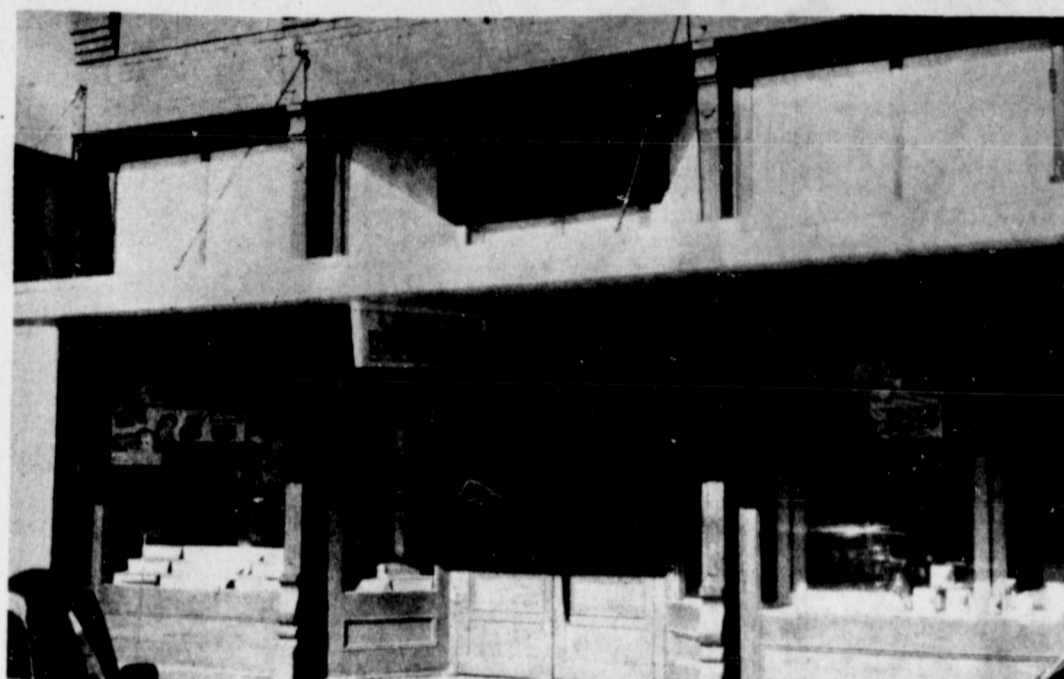

## Oldest Business In Panhandle Area Is Sold Friday, Sept. 26

The oldest Drug business in the Panhandle area, Stocking's Drug Store, was sold Friday, September 26, 1973 by Mrs. Jerome Stocking, Joe Lovell, was the buyer.

The business was established in 1885 by Dr. Jerome D. Stocking, Sr. and had remained in the family since that time. Jerome Stocking, Jr. had continued operation of the store following his father's death and upon the death of Jerome Stocking, Jr., his wife, Mrs. Jerome Stocking kept the business in operation.

Dr. Stocking, founder of the Drug Store, graduated from the University of Michigan School of Medicine in 1876. He came to Texas from New York and in 1885 drove across the prairie to Old Clarendon. In those early days, as was the custom, Dr. Stocking was paid a salary to make it possible to have a doctor, and under these conditions he served seven counties being the only doctor. Stocking's Drug was established in May of 1885 at Old Clarendon.

Modes of travel made it impossible to reach patients in a short time and the doctor often remained overnight in homes, making trips by horseback or buggy.

He and his wife had two sons, Fred and Roy. The first Mrs. Stocking died while living in Old Clarendon.

In 1887 the Drug Store was moved to the railroad and the present town of Clarendon. After the death of his first wife,

Dr. Stocking married Sallie Ward of Henrietta whom he had met through the pioneer Ben Chamberlain family. To this union nine children were born: Ralph, Homer, Jerome D., Ruth, George W., Collis A., Frank A., Robert E., and Mary. Though it was difficult to educate a family in those years, all of the Stocking children were well educated and became professional people. Dr. Stocking died in 1918 of a heart attack while addressing a group in the Methodist Church at which time he was paying a tribute to our soldiers. Of interest might be the fact that two days following his death his first car arrived having been on order for some time.

Jerome D. Stocking, Jr. took over the Stocking Drug Store at that time and continued its operation. He married Beatrice E. Mayer, RNA in 1932 and together they handled the business until his death in 1964. Since that time Mrs. Stocking has operated Stocking Drug Store.

Stocking Drug Store has been a tradition in the Panhandle area. Tourists have traveled miles to visit the store which has been maintained to a great extent in its original structure. Former residents seldom come to Clarendon that they do not return to the store to visit and recall memories of yesterdays. We shall miss our pleasant visits in this historical landmark as we already find ourselves thinking, "I believe I'll visit with Bea a minute and get away from this typewriter," and then, our second thought is, "I can't do that. Bea's now retired."

It has been a pleasure to do business with Stocking Drug

Store these years, a business known for its honesty, integrity, and fair business practices, principles which would be a fine guide line for any business. Mrs. Stocking reports she is going to thoroughly enjoy her retirement — if you may call it that for she will always be busy. She has many, many interests and a wonderful philosophy for living and we hope she will now have the time to pursue a few of the pleasures that have had to be pushed aside while tending to her business.

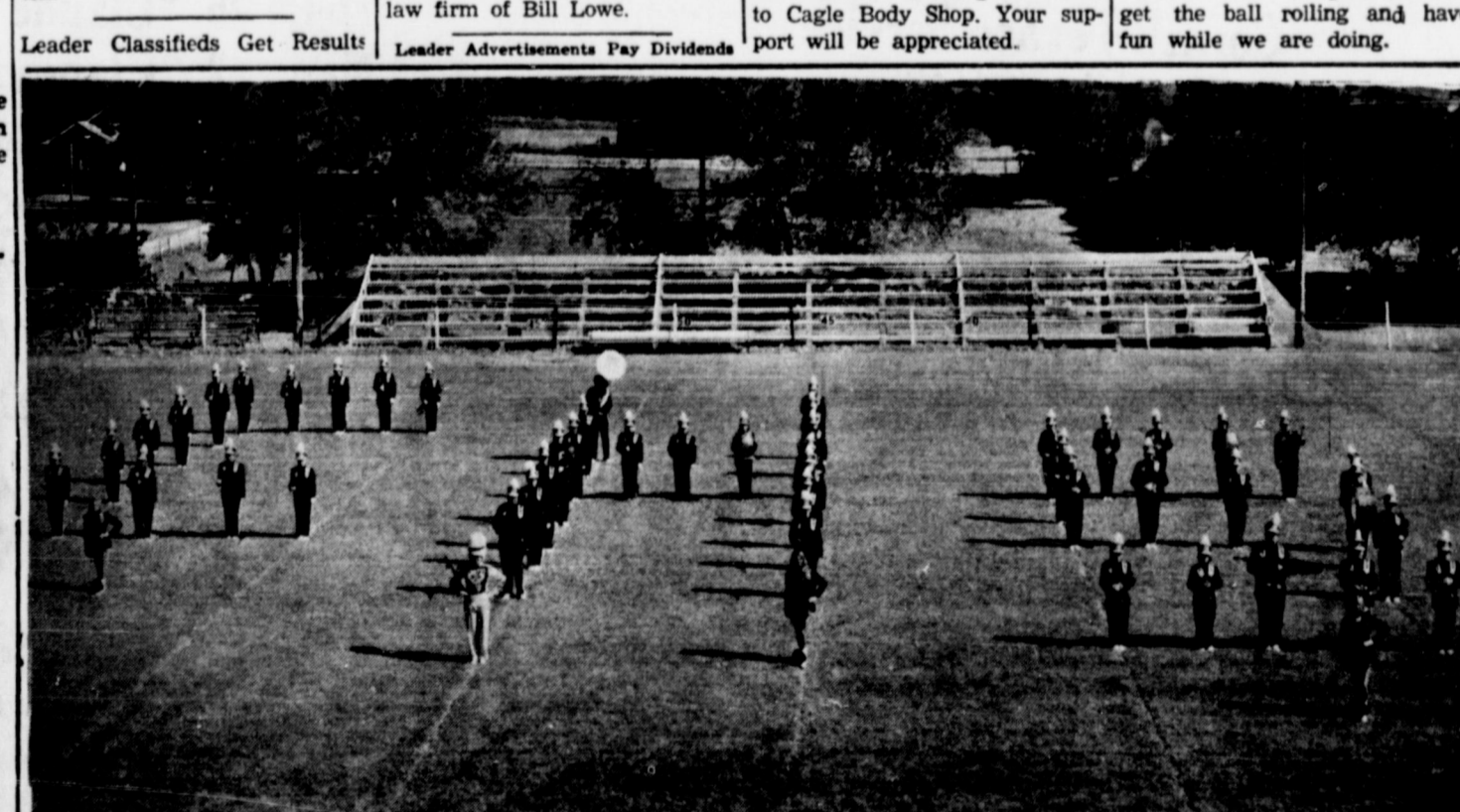
The first project planned is the rebuilding of the Hedley Arena. Everybody is eager and anxious to get this work completed so it can be enjoyed by the young people.

New members are always welcome. We plan to continue our activities through the winter months. Let's all pitch in and get the ball rolling and have fun while we are doing.

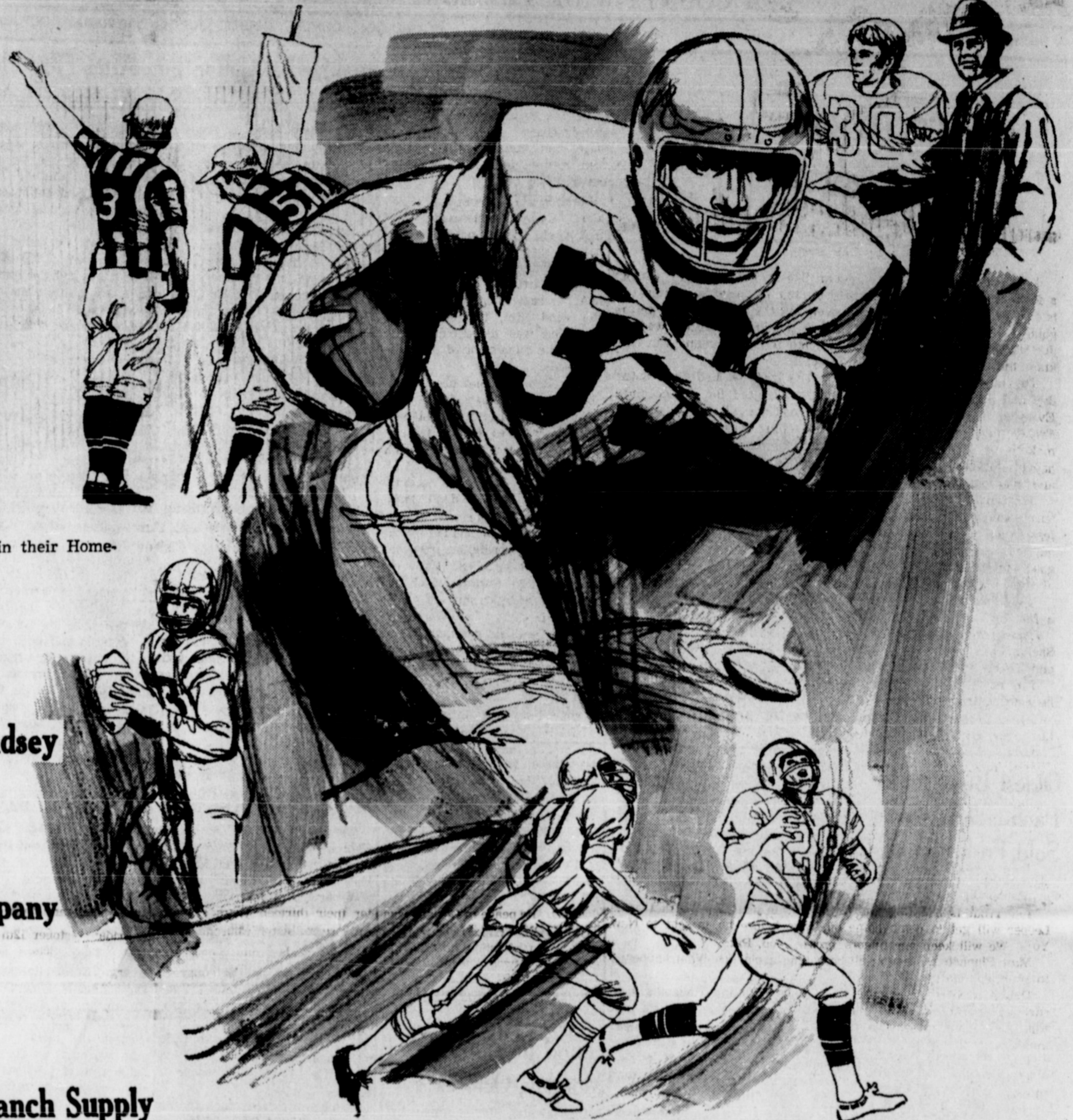

One of the more interesting sights as a young boy was in the fall to see the tumbleweeds being blown by the winds. It was interesting to watch them roll along, occasionally seeming to leap as much as three to five feet in the air. Many times I have seen the fences between farms solid with tumbleweeds running in some cases for miles on end. I guess it would not have been so interesting if I had realized that as those tumbleweeds rolled across the fields they were distributing seeds which next year would have to be hoed out of the crops.

Perhaps the interesting thing about those tumbleweeds was that where they went, they went not of their own free will or desire. Rather, they were blown by the wind until they became hung on something stronger than the wind. Yet, the blowing of the wind was the deciding factor in the movement of the tumbleweeds.

You know, some people are like that in what faith they have; they are like children who are "tossed to and fro and carried about with every wind of doctrine." That is, they don't really have any real convictions; they really don't know what they believe and therefore are easily persuaded by the winds of interpretation from one doctrine to another. But, the final reality toward which we strive is a fellowship of Christians who know in Whom he believes and is persuaded that He is able to guard until that Day what has been entrusted to Him (II Timothy 1:12). For whenever the community of faith become uncertain in their faith in Jesus Christ, the people begin to fall out with each other, to quarrel, to bicker and even to abuse one another. Knowing in Whom we believe gives us the motive and strength to be sure in our commitments and the covenant we have made to God in Christ Jesus because of the Holy Spirit dwelling within our hearts.

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

"There'll be no 'right-to-work' law in the proposed new Texas constitution," predicted Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Bill Hartman, Beaumont Enterprise - Journal, at a meeting of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association last week.

Answering a question from a newspaperman at the summer meeting of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association in Guadalajara, Mexico, Hobby and Hartman said the Texas Constitutional Revision Commission will not have "right-to-work" in the proposed constitution which will be submitted to the legislature in November. Hartman is a member of the commission.

"It will be impossible for 'right-to-work' advocates to get the two-thirds vote necessary to get it back in the constitution at next year's Texas Constitutional Convention," Hobby added.

The convention — beginning in January — will be writing a new constitution to present to Texas voters in 1974.

Hobby also told the Texas publishers that the most important change for the commission and Concon is reorganization of the executive branch. "Texas state government now spends \$5 billion a year with no one in charge," he concluded. "Under our present constitution we have the weakest 'office of governor' in the nation."

**SPECIAL SESSION URGED** — Atty. Gen. John Hill has joined in the demand that Gov. Dolph Briscoe call a special legislative session on a wide range of child welfare matters and school finance laws revision.

Briscoe, who heard of the recommendation while attending the Southern Governors Conference in Alabama, said he has not changed his mind about need for a special session at this time. He made clear that means he doesn't intend to call one. Hill also released his report on licensing of Artesia Hall, the

East Texas child care facility which was closed last summer after reports of serious mistreatment and even a murder charge there.

While he, in effect, said W. Kendall Baker of Houston, a former State Welfare Board chairman, and House Speaker Price Daniel Jr., did nothing wrong in serving as attorneys for the Artesia Hall owner, the attorney general advised a law curbing legal practice before state boards by former members. He also suggested restrictions on legislators practicing before state agencies.

Hill concluded there were no improper payments or inducements to get Illinois children placed in Texas child care institutions by that state's welfare officials.

The attorney general conceded, however, that there appeared to be a certain amount of "winning and dining" of the Illinois officials.

He criticized hiring out of Texas Welfare Department employees part-time to private child care facilities. The Welfare Board, meanwhile, voted to fire its former director of social services, who had been on the payroll of private institutions.

**YOUTH COUNCIL SHAKEN UP** — Leadership of the Texas Youth Council was shaken up in the wake of recent "seminars" at Gatesville Boys School and a court finding that discipline is too harsh at several state institutions for youth.

Dr. James A. Thurman resigned as TYC executive director, a post he has held since 1957, and Robert Kneebone quit as chairman.

The Board named W. Forrest Smith of Dallas as new chairman of TYC and Ron Jackson, 33, of Brownwood as acting executive director.

Smith told the House Committee on Human Resource TYC "needs a little settling time and a little of the pressure taker off" before it can move toward new goals. Smith said the council will comply fully with the rulings of Federal District Judge William Wayne Justice at Tyler that it end certain disciplinary practices used against youth school inmates.

**NEW GAS RATE GRANTED** — The Railroad Commission granted Lo-Vaca Gathering Company, which sells natural gas to many Texas cities, a fluctuating interim rate of about 29.55 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of gas.

The increase is five cents above the present weighted average cost of gas to the company as of last June.

A commission order also provides that the weighted average cost of gas be adjusted up or down each month to reflect the current cost Lo-Vaca is paying.

Lo-Vaca sought an interim rate of 34.9 cents per mcf. The commission said the interim rate was designed to allow the company to purchase gas and recoup operating, but that it does not provide a rate of return on investment. Granting the temporary rate may prevent or mitigate gas shortages to the public during winter heating months, the commission order said.

**AG OPINIONS** — The Parks and Wildlife Department may contract with utility or water districts for water and sewage services in state parks, Attorney General Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: The State Department of Public Welfare must continue to license child-care institutions for the emotionally disturbed.

State employees may receive merit salary increases in both years of the fiscal period, but the amount spent for such raises can never exceed the monthly maximum no matter how much money is available.

Beaumont has authority to donate park land to the State Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation for use in building a hospital, without need for an election, but public hearings are required.

Out-of-state and out-of-county witnesses can be paid reasonable expenses for their appearances in court cases.

Clayford T. Grim of Austin will serve as managing director of the Texas State Building Materials and Systems Testing Laboratory, a consortium of nine state universities seeking to find innovative materials and methods in building.

### AC Is Notified Of Initial Award For LEEP Grant Program

The federal Law Enforcement Education Program (LEEP) has awarded Amarillo College an initial award notice of \$10,000 subject to availability of funds. This will be allocated to law enforcement personnel working toward a degree at AC.

This is the third year the federal grants have been awarded to AC, said Larry Patterson, director of financial aids and placement. The current grant is for fiscal 1974.

In-service law officers, enrolled as either part-time or full-time students at AC, can receive money for tuition, books, and fees under the program.

"In the past we have been able to fund 100 percent of this and hope to continue to do so, but it all depends on availability of federal funds," said Patterson.

Under LEEP conditions, the grant recipients must also agree to remain with their present employers for two years if accepted.

Applications may be obtained from the financial aids and placement office located in the College Union Building on the AC Washington St. campus.

Patterson or Walter Eubanks, director of law enforcement education at AC, may be called for further information.

### Social Security

Q—My daughter, age 28, has been receiving benefits on her deceased father's record for three years because she has been disabled since age 15. Is there any possibility of her being eligible for Medicare?

A—Yes, beginning July, 1973 she is eligible. The cost will be \$6.30 a month and this will be deducted from her social security check.

Q—My husband is receiving social security benefits because of injuries received in an automobile accident. Our son was disabled in the same accident, but was told that he could not receive benefits on his father's account because he was over age 18 at the time he became disabled. Has this changed?

A—Yes, The 1972 amendments make it possible for a disabled child to receive benefits on the parent's record if the child was disabled prior to age 22.

Q—I have been receiving social security disability benefits for several years and I understand that I will be covered by Medicare beginning in July, 1973. My son, age 24, has been disabled since birth and is receiving benefits on my record. Will he be entitled to Medicare, also?

A—Yes, The Medicare coverage for the disabled includes "Disabled Adult Children."

**One-To-One Sponsors Must Supervise For Juveniles To Hunt**

Hunters under 17 years old who wish to hunt on one of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's wildlife management areas must be supervised by adults 21 years of age or older on a one-to-one basis, according to department officials.

Department policy allows hunters as young as 12 years old to participate in public hunts, but there must be one adult for every child under 17 years during both hunts for which drawings are held and for open hunts such as those for quail, dove, squirrel and waterfowl on certain management areas.

Department officials say there were several misunderstandings of this policy last year when applications to hunt arrived at department headquarters in Austin for one adult and two or three juveniles.

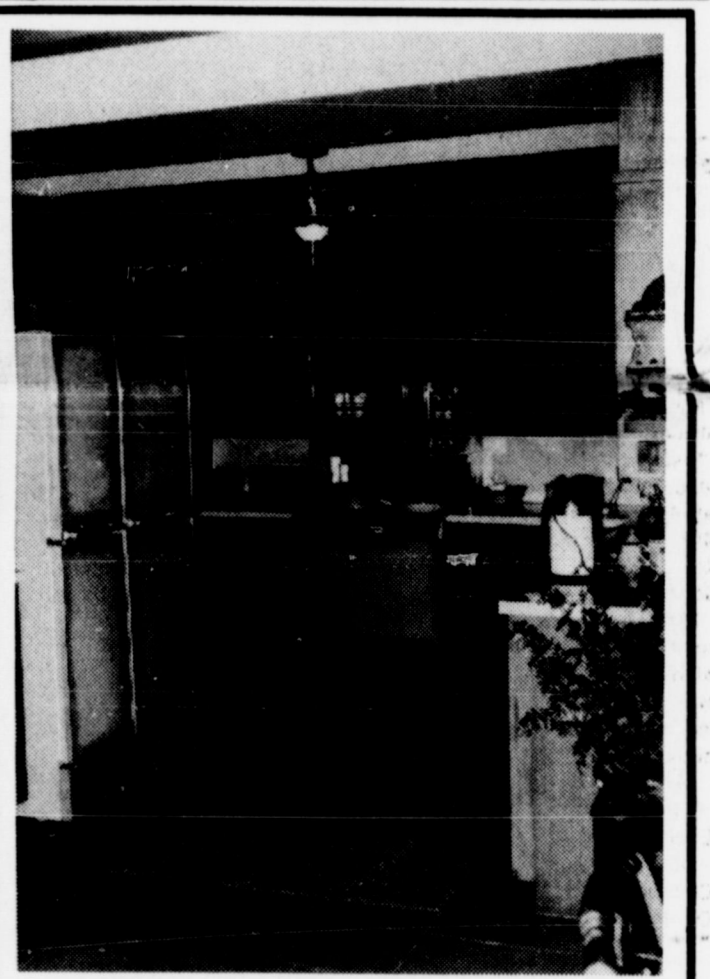
According to department officials, failure of the sponsor to supervise the minor during the hunt will be considered cause for forfeiting hunting rights for both the sponsor and minor.

### Bob Bullock Is Candidate For State Comptroller

During his tour, Bullock said, "Texas taxpayers are losing \$32,500,000 in tax dollars each year because some retailers are pocketing the state and local sales taxes they collect instead of reporting it to the Comptroller."

"Frankly, I think it is ridiculous to talk of taxing food and medicine when ten percent (10%) of the sales taxes now being paid by our citizens is not being recovered by the State."

"As Comptroller, I will work to see that the taxes we now pay, are not lost to some unscrupulous retailer because of faulty collection procedures by the State."

Bullock, a veteran of the Korean Conflict, resides in Austin with his wife and two children.

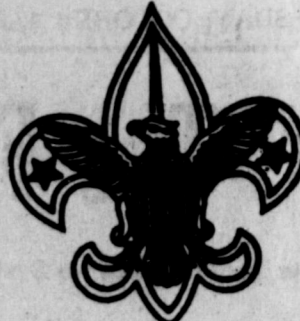
