Monday is Labor Day - Drive safe

Monday, Sept. 3rd is Labor Day. The Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 54 deaths will result from traffic accidents during this holiday.

Most of the local merchants will be closed. The Grocery Store and Gibson's will be open all day. IGA Foodliner manager, Larry Mabry stated, "We will be open at least part of the day.'

Other stores, Mike's Gibson Pharmacy, Bivens Pharmacy, Greene Dry Goods Co., The Nook, Saye's, Henson's, Stavenhagen Furniture and Osburn Furniture, will all be closed.

The Clarendon School will be closed but the Hedley Schools will hold classes. Hedley Superintendent Glyndol Holland said. "We will be open Monday, Labor Day, but will take our holiday during the Hedley Cotton Festival.'

The Donley County Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Safety urge citizens not to exceed the speed limits and please do not drive if you have been drinking.

DPS Director Jim Adams said, "Obviously, we would be pleased to have no fatal accidents during this 78-hour holiday, but our statistics show that is not probable. We know that some drivers will insist upon driving while intoxicated, others will deliberately exceed the speed limits and still others will drive in a careless or reckless manner."

"DWI and speeding are always the biggest contributing factors to our traffic deaths, but the failure to use seat belts is another reason we have so many fatalities. If more

drivers would simply stay sober, drive within the speed limits and wear seat belts, fatalities would decline still further," said Adams.

DPS statistics for the year to date reveal a two percent decrease in fatalities statewide. Adams said the decrease in total deaths may indicate more people are using seat





September usually brings Revival Meetings to the churches in our community. These meetings come and go and yet we live in a generation which has never known Revival-God's way. These next few weeks I want to use my column to discuss "What is Revival-God's

way"?
"Revival," according to the Oxford Dictionary, is "a reawakening of religious fervor". Another definition is, "to recover renair

and restore." My friends if "Revival-God's way" is going to come to our community, our state, or our nation, our churches are going to have to be recovered, repaired and restored!

That the church is sick, few will dispute. "The church seems almost indistinguishable from any other organization in society. You can't tell the Christians from anyone else," so says Danny Ryoberg, Editor of The Wittenburg Door. We have been influenced far more than we would like to admit. This infiltration has dulled our effectiveness, blurred our vision and caused us to adopt worldly standards of success." A century ago Andrew Bonar said, "I looked for the church and found it in the world. I looked for the world and found it in the church." Are things any better today?

Leonard Ravenhill, a noted author of Revival, has said that we will never see true Revival until,
