## Committee Formed To Raise \$9,000 For New CHS Band Uniforms

A Citizens Committee has been formed to solve a problem or we might say, a real need at this time.

The Clarendon High School Band needs new uniforms to replace those being used today which are eleven years old, have gone thru weather, hard wear and alterations to fit various sizes of band members numbering several hundred during this time.

It will cost \$9,000 to purchase new uniforms and at the present time the school board has used its budget for the current year. The band now has 80 members with a larger band in prospect for next year. It will take approximately 80 uniforms to be able to come near fitting the various sizes of band members.

A committee of four has been named to raise the money. They are as follows: F. E. Chamberlain Jr., owner of Chamberlain Motor Co., Emmett O. Simmons, President of the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co., W. Carroll Knorpp, President of the Donley County State Bank and Melvin Boothe, President of the Security State Bank at Hedley.

The drive for the \$9,000 will start this week with 30 selected business firms, individuals and organizations being asked to contribute \$300 each to raise the necessary money. This quick fund drive is expected to raise the money for the new uniforms.

We understand the school board has agreed to budget the money next year so this will not be necessary again. If you are one of the selected,

you will be contacted within the next week. Let's put the band in new, respectable Uniforms now!

Dale LaTonn, Warroad, Minn., planned to arrive in Clarendon October 22nd or 23rd to get everything lined up for general practice of medicine here and the opening of Medical Center Hospital. He said it would probably take two to three weeks to get everything set up after he and his family arrive here.

Dr. and Mrs. LaTonn (Janice) have one daughter, Christine, age 4. They have made their home at Warroad, Minn., the past 1½ years and previous to that he had practiced at Oxnard, Calif. five years. Mrs. LaTonn is a Registered Nurse.

## Hospital Board Makes Contract With Dr. E. Dale LaTonn

The Donley County Hospital Board has made a contract with Dr. E. Dale LaTonn to practice medicine in Medical Center and open the hospital portion of the center as soon as possible. The Board received the signed contract from Dr. LaTonn Monday of this week and the Doctor reported he would make every effort to be here around October 22-23 and would open the hospital just as soon as feasible.

In other Board action Monday night, Bright Newhouse made the motion to remove the restriction of Doctors using the Medical Center for general practice and make the facilities available to Dr. LaTonn and also accept his application as a staff member.

In other board action, the board voted not to accept the Public Schools proposal to collect taxes on a two year contract but to suggest a 3 member committee from all three taxing units, public school, college and hospital, to figure out a proposal agreeable to all concerned.

This badly needed building will help alleviate the housing conditions in Clarendon and make possible comfortable living quarters at a cost within the means of our senior citizens.

## Singing At

### Midnight

ACTS 16:25 - "And at midnight Paul and Silas prayed, and sang praises unto God; and the prisoners heard them."

Can you put yourself in the place of one of those prisoners in the Philippian dungeon? Apparently, from all I have read, most prisoners put into jail during those days became forgotten men - except for the jailor who

usually was very cruel and treated the prisoners more like animals to be broken in spirit and body than they treated them like men. Just think, if you can, the horrible plight of these men—the filth they existed in and the poor inadequate food and the severe treatment at the hands of their oppressors; the air so stale one can hardly breathe and the darkness so dense that you seek to avoid the light because it pained the eyes. In such an atmosphere many killed themselves, others lost their minds and some became scavengers. Forgotten men they all were with no hope of new life. Can you picture yourself as being one of

them? Probably not to the extent you can emotionally experience the depression and despair of those prisoners who were totally deprived of release from their punishment.

Now, can you possible imagine what it would be like to suddenly hear from the other end of the dungeon the singing of hymns, the lifting up of prayers and men rejoicing in the Lord amid their imprisonment? The hymns, prayers and voices speak of new life, of joy and happiness, of peace and release. The mind and heart become jared a bit and you begin to remember things about life that you had forgotten, and suddenly you experience a penetrating light that makes the dungeon as bright as the Sun at midday. The bonds that confine you are removed, the door to the cell flies open and all you have to do is to walk through the door into freedom. You would expect a mighty rush for freedom, wouldn't you? But, that's not the meaning of the words: "and the prisoners heard them" (Acts 16:25b). This means that they heard the Gospel Message which brought to them new life amid their degradation. In the Spirit they could ascend as Paul later describes in II Corinthians 12:2—"I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up into the third heaven—", and be free - so free that they remained in the jail and thereby saved the life of the jailor who would have taken his life over the loss of one prisoner and who could certainly not stand the shame should he lose a jail full of prisoners.

You see, sometimes we are the vehicle of God's salvation to another because we do the unexpected which may cost us but the cost is worth the saving of another's soul for God. To bear the Gospel does not always mean we escape physical, mental or emotional pain and agony; but that through our endurance we make an effective witness to another for the glory of God. Grace and peace in Christ Jesus THINK ON THIS: Face God and you will find it easier to face every circumstance.

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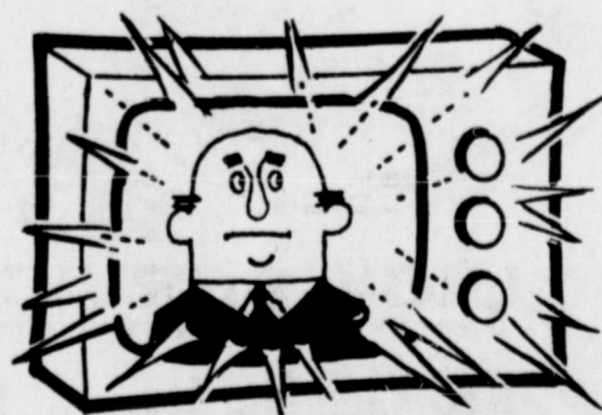
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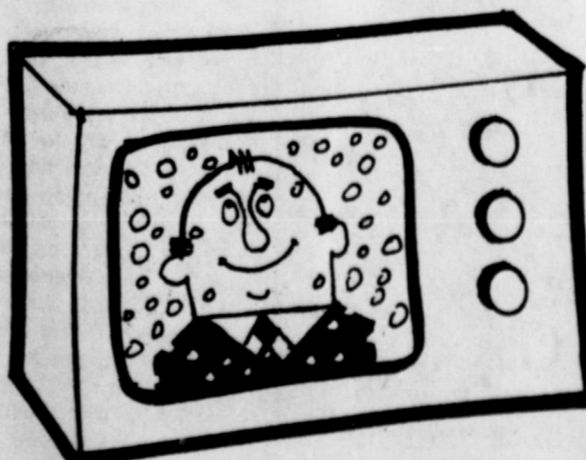

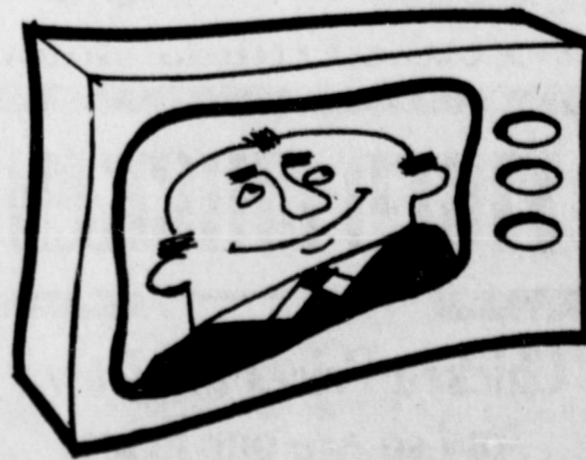

A culturally oriented educational program has been presented in Clarendon by the Sangarasivam family from Ceylon. The program gave an overview of the peoples and countries of Ceylon, India, Kashmir, Singapore and the Indonesian Islands.

The members of the family are: the Father, Sivam; the mother, Indra; an older daughter, Santosh; a son, Devaker, and a younger daughter, Yamumma. On Sunday, September 16, Yamumma, who is nine years old and has completed two years of a six year course in Hindu religious dances, presented two dances normally done in the Hindu temples. These dances were presented in the old college gym and each one took about twenty minutes to perform and each required a different type of dress. For the first dance it required about one hour for Yamumma to get dressed with her mother's help, the second dance required only about twenty-five minutes. During the intermission Sivam talked about the people of Ceylon, India and Asia, answering questions from people in the audience.

Indra, the mother, demonstrated how to put on the sari, using Mrs. Frank Phelan, Jr. as a model on Sunday, September 23. The sari is the national dress of the Hindu women and requires a blouse and undergarment. There is six yards of material that is fifty-seven inches wide to the sari, which is a beautiful silk garment. It is said to be a very comfortable dress for women to wear, however, the women of Ceylon do not wear it as a work dress. It is worn primarily for festive and religious occasions.

Mr. Sivam demonstrated how to wrap the turban, the official head cover for Hindu men. The turban often is made from a scarf like apparel worn by the men as a part of their official dress to be used as the turban when the occasion calls for one. He also showed slides talking those present on a pictorial tour of Ceylon, India, Kashmir, Singapore, and the Indonesian Islands.

Yamumma favored the group with two piano solos. Santosh, the older daughter who was to demonstrate how to put the sari on was unable to be present.

Mr. Sangarasivam is a Veterinarian, having received a degree from Texas Tech, and is practicing with the Beef Cattle Co. of Wheeler, Texas which is operated by Mr. Joe Weatherly. Sivam expressed the desire to be able to stay in the United States until his children have completed their education because Ceylon has gone socialistic and the English language has been outlawed. He feels that it would be difficult for the children to learn a new language and to keep up with their studies. Therefore, if they can complete their education before returning to Ceylon it will be to their advantage to stay in the United States.

Indra expressed distress and deep concern because in the American public schools there is

so little discipline, stating that the lack of discipline is not good for the children. Sivam stated that he was afraid to come to the United States because of some of the things that he had heard about. However, he had a friend that had attended Texas Tech who encouraged him to come to the States to finish his education. He said now he is very pleased that he came to America and to Texas.

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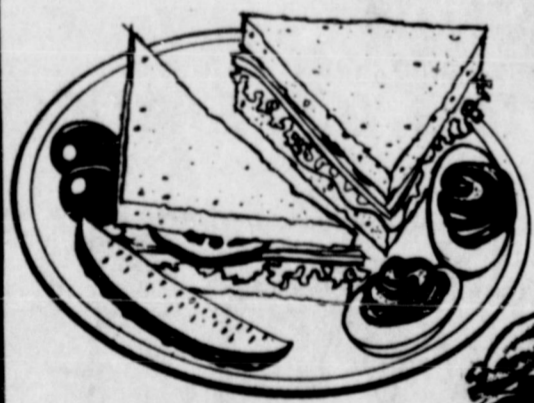
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### Hospital Contract

THE STATE OF TEXAS X  
COUNTY OF DONLEY X

#### EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT is made by and between the Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District and Doctor E. Dale La Tonn wherein the parties agree to the employment of E. Dale La Tonn hereinafter referred to as "Doctor" under the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth:

I. The Donley County Hospital District will furnish the Doctor with office space and the customary office equipment needed in the practice of medicine, not to include office supplies, medication and other supplies usually used in the office practice of medicine.

II. The Donley County Hospital District will do the billing for Doctor in his private practice of medicine with no charge to him. This billing shall, however, be done in a manner mutually acceptable to Doctor and to Donley County Hospital District.

III. The Donley County Hospital District agrees to furnish the Doctor with a receptionist and a nurse on the terms and conditions as follows:

(a) The Doctor will pay \$250.00 a month towards the wages of the receptionist and the nurse if he nets a figure of \$5,000.00 per month or a sum in excess of \$5,000.00 a month in his private practice of medicine.

(b) The Doctor will pay \$500.00 a month toward the wages of the receptionist and nurse if he nets \$10,000.00 per month or a figure in excess of \$10,000.00 a month in his private practice of medicine.

It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that these two workers will be treated as employees of the Doctor, and the Doctor will have sole discretion in employment and dismissal of the workers. Any additional office workers needed by Doctor will be paid for by the Doctor.

IV. All lab work, X-ray work, and physical therapy ordered by the Doctor from the office will be done in the hospital facilities and the Doctor will pay 50% of the usual charge. X-rays and lab work ordered in the emergency room will be hospital property and the Doctor will work for fee only. All hospital patients lab and X-ray records will be hospital property.

V. All office facilities furnished Doctor by Donley County Hospital District will be run by the Doctor as he sees fit and set up as he wishes. Doctor agrees that he has no control over the hospital facilities.

VI. In consideration of the services and facilities furnished to Doctor by the Donley County Hospital District, the Doctor agrees to care for the indigent and welfare patients in Donley County, Texas.

VII. Adequate malpractice insurance will be carried by the Doctor at his own expense, and the Donley County Hospital District also agrees to maintain its present liability insurance on the office space provided by the Donley County Hospital District.

VIII. Doctor agrees to charge prices which conform to the reasonable, usual and customary charges for the same or similar services in this area, but subject only to this limitation, the fees charged by Doctor will be his decision alone.

IX. The Doctor will have the right to refuse or accept another Doctor using the office facilities furnished to him by the Donley County Hospital District and will have complete control over this decision.

X. The accounts receivable generated by the Doctor in the office furnished him by the Donley County Hospital District will be his property alone. Should Doctor move or leave, the Donley County Hospital District agrees to bill the accounts generated by him for a period of six (6) months. At the end of this time all accounts not collected will be turned over to Doctor and he may use such collection procedures as he may see fit.

XI. This contract is to last for a period of two (2) years, except that either party hereto may terminate the contract on giving thirty (30) days written notice. At the end of this two (2) year period the contract may be renewed for an additional two (2) years or altered by the parties hereto as they may see fit.

XII. The parties agree by these presents that this agreement constitutes the only agreement between the parties, and any agreement to the contrary of any provision contained herein shall be void unless expressed in writing and signed by the parties hereto. The parties further agree that this contract is performable in Donley County, Texas.

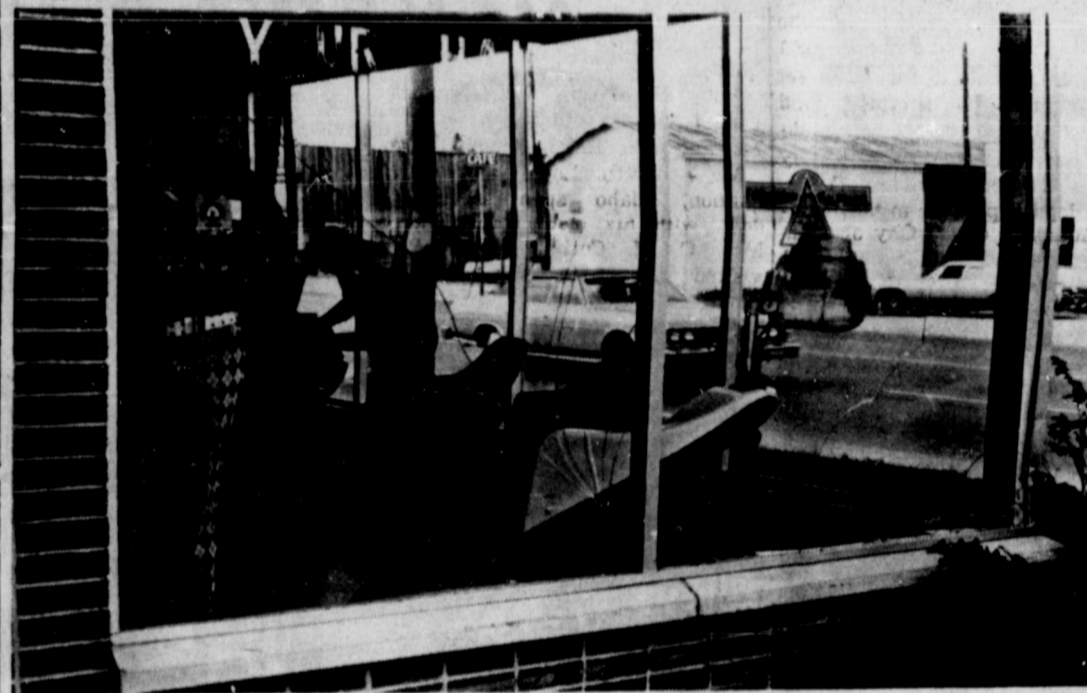

### Community Action At Work In County

The Donley County Community Action Agency had their monthly Advisory Board Meeting, Thursday, September 20, 1973. Fifteen were present at the meeting. A good representation of the community was present. Mr. A. A. Burnett, Executive Director of Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation in Amarillo, was guest speaker. The group was taken on a tour of the new office and classrooms. Mr. Burnett discussed the program and its benefit to our community and then entertained questions from the group. He will be present at the next meeting for further discussion. Mrs. Osburn reported that the TSTI Adult Education classes were doing well and the interest has been increased tremendously. The total enrollment for classes scheduled is about 100. Nine classes are scheduled with two in session now with 27 enrolled. Enrollments are still open for all classes if anyone is interested in an adult occupational education. Classes are not for College Credit. These classes are available to all low-income group or educationally disadvantaged persons who did not com-

plete their high school education or any person wishing to upgrade themselves on the present job or just for self-improvement. The concept of the Community Action Agency was explained in detail by Mr. Burnett at the Board meeting. He pointed out how the programs and the community were related through services available. According to the percentage of persons in the low-income group in our county, we need to work on this situation. We need trained workers and jobs to place them in to relieve the problem somewhat. The question is, where is the industry to place these trained people? Some will relocate, gladly, but some will choose to remain here. There are jobs available to those who want to work, are trained to work and motivated to work. Motivated is a big part of getting someone to work instead of getting welfare. Our objective is to get those off the welfare roll that can be trained and able to work and make taxpayers instead of tax users of them. Welfare should go to those who aren't able to work and need it for survival. We have cases of that in our county also. Any way we can help people help themselves is our goal. The agency needs volunteer

workers for jobs such as distributing clothing to needy families and some office work. The agency is funded through OEO (Office of Economic Opportunity) with aid from the Department of Labor for NYC (Neighborhood Youth Corp). Planned Parenthood is funded by HEW (Health, Education and Welfare). The office also has a work study student from Clarendon Junior College employed as secretary. Still, volunteer workers are needed to achieve our goals in our county. We would challenge the churches, civic organizations and individuals to participate in the program.

The yearly GED (General Equivalency Diploma) is 32 graduates, 20 qualified for Final GED and 13 for ABE (Adult Basic Education). This is a very important and worthwhile project that gives a dropout or any person who didn't finish high school a chance to earn their diploma. With the diploma and occupational training, chance for employment or upgrading on the present job increases. Mrs. Eureda Mays reports that her Planned Parenthood Clinic is growing and her services are being recognized throughout the county.

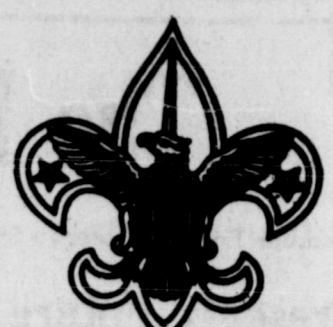
