## Broncs Tuck Away 1st Season Win Over White Deer 20-12

Following one of the most inspiring school pep rallies Friday afternoon in the high school gym, the Bronchos were really fired up (chock full of team spirit) and showed their team effort Friday night to defeat the White Deer Bucks 20-12 at White Deer.

Kenneth King put all the points on the scoreboard for the Bronchos but had lots of help from his team-mates. He started the game off with a thrilling 54 yard run but his try for extra point was spoiled by a high snap from center.

White Deer came right back and racked up their two scores minus the extra points. King added another 7 points in the second period to put the Bronchos ahead again, a lead they never relinquished the remainder of the game. His third TD came in the third period to climax an 84 yard drive which was highlighted by a 64 yard run by King.

Improved blocking and defensive play on the part of Bronchos was evident throughout the game with the Bronco line putting the damper on the Bucks at times when most needed. The Bronchos totaled 330 yards rushing in the game to White Deer's 132. It was a win the Bronchos needed to really get them started for the season.

## City To Fight Phone Rate Increase Suit

According to City Administrator Walter B. Knorpp, City Dads have decided to fight the suit filed last week by General Telephone Co. for a rate increase.

Back in June, General asked for a substantial rate increase for business and residence. This was denied by the city council. The Company came back with a compromise lowering the rate some but the city still did not agree. The compromise proposal was to raise business phone rates from \$15.40 to \$18.25; first proposal was to increase to \$20.45. Residence from \$7.70 to \$8.75 and first proposal was from \$7.70 to \$9.75 for 1 party and \$6.60 to \$8.80 for 2 party.

The city felt that the approximately 30% increase first asked for was way out of line and the latter, approx. 16.2% was still too high, according to Knorpp. He stated further that the city had been promised numerous advancements here including direct dialing several years ago and previous rate raises had been granted on the strength of such proposals but nothing had been done. The council is ready to go to court to defend what they think is right for the people they represent, Knorpp concluded.

### News Regarding The Hospital District & Medical Center

The Donley County Hospital District Board of Directors met Monday night and among other regular business accepted the resignation of Steve Bell as Administrator of the Medical Center. Mrs. Peggy King accepted the responsibility of the position temporarily but due to her vacation being set up at this time, Steve White, Nursing Home Administrator, will handle the job at present.

Bell's letter of resignation read as follows:

gentlemen: Please consider this my resignation effective Sept. 16, 1974 at 7:30 p.m. I do hope that this facility can continue to run and on a profit basis. There are some sincerely concerned board members on the present board. However, there are a few that cause constant turmoil. To those who have helped, I want to say thank you for the opportunity you have given me to serve this district. Respectfully, Stephen Bell.

He also included a side note of criticism and suggestions which your editor feels is not in good taste for publication at this time as there are always two ways to look at any situation and true facts have to be proven out, which we have not found to date, before we make publication of such.

In other action regarding the Hospital District, the following information has been received. The Civil Court of Appeals suit Citizens vs. Dr. Smith was a unanimous opinion in favor of the citizens filing the suit. Dr. Geo. W. Smith's attorneys filed a document requesting a rehearing. This was denied this past week. Dr. Smith now has 30 days to appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas. Such an appeal could take an estimated year for some type of action and it is pretty well accepted that the Supreme Court would not reverse the order handed down by the 7th Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo. In their opinion, District Judge Robert Montgomery was in error in his rulings here.

The Clarendon Bronchos will take to the road again Friday night to pit their skill against the Quanah Indians at Quanah. Game time will be 8 p.m.

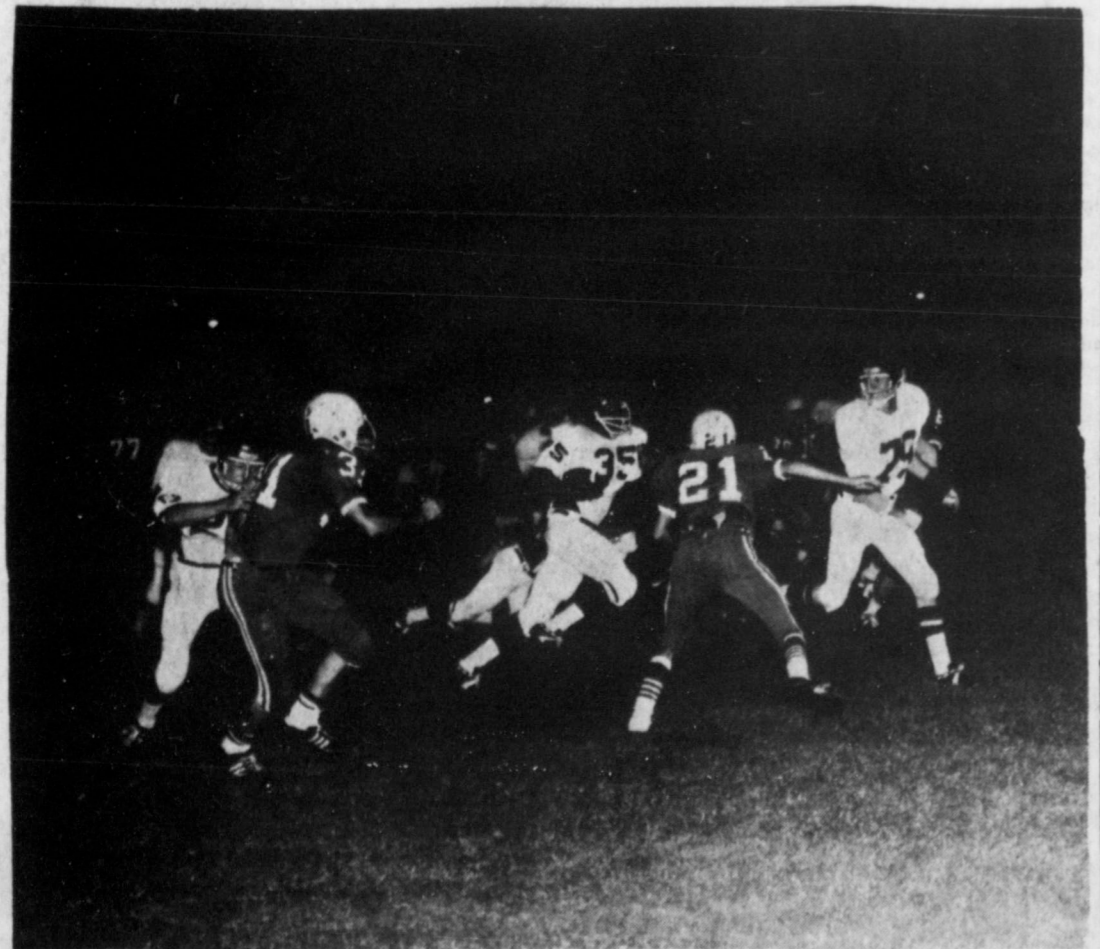

## Pentecostal Revival Set September 26-28

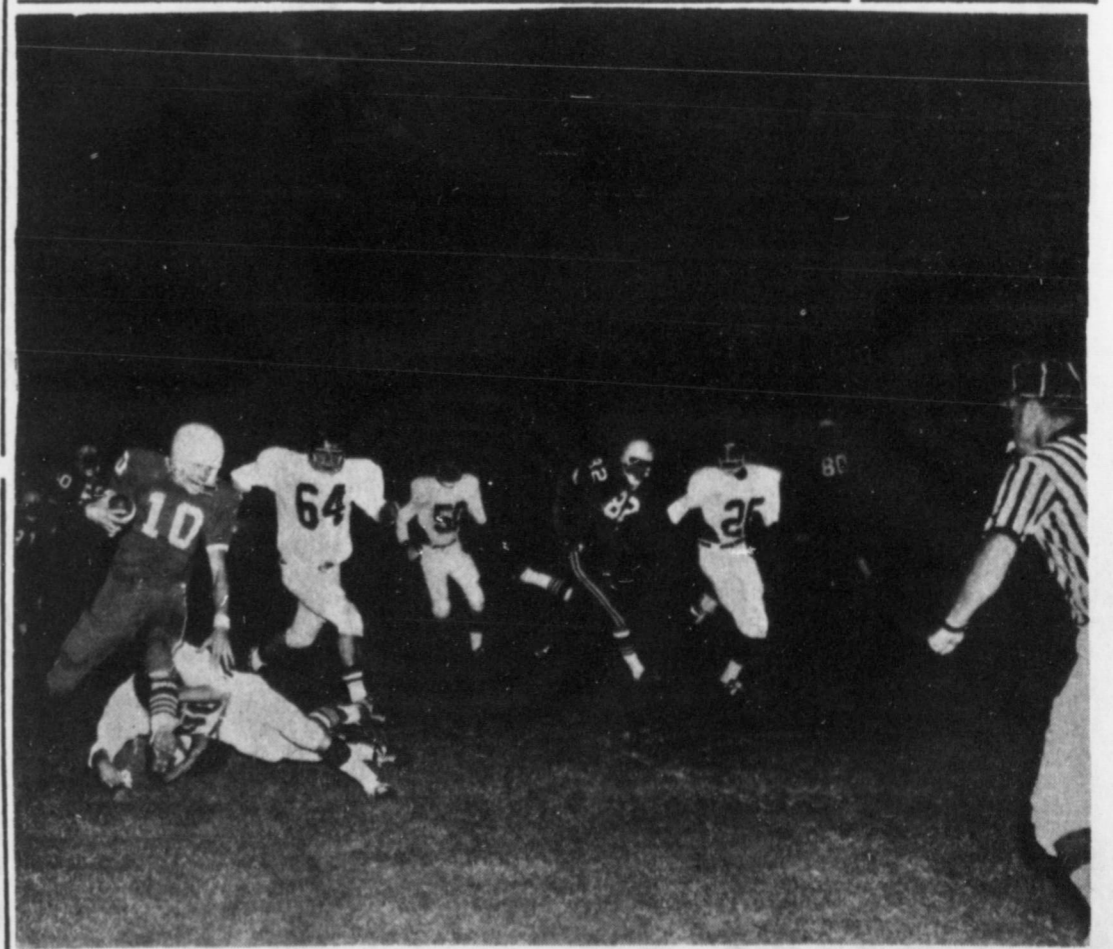

**Recalling The Indians Of Old Clarendon**

The Staked Plains, as it was called in the 1800's, belonged to the Comanche Nation by right of inheritance and by right of a federal grant from the United States Government. Nevertheless, the Plains became the object of settlement because of its rich farm and ranch land. The Plains were a cattlemen's paradise; so hundreds of little townships popped up all across them. One of these settlements was "Saints Root" or Clarendon as it was later called. Some around Clarendon today say that the town got its name from Lord Clarendon of England.

There is still one or two living in Clarendon who recall the Comanche Indians of the turn of the century. They were led by a young chief, half Comanche and half white, called Quannah Parker. Quannah Parker and his Comanches were a familiar sight in Clarendon. They roamed the Plains as Lords of the Plains, fitting into the landscape as if they belonged to it and were a part of it.

The horsemanship of the Comanches was superb recalls one man. They were better horsemen than the Texas "brush-oppers" or the Mexican vaqueros, he recalls. As they rode their horses, often individuals would do tricks on the backs of their horses, standing straight up, doing head and hand stands, swinging from side to side, with perfect balance as the animal raced at break-neck speed.

Terror tales were popular during the turn of the century about the Comanche. They were recognized and appreciated by men of the Plains as good warriors and fighters. Not intimidated by civilization, they could smell like the beasts of the Plains. They could scent water miles away, and down wind from them, no enemy could approach them. Few could stand the Comanche charge on horses with the blood-chilling war cry of the Comanche brave. "Comanche", they were called with respect by those who knew how to appreciate their bravery in battle. "They could turn on a dime a horse running at full speed," says one man. "They could bring a running horse to a dead stop in twenty-five paces. They were better at horsemanship than the best trained cavalry we ever had."

The "Comanche" were good at breaking wild horses, commented one individual who worked on the Goodnight ranch as a boy. "They could tame a wild one faster and better than any Texas cowboy. They did it the easy way, without breaking the spirit of the animal, while the cowboy did it the hard way. They had a unique way of doing it. They would tie two gentle, well-trained horses, one on each side of the wild animal. They would let these gentle horses run a-while tied to the wild one. They ate and slept tied to the wild one. When the time came to

**State Capitol Highlights and Sidelights**

Gloomy predictions of increasing natural gas shortages during winter months were made to southern governors at their conference here last week.

Federal Power Commissioner Don S. Smith reported major pipeline operators expect natural supplies to fall 9.6 per cent below demand.

Smith forecasts gas pipeline curtailments this winter will be 81 per cent greater than last year.

To sustain present levels of gas consumption would require discovery of "a new Alaska every year," the federal agency official told the governors.

EPC, according to Smith, has taken these steps to relieve impact of the shortage:

Entered an order to allow 2,400 of the 3,900 smaller gas producing companies to sell interstate gas at 63 cents per thousand cubic feet, instead of the 42 cent wellhead rate permitted major producers.

Reinstated emergency provisions to allow utilities to use gas through pipelines for 60-day periods at market rates rather than lower, regulated interstate rates.

Texas' Gov. Dolph Briscoe said the action would have little effect in Texas, where demands will keep prices far above the 63 cent rate.

**INFORMATION SOUGHT** — A Cleveland firm hired to survey tax values in 35 school districts sought tax appraisal and computer contracts with all 1,100 districts in the state.

Legislative Property Tax Committee Chairman Sen. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock said the solicitation seemed "inappropriate" to him.

break the animal, one Indian would mount each of the tame animals, while a third climbed on the back of the wild one in the center. Most of the work of taming the wild one had already been done by the two tame animals by his side. The wild one was ridden in between the two tame ones. Generally, he didn't cut up too much. Taming him was easy and fast using this process."

One person recalls a conversation with Quannah Parker saying, "The Indians were basically good people. They would have been wonderful religious people if guided properly. They were basically religious believing in the "Great Spirit," and what they knew about God and their concept of God, often surprised those who bothered to talk with them about Him."

"They were like any other human being. They didn't want to lose their land, and we were settling permanently upon it. We were a threat to them and their security. We went to fighting them to take their land, not to say that they and their ways were strange and frightening to us."

The rain dance of the Comanches was something to see, recalls one person. When it was dry, they would dress themselves out in their finest and dance and sing all night, praying that it would rain. If it did rain within a few days, they would once again dress themselves up in their best robes and feathers and have a "thanksgiving dance," thanking the Great Spirit for sending the rain.

We could learn from their concept of simple thanksgiving. We recall that Jesus Christ said, "God is a Spirit, and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." (John 4:24).

Simplicity of life style usually causes us to be more appreciative of God's goodness and bountiful care of all His children. We get so caught up in this life we call civilization that we become barbaric in our concepts, attitudes, and treatment of others.

So, let us say, "Thank you Lord, for today, and the great heritage that has been passed down to us, making it possible for us to enjoy this day in peace."

**CRIME FIGHT MAPPED** — Atty. Gen. John Hill has called for establishment of a statewide grand jury and a central information bank as weapons in the fight on organized crime.

At a law enforcement conference, Hill said state and local law officers must co-operate to combat the increased threat of major crime.

Governor Briscoe, meanwhile, said he plans to propose to the legislature again in 1975 a law to permit wire tapping to gather evidence of organized crime.

**AVE Classes Open For Registration At AC**

Over 60 courses covering six major areas of instruction are open this fall at the Amarillo College Adult Vocational Education (AVE) program. These courses are in the categories of health care; real estate; business - secretarial; agri - business, technical, electronics-shop; and mechanical - automotive. Ten of the courses are being offered for the first time.

The majority of these classes meet from 7 to 10 p.m. with fees ranging from \$6 to \$46. Registration is now in progress and interested students may enroll in the registrar's office in the Washington Street Administration Building or at the West campus School of Vocational Arts, 622 W. 9th.

The Amarillo College Radio-TV Department has received notification from the FCC to proceed with operational plans for a Class C, FM educational radio station. Plans are now being made to begin putting in equipment and readying the transmitter given by KGNC as well as planning a tentative radio schedule. Programming will include classical music and educational programs at sign on time.

**ASCS Farm News**

**FEED GRAIN:** If your feed grain is not going to be worth harvesting for grain and you want to either plow it under and plant a small grain such as wheat or rye or you want to graze it out, you should come to this office and sign up to have the acreage appraised before plowing it under or turning livestock in. This must be done in order for the farm to be eligible for a low yield payment on feed grain.

**1973 REAP AND 1974 RECP:** We have funds available for carrying out needed conservation practices. One of these practices is establishing vegetative cover for winter protection by planting winter peas or rye.

**WHEAT ALLOTMENTS:** You should have received your 1975 wheat allotment about the middle of August. This allotment is not a restriction on the amount of wheat you may plant. The allotment will be used in computing disaster and deficiency payments.

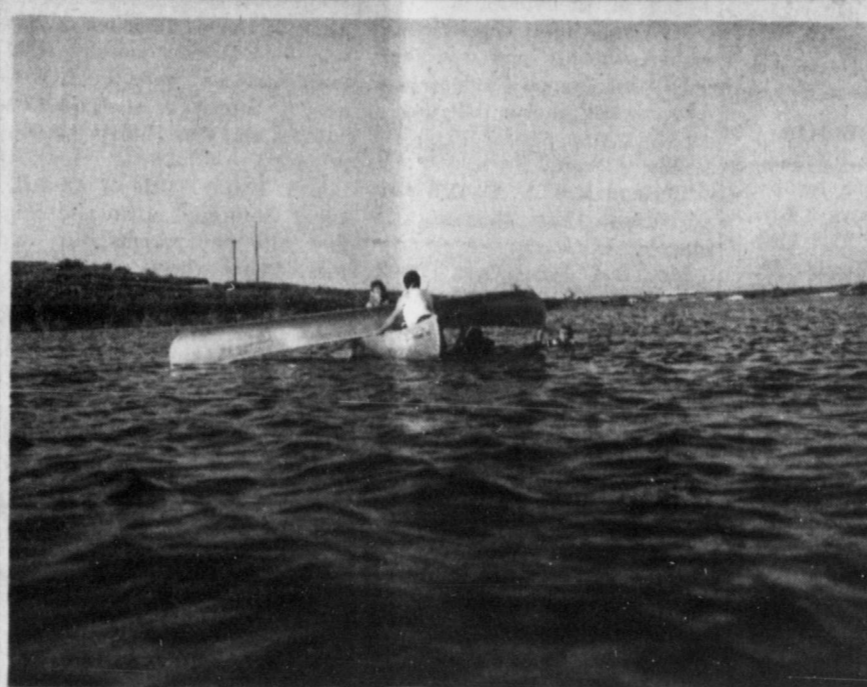
**PAYMENT LIMITATION:** The combined maximum payment a person may receive under the feed grain, wheat, and upland cotton programs for 1974 is \$20,000.00.

Before you can receive any payment under the 1974 program you must complete and return the questionnaire recently mailed from this office.

**COUNTY COMMITTEE ELECTION:** It is time to start thinking of a producer you would like to see elected to the county committee. Lacy Noble has served 3 consecutive terms (maximum by law) and will go off the committee this year. You will be receiving, in early October, additional information along with a blank nominating petition.

**1975 PROGRAM PROVISIONS ANNOUNCED:** The provisions announced are unchanged from 1974 and are as follows:

1. There will be no set-aside and no conserving base requirements.
2. Producers may continue to preserve their allotments with conserving crops, excluding rice and quota crops within their allotments. (Cotton deficiency payments cannot be earned when

## The Sounding Of The Trumpet

Leviticus 25:9 — "Then shall thou cause the trumpet of the jubilee to sound . . . in the day of atonement shall ye make the trumpet sound throughout all your land."

The company of players and singers assembled by David after he had established Jerusalem as his capital probably represented the earliest municipal orchestra about which written records have survived. From II Samuel 6:5 and I Chronicles 15:16 we learn that the king's orchestra included at least three percussion instruments: tambourines, castanets, and symbols. The string section included lyrics and harps and there was one wind instrument the horn, e.g., the cornet (I Chronicles 15:28). However, the trumpet was of special significance in civil, military and religious ceremonies and it does not appear that it was ever played with other instruments.

In religious services the trumpet was blown to call the people to worship and repentance that they should turn from their sins to the Lord. Paul sounds a kind of trumpet call when he says that our labors in the Lord will not be in vain, for we shall overcome the grave and be raised with a nature that is imperishable (I Corinthians 15: 50-58). Paul says that he who believes in Christ can be confident that "at the last trumpet; for the trumpet shall sound" (I Corinthians 15:52) the Christian will become immortal. Christ made this possible for us by his triumph over death and sin, the two major enemies of man. This is so because Christ overcame death by rising from the dead and by bringing forgiveness to mankind. In the Scriptures Jesus is always the victor in these two areas where man cannot save himself.

Therefore, the ministry of the church is to call men to repentance that when ". . . the trumpet of jubilee . . ." sounds there shall be a great host to sing:

When the trumpet of the Lord shall sound, and time shall be no more,  
And the morning breaks, eternal, bright and fair;  
When the saved on earth shall gather over on the other shore,  
And the roll is called up yonder, I'll be there.

Paul says: "Behold, I show you a mystery: we shall not all sleep, but we shall be changed" (I Corinthians 15:51). Upon the second coming of Christ the trumpet shall sound and the transformation necessary for our being received into the Kingdom of God shall be ended; and there will be the culmination of history. For those who the transformation is complete will hear the Lord say: "Well done, good and faithful servant; . . . enter thou into the joy of your master" (Matthew 25:21).

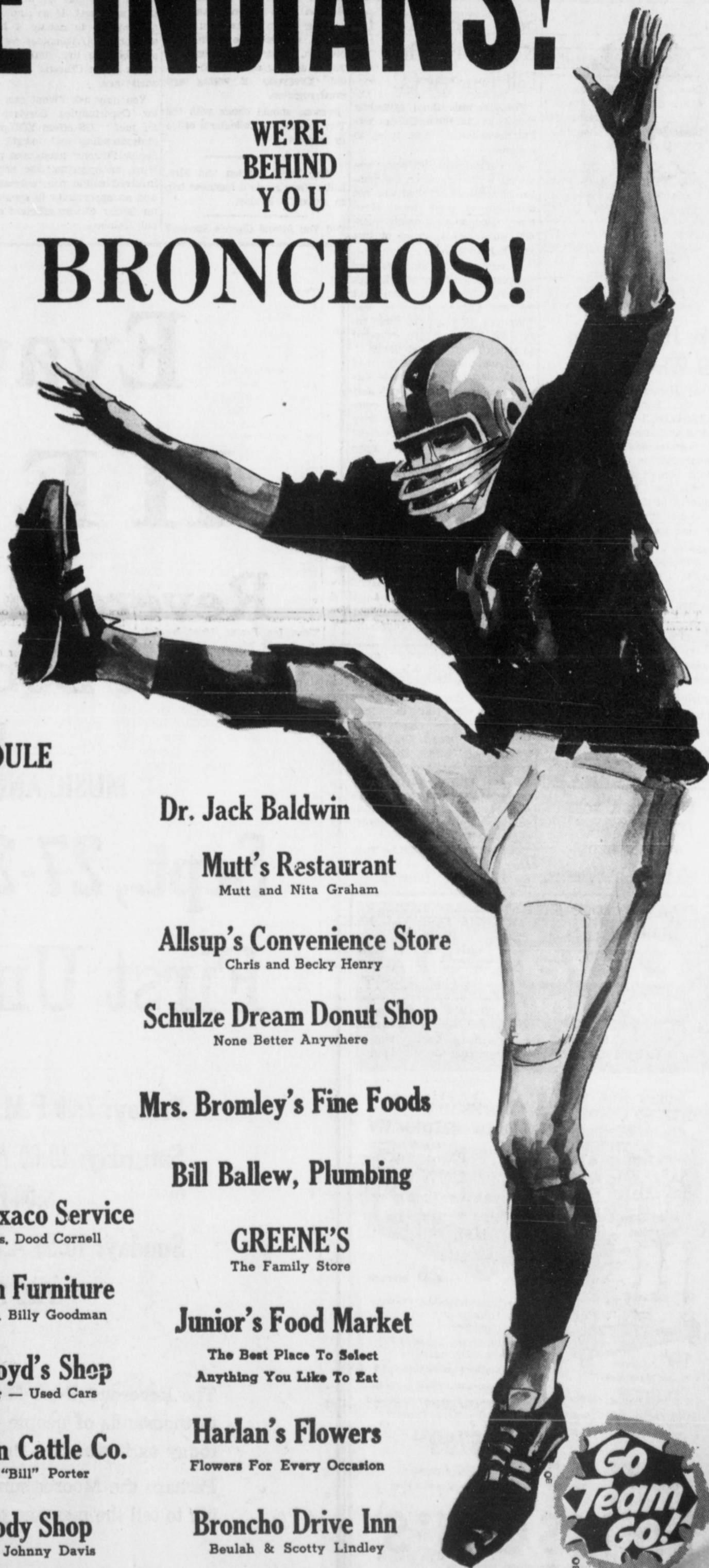

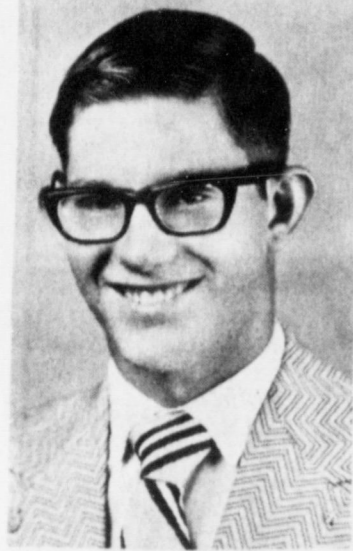
