> The bill contains a policy educational opportunity is "a matter of highest priority." I June 11, 1974. support the concept of equal educational opportunity, but I have long opposed the practice of forced busing to attain racial balance. This week, another amendment is expected to be voted upon which would prohibit the use of federal funds to sup-

port busing for racial balance. The new Education Act will consolidate school aid programs categorical programs into two: library and instructional resources, and innovation and support services. This action should reduce government red tape, paperwork and compliance acti-

The bill also extends bi-lingual education programs for another three years. These programs are particularly important for areas of Texas where many people speak Spanish as their primary

language. One of the most controversial portions of the bill calls for revision of the formula for distributing aid to schools serving disadvantaged children. Allocations under the bill as written in Committee would bring school districts in the 13th Congressional District of Texas some \$3,-031,137. An Amendment has been proposed which would apply a different funding formula, which would net our District \$2,955,810.

Education is one of the most important functions of government. I have always supprted a maximum amount of decisionmaking with local school boards and I shall continue along that philosophy as I cast votes on hese education matters this

AN ANTI-HIJACKING bill was recently passed by the House which will allow the death penalty in at least some cases Tough Criminal penalties are a deterrent to crime and I sough to toughen the bill which was passed, even though it is tougher than what we now have. I vot ed against an amendment which would have prevented use of the death penalty entirely. That amendment was defeated 121 to 286. Also, I voted for an amendment which would have stricken language prohibiting the death penalty in certain mitigating circumstances. That was also rejected, 102 to 302.

ON ANOTHER ROLL - CALL VOTE this past week, I voted against supplemental appropriations for the State Department, although the majority of the House members approved the measure, 331 to 75.



Q. Is it true that a retiree may | support for the child in 1973 be entitled to a tax credit for 1973 when he files his return?

Yes. If you are a retired U.S. citizen or resident, had \$600 of earned income in each of any 10 calendar years before 1973, and had retirement income during 1973, you may be entitled to a tax credit. Inaddition, just by filling out a few lines on Schedule R and your tax form, you can get the IRS to compute the retirement income credit for you. See your tax form instructions for de-

Q. My husband and I are legally separated. I have custody of our daughter. Does this mean I can claim her as a

A. That depends. First, you and your husband together must have furnished more than one half of the child's support for 1973. Secondly, the child must be in your or your husband's custody for more than half the year.

If these conditions are satisfied, then generally the parent having custody of the child for the greater part of 1973 is entitled to the dependency exemption. However, there are exceptions to this rule. Your husband may be entitled to the exemption if he contributed at least \$600 toward the child's support during the year and the decree of separate mainte nance or a written agreement specifies that he is entitled to

Another exemption arises

and you do not establish by a clear preponderance of the evidence that you furnished more for support.

Q. I heard that there are five tests that must be met for a taxpayer to claim a person as a dependent. What are they?

A. For a person to qualify as your dependent for 1973, the following tests must be met: 1) You must furnish over half of the dependent's total support during the calendar year; 2) Unless the person is less than 19 years of age at the end of the year or a full-time student during five months of the year, you may not claim him as a dependent if his gross income is \$750 or more; 3) The person must be a member of your household and live with you for the entire year or be closely related to you; 4) He must be a citizen or national return, Form 1040X. This form of the U.S. or a U.S. resident, or a resident of Canada, Mexico, Panama Canal Zone or the Republic of Panama for some part of the year; and 5) The person must not file a joint return unless one is not due but was filed merely to obtain

Q. I had a part-time job last summer to pay college tuition. I didn't earn enough to pay income tax, but I'm going to file a return to recover income tax withheld from my pay. Can I check off \$1 of the tax withheld for the Presidential Election Campaign Fund?

Q. I pledged \$100 to a charitable organization in December 1973. I was billed in January 1974 and just paid the bill. Can I deduct this amount on my 1973 return?

A. No. Contributions must actually be paid before the close of 1973 to be deductible on your return for that year.

Q. Can I file my tax return without my Form W-2?

A. You should make every effort to obtain your W-2 form from your employer to insure a proper return.

However, your return must be filed on time. If you do not have all your Forms W-2, report all your income and attach a statement explaining how you computed any tax withheld for which you claim credit, but for which you have no Form W-2.

If, after you have filed your return, you receive a Form W-2 for income that you did not include in your return, or if you find your estimates of income and withholding tax to be incorrect, file an amended is available at any IRS office.

Q-I am retired and my 16 year old son draws social security benefits on my record. will never be able to work. I am concerned as to whether his benefits will end should I die before he does.

A-Assuming that your son meets our disability requirements, he will continue to draw his benefits as long as he remains disabled and does not marry. However, in order to establish his disability, you should contact the social security office nearest you when he is 171/2 years old to report his disabiity. The social security office will at that time undertake the necessary development to determine his disability.

Q-The Veterans Administration pays me pension under the so-called "old law." Can I switch to pension under the "new law?" A-Yes, if it would be to your advantage. It is suggested, however, that you first discuss it with a VA representative, since once you've made the change you cannot return to benefits under the "old law."

Q-Am I eligible for educational assistance from the Veterans Administration for service in the Army from July 1 through Nov. 30, 1969?

A-No, unless you were separated for a service connected disability. Otherwise, to be eligible for this benefit, a veteran must have served more than 180 days of active duty, any part of it after Jan. 31, 1955, and he must have been separated under conditions other than dishonorable



CONSERVE AND SAVE

ON WATER HEATERS



Normally the quantity of Hot water used in a household is about 1/4 to 1/3 of the total water usage. Here are some suggestions that can help you get the most out of your water heater.

With a little planning, you can arrange to wash only full loads of clothing in your washer and full loads of dishes in your dishwasher. Less than full loads consumes energy and wastes water needlessly.

To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.

A water heater that's old, or too small for your family needs, can be wasteful because it's working too hard and using too much energy to keep up with your hot water demands.

It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute, will waste 300 gallons per month.

The thermostat controlling the water temperature is pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150°F. This setting has proven most satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.

The thermostat can be adjusted to provide warmer or cooler water temperatures. The thermostats are clearly marked for easy adjustment to increase or decrease the water temperature.
