

Satellite School Provides Needed Service Here

Clarendon Satellite School for the mentally retarded child is available to any one who qualifies whether they live in Clarendon, Donley County or some distance away.

In the past the mentally retarded have been shut in a closet, so to speak, and little if any thing was done to try to teach them.

Today with schools like the one here in Clarendon much has and is being done to train great numbers of these children.

The primary purpose is to teach or train the mentally retarded in language development, motor development (coordination of hands and all parts of the body) self care, socialization, hygiene and spare time endeavors. It is of the utmost importance to learn to communicate, to learn the names of things.

Mental retardation is not rare. In this country alone 10,000 children a month are born with this problem. There are already 200 known reasons for the number. Only a small percentage of the children receive the services available to them.

In this age of enlightenment they are being brought out of the closet and into the light of developing potential. They are trainable to some extent in every case.

Not all children who are mentally retarded come from affluent families such as Pearl Buck's, Roy Rogers or President Kennedy's so the Satellite Schools have been developed to help the child and his family.

These special children have a need to be with others who, like them, have problems. This way they do not have to try to compete with odds too great and they like all of us are more comfortable with those who have something in common with them.

J.C.A.H. (Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals) sent a team from Chicago to this school to make an assessment schedule to evaluate capabilities of the individual and it is transferrable, in Texas, from one place of residence to another. Under this system the child who transfers from one school to another if the family moves can continue in the new school at the same place he left off at the old address.

Clarendon's Satellite School operates within the Curriculum Guide for the Mentally Retarded under the direction of Harry Heyman of Amarillo.

The school in Clarendon was started seven years ago in 1968 and has had as many as 20 students during the school year. Like any other school some of the students did not attend in the summer months, however the school operates 12 months of the year.

Two boys John Myers, who has been with the school seven years, and John O'Neal, who has been there five years have progressed to handling the janitor work at the school. They sweep the gym, bleachers, floors and stairways. They can sort and package materials, empty trash and tell time. They are always on time for church or school. They go places alone the same as any boy might.

Glenn lives alone, does his own cooking and laundry, has a checking account, writes checks and has a drivers license. Both of these boys are capable of doing a variety of odd jobs and they want to work.

If anyone has jobs that need doing they may call Cloe Ann Newhouse in the afternoons for more information.

The school is governed by an advisory board and the president is Rev. Weldon Rives. Money is needed for the school and is tax deductible. Volunteers are always in demand and donations of juice and cookies are most appreciated. Transportation is needed for special outings.

Two teachers Mrs. Cloe Ann Newhouse and Mrs. Pearl Hermesmeier train the children and they are making an appeal to the parents of children who are mentally retarded to make use of these facilities.

Any is welcome to come to the school at any time, but November 10-14 has been set aside for visitation week for anyone in the county, area or any reader of this newspaper.

Classrooms are in the old Clarendon College Building. If the visitor enters by the south door the rooms are the first doors on the right and on the left. Come and see the crafts made by the students or play a game of Mexican dominoes with John and Glenn.

Any wishing reassurance concerning the Satellite program may discuss the school with a minister.

Baptists In Revival Services

Rev. Doctor Virtus E. Gideon, professor of New Testament at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminar in Ft. Worth is in revival services at the Clarendon First Baptist Church through Sunday Nov. 9.

Dr. Gideon is widely traveled having been in England, France and Scotland. The time in Scotland was taken on a sabbatical for one semester. Dr. Gideon was accompanied by his family and found Scotland a most interesting place. He and his family were impressed with the warmth of personality of the Scottish people.

He has traveled extensively in the southwestern part of the United States in Bible services and various conferences.

A student of Greek Dr. Gideon stated, "Greek gives the theologian the ability to work with the basic language of the original writings of the New Testament."

As an author he has written "Luke, A Study Guide", is co-author of the "New Smith's Bible Dictionary", commentary materials in the "Living Bible Commentary", has written numerous articles and essays in theological journals and has other articles in preparation for publication

Clarendon teachers will attend the 42nd annual convention of District 16 of the Texas State Teachers Association in Amarillo Friday November 7.

For the Clarendon school students it will mean a Friday holiday while the teachers meet in general convention at the Amarillo Civic Center Coliseum beginning at 9:30 a.m. Friday morning.

Activities will begin Thursday at 6:30 when the district's House of Delegates representatives meet at Amarillo High School for a banquet and business meeting.

Special guests at the banquet will be area legislators, including State Sen. Max Sherman of Amarillo and State Reps. Phil Cates of Pampa and Bob Simpson and Ben Bynum, both of Amarillo.

Among those who will submit reports will be Johnny Leathers of Clarendon. New district officers will be elected during the business session to be held beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Following the general session, the teachers will break up into smaller groups for luncheons and sectional meetings in about 28 different city locations.

Voters Reject Constitution

Joining a statewide landslide, Donley County voters turned thumbs down on a new state charter Tuesday, crushing eight constitutional revision propositions by margins of up to 7 to 1 in a larger than expected voter turnout.

If approved the eight propositions would have done away with the state's 99 year old constitution which has been amended more than 220 times.

State news analysis pointed to Governor Dolph Briscoe's public opposition to the eight propositions as the key factor in the new charter's rejection.

Still another local leader attributed the rejection to basic grass roots opposition. "We've lived with the present constitution a long time, and although there are problems, the people feel they can be worked out, but a new constitution is an unknown and the feeling was it could do more harm than good," he explained.

But whatever the exact reasons, there can be no doubt that the people said "No" to five years of Constitutional Convention and legislative efforts to do draft a new constitution.

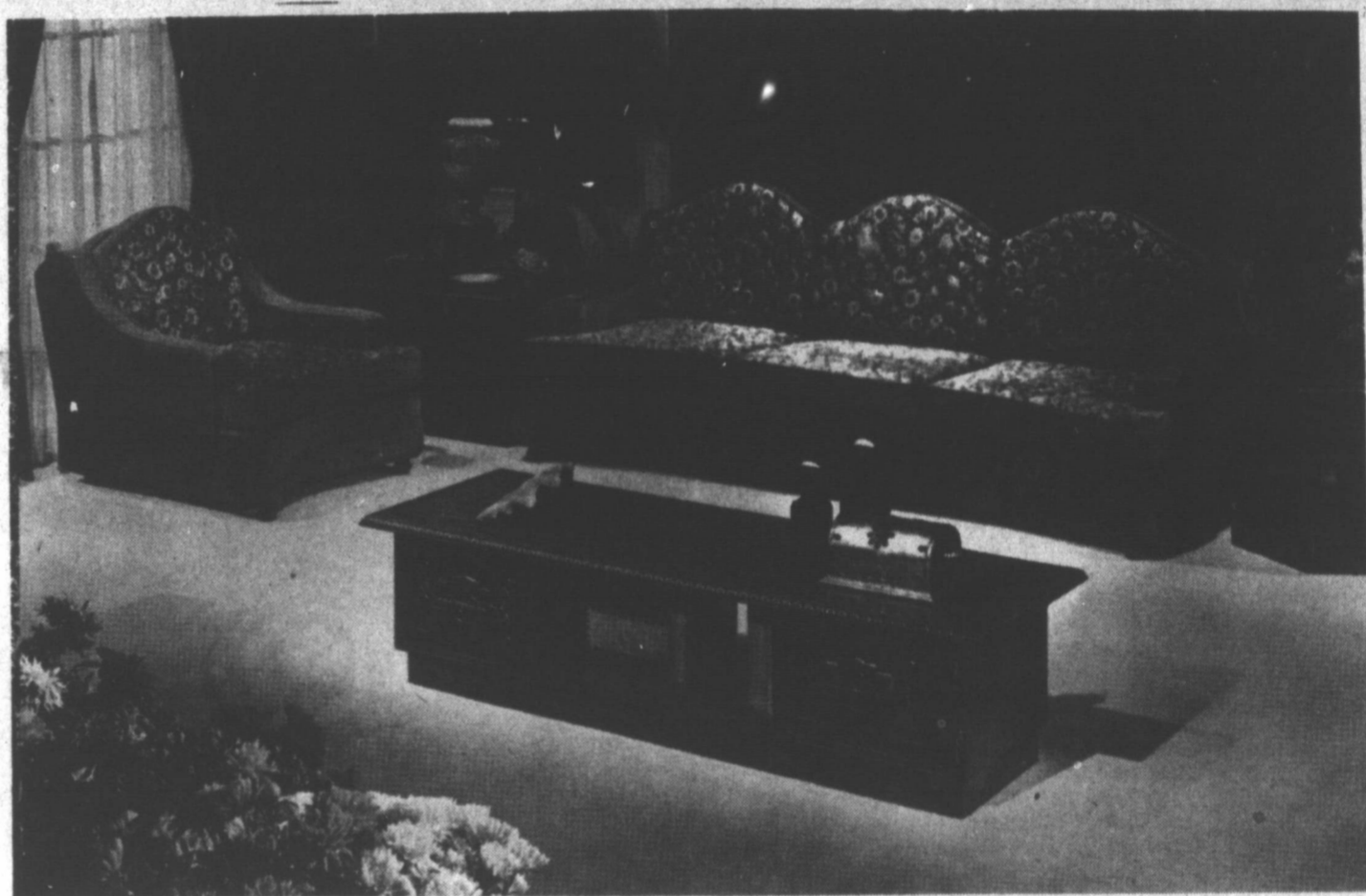

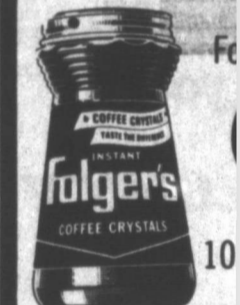

Religious Thoughts

PURPOSES OF DISCIPLINE IN THE HOME
By James O. Brandon

God tells parents to discipline their children from the background of a very thorny pathway. The Lord says that thorns and snares are in the way and he that is forward will get into them. God says that it is necessary for a person to learn how to keep his soul; therefore, He says: "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Prov. 22:5-6).

Children are not born with a highly developed sense of what is right and wrong. By nature their impulse is to take for themselves whatever attracts them and to please themselves no matter who else may be displeased in the process. It is amazing how many modern parents let their children get away with it.

It is the obligation of parents to instill in the child those principles which will transform him from a creature of personal whim and selfish impulse to a person who not only recognizes the rights of all other persons about him, but who also feels an obligation to give himself in unselfish service for their good.

Discipline in the home lays the foundation both for the further discipline which society imposes on individuals and for the discipline which God in Christ purposes for all men. For Christian parents, all discipline should have the distinct Christian objective of bringing the individual to accept the yoke of Christ.

Discipline serves many specific purposes. It teaches children respect for authority, the consequences of wrong doing, the habits of right living, the exercise of responsible freedom, and the regulation of his own behavior. Most of us grew up in a time when discipline was strict in the home. We said, "Yes Sir!" and "No Sir!" We arose to greet an older person. These are Biblical qualities which we do well to instill within our children. They didn't hurt us and they might do our children some good. Many are surprised to discover that the Bible tells the younger to arise from his seat to greet an older person. God says, "Thou shalt rise up before the hoary head, and honour the face of the old man..." (Lev. 19:32). God tells us: "He who spares the rod hates his son, but he who loves him is diligent to discipline him" (Prov. 13:24). Evidently there are a lot of parents who hate their children today, because they fail to discipline them when they need it.

In the home we need to establish realistic limitations. Some child behavior is wanted and encouraged. Some behavior is not wanted but is allowed under certain circumstances. Some behavior is not permitted and must be stopped.

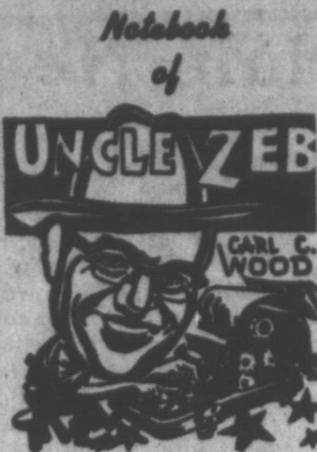
The parent should communicate what is acceptable and what is unacceptable conduct. A good rule is: "Let your eye be as your eye and your hand as your hand." In other words when you say "no!" Don't change it.

What is expected should be stated so as to minimize resentment and protect the child from embarrassment. Limitations should prevent the child from hurting others and protect the child from hurting himself.

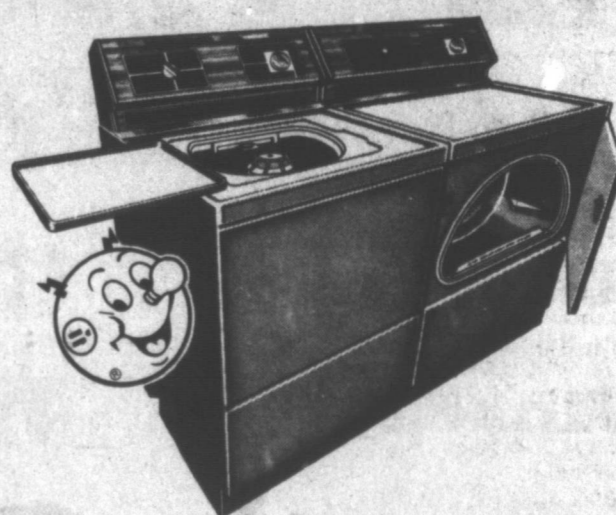

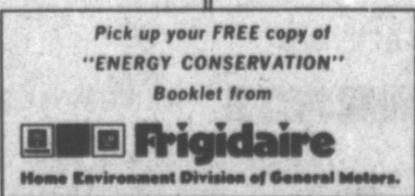

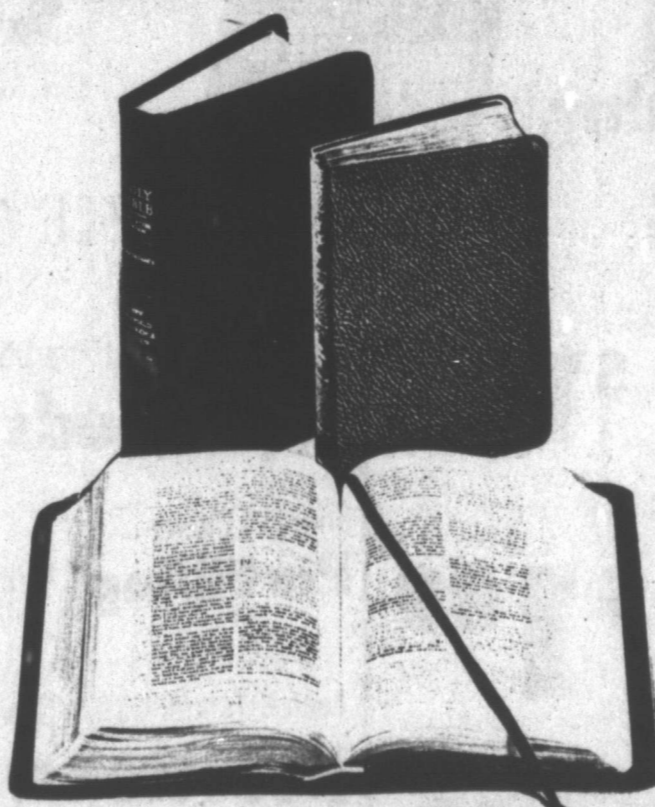

Emergency Loans Available Through FHA

More information for Donley County loan assistance is being made available for those who qualify under the designated provisions.

The Farmers Home Administration is now making emergency loans in Donley County. This action is possible because this county was declared a natural disaster area by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Mr. J. Lynn Futch, state director of FHA, said adverse weather conditions this year have caused extensive damage to local crops and farm production.

Farmers or ranchers in the designated county who have suffered losses may be eligible for Farmers Home Administration emergency

loans to cover actual physical or production losses. Other loans under the emergency program can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments to the operation.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken county will be accepted by Farmers Home Administration until December 29, 1975, for physical losses and July 29, 1976, for production losses.

Loan funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts, or to replace damaged or destroyed buildings, including homes.

Emergency loans are repayable as soon as possible

consistent with the repayment ability of borrowers. Mr. Futch said. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan. Loans covering actual losses are repayable in their entirety at an interest rate of five percent. Other loans will be made at current interest rates for long-term or short-term credit.

To be eligible for a loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from this disaster and have no other means of recovery or sources of credit.

Loans are made through local offices of the Farmers Home Administration serving the designated county. Mr. Robert A. Keown is the Donley County Supervisor and his office hours in

The Colts will be looking to up their 4-4 season record as they travel to Claude tonight. Game time 6:00.

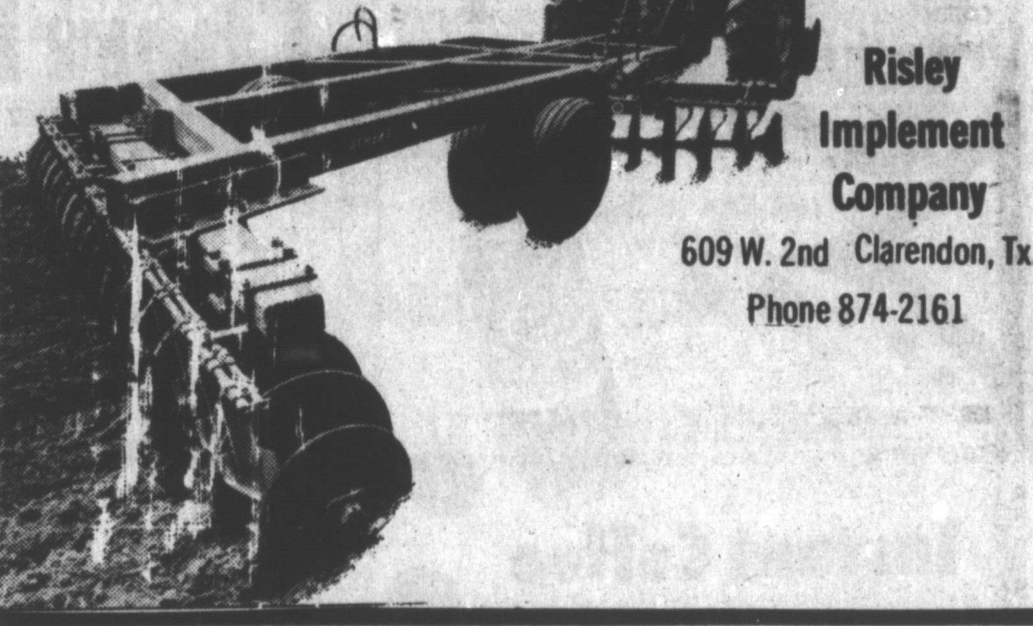



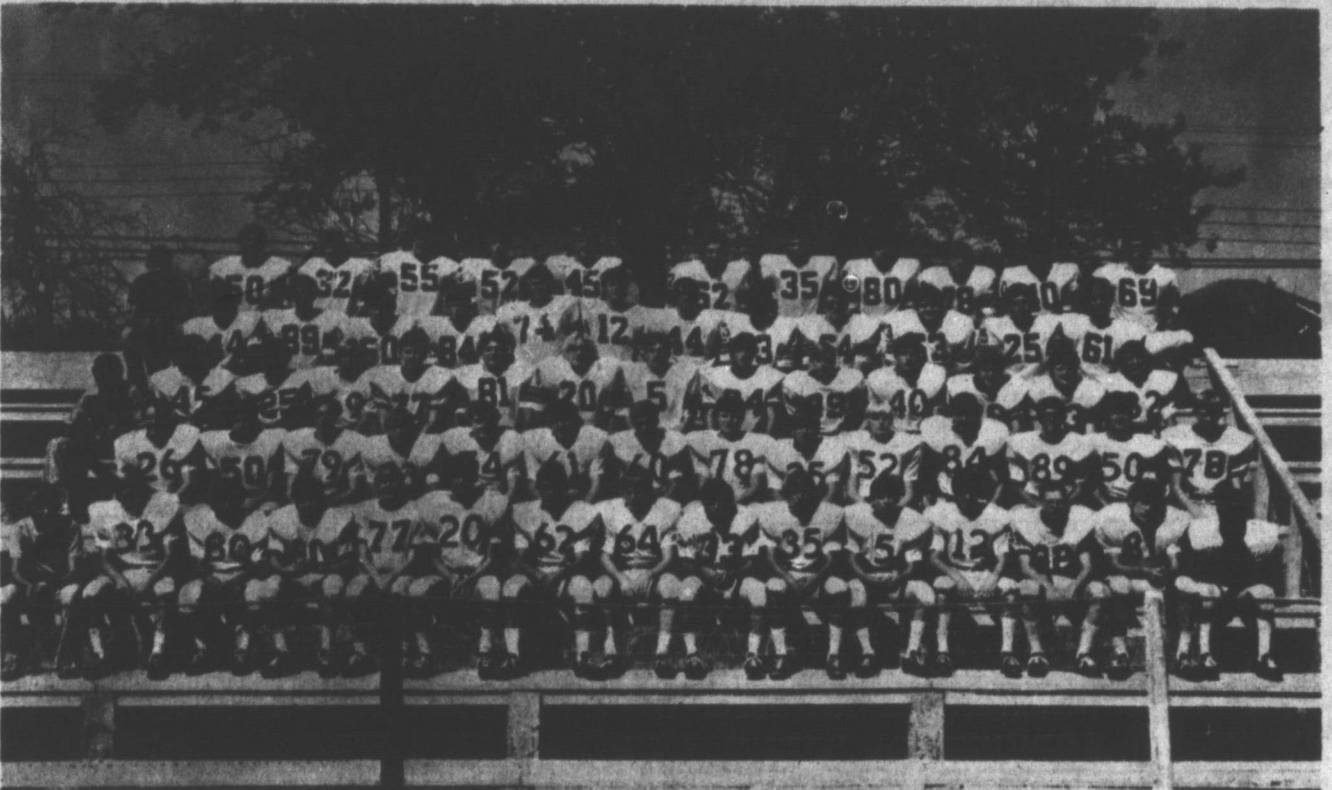

VRS Available For Vocational Adjustment Students

By James Duke

Vocational Coordinator, Eastern Panhandle Cooperative Schools

In 1962 the Division of Special Education and Vocational Rehabilitation within the Texas Education Agency developed the Cooperative School Program. The program was designed to enable local school districts to utilize Vocational Rehabilitation services for eligible handicapped students enrolled in Special Education classes in the secondary schools.

The Cooperative School Program assists educationally handicapped students

whose impairments constitute vocational and/or employment handicaps. The program serves students who are mentally retarded, physically handicapped, emotionally disturbed, minimally brain-injured, hearing impaired, and language/learning disabled.

A Texas Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor is assigned to work as needed with James Duke, the Vocational Adjustment Coordinator of the Eastern Panhandle Cooperative (Allison, Briscoe, Canadian, Clarendon, Estelline, Hedley, Higgins,

Keiton, Lakeview, Lela, McLean, Miami, Mobeetie, Quail, Samwood, Shamrock, Wellington, and Wheeler.)

The Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor can provide services such as the following, as they may be needed in addition to those which the school provides:

(a) A general medical examination by a doctor of the family's choice, to evaluate a student's physical fitness for job training and employment.

(b) Special medical examinations, if the need is indicated by the doctor who completes the general medical examination.

(c) Physical correction services involving a physical handicap that is a definite vocational handicap may be arranged for eligible students, depending on the economic need of the family.

(d) Training fees to employers and other training agencies, and training supplies that might be needed to support a student's training program. The training fees are available on a negotiated basis, and can be approved only through arrangements made with the Rehabilitation Counselor. Fees will vary according to the merits of particular training programs and the amount of time spent in training.

The Rehabilitation Counselor and Vocational Coordinator would be glad to discuss these Vocational Rehabilitation services and the Vocational Adjustment Program with any employer. There is a need for both part- and full-time on-the-job training stations for these area high school students. 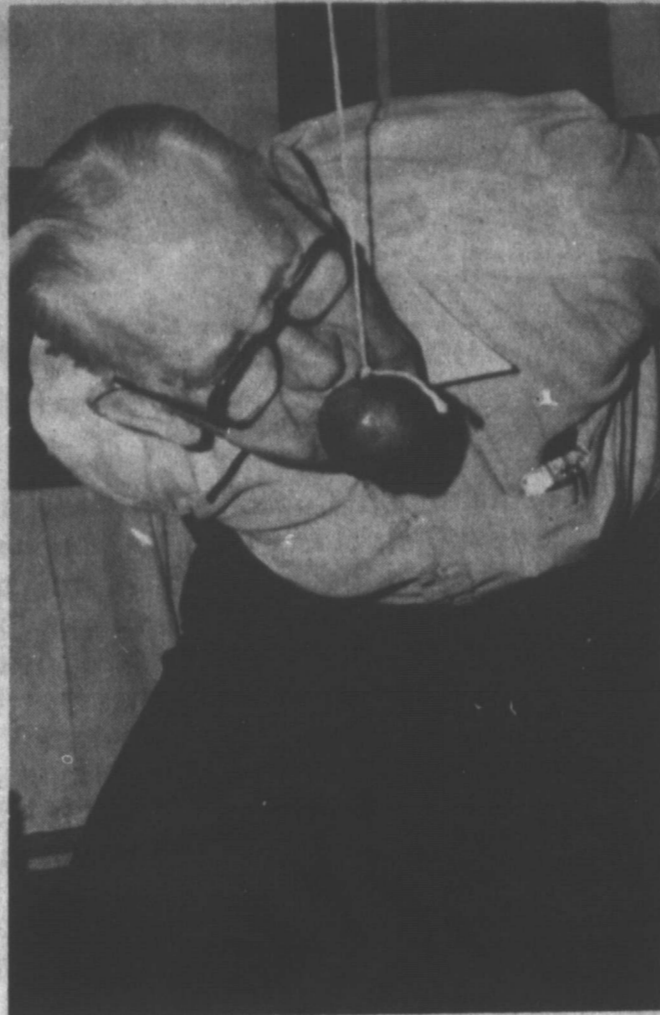

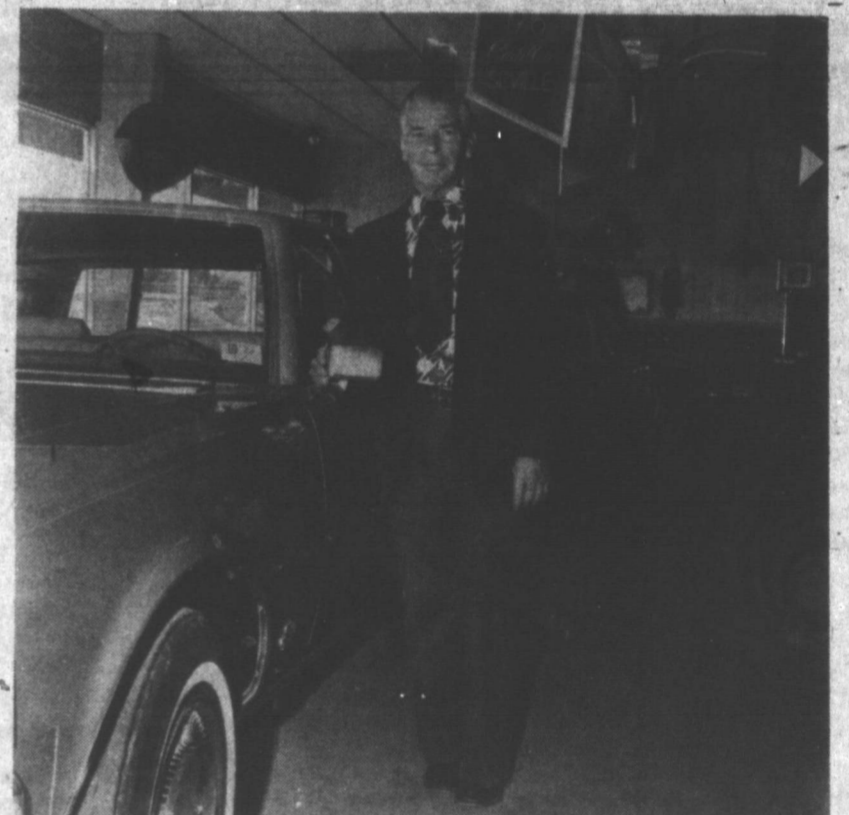
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
