## **Guineas Added** To Game List

Cuban Birds Fly Quarter of Mile When Flushed

AUSTIN, Nov. 28.-While Texans are blasting away at deer and turkey, the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has, in an effort to add to the wildlife supply of the Lone Star State, released 200 wild Cuban guineas on three south Texas areas, it was announced here today by the Department's Executive Secretary. It has long been believed by the game chief that wild guineas will prosper in several sections of Texas. In Cuba the wild guinea, which is not as plump as the domesticated guinea of the United States but which is more streamlined, is considered a rare game bird and hundreds of Americans travel to that island annually for that sport. 

> BOOKS THAT LITTLE WILLIE STUDIES IN SCHOOL

Everybody knows little Willie's textbooks are free-but where do they come from?

Who has the responsibility of selecting what he should read and

study in the public schools? Answer to both questions: The state board of education. The board, of education, has the last word in all cluding the expenditure of from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 a year for textbooks.

Following the grade school pupil from the smallest one-teacher rural grammar school, all the way thru high school, the board make all decisions concerning his educationhow many days he will go to school, what holidays he shall have, how much money shall be spent on his education, what books he shall study, what new schools shall be established to help him along.

On the second Monday of each October the board meets in Austin and opens sealed bids from publishers of textbooks. Copies of the offered books are then given to a committee of five educators-engaged in teaching-and they pick what they consider the best of the lot. Finally the board makes its decision from among the books chosen by the teachers' committee.

When the board issues its annual call for bids, it describes each book desired. For instance, a request was


