for this period. This is up from \$4,684.64 from last year for the same period. Total 1985 payment is \$39,739.63, which is down from \$41,321.27 for the same period in 1984.

Hedley shows no payment for this period but has received \$2,710.10 so far this year. This compares to \$2,912.29 for the same period in 1984.

Howardwick received \$604.35 this period which is down from \$778.85 for the same period in 1984. This year they have received \$5,545.25 which is down from \$6,578.45 for the same period last year.

This money which is spent in Donley County, helps keep our city governments running. Each time you shop at home, you are helping keep our taxes down. If the cities did not receive this money, it would have to be raised through taxes.

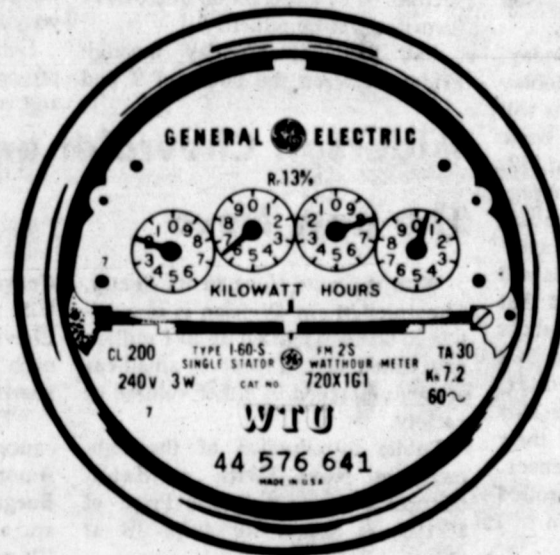

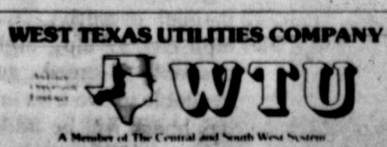

# Behrens receives appointment to West Point

Phil Behrens began his senior year with a shoulder separation suffered on the football practice field at Canyon High School. The No. 1 quarterback recovered by mid-season, and he helped march the Eagles just short of the playoffs.

Behrens was back in top shape when the basketball season began, but in his 13th roundball game, the team's playmaker separated the same shoulder.

It looked like a disastrous year for the highly touted senior, but Behrens rebounded. He earned his eighth varsity letter as a member of the CHS golf team that finished first in District 1-4A. Despite his injuries, he was named the school's All-Around Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive time, and he finished 10th in his class academically.

And to top off his topsy-turvy year, Behrens accepted an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point.

"It's not what I had in mind to do, but when I get up there I'll see what it's like and go from there," said Behrens, who will play football for the Cadets.

"If I graduate from West Point in four years, I'll have to serve in the Army for five years after that."

The modest athlete received his appointment from Congressman Beau Boulter. But because of his injury-riddled season, Behrens will never know what turn his career might have taken.

"It's hard to tell, I might have gotten a few more opportunities to go somewhere else. It's just hard to say."

"They wanted me to come up

there and play football, though, and that sounds pretty good because the education up there is really good."

"He (Phil) really wanted a chance to play Division I football, and he'll get that opportunity at West Point," said Jerry Behrens, Phil's father.

"And what's nice about it is he didn't go after the appointment. They pursued it from up there."

Behrens, who is strong in mathematics, said he will study some type of engineering at West Point. He will report to the academy July 1.

"If I don't make quarterback, I'll be playing somewhere in the secondary," he said. "And punting, they want me to punt this year. I think I'm going to try out for the golf team, too, when football is over."

CHS Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Houston Powell had this to say about Behrens: "Phil is a very, very good young man to coach. Going into the past football season, he was an excellent quarterback. He's very dedicated and hard working, and just a super individual in every way."

"Phil has lots of good leadership qualities, and he will be missed a great deal by the entire athletic program," Powell said. "I think it's an excellent opportunity for him, to go to West Point. And I think that he will certainly be a very outstanding individual there, not only academically, but athletically as well."

The success of the Eagles' golf team helped turn around the senior year for Behrens. A member of the National Honor Society and the Canyon High School Athlete's Academic Honor Roll, he had no problem finding time for sports.

"I was really looking forward to playing football first of all, and then that (injury) happened. I thought it was all over with. Then it happened again."

It was a big letdown. But winning the district championship in golf this year was probably the high point of my sports career at Canyon.

"I didn't really study that much. I spent most of my time practicing and working on sports. Studies just kind of came natural. But with that new law (no-pass, no-play), they're just really getting strict."

"I never did have to worry about it, but it's not really that fair. I don't think they should punish them like that."

"It's hard to say, but a guy should make his grades. If he can't, he probably doesn't try very hard. Still, I'm glad I'm out now."

"It's going to be tough, leaving Canyon and my family, but I'm looking forward to going to West Point and playing football. And, if I make it in engineering, I could get a pretty good job when I get out."

Phil is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Truett Behrens.
