Art Exhibit Sunday At Farmers State Bank & Trust Co.

Les Beaux Arts Club is sponsoring an exhibit of Indian Paintings, Jewelry, Mugs, and Artifacts at the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. Sunday, April 29, from 2 to 6 p.m.

Ben Konis of Amarillo, formerly of the New York City area, will exhibit many of his paintings, portraits and landscapes, which portray the Indian and his country.

Mr. Konis, a native of New Jersey and of Lithuanian parents, studied at the Art Students League and at the New School for Social Research. He received his Fine Arts Degree at the Catalan-Rose Institute of New York City. For 18 years he worked as a commercial artist in his own firm. After a painting trip through Europe he decided to make art his full time vocation and he and his wife, a native of the Texas Panhandle, moved to Amarillo in 1969. The couple has two daughters.

Konis first paintings were sold at a Group Exhibition of Gallery artists at Greenwich Gallery in New York City. His next showings were in Spring Washington Square Outdoor Art Exhibition and he garnered much recognition for his work in local shows. His first one-man exhibit was in Reynolds Gallery, Taos, New Mexico. He has exhibited at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo; Panhandle Plains Museum, Canyon; Gallery III, Ruidosa, New Mexico; Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, New Mexico—to name a few.

Presently Konis exhibits with the Colony Art Center, Amarillo; Troy's Cowboy Art Gallery, Scottsdale, Arizona; Gallery III, Ruidosa; Dr. Carl Rainone, Arlington, Texas; and with Gallery Twelve, Livingston, New Jersey. His media is oil and pastel. He is in great demand for art workshops, lectures, and demonstrations throughout the Southwest and conducts classes in Amarillo at the Colony Art Center and in the Community Service Program of Amarillo College.

In addition to the exhibit of portraits and landscapes will be a fine collection of Navajo Rugs by Mr. Merle McMurtry of Tulsa. He will also bring Indian basket work and fine examples of Indian pottery and jewelry. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker of Pampa will have on display and for sale Indian Jewelry, much of it with turquoise and silver filigree work. This exhibit will be one of the finest ever held in Clarendon and the public is invited to attend at any time between the hours of 2 and 6 p.m.

Alfalfa Weevil In Donley County Now

The alfalfa weevil is infesting many fields of alfalfa in Donley County according to Ronald Gooch, County Extension Agent. Larvae of alfalfa weevils cause heavy damage to alfalfa early in the spring, from the time the plants are 6 inches high until they reach the early bud stage. The larvae are about 1/20 inch long and are cream colored when newly hatched. As they grow older they turn light green. Full grown larvae are about 1/4 inch long. The larvae feed on the alfalfa terminals and then on the lower foliage, skeletonizing the leaves.

Insecticides can be effectively used to control the alfalfa weevil. Applications of insecticides should be applied when approximately 50% of the alfalfa tips in the field show feeding damage. Ten to twenty larvae per square foot are also considered to be an economical infestation. Additional information on the alfalfa weevil is available at the County Extension Office.

Law Observance Day Program At CC May 1

Dr. Kenneth K. Keiser, associate professor of sociology at West Texas State University, will moderate a Law Observance Day program at Clarendon Junior College May 1.

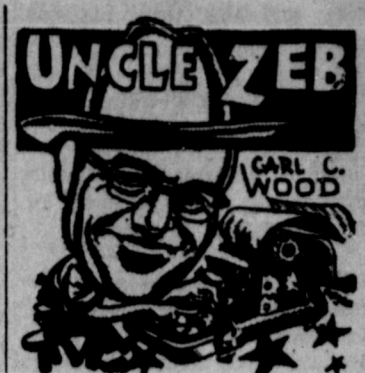

A week or so ago we proved that Uncle Zeb was qualified as a cattlemen, even to the point of being eligible to wear our pants legs on the inside of our boots. On the basis of that we would like to speak out for the cattlemen. . . . We think they are being made the Scape Goat for our price situation. . . . Just a few arguments in his behalf ought to be sufficient. . . . Fris of all the things he must buy in order to stay in the business has skyrocketed even more than beef. The other day we talked with a farmer-rancher that had driven two hundred miles to an auction sale to bid on a piece of farm machinery. It went for three times what he had given for one in the forties.

Take for instance the price of cotton seed. It has sold for some fifty dollars per ton this year, and in many cases would scarcely pay for the ginning. On the other hand cotton seed cake has sold up to one hundred and sixty dollars per ton. In many cases of the farmers gross income dollar is going into production costs then at any time in the past. . . . Many of the large cattle production units are being bought up with money that was earned in other professions. Of course there has been little price spurts that have brought good profits to the inexperienced in the cattle business but by and large it has been a survival of the fittest. . . . Mostly it has been no game for the novice or leaver.

More than this the cattlemen has never cried to Washington for hand-outs. . . . He has battled for his freedom, and he has taken the hard knocks in stride. Now when he is approaching a break with other folks in the market place there are those that would take off a chunk of his tough hide. It isn't fair and it shouldn't be done. His city cousins are making more than ever before and they want and need good RED MEAT. If they succeed in breaking the Cattlemans production back, then we will all suffer. Please Mr. Congress don't single him out for a Scape-Goat. It Just Ain't Right.

Forgiving And Forgiven

Matthew 18:21, 22 . . . Then came Peter to him, and said, Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus answered him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times; but, Until seventy times seven.

In a recent church newsletter of a pastor friend of mine - C. T. Jancoson, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Anson, Texas - I read his account of a lecture given by the driver of a commercial bus on which Brother "T" was riding through the area around Fredericksburg, Texas. The driver spoke of points of interest with a philosophical and Spiritual discourse that gave evidence that it came from his very soul. Of the many statements in the discourse the one which most interested Brother "T" was: **Time wasted on getting even can never be used to get ahead.** In response, Brother "T" raised the question: **How many, many times do we cheat ourselves out of the best things in life while trying to measure out justice to our neighbor?**

Far better than "trying to measure out justice" is to hand out forgiveness! Forgiveness is a personal virtue unique among created creatures, and man cannot be truly happy unless he forgives and is forgiven. Jesus adds to the necessity of our offering forgiveness and of others forgiving us (Matthew 6:15): **If you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your father forgive your trespasses.** Thus, we see that true forgiveness is always conditional - depending upon the attitude of the one being forgiven as well as he who forgives. Therefore, true forgiveness is an experience in personal relationships and unless one has a forgiving spirit, he can neither forgive others nor experience forgiveness himself - and this leads to a most miserable existence, whether its an individual, community, state, nation or the world. But, the law of the Spirit is that there must be forgiveness - that both parties forgive and both be forgiven. And when this is the case, something good happens.

Sometimes we reach the point

where we don't want to forgive - again! But in Matthew 18:21, 22 Jesus established the fact that one must forgive as often as it is necessary because the need for it is constant and abiding. The reason that it can be endless is that God's love is everlasting and endless, thus our capacity to love and to forgive must also have no limit. And, when this shall come to pass, then the sojourner among us will depart marveling as to how "those Christians love one another!"

Veterans Buying New G. I. Homes

Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Director, mindful of the spring home - buying season, cautions veterans, with thoughts of selling homes purchased with G. I. home loans, to get "release of liability" from VA if the loan is assumed by the buyer.

Coker explained that unless a veteran asks for and receives a "release of liability" from the VA office which guaranteed his home loan, he will be liable for payment in the event of default by the purchaser.

Getting a "release from further liability" is simple, Coker noted, provided certain conditions are met:

- The veteran's loan must be current.
- The purchaser must agree to assume the veteran's liabilities.
- The prospective purchaser must be a good credit risk.
- Income must be sufficient to cover payments on G. I. loan.
- Coker pointed out, however, that "release of liability" does not automatically restore G. I. loan entitlement the veteran used to purchase the home he sold.
- VA may restore entitlement only under certain conditions - mostly those which the agency considers "compelling reasons" for disposing of the property.
- At any rate, Coker urged veterans who plan to sell G. I. homes (subject to the veterans' mortgage) to apply for a "release" from the VA office which guaranteed their loans before finalizing sales.

Farmers Home Adm. Emergency Loans

Farmers in Armstrong, Donley, and Gray Counties, Texas, who suffered crop or property losses because of the drought and other natural disasters during the period of January 1, 1972 through June 19, 1972 and who have not received an Emergency loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an Emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, Agriculture Building, Clarendon, Texas, on or before the close of business May 8, 1973.

Applications may also be made at the City Hall in McLean between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon on Thursday, April 26, 1973; at the Courthouse in Claude between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon on May 2, 1973; and at the Courthouse Annex in Pampa between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon on May 3, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for Emergency loans at 1 percent interest.

In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

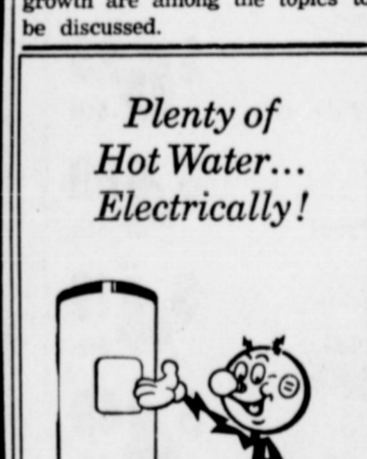

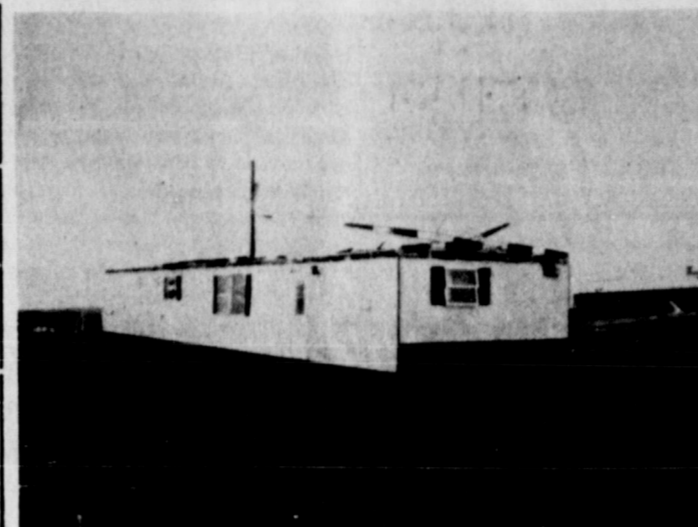
Fishing honors were garnered by Bert Smith, Jr. with his 9 lb. 5 oz. Pike. Jimmy Roberts was chairman for this activity.
