A-Benefits of \$90 per month are \$1080 per year. You won't be entitled to receive benefits for June, July, and August; but since your earnings won't exceed \$175 per month while you are working at your school, you will be entitled to receive nine of your social security checks for the year.

Q-I worked for a department store for 21 years ending in 1972. I have now taken a job with the State where I am not covered by social security. Can I keep up my social security by paying into it myself?

A-The law does not permit voluntary contributions of social security taxes. You must work in covered employment or selfemployment to make contributions. Because you have worked under social security for at least

ten years, you are guaranteed a retirement benefit at age 62 or later and you are protected for survivor benefits in the event of your death and for Medicare at age 65. You are also insured for disability benefits for five years following your last covered employment.

Q-I have been receiving disability benefits for four years. I read that if you have been drawing disability for at least two years you will be eligible for Medicare. When will I be

A-Those receiving disability benefits for two years or more will become entitled to Medicare July 1, 1973. You will be automatically enrolled and need take no action. 




