## Hospital Board Seeks Lease

The Donley County Hospital Board decided Monday night to ask the Pacer Phenix Corporation of Wichita Falls for a contract proposal under which they would lease and operate Medical Center Hospital here.

At the regular monthly meeting, the board reviewed a preliminary proposal from the corporation which would operate the hospital as a business and was basically satisfied with the terms. "Undoubtedly, the date they are shooting for is March 1," board chairman Delbert Robertson said. This was because the payment schedule tables were set up for that date each year.

Therefore, the board moved to get the proposal and their preliminary approval for a contract to be drawn up right back to the medical services corporation so they could get it in final form.

Terms proposed by the Pacer Phenix Corporation are generally that they would pay off all bonded indebtedness of the hospital district as the notes come due over about the next 25 years. These lease payments would

be from \$44,000 to almost \$50,000 per year, varying according to amounts of payments coming due each year.

Under the corporation's proposal, the final years of the lease agreement, they would be able to purchase the hospital from the district for \$90,000. They would have the option to purchase the facilities and the land for the total amount of the bonded indebtedness, about \$644,000 at present, at any time between now and the final year of the 25-year lease, renewable at their option at five-year intervals.

The corporation had originally offered \$17,000 lease money for the first year, but having determined they would be unable to staff, equip and open the facility at anywhere near a profit for the first year, they stipulated in their informal proposal that they pay only a token sum of \$1 for the first year. They would, however, furnish such equipment as they determined they would need.

The hospital board unanimously agreed that the proposed terms of the lease agreement would be agree-

able, provided a favorable settlement could be reached on several minor points. For example, the corporation would be expected to finance any upkeep or remodeling of the existing facility and to have it insured.

Hospital district taxes would be used over the next two years to retire general obligations and warrants and to meet bond payment schedules until the corporation took over this indebtedness after the first year.

Hospital administrator Gerry Knight said, however, that some of these debts are questionable and might never be paid. Poor records were kept under prior administration, he said, and there is no way to know what some of the debts on the books were for or if they are valid, since there are no receipts or invoices.

An adding machine was purchased for over \$600, Knight said, and more than \$400 is still owed on it. But he said it was of inferior materials and could be purchased ordinarily for about half of what was still owed on it. The board recommended that he inform the dealer in Pampa to pick up the machine and buy another.

Once the Pacer Phenix Corporation assumed the operation of the hospital and the debts of the district were taken care of, board members asked, would a hospital district be necessary?

"You bet," Knight said. Robertson pointed out that the district would still be obligated to take care of the health care needs of the county's indigent, although he said that taxes should eventually come down to around 10 to 20 cents per \$100 valuation.

Even now, without the hospital being open, the district is obligated to assume the cost of health care for indigent residents of the county who have proof of

their status as such on file at the hospital here. Then the district must pay for their care at neighboring county hospitals which weren't built with federal Hill-Burton funds. A stipulation of such funding is that the hospital built with these federal monies take care of the indigent without turning them away.

A hospital district would be necessary to operate the tax office in order to care for these indigent of the county until such time as the people of the county dissolve the district by voting it out, Robertson explained. And, Knight pointed out, another expense which makes the district necessary is the administrative cost of processing the indigent who need health care. This function would not be assumed by the leasing corporation.

"I was contacted today (Monday) by an Arkansas group with three doctors interested in relocating in Texas, although they didn't know where," Knight said. They said they would again contact the local hospital administrator later in the week, but the board moved to go ahead with negotiations with the Pacer Phenix Corporation since their plans were obviously further along.

Knight was authorized to contact Pacer Phenix executive vice-president Jerry Mize to work out the details of the contract for further consideration by the board later this month at a called meeting.

"What if the corporation kept the hospital only one year and then turned it back?" board member Lacy Nobles asked. Member John H. Jones pointed out that they could hardly do worse than at present, not being opened at all.

"If we had doctors," Jones said, "financially we couldn't operate it now." Not only would it be easier to operate the hospital facility

once it had opened, but after they had made payments over a period of years, it would be to the corporation's advantage to keep it open, since the purchase price would be reduced by the amount of principal payment paid during all previous lease periods, board attorney Mike Sanders of Lovell, Lyle and Cobb pointed out.

In other action, Ansil Adamson took his oath of office to fulfill the one year and two months remaining on the unexpired term of O.C. Watson on the hospital board.

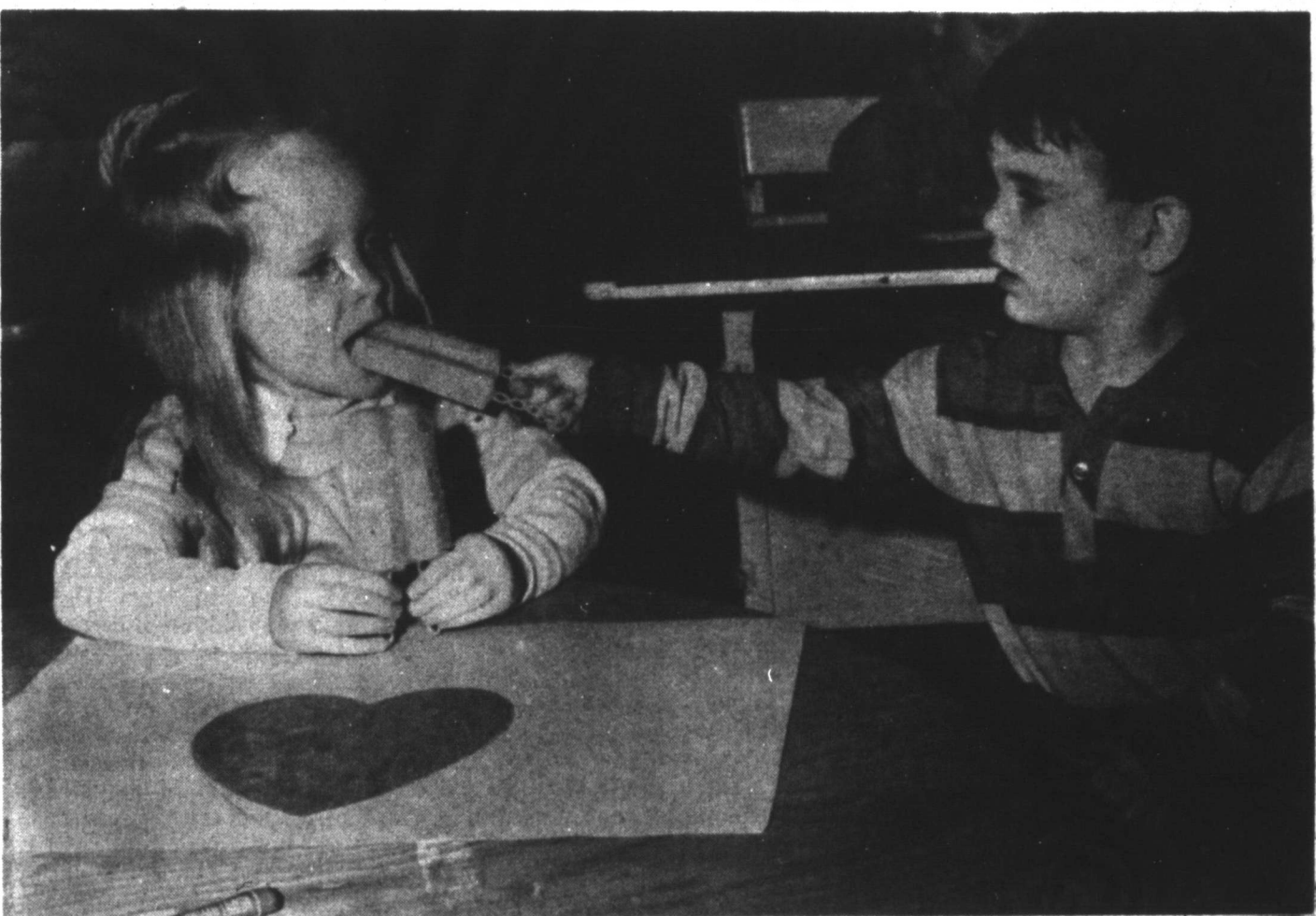
Also, board members John H. Jones, C.C. Ayers and Ernest Barbee were appointed to a committee to reexamine the valuations on

pieces of farm equipment. The system used by the hospital board was borrowed from the school district, and knowledgeable farmers on the board thought some of the valuations were out-of-date.

For example, although a six-row tractor costs a good deal more than a four-row, no differentiation was made for tax purposes.

Valuations on automobiles were left the same for each year model as last year's, and 1975 cars were added on at a higher rate to cover inflation.

Board members present were Ernest Barbee, Bud Hermesmeier, Ansil Adamson, C.C. Ayers, John H. Jones, Lacy Nobles and chairman Delbert Robertson.

## County Commissioners Court Meeting—

## Depository Bids Opened, Road Salaries Adjusted

In the regular monthly meeting of the Donley County Commissioners Court Monday, the Farmers State Bank and Trust Company was again selected as depository for county and school funds, bids were taken on a car for the sheriff's department, and an agreement was ratified between the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development District and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Other action included a pay hike for county road hands, the tabling of the architect's bill on the courthouse annex and continuation of past policies of homestead tax exemption for those 65 years of age and older and continuous county court throughout the year.

Also discussed was the price of gravel, gasoline for the sheriff's department and highway patrol, the transfer of funds from one precinct to another and the possibility of granting Clarendon city policeman Homer Holman county-wide law enforcement authority.

Bids on the county and school funds depository were received from the Farmers State Bank and Trust Company of Clarendon and the Security State Bank and Trust Company of Hedley. On 30-day to one year deposits on amounts less than \$100,000, Farmers State Bank offered six and one-half per cent interest, while Security State Bank offered interest of five per cent for 30 to 90-day deposits for the county and for the schools were in amounts of less than \$100,000, so the bid of Farmers State Bank was accepted.

After discussing the preference of Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Jr., fuel economy and trade-in values, the commissioners decided to

accept the lowest bid turned in on four makes of cars. That bid was for \$4,479 on a Chevrolet Impala equipped to specifications, turned in by Alderson Chevrolet. Judge Billie R. Christal warned the commissioners that dealership owner Gene Alderson is his nephew, and County Attorney John Knorpp was called in for consultation.

Knorpp said that they somehow had the notion that nepotism laws, which forbid the hiring of kin for positions of public trust, confused in the issue, and there would be no problem with accepting the bid, provided that Judge Christal refrained from voting, as he did.

Soil Conservation Service officer Monte Sowers appeared to ask that the commissioners ratify an agreement between the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development District (RC&D) to cooperate on planning conservation measures.

Donley County and the cities of Clarendon and Hedley are represented on the RC&D by Judge Christal. RC&D represents a seven-county region of the Panhandle with very similar interests and conservation problems, Sowers explained. PRPC and RC&D have had some disagreement in the past about which organization would represent the area in conservation planning.

"What this (agreement) boils down to," Sowers said, "is that you've now got PRPC in your corner on RC&D." Judge Christal put forward the motion to ratify the agreement, and it unanimously passed.

Jess Finley, of Precinct 4, the northeast part of the county, said that road hands ought to make as much as the

sheriff's deputies, since the road hands do labor for their pay. There was some hard feelings among them, he said, since they were not given a pay raise as were other county employees at the last commissioners court meeting.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Gene White of Jerico Route said he was inclined to agree, and Precinct 2 Commissioner Olace Hicks of Clarendon said he'd go along. Therefore the commissioners raised their road hands \$27 per month to \$6,000 per year.

A bill from the architect on the courthouse annex was tabled because payment would have made him 80 per cent paid up, while work is yet only eight per cent complete, and some of the plans still have to be redrawn.

The commissioners passed a motion to rotate each month among the service stations that would be willing to furnish gasoline at two cents above wholesale for use by the sheriff's department rather than purchase a tank, as this would allow them to check the oil and do other minor service checks which might otherwise be neglected.

They agreed to check on the possibility of locating a gasoline tank for the highway patrolmen, or state troopers, at the Texas Highway Department barn.

A request that the commissioners grant county-wide law enforcement jurisdiction to Clarendon policeman Homer Holman was discussed. County Attorney John Knorpp advised that this would not be legal unless he was made city marshal, which would automatically give him concurrent authority with the sheriff's department.

The main reason for the request was so he would have authority to enforce

litter laws between the city limit and the city dump, County and District Clerk P.C. Messer said. Holman already has full authority on all city property, including the airport and dump and can pursue violators outside those bounds and the city limits, Knorpp said. The motion was tabled for the present time.

Hicks brought forward a motion that all bills to the county be signed by the purchasing agent for the county and that the bills include an itemized receipt. Finley mentioned one instance when the county was billed \$36.00 for a clipboard.

Since it is the commissioners court's responsibility to control expenditures by the county, Finley said, he asked whether all purchases ought not to be approved in advance. This would be impractical, Judge Christal said, but the court does have authority to refuse payment on any item, as Knorpp pointed out.

## Rainfall Total Above Normal

Moisture for the year thus far is running well ahead of that recorded in 1974, according to meteorologist Tommie Saye's records.

In the first six days of February this year, a total .67 of an inch precipitation was registered in Clarendon. This compares with the 1974 total for all of February of .27. On February 1, .18 inch was recorded, .02 on February 2, .23 on February 3, .16 on February 4 and .08 snow on February 6.

This total, added to .65 for January this year, brings this year's total precipitation to 1.32 inches, considerably more than the .86 recorded in all of January and February in 1974.

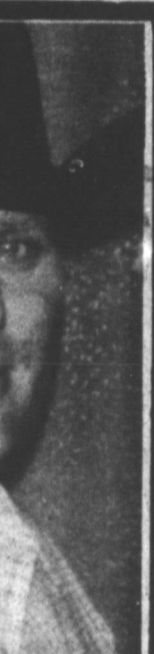

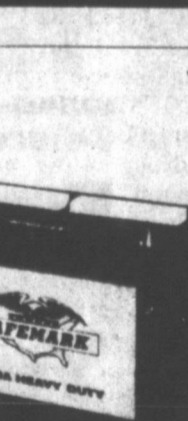

### TEXAS TALK

Q. What are some of the characteristics of a good breeding bull not necessarily required for good beef cattle?

A. Most notable characteristics for breeding bulls not necessary in beef cattle include; a masculine appearance, breed markings, constitution and a good weight-to-age ratio.

CONSTITUTION—Usually described as the positive tendency of an animal to perform well and survive during advanced age. Physical characteristics indicative of a good constitution are full development of the forequarters, wide-open and broad nostrils, a strong straight back and good body width and depth.

MASCULINITY — Evidenced by the appearance of the bull. General features to look for are a full neck, strong horns (when this is a breed characteristic), full forehead with good development of chest and shoulders.

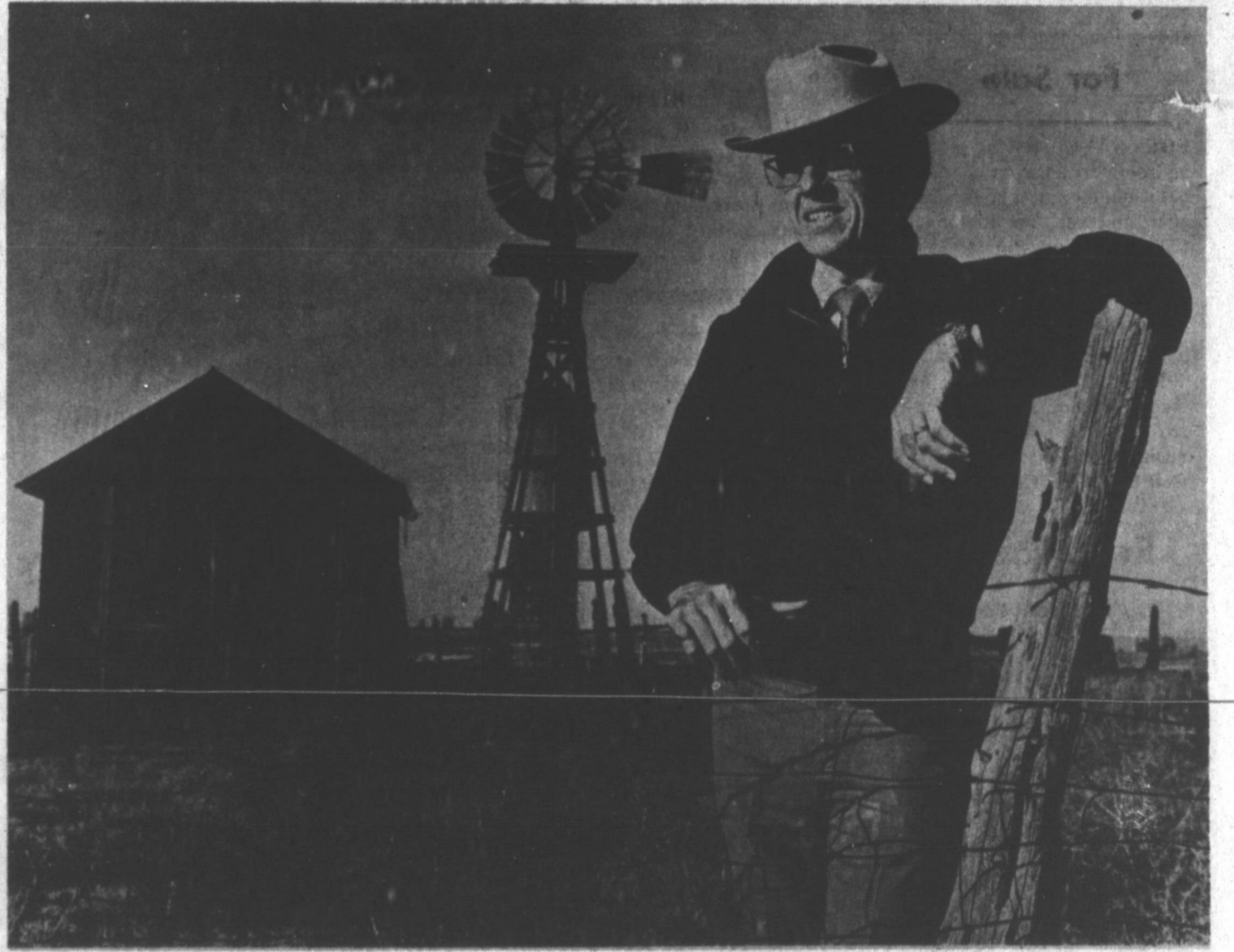

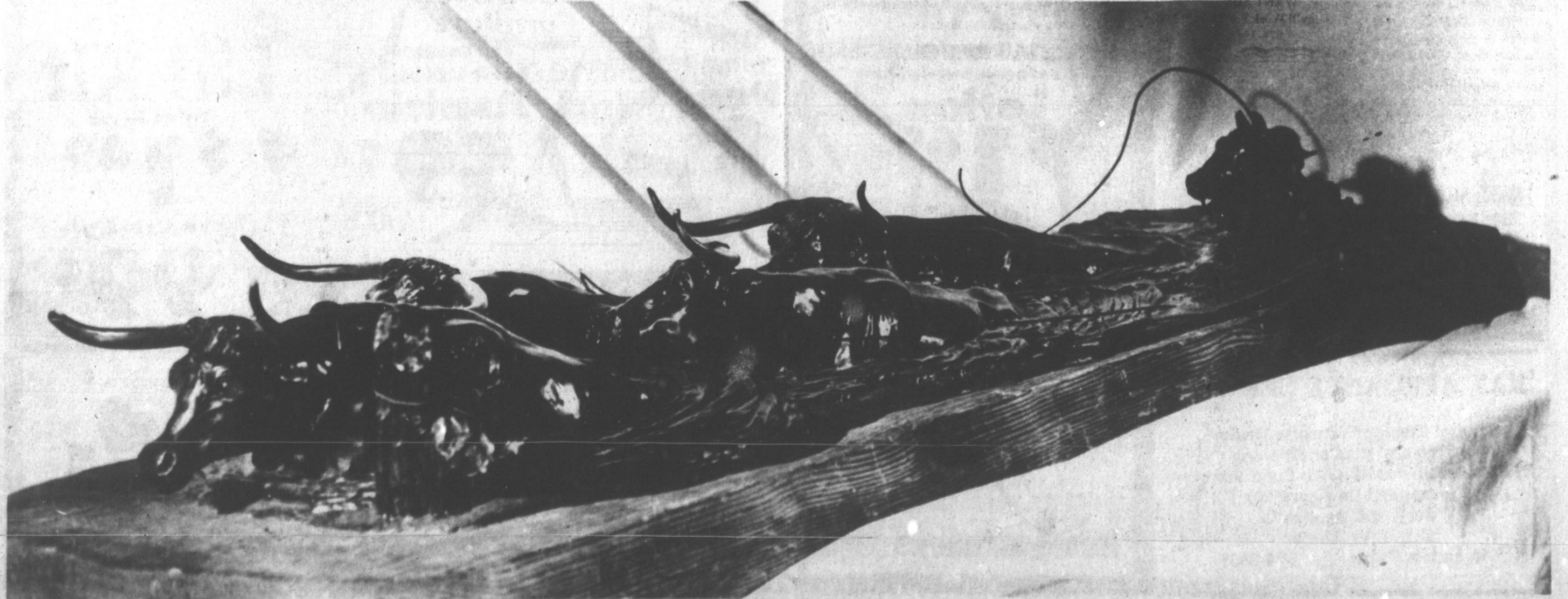
