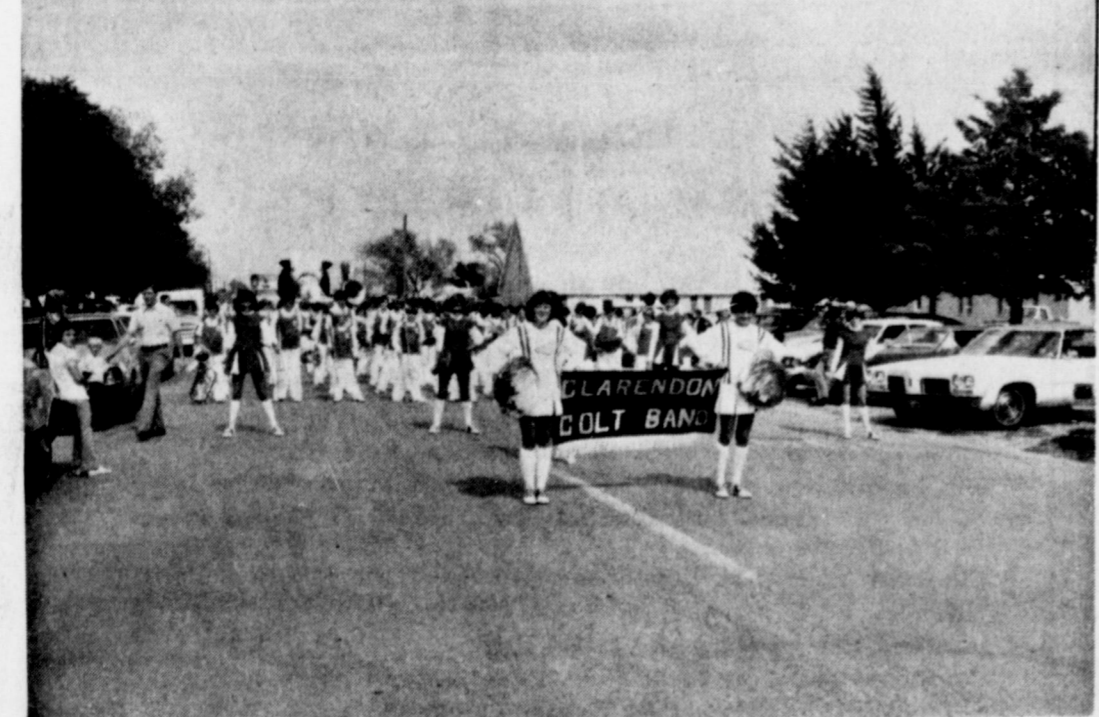

The Church Living Abundantly

John 10:10b - "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

The passage of Scripture of John 10 which speaks of Jesus as the Good Shepherd may well be the New Testament's Counterpart to the Old Testament's 23 Psalm. Perhaps this is as it should be because we think of Jesus, the Good Shepherd in John 10 when we read the 23 Psalm, although the psalmist most likely had the Lord God in mind when he penned the words "The Lord is my Shepherd . . ." You see, it is the same God who spoke to us in the psalmist's marvelous poem who also speaks to us through the incarnated Son of God as described in John 10.

Now, while we normally think of these words in John as applying to individuals, they apply equally as well to the Church. Pesus might be interpreted as saying to the Church: "I came that you might have vitality and that you might overflow with it." But, was he speaking just to the cluster church which met in the homes of Christians which had little organization, or are his words spoken equally as well to the highly institutional church of the 1970's? Well, I think he would be talking especially to the institutional church because it has a greater tendency of becoming a cold cooperation rather than a warming fire which drives the chill of evil from the marrow of our bones.

Therefore, I think Jesus would say that if the Church of the 1970's is to live abundantly it must be a united church. Now, this does not mean that we have to come together as one overgrown institution. It does mean that we must be primarily concerned with spreading the light of Christ upon the darkness of men's lives that they might walk in the light of God's holiness and be his disciples. The Book of Ephesians is an explosion of God's purpose in Christ to unite fragmented mankind and the entire universe into one harmonious whole. This unity he plans to accomplish through a united church - his own redeemed and united people, being in the Spirit and one in the Lord.

Think Jesus would say that for the church to live abundantly it must be a working church, pointing out sin and proclaiming forgiveness for the truly repentant person. It is the duty of the Church to perform two spiritual tasks in behalf of the people: (1) It must so present Christ to each person that he will come to think of himself as a man who needs DAILY the forgiveness of God. This the church does by making God's holiness very plain and by declaring that Jesus knows the most direct route to the heart of God. (2) The church must escort the shamed soul into God's presence where he may hear the words "Your guilt is forgiven you, go and sin no more."

Finally, for the church to live abundantly, Jesus says, it must be a giving church. A cardinal doctrine of the Jewish and Chris-

tian faith is that men are responsible to God for their actions. One of the earliest stories of the Old Testament - that of Cain and Able - teaches the proposition that every man is more than his brother's keeper, he is his brother's brother! And that's more than being just a keeper. This doctrine of responsibility became, in turn the Bedrock upon which the Christian doctrine of stewardship rests. The Christian doctrine declares that God holds the church responsible for all that has been entrusted to it by the Master. GRACE AND PEACE.

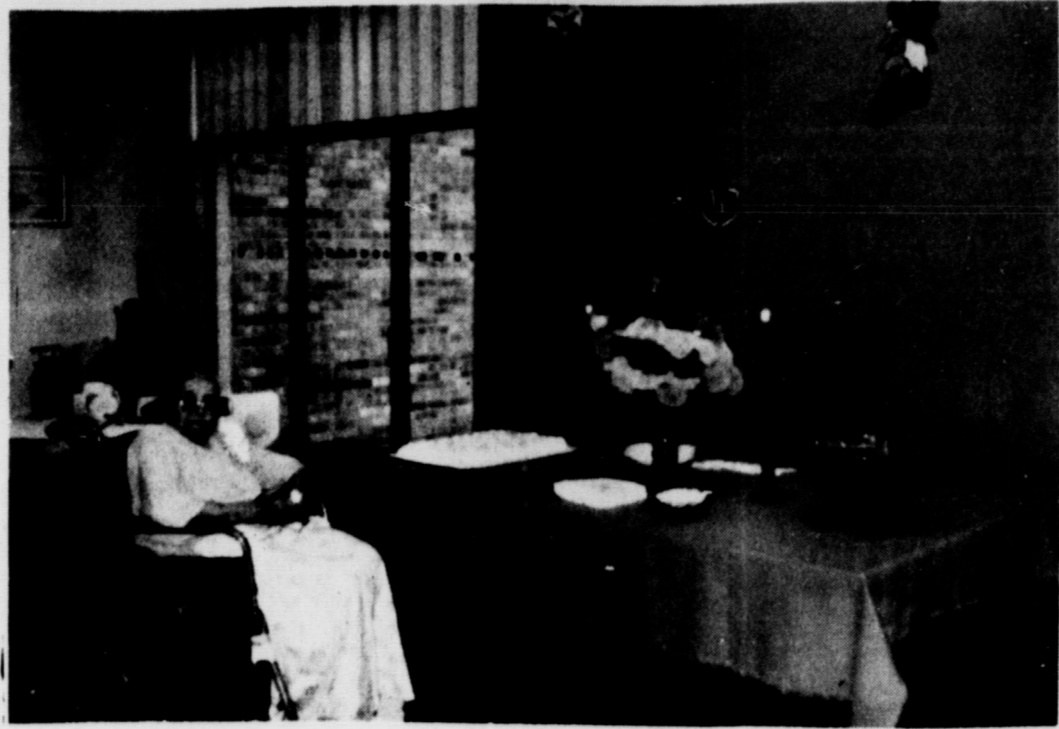

The Consumer Alert

Fall is a traditional time for apartment hunting for many Texans. Students returning to universities, summer newlyweds, recent graduates embarking on a career and a life away from home, families who for financial reasons cannot buy a house at present — all may be in the market for an apartment.

When you have narrowed your list of possible apartments to about three by telephone inquiries, visit them in person and be sure your first impression is a good one. You should notice a general air of cleanliness and regular, adequate maintenance. Your first impression of an individual apartment should also be favorable. It should appear clean, with no loose carpeting or linoleum, no broken or cracked windows.

When you move, again go through the apartment with the manager or owner and determine any damages that will be deducted from your security deposit. Under Texas law, the landlord must refund your deposit within 30 days, or give you a list of deductions along with the balance of your deposit. If you leave owing rent, this can be deducted. You are required to furnish your forwarding address so the refund can be mailed to you.

THE ECONOMY AS CONGRESS MOVED TOWARD RECESS

The Congress was moving toward a pre-election recess last week, although I was among Members who signed a petition asking the leadership to keep the Congress in session. There is still a number of very important measures which have not yet gained final passage. Many of these would affect government spending or otherwise

aster headquarters is in a sub-basement at the Department of Public Safety in Austin, where a core of public officials coordinate disaster activities. In the State Health Department, the Disaster Health Services Program of the Emergency Medical Services Division provides additional resources at the point of need. This is a part of the Texas plan for disaster health and medical care.

Seventeen disaster relief districts, each with a physician directing disaster medical care, are tied into a district Civil Defense Council which coordinates activities of state agencies with disaster functions. In case of disaster or severe threat — such as an impending hurricane along the coast, the Civil Defense Council is mobilized. Within each district are zones from which supplies and personnel requests emanate.

The State Health Department sends representatives of the Disaster Health Services Program to each disaster area to help coordinate activities of other health department personnel. In the case of hurricanes, program personnel are pre-positioned in cities along the Texas coast to await and plan for the expected arrival of the storm.

Always quick to arrive on the scene are engineers of the Sanitary Engineering Division whose primary function is checking water supplies. Investigators from the Food and Drugs Division check damaged food and drug products, and Communicable Disease Services Section personnel may be assigned, and local health departments put physicians, nurses, sanitarians and others on duty immediately.

Within minutes after a tornado dipped down into the heart of Lubbock the night of May 11, 1970, nurses and others picked their way through the rubble to check and salvage vaccines and get them to pre-planned emergency headquarters. A disaster health representative of the State Health Department was on the scene of the tragedy within two hours even though city telephones and electricity were knocked out and transportation disrupted.

The Corpus Christi - Nueces County Health Department had its personnel on duty when Celia slammed into that city on August 3 of the same year. The State Health Department was also there. The personal automobiles of two representatives of the Disaster Health Services Program, who were in Corpus Christi awaiting the storm, were severely damaged. In addition, district engineers and personnel from state headquarters were on the scene.

Equipment from a Packaged Disaster Hospital was set up in a church at Aransas Pass to provide needed medical equipment after Celia. Just recently the Health Department took over the medical inventory of 101 Packaged Disaster Hospitals, similar to the one from which equipment was used during Celia.

A major disaster isn't the responsibility of one agency but demands the coordinated efforts of many to snap back after tragedy. During spring tornadoes which hit Burnet and Hubbard last year, for instance, the Texas National Guard responded quickly with trucks, personnel and helicopters. Representatives of the State Health Department were on the scene within an hour of notification, coordinating disaster health relief.

The State Health Department and its local and regional units have responded quickly and effectively in past disasters. With the resources and personnel at its command, it stands ready always to meet the future emergency needs of the citizens of Texas.

have an impact upon the economy. But, at this writing it appears the recess will take effect this week in which case this will be my last Congressional report until the post-election session begins.

The President's economic address to the Congress contained a number of important requests which merit the attention of the Congress. I do not agree, however, that a tax increase will effectively combat inflation. On the contrary, giving more money to the federal government to spend may only spur inflation because the big spenders in the Congress have, over the years, demonstrated a lack of responsibility by spending ALL of the money the government takes in; in fact, the federal government usually spends MORE money than it takes in. We must eliminate unnecessary government spending, but I have no faith that the liberal majority in the Congress will refrain from spending any additional funds collected through increased taxes. I'm opposed to raising more money for the liberal majority in Congress to spend and to create new bureaucracies.

As the House moved rapidly toward its recess, I supported an effort to demand that fiscal 1975 spending be held to \$300 billion, as the President requested, and supported other efforts to bring spending down, even further.

THE RISE IN FUEL COSTS has been one of the major inflationary factors. This week, I asked the House Ways and Means Committee to consider the solutions reached by the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Energy as an alternative to their tentative decisions affecting the oil and gas industry. I did this by introducing for the first time in the House the Energy Revenue and Development Act which is the result of extensive work by the Senate subcommittee.

The Act establishes an energy trust fund to spur energy development and pay for it from Outer Continental Shelf drilling revenues. Also, it would repeal the foreign depletion allowance while preserving the domestic depletion allowance which is the life-blood of independents who drill 87% of our domestic exploratory wells. The majors do not significantly utilize the domestic depletion allowance. Ending the foreign depletion allowance would bring \$40 million annually into the U. S. Treasury. The Act also would de-regulate new natural gas and old gas as contracts expire; and would end present price controls on oil and petroleum products.

All of these actions would serve to spur domestic energy development and discourage further investment in foreign sources where we are over-dependent. Those foreign sources have become more costly than our domestic ones. If we can increase domestic energy production and decrease foreign dependency, we will be moving toward more energy and avoiding higher consumer costs.

In a meeting I had with the President, I urged him to clarify his position on the energy tax bill pending in the Ways and Means Committee and which is considered in the post-election session. I stressed the importance of retaining the domestic depletion allowance.

ECONOMIC AGRICULTURAL MATTERS were the main points discussed this week when Zack Fisher and I met personally with President Ford. The Pres-

ident assured us that no embargo would be imposed upon grain exports but that he was seeking voluntary cooperation from exporters so that Administration monitoring could insure that we don't run short on domestic grain supplies and that exporting is done in an orderly manner so that in the long run farmers will retain normal foreign grain markets and maintain a more profitable margin rather than risk an erratic and unstable market.

We urged the President to direct his review of restrictive economic practices particularly to food processor - distributor operations. If any restrictive, anti-trust or monopolistic practices are operating among middlemen, the result is disadvantageous to producers and consumers alike and should be stopped.

I specifically urged the President not to exceed the executive order currently in effect lifting meat import quotas when it expires Jan. 1. We urged the President to re-double Administration efforts to get beef exporting countries to reduce their export levels into the United States.

Social Security

Q—I now get the supplemental security income (SSI) gold check each month. When my checks first started I was not working, but now I am earning \$40.00 per month from a part-time job. Will this affect my SSI check amount?

A—Additional earned income or unearned income may lower the amount of your SSI check and must be reported. However, you may have as much as \$35 a month earned income (wages, self-employment income) and still get your full check, if you have no other income (earned or unearned).

Q—I am 80 years old and I have never worked at a job where wages were covered by social security. However, I receive a special payment of \$32.10 per month. Will I be able to get the SSI (gold checks)?

A—We will have to know more about your living arrangements and any other income and resources in order to determine if you are eligible. Your special payment will stop if you become eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) checks.

Q—My husband died in January 1974. He was receiving Railroad Annuity checks and social security retirement checks. Can I expect a funeral allowance from both the Railroad Board and Social Security?

A—A lump sum death payment is payable only if social Security has jurisdiction. Social Security pays both a lump death payment and survivor's benefits. If the Railroad Retirement Board has jurisdiction and will pay survivor's benefits, no lump sum is payable by IRS. The law allows payment of benefits by other agencies during the worker's lifetime, but upon his death

only one agency can pay benefits. The benefits payable by either agency will be based on the combined records.

Q—I will be 62 later this year and I expect to apply for monthly social security retirement benefits at least at that time. I know that by applying at 62, my payments will be reduced. I have a wife and two minor children. Will their payments also be figured on my reduced rate?

A—No. Even though you'll get reduced benefits, the payments for your wife and two children will be figured on your unreduced rate.

Q—I am 61 years old and a widower, and I was completely dependent on my wife before she died. Can I get monthly social security payments on her work record?

A—If your wife worked long enough in jobs covered by social security, you may be able to get monthly benefits. Effective January 1973 the age of eligibility for dependent widowers was lowered from 62 to 60. You should get in touch with your social security office and apply for monthly payments.

Q—My husband died in an auto accident 4 months ago, and my 20 year old son was severely injured in the same accident. Since my son had worked for 6 months before the accident, can he get monthly disability payments from social security?

A—To qualify for disability payments on his own record, your son needs at least 1 1/2 years of work under social security during the last 3 years. However, if it looks like he'll be disabled for a year or more, he may be able to get benefits on his father's earnings record. Children can get monthly payments on the record of a deceased, disabled, or retired parent if the child becomes disabled before age 22.

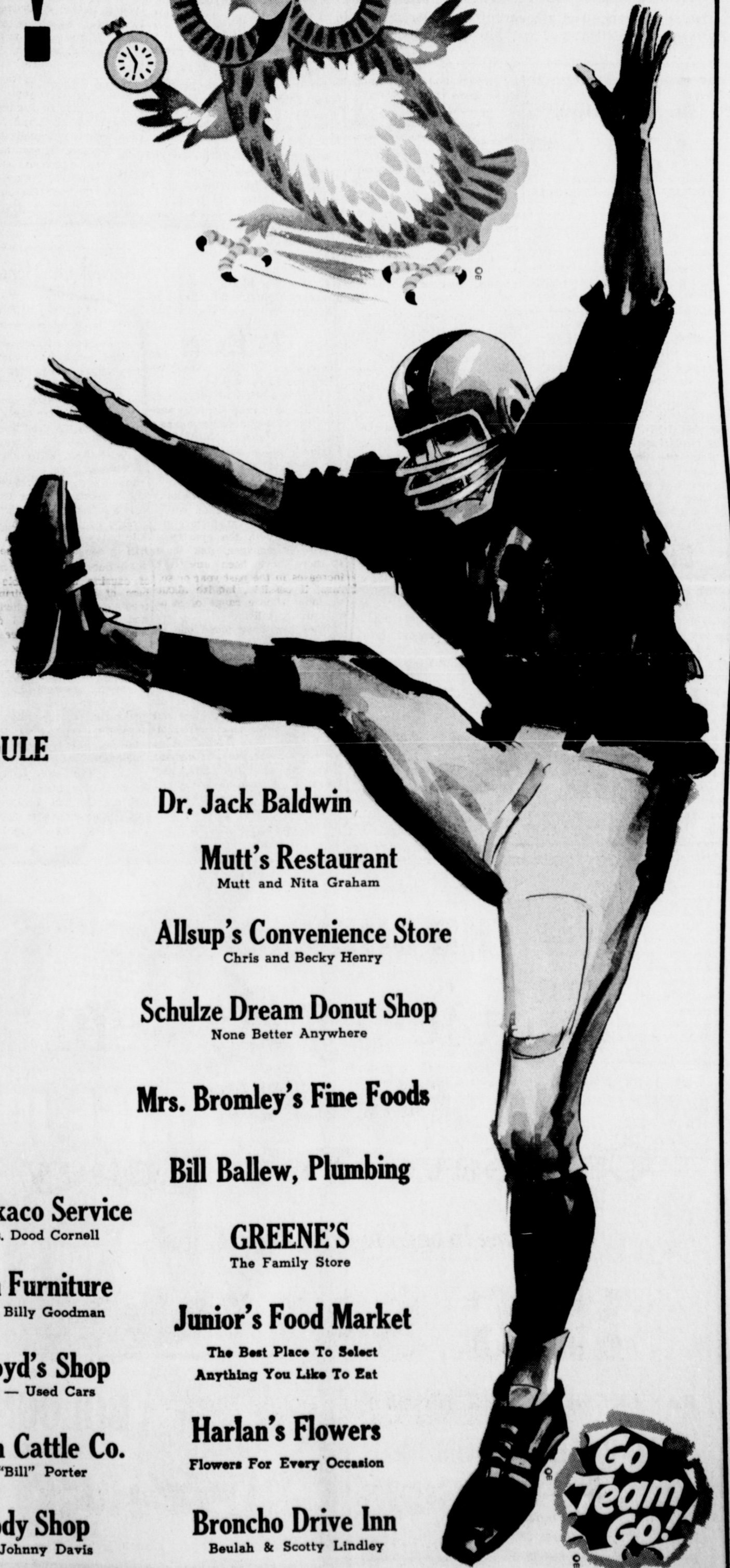

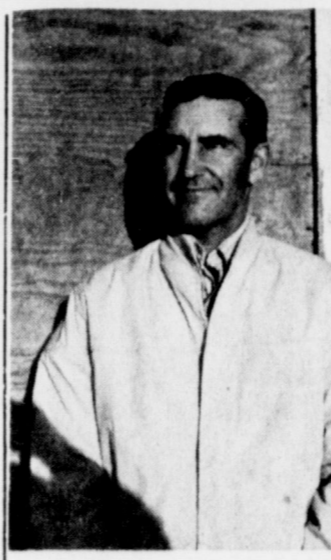
