HOWARDWICK - Following 4 years of service from temporary water systems, communities in the lake area will be connected to a State approved water system beginning in 1973.

In some instances well water, when approved, can continue to be dispatched through a new our Churches in the Panhandle tem. Wells in the general area. however, are steadily declining in the quality-level permitted for human consumption, and wells cannot be depended on for an indefinite supply. The State Department of Health has noted vised local developers and local government bodies to get connected to the Greenbelt Industrial nent approved source of water in the area, as soon as possible.

Financing of the overall project will come mainly from the Farm and Home Administration, various Texas agencies, and some additional assistance from the Federal government.

Relative to the individual communities involve t, the City of Howardwick, if caused to put in its own approved system, will then sell revenue bonds to finance its portion of the cost, which amount would be somewhere less than 50% of the total; the city would expect to receive significant grant money from the Federal government.


If the development company that owns the Sherwood Water System, now serving the city of Howardwick, decides to replace its temporary system with a State approved system, the funding would be a private matter handled by the development corporation.

Other communities, such as the citizens group on the south side of Greenbelt Lake, the "Road Runners" quarter section now under development, and the citizens of the Saints Roost subdivision, will decide for themselves in what manner they shall tie on to the water, if wanted, and finance it - with funding aid available from the Farm and Home Administration if desired.

A State approved water and distribution system in the lake area will make it convenient for the property owners to qualify more easily for Rural Home and Business loans, and make possible other accommodations and assistances from government agencies who are in the business of helping resort and retirement communities.

It fills a badly needed void in the area, and is gratefully welcomed by the people, some of whom never having had any water at all.

General Telephone To Reduce Bills In Jan.

Telephone customers may notice a one per cent decrease in their telephone bills in January. The reduction is the first scheduled step to eliminate the Federal Excise Tax paid by telephone customers and collected by telephone companies on telephone service, reducing it from 10 per cent to 9 per cent during

The government agreed in 1971 and then reduce it one per cent annually for 10 years until elimi-

The Federal Telephone Excise Tax was first passed as a "tem-Conflict in 1953. It was an easy telephone companies did the colof charge.

Despite continuing efforts to remove the tax, felt by many to be unfair, it has continued since the end of the Korean Conflict. The tax is levied on both local telephone service and long distance calls.



A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News Compiled From Sources

Winter Weather Stops Harvest . . . Consumers Sound Off... Confined Feeding Regulations Rejected... Cold Weather Slows Screwworm.

Of The Texas Department of Agriculture

Old man winter slowed harvest of Texas agricultural products from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley. Citrus harvest was at a slower pace due to cold, wet weather. Cotton and grain sorghum harvest on the High and Low plains was delayed by snow and freezing weather.

Peanut and soybean harvest was also cut back due to the weather; farmers were also unable to complete seeding

But in spite of the bad weather, overall harvest is generally ahead of last year. Cotton harvest for the state is now more than 40 percent complete compared with less than a third a year ago. Grain sorghum harvest, on the other hand, is slightly below last year at this time. Peanut harvest is virtually complete. Sugarbeet harvest is 60 percent finished compared to only about 50 percent at this time last year. Soybean harvest is behind this year compared to 1971; this year the crop is about three-fourths gathered; a year ago harvesting of soybeans was 85 percent complete.

Pecan harvest is again slowed due to the weather for the third straight week in a row.

Wheat seeding throughout the state is almost complete as is oat planting. Flax seeding is 75 percent complete compared with slightly more than half a year ago.

CONSUMERS had their chance to sound off recently regarding dairy products. A survey of consumers was sponsored recently by the Texas Department of Agriculture to give the dairy industry information on consumer acceptance of dairy products.

The two most serious complaints voiced by the consumer were spoiled and bad quality products and faulty containers. High prices were also a complaint by consumers.

Consumers suggested to the dairy industry that it provide fresher dairy products, date all product containers, use more glass milk containers, provide a wider variety of

The survey was conducted in the Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, and Tyler areas.

TEXAS Water Quality Board's proposed water pollution control regulations for dairy and poultry operations have been withdrawn. The Texas Water Quality Board will continue its present policy of handling each confined feeding operation individually under its waste control order or "permit" system. Only swine are exempt from this. Swine operations are required to register under the swine feeding regulations.

COLD weather has slowed screwworm infestations, and this is providing an opportunity for officials in charge make plans for 1973.

Screwworm eradication officials at Mission look upon this period as a time to "catch up" in efforts to eradicate the screwworm in 1973.

Cooperation between Mexico and the U.S. governments as well as cattle producers in those two countries will help to improve prospects for the 1973 eradication effort, officials explained.



AMBULANCE SERVICE

A few years ago in Texas, was more or less a haphazard affair. Some communities and visited Saturday with Mr. and and attendants with little or no emergency medical training.

Then the Texas State Depart ment of Health moved to increase the quality and quantity of training and equipment, and the pro-fessionalism of emergency medical care personnel rose in Tex-

in Texas has improved considerably in the past few years and is continuing to improve," said Charles E. King, Director of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety, Texas State Department of Health. 'The State Health Department is now responsible for assisting communities in the establishment and improvement of emergency medical care facilities the training of ambulance personnel, and the maintenance of a State Registry, which encourages emergency medical care personnel to acquire and maintain a high level of proficiency.'

The importance of properly trained ambulance attendants is evident from a study of the American College of Surgeons which reveals some 20,000 persons die each year because of inadequate care prior to reaching a hospital. Some 25,000 persons are permanently disabled as a result of improper hand-

After conducting a State sur vey to determine the need to upgrade the skills of ambulance personnel across the State, the State Health Department established an Emergency Care Attendant program designed to take the classroom as near to the student as possible. The first course was held in San Angelo in 1968 Now courses are offered which invoive up to 72 hours of in-

tensive and specialized training. As of the first of 1972, these training schools have been at tended by 9,585 students, with Leader-Out-of-County Rate \$5.50 6.766 of those successfully com- Leader-Local Rate \$4.50 A Yea pleting the course. Some 89 schools have been conducted across the State with students representing 556 Texas towns and cities, thus providing many of first highly trained emergency care personnel.

The methods and curriculum used in the Emergency Care Attendant school are applied, but magnified, in the Emergency Medical Technician School, a totally different training program of a more intense nature. The first such course was held in Austin in 1970, with six courses conducted in Houston since that time, three in Fort Worth, one in Amarillo and one in Dallas. Some 408 persons have enrolled in these schools with 330 gradu-

Houston and Fort Worth now require by law all ambulance attendants to have completed Emergency Medical Technician training and be certified by the State Health Department.

A-VA recently entered into an agreement with the Blinded Veterans Association for B.V.A. representatives, themselves blind, to augment VA service to blinded veterans.


Memphis Rites Held For Mrs. Myrtis Phelan

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) with 33 percent followed by Strict Low Middling (41) with 30 percent, and Middling Light Spotted (32) with 21 percent. Micronaire, fineness and ma-

turity, readings showed 67 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9. The 3.3 to 3.4 range accounted for 16 percent and the 3.2 to 3.3 range accounted for 14 precent.

No pressley, or strength, percentages were available this week due to the holidays.

Trading in the cotton market in the Memphis area continued active and prices for the week closed fully steady. Some average prices on the most active qualities traded were Strict Low Milling (42) and Middling Light Spotted (32), 32 staple, 3.5 to 4.9 mike, 25.35 to 25.50 cents per pound.
