Religion Philosophy To Be Offered At CC

Philosophy of Religion 113, a 3 semester hour course, will be taught at Clarendon College the coming semester by Don Stone. Classes will be held Monday evenings, 7 to 9:30 p.m. at the College.

This course will consist in an exploration of the Old Testament of the Bible. It will emphasize the unfolding drama of the Hebrew people set forth in the Old Testament narrative and seen against the backdrop of Old Testament poetry and prophecy.

A study of the Old Testament is much more than an introduction to the New Testament — just as the walls of a beautiful cathedral serve more than mere support for its majestic roof. The Old Testament is an integral part of one story climaxing in the coming of Christ.

Through motion pictures, recordings and class dialogue it is hoped to make the recorded drama relive for the student, reports Don Stone.

Enrollment is open to all Adults for a \$25 Audition Fee or \$34 for College Credit. Regular students taking at least 9 semester hours for credit will pay the usual \$12, out of county students will pay \$15 additional.

The public is invited and urged to come out and look the boys over and give them your support from the very beginning.

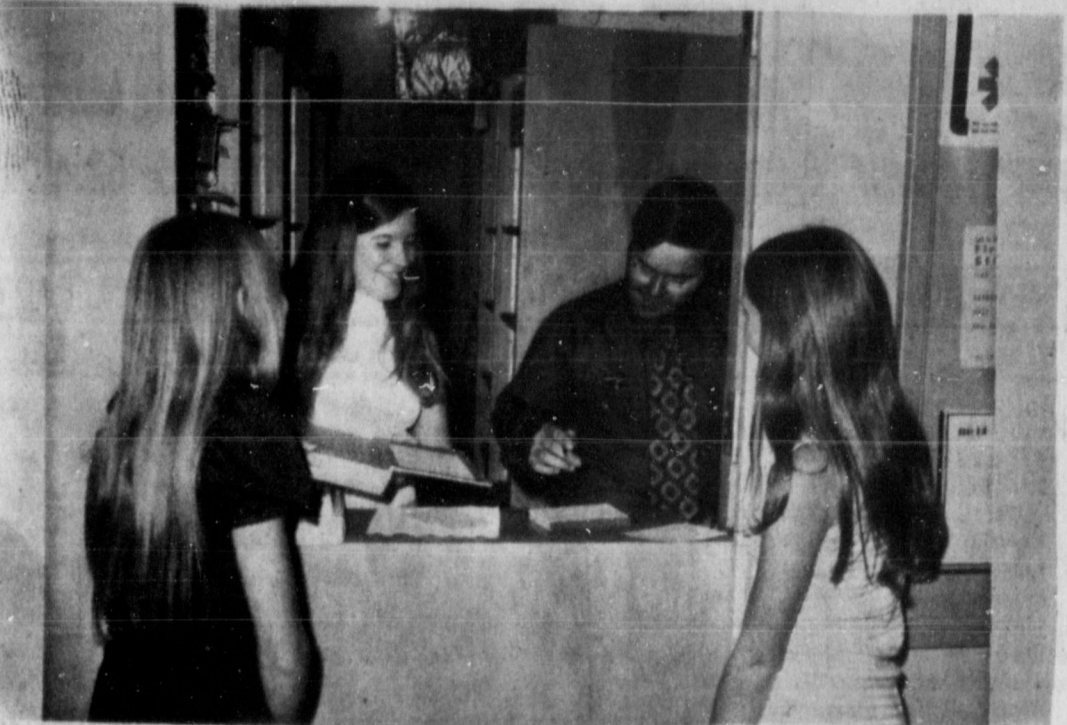

Gov. Standards Set For Extension Cords

Electric extension cords must conform to set safety standards. "The Food and Drug Administration and the National Electrical Manufacturers Association recently agreed on voluntary safety standards concerning extension cords," Mrs. Dor-

is Myers, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, noted. "Under new standards, extension cords can have no more than three outlets. "Also, protective devices must cover outlets when not in use." According to the specialist, the cord itself or its package will bear the warnings: "Caution. Avoid hazards. Keep child-

ren away. Fully insert plugs. All cords manufactured after January 1, 1973, must meet these standards, Mrs. Myers added. According to an extensive study of the American Council on Education, veterans are more likely than nonveterans to plan a career in business or technical fields.

An Ugly Sin

Mark 7:6 (Isaiah 29:13): This people honoreth me with their lips, but their heart is far from me.

Some years ago I read Dr. Schwarz's book **YOU CAN TRUST THE COMMUNIST** (to be Communist). The thrust of the book is that they attempt to appear to the masses to be a "new savior" who is working for the rights of the working class as they attempt to improve their lot in life. But, Dr. Schwarz points out that this is but a front for their real interest is to take over society and the government and make this nation - and the whole world - a communistic world where in reality very little interest is shown for the individual and where human rights and dignity is of no importance. One important thrust of the book is its emphasis of the Communist appearing to be something they really are not.

Well, this is really nothing new. Isaiah points out in Isaiah 29:13 that the people of the Covenant Community were putting on a pious front which hid a profane heart. And Mark declares in his gospel (7-6) that in Jesus' day certain religious folk used "tricky talk" which belied their inner thought and motive - Jesus called such persons "hypocrites."

A serious accusation against the church and Christianity today is that we appear outwardly to practice a religion but it is for show. We do not live up to our claims; we are not Christian at all because too much self-centered sand has gotten into the gears, so much so that it has slowed us down to an almost dead stop. Thus we perform certain acts to achieve a reputation for being religiously pious, or as Jesus said (Matthew 6:1), in order to be seen by men.

Let us look closely at our religious practices and determine the extent of their validity, that we might disprove such complaints lodged against us and Christ's Church. The church exists to serve others, as Christ himself was the servant of all. All its wealth, numbers, structure, add power belong to God in Christ Jesus. Let us make certain that we are committed anew each day to him who said I am the truth, and Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.

Grace and peace in Christ Jesus. **THINK ON THIS:** If this is God's Country, we should live in it like God's people.

Carefully Select Your Kitchen Carpets

Kitchen carpets promise convenience in return for careful selection and a little extra daily care, according to Patricia A. Bradshaw.

"Daily care means removing spots and spills quickly, then sponging carpet - along with frequent vacuuming," the housing and home furnishings specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, said.

She brought up several points for selecting kitchen carpeting. "For practical use, multicolors or tweeds show soil less than solid colors.

"Medium to fairly dark colors tend to stay 'fresh' longer—deep dark shades show lint and surface dust more readily, and light areas show spots.

"Good quality kitchen carpeting should consist entirely of man-made fibers because they aren't subject to mildew or rot. The face should be a non-absorbent, easy-to-clean fiber such as nylon, acrylic or olefin. Olefins are the most stain-resistant.

"The carpet should have a water-resistant barrier to help prevent liquids from soaking through and causing mildew or rot.

"It should have a short, dense, loop pile that will suspend crumbs and spilled substances on top of the surface for easy cleaning.

"Test samples for absorbency by pouring a little water on each one.

"Water should bead on the surface and be easy to wipe up. Although olefins may permit moisture to flow through the pile more quickly than other synthetics, they can be blotted easily."

The specialist cautioned against using carpet with woven jute backings in the kitchen, because liquids can mildew and rot it - or even cause shrinkage. Most kitchen carpets have sponge or high-density foam backing - some have a layer of woven or solid plastic between carpeting and backing as an extra barrier.

Turning to advantages of a carpeted kitchen, she cited the comfort and warmth it provides, along with a more luxurious appearance. Also, installation may be made over a floor in rather poor condition.

"Kitchen carpet requires less scrubbing and no waxing, absorbs much kitchen noise, and lessens the danger of breakage," she added.

A veteran interested in obtaining a GI loan should request an application from the nearest VA regional office, fill it out and return it. The VA will promptly issue a certificate of eligibility if the veteran is eligible.

Accent On Health

Despite the rich bounty provided to us by the land, Texas and the nation are described as nutritional illiterates.

Nutrition is a relatively new science. For this reason there is room for misunderstanding, and even intentional misrepresentation. Although much malnutrition is the result of poverty, full pocket doesn't mean a nourished body, says the State Health Department.

Focus on the high price of meat has made Texans more aware of their eating habits. But one group of individuals — the food faddists — are willing to pay through the nose (and sometimes through their health) for items no better than those offered in supermarkets.

Like bobbysox, beeboppers, pointed toed shoes, ponytails and rock 'n roll, fads come and go. But for some the memory may linger on since food fads can affect health and quality of living for a long time.

A big fad at the moment is the weight reduction kick, which is tied in by food faddists with better health and some particular foodstuff which they say can cure all the ills of the believers. Some reducing diets, when followed too long, can lead to permanent health problems.

Nutritionists say there is no one particular cure-all food, and they have scientific proof. Faddists, on the other hand, push hundreds of different contradictory fool systems, including the current "organic" food

theory. Many diet or nutrition advocates are opportunists whose major motivations are economic. Some of these persons appear to be sincere, albeit misguided and close-minded in their nutritional beliefs.

A look at the highly-publicized diets which have been put forth gives you an idea of the perplexing situations greeting those interested in dieting — either for weight loss or other health reasons.

The drinking man's diet, Zen diet, grapefruit and egg diet (misnamed the Mayo diet), vegetarian diet, cereal diet, low-protein, low carbohydrate diet — are all a part of the present-day food craze, says the Health Department. Some, such as the Zen diet, can result in malnutrition.

And, there are the vitamins and food supplement faddists who push all types of supplement concoctions off on the willing indulger. Vitamin E and Vitamin C, both essential to the body, are among the vitamins being pushed at present.

Dr. Linus Pauling advocated great amounts of Vitamin C to prevent the common cold. Research has failed to substantiate his claim.

The State Health Department says you can get all the required nutrients, including Vitamins C and E, through a wise selection of foods. Selecting foods properly will also insure efficient utilization of the food dollar — something that can shrink rapidly in today's supermarkets. Supplements generally are expensive and unnecessary, unless prescribed by a physician.

The Nutrition Service Division of the State Health Department says the basic food groups still are the best guide for the average person who needs strength and vitality to meet each day's challenges. These are divided into the milk group, meat and alternate protein group, fruits and vegetables group, and the bread and cereal group. While giving you sufficient energy, these groups also supply the trace elements of minerals which your body needs.

Nutritional quackery appeals to desperate people who want to believe in the impossible and the incredible. In the case of weight-reducers, they want to believe in something simple and easy, in a cure-all calling for no effect on their parts. Traditional calorie counting is too slow, too limiting for their appetites. People with illnesses want a miracle to help them.

"Compared to the exotic nutritional advice, which borders on the occult or is rendered with spiritual fervor, normal everyday nutritional education lacks pizzazz," writes an Ohio State nutritionist. "That is why the voices of the home economists — the dietitian — the nutritionist — food technologist — are not heard when they contradict the often untrue and sensational health claims being made by those who so avidly degrade the American food supply."

Significant progress has been made in the science of diet and its relationship to health, but science advances by slow, difficult steps which are much too slow for impatient, desperate people who want immediate solutions.

But when the fads have run their course, the accepted, scientifically approved four food groups still stand tall as the way to receive proper nutrition from the foods you eat and drink, says the State Health Department. A place to look for reliable information about nutrition and health is your local physician or your local health department. You may go also to a home economics teacher, or the county extension agent. They too will be able to give you some help and printed information.

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partisan general account for all eligible candidates. Just check the box provided.

Q—My adjusted gross income is \$13,000. Can I take the \$2,000 standard deduction on my return?

A—No. The standard deduction is 15 percent of your adjusted gross income up to a \$2,000 maximum. Fifteen percent of your adjusted gross income is \$1,950. This is your standard deduction, not \$2,000.

Q—My son turned 20 in 1972. Does this mean that I cannot claim him as a dependent any more?

A—No. If your son did not have gross income of \$750, or more or was a full-time student for at least five months of last year no matter how much money he made, you may still claim him as a dependent, regardless of his age, if all the other dependency tests are met, including furnishing over one-half of your son's total support.

Q—Are scholarships taxable?

A—No. In general, if you receive a scholarship or fellowship grant, you may exclude your gross income, depending upon whether or not you are a degree candidate. If you are a degree candidate, there is no limitation on the amount that may be excluded from your income. However, if you are not a degree candidate, the amount you receive as a scholarship or fellowship may be excluded up to \$300 times the number of months for which you receive amounts under the grant during the tax year.

A scholarship that is compensation for past or future services or primarily for the grantor's benefit, is not excluded from gross income.

For more information, see IRS Publication 590, "Tax Information for American Scholars in the U. S. and Abroad." A free copy can be obtained by dropping a postcard to your Internal Revenues district office.

I installed a new water heater in my home last year. Can I deduct the cost on my tax return?

A—No, but you may add the cost of this item to the basis of your property, so that it will be taken into account in the event that you sell your home.

Q—Are gambling losses deductible?

A—If you itemize, you may deduct your gambling losses incurred during the year, but only to the extent of your winnings. Gambling winnings must be reported as income.

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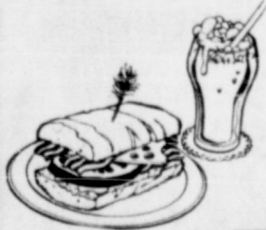

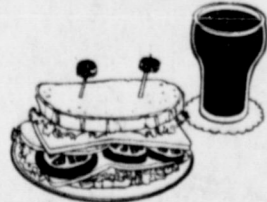

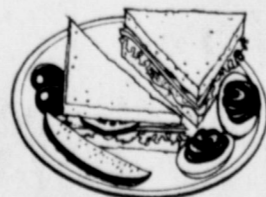

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The Consumer Alert

BUYER'S RIGHTS

Both the consumer and the door-to-door salesman will have reason to think twice about an at-home sale that there is a new State law which gives the buyer the right to change his mind.

The "Home Solicitation Act" by Dallas Senator Bill Braeck-

lein and Representative Chris Semos of Dallas became law when the governor signed it June 13.

Basically, this law provides that if a consumer is solicited at his home for a sale or merchandise or services costing \$25 or more, and subsequently decides that the goods weren't what they'd been cracked up to be, he can back out of the deal within a three-day period.

But it also imposes some strict responsibilities on the consumer, as well as the seller.

For instance, the Home Solicitation Act does not cover sales of farm equipment; insurance regulated by the State; realty sales in which the transactions are being negotiated by a licensed real estate broker or attorney; or sales made pursuant to a preexisting retail charge account, or based upon prior negotiations at a business establishment where the goods were displayed.

The original offer must have been made and agreed upon at your doorstep. And that seems fair enough, since the whole idea was to put the consumer on equal footing with the itinerant salesman whose sales pitch may be better than his product.

The salesman is required to give the consumer a "fully completed" receipt of contract — written in English, or Spanish, or in whatever language the sales presentation was made — at the time of the transaction.

Also, he must tell the signer about his cancellation rights, and furnish him with a copy of this printed statement:

"You, the buyer, may cancel this transaction at any time prior to midnight of the third business day after the date of this transaction. See the attached notice of cancellation form for an explanation of this right."

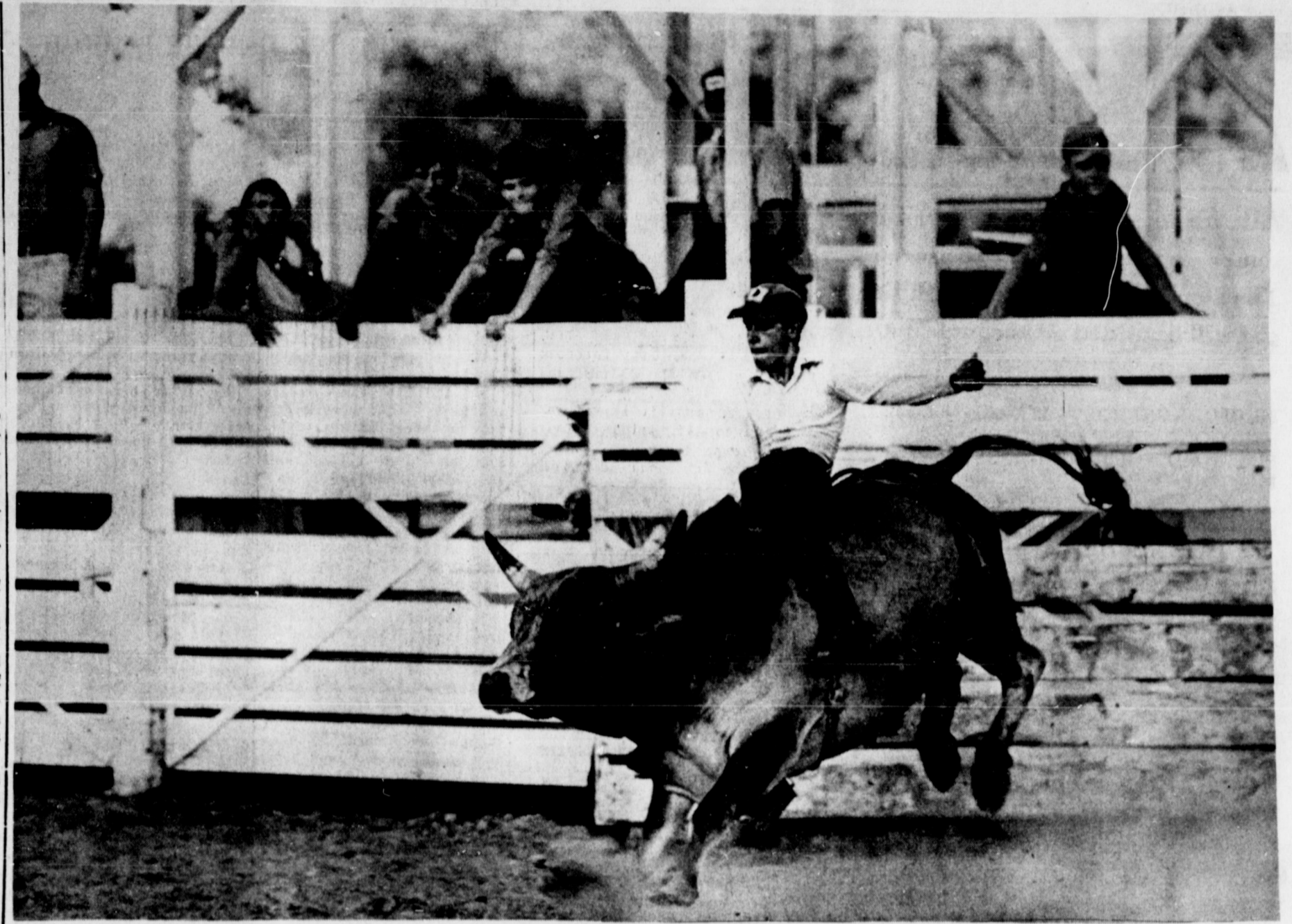
The form recites a detailed description of the duties of both parties.

The buyer has the duty to meet the three-day deadline by letter or telegram, and he must be prepared to take "reasonable care" of the goods or property in his possession until the cancellation procedure has been completed.

If unacceptable home improvements are involved, the merchant has to restore the property to its prior condition, unless the consumer says otherwise.

Violation of the act by a door-to-door seller not only would make him liable for actual damages to the consumer, reasonable attorney's fees and court costs, but he risks having the contract voided.

And if the merchant doesn't refund the consumer's payment and recover the goods which have been rejected within 20

days after receipt of the cancellation notice, the buyer does not have any more duty to return the goods.

Hopefully, merchants specializing in home solicitations will accept the challenge of this new law by making certain that the goods and services they offer are worth keeping.

But it is the sad truth that there always are just a few people who would rather try to make a "fast buck" than an honest sale.

With the "Home Solicitation

Act," and the new "Deceptive Trade Practices - Consumer Protection Act" I told you about last week, we have armed the consumer with remedies for encounters with that type of operator without hindering, harassing or penalizing our honest and ethical business community.

"The Special Enrollment Examination is not a test to obtain employment," Mr. Coppinger said, "It presents an opportunity each year for those who are not attorneys or CPA's to establish proof of competence. This is required of tax practitioners who seek to acquire enrollment status in order to represent their clients at all levels of procedure before the

IRS."

Completed applications, accompanied by a fee of \$25 payable to the IRS, should be mailed by August 31, 1973 to the Director, Audit Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C. 20224; Attention: CP:A:S:T-SEE.

About 10,000 people are expected to attend the nationally famous Boys Ranch Rodeo at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch this Labor Day weekend.

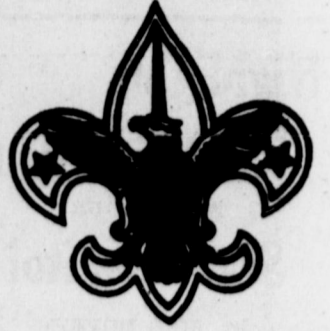
