### District Judge Files Document Fri. Granting Withdrawal Of Attorney General's Joinder In Hospital Suit

District Judge Robert Montgomery filed a court order here Friday, April 19 granting the withdrawal of the Attorney General's office participation in the suit against Dr. George W. Smith in respect to the motion of the Attorney General filed January 2, 1974 entitled Motion To Set Aside Judgment. Lawyers representing the Hospital District were not aware of this instrument until after the order had been filed. The Attorney General John L. Hill now consents to, join in, and adopts such Settlement agreement effective as of its execution on the 5th day of March 1973, upon which the Judgment of March 7, 1973 was based, and which Judgment of March 7, 1973, and the reinstatement thereof. Prior to the election of Hospital Board Members April 7, 1973, a majority of old board members agreed to a settlement with Dr. George W. Smith for \$48,000 and with interest would have amounted to around \$60,000. Judge Montgomery filed an order granting the agreement on March 7, suspended same on April 6, 1973 and then reinstated the order upholding agreement for settlement on June 25, 1973. It all boils down to one point, according to the District Judge's order and the withdrawal of intervention by the Attorney General's office that at this time, the Hospital District (the Taxpayers of this District) is liable for the approximately \$60,000. We understand the Hospital Board members plan to continue their fight against paying this amount which would naturally call for raising taxes to meet such an obligation. We understand that contact was made with the Attorney General's Office in regard to the withdrawal of the Attorney General in the suit and it was stated that a prominent Lawyer had convinced that office by some means or otherwise that a majority of Donley County citizens were in favor of the settlement. This so-called majority certainly was not reflected in the election of Board Members April 7, 1973 at which time three of the present members were elected by a near two to one margin. The voters were not only voting for the candidate at that time but for the issue also. We are all pleased that our hospital is in operation and staffed by two good doctors. ### Plans Underway For General Telephone Co. Building For DDD

J. H. Davis, District Manager Memphis, Texas 79245 General Telephone Company Architects and Engineers from San Angelo visited Memphis on April 10, 1974 for finalization of plans for a building addition of 40' x 102' to the Memphis exchange building located at the corner of 8th and Noel Streets in Memphis. Construction is scheduled to begin in July 1974 and complete in approximately six months. The addition is being made to house new equipment in connection with the project to furnish Direct Distance (DDD) next year in Memphis and all towns handled by Memphis which are Wellington, Dodson, Clarendon, Hedley, Lakeview Estelline, Turkey, Quitaque and Flomot. Silverton's toll center will be changed from Lubbock to Memphis and DDD furnished on this same project, according to J. H. Davis, District Manager for General Telephone Company. New underground toll cables will be placed to Turkey, Quitaque, Silverton, Wellington, and Dodson to replace existing open wire facilities. Although this project was delayed from 1973 because of budgetary limitations, no thought was ever given to dropping the project from the planning schedule, Davis added. Direct Distance Dialing is presently available to 81.8% of General's over 100 million telephones.

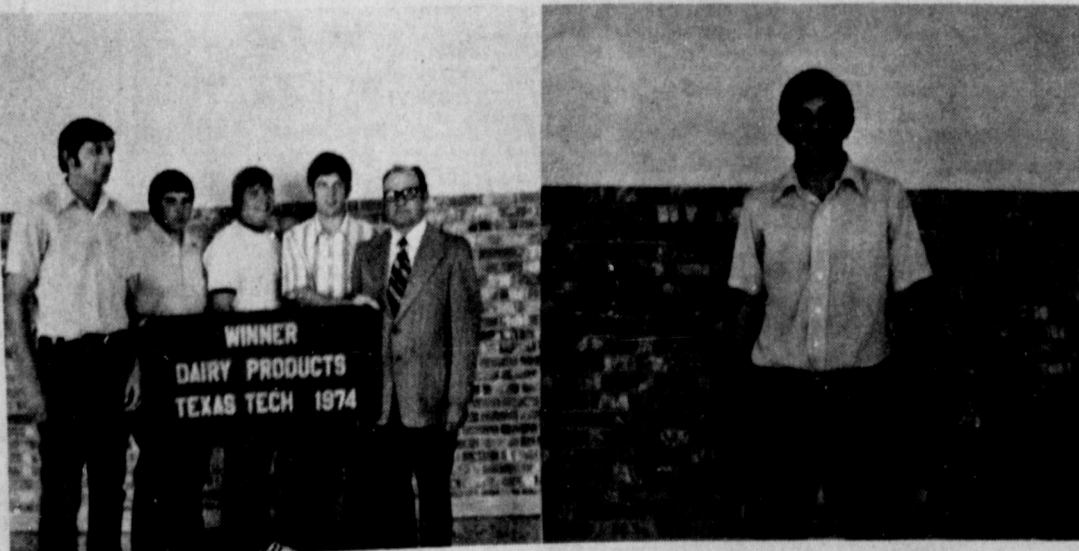

### Free Band Concert Slated For May 9

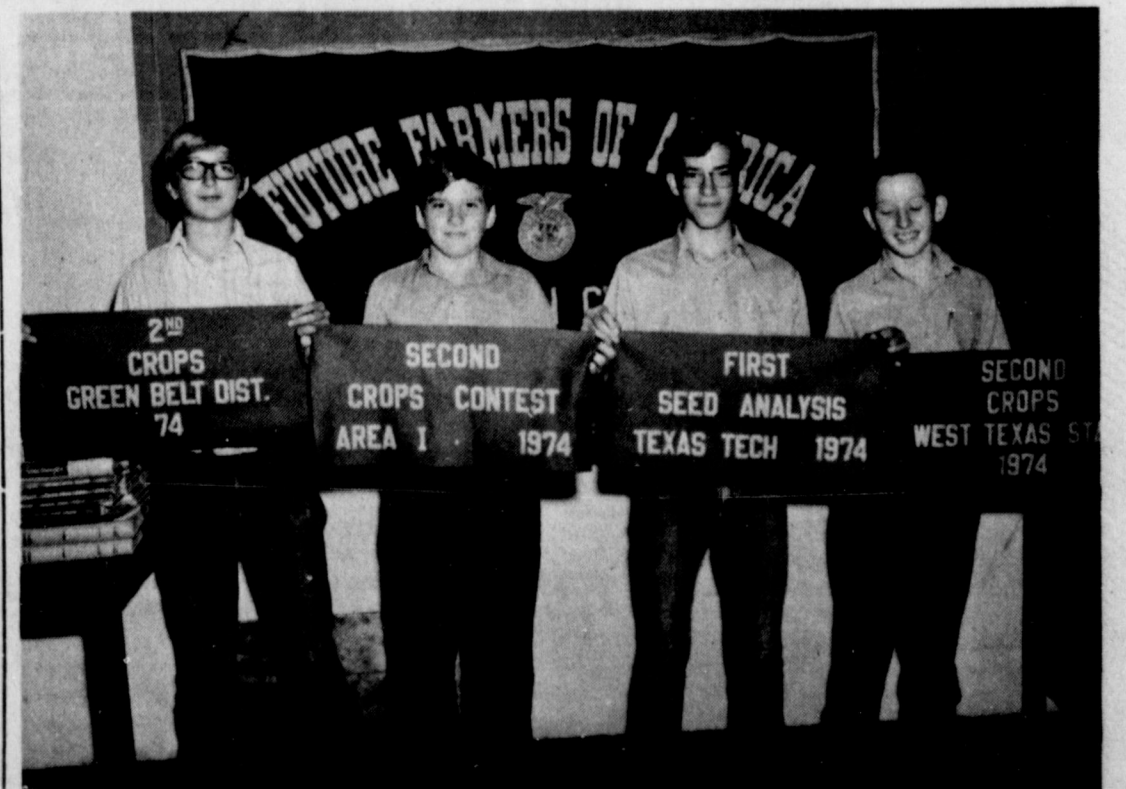

THP Reports Rural Accidents In County

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1974, shows a total of 395 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 172 persons injured as compared to March, 1973, with 468 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 263 persons injured. This was 73 less accidents, four more killed, and 91 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

of the article would allow the legislature to authorize state debt to finance a "superport" and housing for the elderly.

The committee threw out another earlier decision to allow a separate statewide vote on whether pari-mutuel gambling should be prohibited by the new constitution.

Still another change in the General Provisions article would allow homeowners to refinance their property to obtain funds without losing their protection against forced sale for debt.

A prohibition against branch banking would be continued, and regulation of bank holding companies would be left up to the legislature.

During more than three months of deliberations, the committee heard 231 witnesses in 22 public sessions on 96 proposals covering 31 subjects.

Convention President Price Daniel Jr. expects all work of the body to be wrapped up by the second week of June.

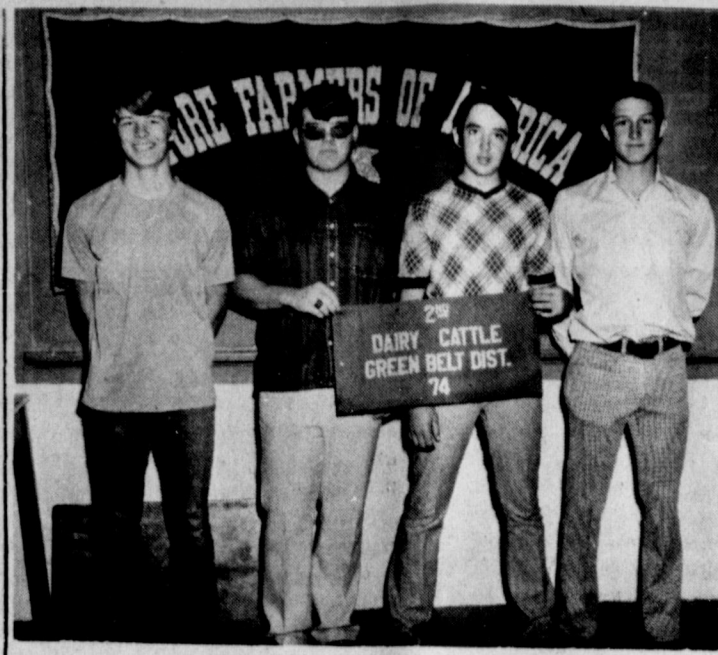
**DRILLING INCREASES** — Oil and gas well completions are increasing this year, according to the Texas Railroad Commission. A total of 1,395 oil wells have been drilled since January 1, compared with 1,191 during the same period in 1973. Gas well completions rose from 678 to 799.

Nine oil and 28 gas discoveries were reported by the commission during April 1 - 15 which brought the total for 1974 to 79 and 102, respectively. The figures for 1973 were 56 and 109 oil and gas discoveries.

**MORE SPEEDERS** — An increasing number of Texas drivers are violating the 55 miles-per-hour speed limit, Col. Wilson E. Speir, Texas Department of Public Safety director, reports.

Speeding arrests by the Highway Patrol during March were 109 per cent greater than in March 1973, Speir said.

In March 1974, 58,760 speeding cases were filed, compared to 28,111 a year ago. Passenger

Those who expect to be absent from their county of residence only on election day may vote by personal appearance at the county clerk's office.

Those who will be absent during the time for personal appearances and on election day can make application to county clerks for obtaining an absentee ballot by mail to an address out of country. Mail ballots also are available to the sick and disabled or those unable to vote election day due to religious belief.

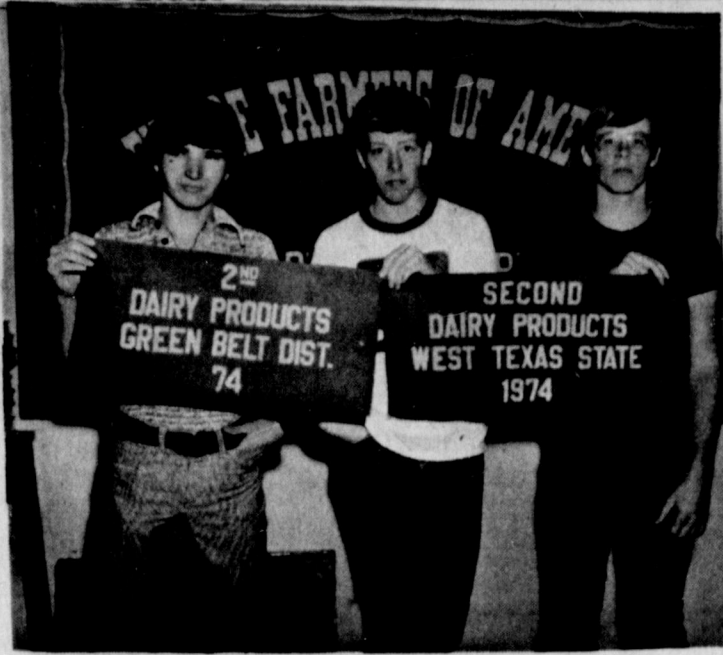
