Holiday Traffic Toll Light Here

It was a quiet Thanksgiving holiday for Donley County law enforcement officers. Only one accident was reported, and this involved one of the Clarendon City Police patrol cars.

Police Chief Gary Gerdes reported severe damage to the patrol car he was driving and heavy damage to a 1970 Plymouth driven by Butch Strickland of Clarendon when the two cars collided at the corner of Highway 287 and Gort Streets Saturday afternoon about 4 p.m.

The patrol car, a 1973 Plymouth, is being replaced by Gerdes' personal car while being repaired.

Other law enforcement agencies reported an exceptionally quiet holiday weekend, with no major accidents being reported on Donley County highways.

Day Care Group Seeks Funds

The Day Care Center Board held its second meeting at the Community Action Center on November 27th, 1974. David Duncan of the Texas Panhandle Early Development Training Program and Johnny Raymond, assistant director of Manpower, spoke to the group about possible revenue resources and programming resources.

All Subscribers of Press, Leader Receive Papers

Today's Clarendon Press marks the first issue of the newly combined Clarendon Press and Donley County Leader publications. The first Sunday edition of the Donley County Leader will be mailed to subscribers Sunday, Nov. 8.

The change-over is the result of negotiations which began several months ago between Mr. and Mrs. George Estlack, owners of the Leader for many years, and Dean Singleton, owner of the Clarendon Press.

Press employees began working last Wednesday to combine the Leader's subscription mailing list in with the subscribers to the Press. The combined circulation of the new publications will now be sent to some 85 to 90 percent of the Clarendon trade area.

NEWS DEADLINES SET

In order for the Press and Leader to meet time requirements at centrally located offset plants, some adjustments will be made in news and advertising deadlines. News of general interest should be called in or brought to the Press office no later than noon each Tuesday and Friday. This includes club news, schools, and social events. Later deadlines will be available for more important news articles when the situation requires, until just prior to shipping pages to printing facilities.

Advertising deadlines will remain at 5 p.m. Tuesday for the Thursday Press and will be set up to 3 p.m. Friday for the Sunday editions of the Donley County Leader.

These deadlines may be set back about mid-January when new and faster photo-typesetting equipment is scheduled to be delivered and installed at the Press-Leader office at the corner of Highway 287 and South Jefferson. Expanded use of local pictures has also been planned for the two publications, with a

new dark room being installed at the present time which will enable employees to develop and print news pictures in a very short period of time.

Correspondents columns from the outlying areas will basically remain the same as before. Previous correspondents for the

Press will continue to write news columns for the Thursday publications and most of the former Leader correspondents will write articles for the Sunday editions.

Anyone wishing to use the Press and Leader news facilities is asked to call or come by the office of The Clarendon Press.

Merchants Host Promotion

Clarendon merchants are going all out to attract and hold Christmas business throughout the month of December, and starting today, a special event has been slated to unfold in Clarendon streets and stores each weekend. These promotions are designed to create traffic, give the shopping public an opportunity to save large sums of money and many will be designed to entertain the children while parents shop.

"Deflation Days", a retail trade promotion sponsored by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, kicks off today (Thursday) and is scheduled to run through Saturday at most Clarendon businesses.

The promotion is quite involved, but it should keep shoppers busy all three days in hunting some tremendous values. Many of the items, listed in a special ad appearing in this edition of the Press, will be purchased at only a fraction of their value.

In the upper right hand corner of the paper you are now reading, readers will find a number stamped by mechanical means. This number is the key to the entire promotion.

Throughout the next three

days, merchants participating in the event will have numbers posted in their places of business. Hundreds of numbers have been distributed to merchants for use in their stores. Merchants may display all of their assigned numbers at one time and keep them on display until all specially ear-marked merchandise is disposed of, or at their discretion, may choose to alternate numbers up to several times each day for the duration of the event.

Here are a few samples of what you may find this weekend:

Donley County State Bank will have four \$25 savings bonds up for grabs to the first four people who bring in numbers matching those posted in their lobby. These savings bonds cost only \$10 each to those four winners.

A regular \$215 Reed and Barton 48 piece "Festivity" silver plate service will be sold for only \$10 at Tunnel Pharmacy some time this weekend if you can match their numbers posted.

Greene Dry Goods will have five different specially marked items for the promotion. These include a ladies three-piece slacks suit which regularly sells for \$39.95 to be sold for \$14.95,

a man's all weather coat valued at \$27.95 to be sold for \$9.95, a boys nylon western jacket worth \$15.95 and now marked to \$4.98, a girls three piece slacks suit valued at \$17.95 to be sold for \$5.98 and an Edgehill Manor double bed size bedspread valued at \$26.95 going to only \$9.95.

Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Co. will have two special items for the promotion. These include a \$24 Disston cordless grass shear for only \$8, and a big 6 1/2 inch Skil saw valued at \$41 for only \$10.50.

Chamberlain Motor Company will provide someone with a complete tune-up for winter driving. It is valued at \$49.95 and includes all parts and labor. The person matching their number will get this special value for only \$7.50.

and M. Oil Company will have a regularly priced \$133.24 set of polyester cord tires for some lucky winner or winners. These will sell for \$17.50 each plus tax to the person bringing in the lucky number.

Perhaps the most unusual offering comes from Wallace Monument who will provide some lucky (?) winner with a two-foot head marker valued at \$115 for only \$25.

Palmer Motor Co. has one 1974 Ford Mustang II which

they will sell to anyone matching their number at \$225 below the actual dealer cost.

John's in downtown Clarendon will have a \$75 mens leisure suit for sale to some lucky customer for only \$8.98 during the weekend promotion.

Clarendon Hatchery will sell five bags of fertilizer, valued at \$1.35 each for only 33 cents to the first five people matching numbers posted in their store.

Clarendon Press and Donley County Leader will sell 10 special combined subscriptions to the two papers for only 99 cents each. These are valued at \$7.50 each inside the county and \$9.00 each mailed outside Donley County.

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce will present two persons with \$25 savings bonds at the ridiculously low price of only 98 cents each if you can match their numbers. The Chamber of Commerce office is located at the Emmett Simmons Insurance Agency offices in downtown Clarendon.

The Hardware, located across the street from Alderson Chevrolet, will provide someone with a conductor's gold pocket watch valued at \$15 for only 98 cents when a matching number is brought in.

Harlan's Flowers will have six \$4.75 tree top ornaments up for

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**Letters To
The Editor**

An open letter to my patients and friends:

Yesterday I received word that my mal-practice insurance had been reinstated as of last week. However, I have not received the policy at this time. As you know, when we returned on Nov. 3, 1974, from our honeymoon, we opened our mail and found that the insurance premium had not been paid on time, in spite of assurances from four different people connected with the hospital board and administration.

This has been a source of embarrassment to me both professionally and personally. The Board of the Donley County Hospital District notified the insurance company to return their check, therefore I have had to reapply, which caused a delay in the reinstatement. Due to the fact that this will be a new policy, which I have applied for at my own expense, and not a continuing policy, the premium increased \$3,000.00 annually.

In the meantime, the hospital closed and Beverly, the children and I then moved my files and equipment a week ago Sunday to a temporary office at 316 1/2 West Parks. I do not have the space nor equipment to practice yet, however, the business office will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday. I do not have a hospital in which to practice and also do not have laboratory facilities, so I feel that perhaps it would not be within my financial power to practice in Clarendon at this time, even though I have built up a wonderful practice, and have many friends in this area.

The question has been brought up as to my responsibility in payment of the mal-practice insurance. I would like to refer you to the April 14, 1974 copy of the Clarendon Press which printed my contract with the Hospital Board. The excerpt on the mal-practice is as follows:

Adequate malpractice insurance will be carried by the Doctor at the expense of the Donley County Hospital District and State Association dues will be included. The Donley County Hospital District also agrees to maintain its present liability insurance on the office space provided by the Donley County Hospital District.

I will notify you in the event that I should open an office in Clarendon. Many thanks for your support and concern.

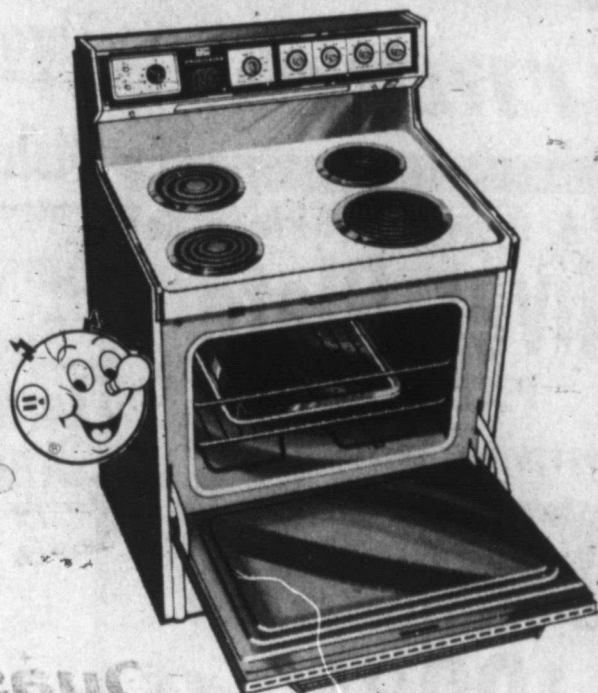

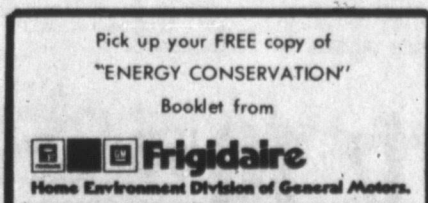

Nobody's Perfect But...

After looking forward to the Thanksgiving weekend for the past several weeks, we are kind of glad it's over. Not only were we stuffed with the traditional turkey and trimmings, but our eyes are now getting a much needed respite from four solid days of football carried by the television networks over the holidays.

We have always been football fans, and throughout the season make it a point to get in a game or two on television every weekend. However, four solid days and nights of grid-iron viewing strikes us about the same way a 30-pound turkey effects a family of four.

After so long, we want to yell "calf-ropes" and change the menu a little.

We noticed awhile back that General Telephone Company was set back in their efforts to increase rates in Perryton for local telephone service. Perhaps this is a slap in the face for a conglomerate like General Telephone, but it's high time that something should be done to partially curb periodic increases in telephone service when it is not justified.

In the Perryton instance, General Telephone Company had claimed they had a 3.2 per cent profit margin. Had this been the case, their submitted increase request might have been approved. However, after a survey by McMorries and Associates of Amarillo was completed, the profit margin of General Telephone turned out to be 9.3 per cent.

McMorries told the Perryton city council that the company (General) uses a state-wide average of about 50 per cent local traffic and 50 per cent toll traffic in setting up their profit margin. In reality, Perryton's traffic amounted to about 70 per cent in long distance calls and 30 per cent local traffic.

In all probability, when the facts are in for Clarendon's it will probably show a much higher percentage of long distance traffic than local. We can't speak for every home and business in Clarendon, but our business calls usually amount to more than \$150 per month at the Press.

We use the telephone regularly here in our offices for acquiring news, advertising and supplies. Deadlines demand prompt action in the newspaper, and we feel we would not be doing our best in gathering the news if we did not use the necessary means to obtain it.

Perhaps we could trim our long distance calls by 50 per cent, if necessary, by being more selective in placing these calls. If the requested 27.5 per cent rate hike by General Telephone is allowed, we will probably see fit to reduce our use of the telephone by some 10 to 15 per cent. At any rate, our telephone bill will remain approximately the same here, regardless of any decisions of the court on the proposed rate increase.

This will be the first week for the new Donley County Leader which will bear a Sunday date line. The employees at the Press have been extremely busy the past few days in sifting through the Leader subscriber lists, eliminating duplications between their subscribers and those of the Press.

In order for fair treatment to prevail, those people who subscribed to both papers will find that their subscription expiration dates have now been adjusted to coincide with the longest subscription period.

For instance, if you subscribed to one paper a month ago and had a subscription to the other that was about to expire, you now have a subscription to both papers which will run for the next eleven months.

Quite a few people will soon be receiving notices of subscription expirations. These subscriptions, when they are renewed, will be billed at a combined rate for both papers.

The combined mail-out of the two papers involved will now give the advertisers more value for every dollar spent in their advertising programs. It is now possible to reach about 90 per cent of the entire trade area with a single ad placed in either the Clarendon Press or the Donley County Leader. We hope more people take advantage of these expanded means now available.

It's always been a mystery to us why the small town merchant lays down and plays dead when the Thanksgiving holiday rolls around. We had people tell us last week that they didn't wish to do any advertising in that paper because they were going to be closed Thanksgiving and didn't see any use in spending money on advertising.

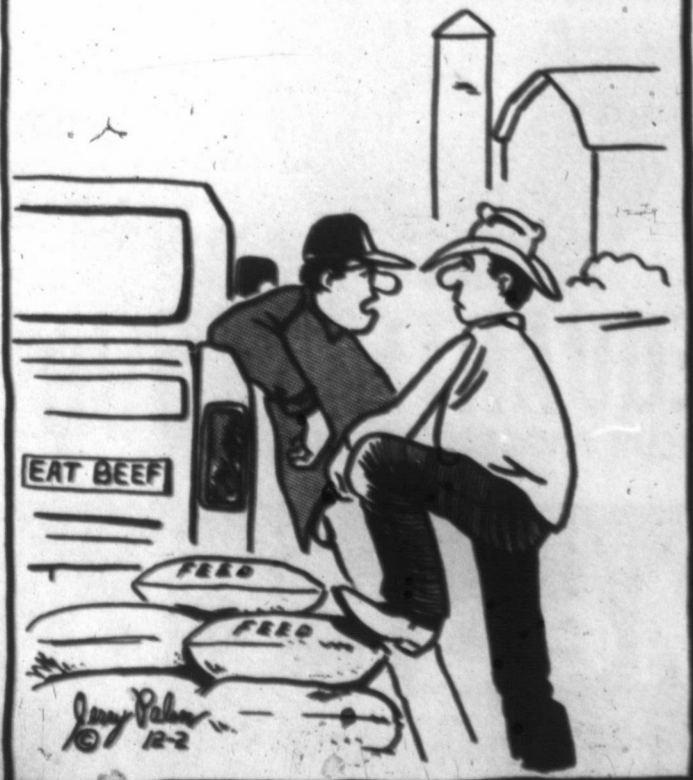
Well, fellows, the big city boys see it a little differently. They knew that area schools would be out Friday and lots of folks were going to be in a position to take the rest of the week off. Consequently, the Thanksgiving Day issues of the larger daily newspapers were filled to the brim with Christmas gift advertising.

Most of the stores in Amarillo and Pampa were also closed for Thanksgiving, but a little thought beforehand has given them the edge on Christmas shoppers. There's no way of telling how much money flowed into these towns Friday and Saturday, but we'll bet that it was no small sum.

These cities have done this year after year. If the effort didn't justify itself with results, it wouldn't continue from one year to the next. As they say in the newspaper trade, our merchants have been "scooped" by big brother.

Now, our merchants are faced with only 17 more shopping days until Christmas. It's a little hard to believe, isn't it?

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas delegates will be heading for Kansas City, Mo., this week for a new kind of Democratic national convention.

Most of them are just as glad there has never been one like it before and hope that there will never be another.

The "mini-convention" or 1974 Conference on Democratic Policy and Organization was mandated by the 1972 Democratic National Convention.

Its job is to produce the first national charter or constitution in history for a major American political party.

It will also serve as a forum for discussion of national issues. Four panels will meet December 6 to discuss four general areas, in identifying the issues of greatest concern to the Democratic party.

The party charter will be adopted after debate by 2,038 delegates December 7, and issue panel moderators will make their reports and addresses December 8.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe is chairman of the Texas delegation, which includes as ex-officio members all members of the Democratic congressional delegation.

Texas liberals, unhappy with selection of Briscoe in a telephone poll, named Ma. Billie Carr of Houston, a national Democratic committee member, their chairwoman.

Prospective candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1976—including U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas—are expected to make strong bids for attention at the Kansas City sessions.

VOTES CANVASSED—Canvass of the statewide general election vote reconfirmed Atty. Gen. John Hill as the top vote-getting incumbent. He polled 1,170,283 votes to win over Republican Tom Cole, with 379,108 and the Socialist Workers Party nominee, with 30,577.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong came in second in the canvass with 1,136,321, and Agriculture Commissioner John C. White third, with 1,125,577.

All the incumbents scored more than a million votes.

High Republican vote-getter in the canvass was treasurer candidate Robert G. Holt, with 559,402.

Votes for governor and lieutenant governor will not be canvassed until the legislature convenes in January. The House of Representatives takes care of that. The Board of Canvassers canvasses the other races, including legislative, congressional and judicial.

COURTS BUSY—During January-June, 1,716,697 cases were filed in or appealed to county, justice of the peace and municipal courts of the state, according to Texas Civil Judicial Council.

Fifty-three per cent of the county court criminal cases and 38 per cent of the civil cases were dismissed or settled before trial.

Justice of the peace and municipal courts received \$26.4 million in revenue during the six-month reporting period.

The council reported 184 of the 254 constitutional county courts have judges who are not attorneys. Only six per cent of 934 justices

of the peace are attorneys, and about 65 per cent of the 215 municipal courts (in cities over 5,000) are licensed lawyers.

RATE MIKES OPPOSED—A group backing utility regulation asked Attorney General Hill to investigate allegations of irregularities in rate practices by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

At the same time, the chairman of the Texas Coalition for Utility Regulation said no city council should grant phone rate increases while questions raised in a suit at San Antonio against Southwestern Bell are pending.

The \$29.6 million damage suit by a fired Bell executive and the family of a deceased executive alleges the company kept a separate set of books for use in getting rate increases and indirectly channeled money into political campaigns.

State Rep. Roy Blake of Nacogdoches also advised city councils to refrain from rate increases until the charges have been proved or disproved.

NEW INDUSTRIES MULTIPLY—Twenty-six new industries which may have a \$121 million annual impact on the economy located in Texas during October.

About 2,300 jobs will be generated, and another 2,259 indirectly created. The industries will produce \$7.4 million in federal taxes a year, \$445,734 in state taxes and \$537,287 in local taxes, according to Texas Industrial Commission projections.

Plants are planned in Palestine, Bryan, Columbus, Morton, Summerfield, Ranger, Longview, Freeport, Marshall, Donna, Waco, New London, Tunaha, Breckenridge, Clear Lake City, Houston, Corpus Christi, Austin and Fort Worth.

VETS DAY CHANGE BACKED—Veterans Day would be returned to November 11, under legislation backed by Governor Briscoe and sponsored by Rep. Lindon Williams of Houston.

Forty-two other states al-

ready have enacted similar bills. Federal legislation changed the date from November 11 to the last Monday in October.

NEW APPROACH BACKED—Governor Briscoe is backing the so-called "weighted pupil approach" to determine spending for public schools.

The formula would take the place of a specific allocation of dollars per classroom teacher unit. Money would be divided among schools in line with time of pupils spent in different types of classes. More "weight"—and more money—would go to the executive types of instruction.

Briscoe announced 60 meetings will be conducted over the state December 2-19 to detail tentative proposals developed for restructuring state school finance systems in 1975.

Meetings are slated in Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Kilgore, Amarillo, Victoria, Houston, Huntsville, Mt. Pleasant, Lubbock, Austin, Fort Worth, Waco, Abilene, Beaumont, Richardson, San Angelo, Midland-Odessa, San Antonio, Wichita Falls and El Paso.

SHORT SNORTS

Bert L. Hancock, an Austin city councilman, will become director of the Governor's Office of Equal Employment Opportunity January 7.

The Governor announced he will ask the legislature to double the state share of cost of instructional television in the classroom to a maximum of \$1.50 per child for the school year.

Attorney General Hill held a university may delay furnishing names of its seniors to a citizen for a month while its code file is being used for registration and reports to state agencies.

U.S. Civil Service Commission is helping develop a proposed centralized personnel policy for Texas.

Add Limestone, Nolan and Upton counties to those requested for disaster area designation due to drought and other adverse weather.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Church Feud

Two factions of a church were locked in a bitter struggle over the powers of a controversial minister. Finally they took the issue to court for settlement.

But the judge refused to take sides. Calling attention to the constitutional separation of church and state, the judge said:

"Courts do not inquire into questions exclusively ecclesiastical. If the courts should deal with litigation of that nature, the whole subject of theology would have to be examined. Such a course would establish the courts as the final arbiter in every religious controversy."



This is the law's usual attitude toward religious disputes, declining to intrude into "things that are God's." However, the courts can

and do take a hand in "things that are Caesar's."

For example, in one case a pastor had a disagreement with his church about the terms of his employment contract. A court had no hesitation in weighing the opposing arguments and in ruling (on strictly legal grounds) against the church.

Likewise, courts have dealt with such mundane matters as the ownership of church real estate or the administration of trust funds left to a church.

Furthermore, of course, churchmen are just as subject to the criminal law as any other citizen. Thus:

A minister, while denouncing sin in his sermon, described it in unusually vivid language. Outraged members of his congregation complained to the police, and the minister was duly haled into court on a charge of using obscene language in a public place.

Finding him guilty, the court commented:

"He has a right to propagate his religious views, but will not be permitted to commit a breach of the peace under the guise of preaching the gospel."

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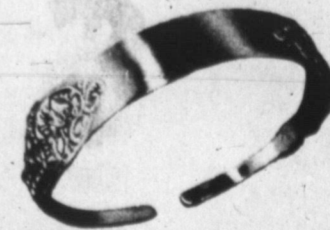

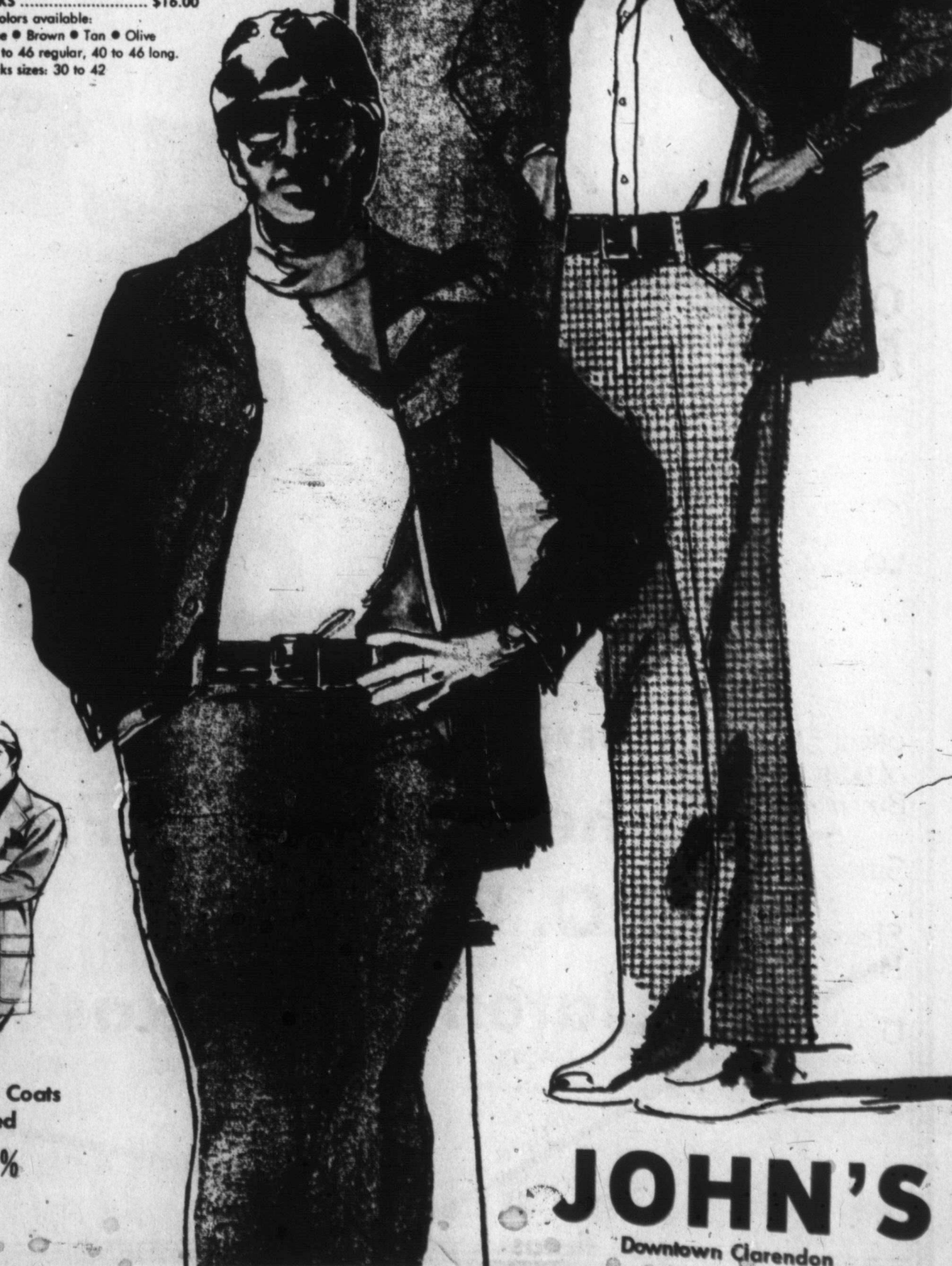

Q. I have just finished my first year at the university, but I failed two courses. My counselor suggests that I enroll in only three courses in the fall. I get monthly social security payments and wonder if I should have them stopped.

A. Yes. You should report this information to your social security office as it appears that you will not be attending school as a full-time student. Your benefits may be resumed when the university again considers you to be in full-time attendance.

I'm 21 and have been getting monthly social security payments as my father is disabled. I am a senior at the university and will be 22 in November, but won't graduate until

January. Can I continue to get payments until I graduate?
A. Yes. Your payments can continue until the end of the semester or quarter in which you become 22.

Q. I receive social security payments as a student and now work as a cashier at a local motel. My job will be part-time during the school year but will be full-time during the summer months and my yearly pay will be about \$3,000. Should I report these earnings?

A. Yes. Report these wages to your nearest social security office.
