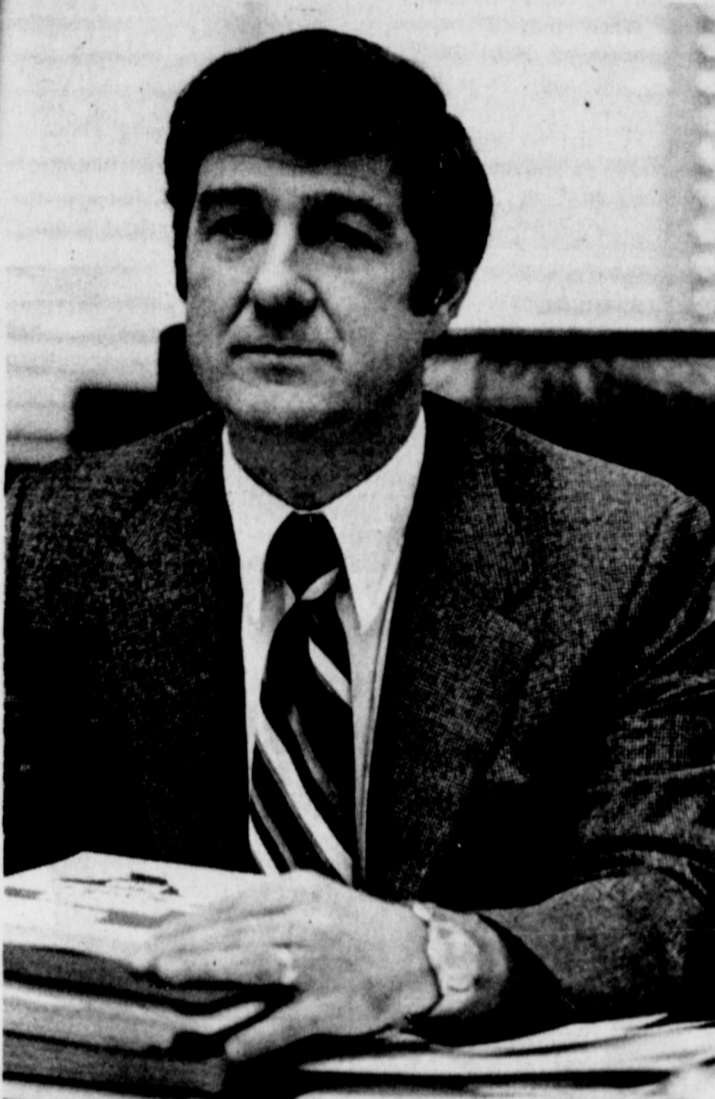

The Greenbelt Development Corp. Assisting Business In Donley Co.

The Greenbelt Development Corporation was formed in late 1972 by a group of Donley County citizens in order to finance existing industry in Donley County and to attract new industry. The corporation is a typical example of the "Industrial Foundation" approach currently being used in many other cities to attract larger industries which will provide increased employment and economic developments necessary to the continued growth of such cities and counties. The development corporation provides 10% of the total project cost. This 10% is loaned to the development corporation by its shareholders, and is repaid on an annual basis. No more than 2.5% of the total project cost may be contributed by the industry which the development corporation finances, and thus the financing is attractive to industries with large capital requirements which may not have the assets necessary to obtain their financing. The development corporation obtains the remaining 90% of its funds through local banks which loan the remaining project cost to the corporation. These loans are SBA guaranteed. During the term of the loan, the corporation owns the assets and leases them to the business it has assisted. When the loans are paid, the corporation deeds the particular improvements and assets to the industry in question. Carl Lightner, with the Small Business Administration in Lubbock, was instrumental in aiding the foundation of Greenbelt Development Corporation. The Corporation is currently engaged in an advertising campaign both in Donley County and elsewhere in an effort to bring new industry which will stimulate our continued growth.

Q—I understand the Veterans Administration is paying a record dividend this year on "V"-prefixed National Service Life Insurance and "K"-prefixed U. S. Government Life Insurance policies. When may I expect the dividend on my NSLI policy?

A—Your dividend is payable on the anniversary date of your NSLI policy, and no application is necessary. If you have elected to buy paid up insurance with your dividends, you will get a statement of your account rather than a check. Dividends amounting to \$308.8 million are payable throughout 1974 on anniversary dates of policies carried by 3.9 million eligible veterans.

Q—I'm a World War II veteran who never used his GI

home loan entitlement. I hear the Veterans Administration will still guarantee loans for such veterans. Is that true?

A—Yes. 1970, Congress removed expiration dates on all unused, VA expired loan entitlement. Henceforth, veterans retain entitlement until used. Apply to nearest VA office if you want to use this benefit.

Q—What's this I hear about husbands of female veterans being eligible for the same Veterans Administration benefits as wives and widows of male veterans?

A—You heard right. Under PL 92-540 (Oct. '72), the term "wife", for purpose of benefits, includes husbands of female veterans and "widow" includes widowers of female veterans.

Q—A few years ago, my husband took out a government life insurance policy with the Veterans Administration, but I'm not sure I'm the beneficiary. Will VA give me this information?

A—VA is not authorized to provide this information during the insured's lifetime without permission from the insured or his duly appointed fiduciary.

For instance, when he healed the leper in Mark 1:40-42, one touch was enough just as it was for the healing of Jairus' daughter in Mark 5:22-42. But, in the case of the Bethsaida blind man (Mark 8:22-26), Jesus touched him twice. You know the story; after the first touch the cure was only partial and the man saw "men as trees walking." Now, I've never seen a tree walking, but in our mind we each one carry an image of what we think the man meant. The man had passed from blindness to sight but his vision was very poor.

It reminds me when my oldest son first got glasses. He was about seven or eight and we lived in Wolforth, Texas. Our house was across from the school

property with the school building about two hundred yards away. After getting his glasses he could see people entering and leaving the school building for the first time in his life. You can have sight but not have clear vision. Those glasses must have brought vision to his sight just as Jesus' second touch brought vision to this man's sight—remember how the scripture said: "after that he put his hands again upon his eyes . . . and he saw everything clearly."

Now, of course this incident recorded by Mark is a parable of the spiritual life and it centers in Jesus, the light of the world, who came to give physical light, yet, and more important, spiritual light also. Remember how John says: "In him was life; and the life was the light of men . . . That was the true Light which lighteth every man that cometh in o the world" (John 1:4-9). Most people today walk around with sight, they have been touched once by Jesus and their relationship with him is as the one who saw men as trees walking, e.g., they know they are caught up in something that is different from the life they once lived for now the

darkness has departed, they see but not clearly. However, many stop there, they have not yet permitted Jesus to touch them a second time, thus restoring full vision. They have some knowledge of Jesus without a saving experience. They have the first touch, but not the second one whereby they know Jesus as their Savior.

We all may need a second touch, a third touch, and even up to a sixth touch, but let us not be dismayed, let us go all the way with Jesus, knowing that he will go all the way with us.

Social Security

Q—I am 27 years old and I have a wife and two small children. It takes all I earn to support my family. As my immediate need is so great and my retirement is so far in the future, may I cease to contribute to the program for a few years even though my work is covered under social security?

A—Regardless of your age or

your current family needs, you must continue to contribute to the program while you work under covered employment. While it is true that your retirement will be quite a few years off, the fact that you are currently working on a job that is covered under social security means that you are building up protection so benefits could be paid to your wife and children well before you reach retirement age. In the event of your disability while your children are still young, not only could social security benefits be paid to you but also to your wife and children. Similarly in case of your death your minor children and your widow would draw monthly benefits. Your children's benefits would normally end when they reach age 18 but they could be continued until age 22 if they do not marry and they remain in school on a full time basis. Since the amount of your benefits will be determined by your average earnings, the more earnings you have, the larger your benefits will be.

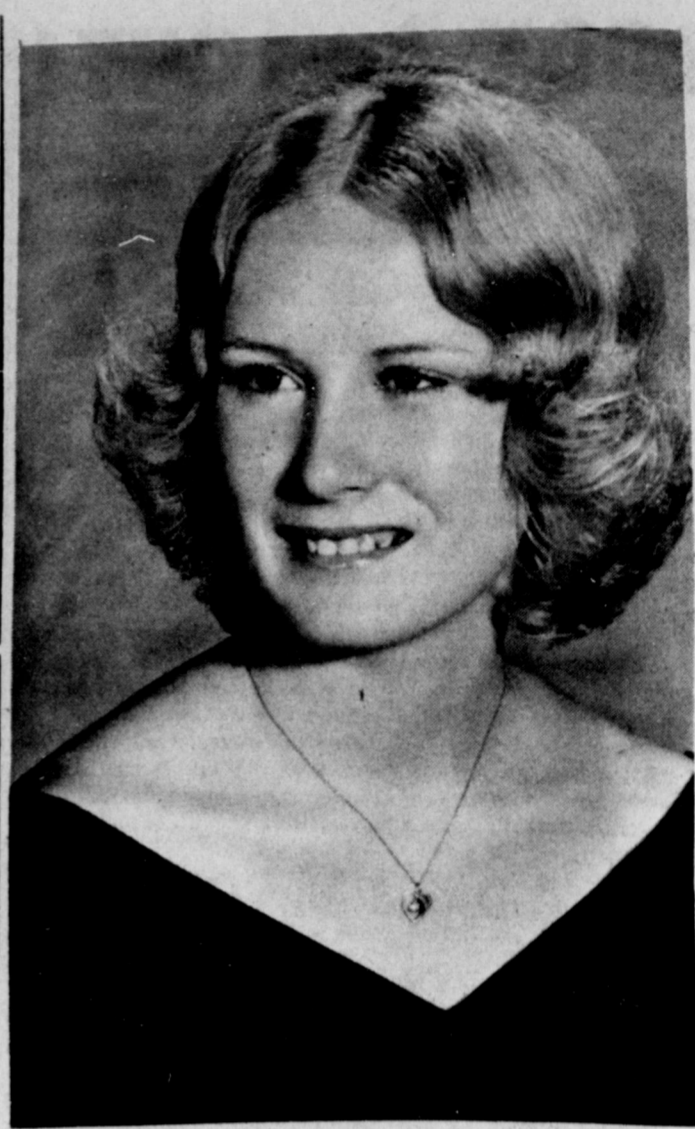

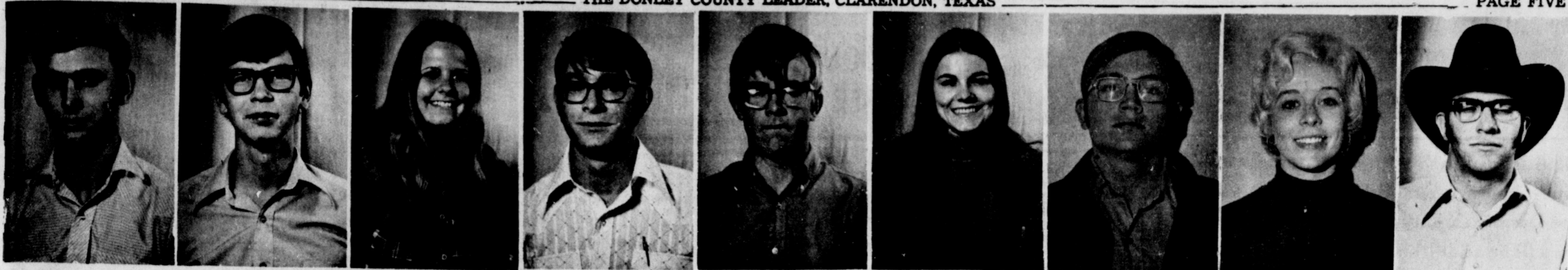

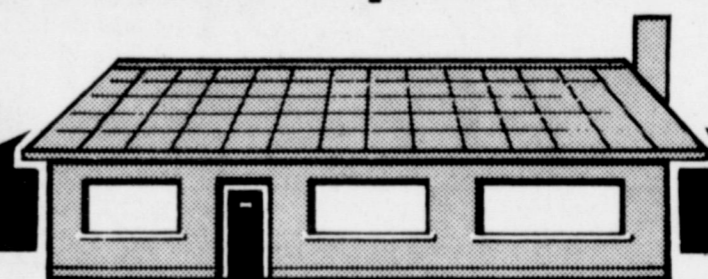

POLITICAL SIGNS ARE REGULATED ALSO

Political campaign signs erected along Interstate or Federal Aid Primary Highways are subject to the same regulations as other advertising signs, the Texas Highway Department said today.

The Highway Beautification Act limits the erection of signs along most major highways to areas zoned for commercial or industrial use in urban areas and to within 800 feet of a commercial or industrial activity in rural areas.

Within those limits, the owner also must have a license plus a permit for each sign.

Detailed information and application forms for licenses and permits can be obtained from Texas Highway Department district offices.

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
