

Community-Wide Thanksgiving Next Wednesday

At the November meeting of the Donley County Ministerial Alliance held at 10:00 on Wednesday, Nov. 5, at the Farmer's State Bank, preparations were finalized for the annual Thanksgiving Service.

This year it will be held at the First Christian Church, with the Rev. Mr. R.A. Nookes, minister of the Church of the Nazarene, preaching.

The Thanksgiving service will be at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 26. A large participation from the Clarendon Community is anticipated.

Rev. R.A. Nookes started his ministry in February, 1933 when he was Ordained at the District Conference of 1940, at the Olivet Nazarene College, Kankakee, Illinois. He has pastored the First Church of the Nazarene in Racine, Wisconsin, Pekin, Illinois and Havana, Illinois.

He was pastor six years at the Emmanuel Church of the Nazarene, Phoenix, Arizona. There he helped build a fifty by eighty foot church sanctuary. The Sunday school grew from a twenty four average, to an average of 169 persons for the last three years of his pastorate there. Rev. Nookes was a member of the Arizona District Church School Board for four years and served as the District Vacation Bible School Director for four years.

While pastoring the Church of the Nazarene at Burkburnett, Texas a large Sunday school and educational unit was erected. He also pastored at Fritch, Texas before coming to Clarendon in March, 1975.

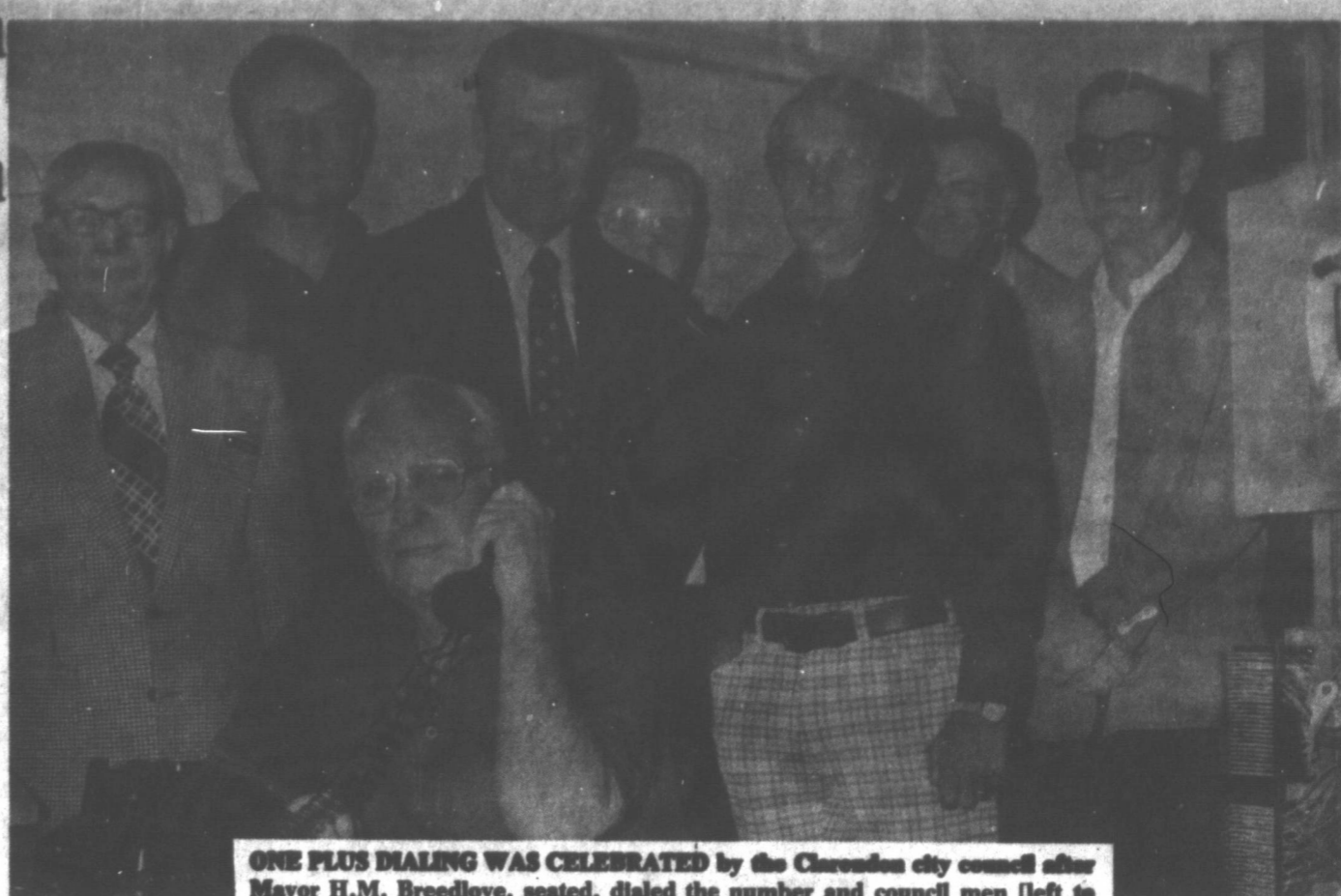
A boy and girl from each county are eligible to receive this highest county award.

COTTON HARVEST GETS UNDERWAY

Cotton harvest is just now getting started with the first hard freeze occurring about a week ago. The cotton that escaped the adverse weather earlier in the year is of good quality and the grain harvest has passed its peak with 25% of the grain yet to come in.

Paymaster Gin No. 3 at Lelia Lake has ginned 13 bales with producer credit for the first bale ginned going to Luther Butler of Lelia Lake.

In the Brice community Paymaster has ginned approximately 200 bales and the quality is reported good.

With the grain harvest 75 to 80% complete the estimates are that this year's crop is the best in 10 years.

Bolin Warehouses reported 16,000,000 pounds of grain had come in and Frank White said it was too early for him to determine the car loads since about one quarter of the grain was still out.

White said grain production was up some 40% from other years when cotton farmers who were hailed out had to replant acreage with grain.

Such good reports on the agricultural outlook will be welcomed by area residents where the financial impact of the farming community is of utmost importance.

Business of the Week

Keys—63 Years Barbering

Ralph Keys began his career in the barber shop 63 years ago when he started shining shoes as a school boy in 1912.

After shining shoes for four years, Keys started barbering when he finished High School in 1916, for Frank Whitlock. No license was required and if the aptitude was present along with the desire anyone could take up barbering.

Whitlock's barber shop was located in the general vicinity of Barbara's Fabric Shop in what was once the old Clarendon News Building

At one time Frank Whitlock had an eight chair shop in the building where Saye's is now. Several other shops in town brought the total of barber chairs to about 20.

Population in the county was considerably greater in those days with five to six thousand persons living in it. There was not too much traveling either and during the week, the barbers had little to do but on Saturday the shops stayed open until midnight and the business was booming. All the patrons from the farms and ranches

came to town on Saturday to do their buying.

Clarendon College was a four year Methodist school at that time and all the girls from the college came to the barber shop to have their hair cut. Short hair had just become stylish and some times as many as 12 or 15 girls would come at a time to have a haircut. This was the era of the flappers.

Even with 18 or 20 barbers in town they were all busy. The beauty shop had yet to become an important

business.

After some years Keys leased a building from Mrs. John Potts, whose husband had been a barber and started his own shop in the building next door to Pittman's Cleaners. That building has recently been razed.

With the popularity of the burr haircut came a problem for Ralph Keys. Some of the young customers ordered the "burr" without checking at home first. Ralph solved that problem by demanding a note from parents with permission to cut the hair as the youngster requested.

Changes were made and had to be adjusted to. "I don't recall the exact year that barbers licenses were first needed," Keys said, "If you had barbered as long as two years you weren't required to take the examination to get one."

Another change came when Ralph bought the Adams barber shop in what is now part of Clifford Grocery Building. When Clifford's bought that building, he moved to the north side of the Mulkey Theatre. In 1965 he moved into the present building when Minnie Gerdes moved her beauty shop to her home.

Clarendon has any number of men who are fifty years old who got their first haircut from Ralph Keys and he has been cutting it ever since. He has given away a lot of gum too as a reward for being still enough to let him give a haircut. The barber business has dwindled in the past few years. Shaves used to run to 25 or 30 a day as compared to two or three a week now. The hair cutting business has dwindled too, with some men letting it grow and others going to the beauty shop to have it styled.

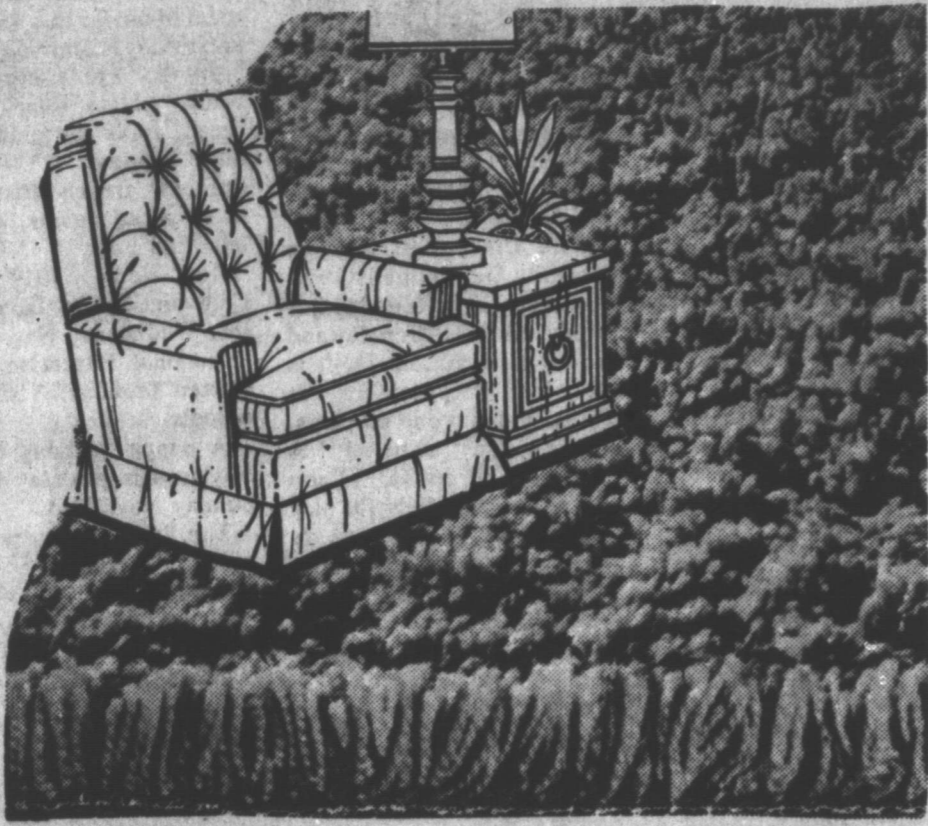

Cynthia's Clever Clues

I want to congratulate Mark Mann and Mary Joe Hermesmyer upon the Gold Star Award they received at the District I 4-H Gold Star Banquet Monday in Amarillo. We all had a very enjoyable evening.

With Thanksgiving right on our heels, my attention goes to a big turkey dinner and pumpkin pies. This recipe for pumpkin bread may hit the spot with you if you dislike pies.

"Pumpkin Bread"

¾ cup shortening
2 ½ cups sugar
4 eggs
2 cups or 1-pound can pumpkin
(Cooked, mashed carrots or winter squash may be substituted)
¾ cup water

3 ½ cups flour, sifted
2 teaspoons soda
1 ½ teaspoons salt
½ teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon cloves
¾ cup coarsely chopped nuts.

Cream shortening and sugar. Stir in eggs, pumpkin and water. Sift together flour, soda, salt, baking powder, cinnamon and cloves. Blend into a smooth dough. Stir in chopped nuts and raisins. Fill baking pans about three-fifths full. Place baking pan in center of preheated oven, at 350 degree F. Bake large loaves 60-70 minutes, or until a clean wooden pick inserted into center of bread comes out clean. Remove from oven. Let stand five minutes in pan. Remove from pan and cool. Yields: 2 loaves 9x5x3; 3 loaves 8½x4½x2½; 4 no. 2½ can-size breads; or 30 cupcakes.

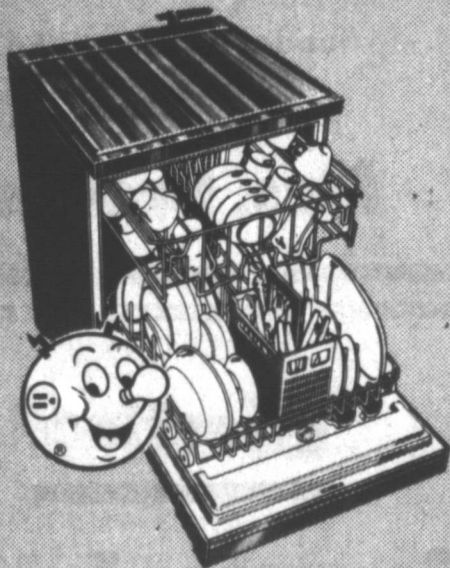

Skelton Rites Held In Temple


Clarence E. Skelton, 93, died Tuesday, November 11, 1975 in Temple, Texas.

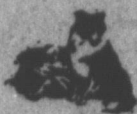

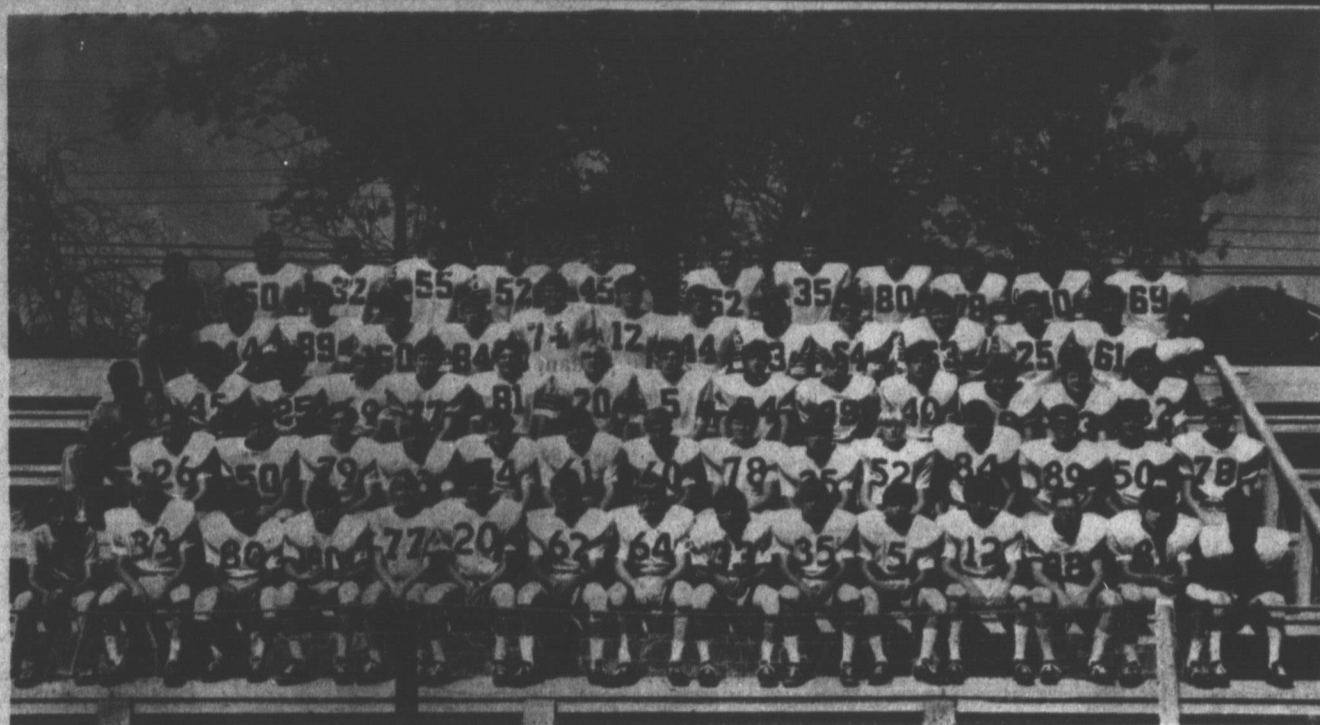
