Bains Business Began With Soda Fountain Trade

An old fashioned soda fountain and an experienced "soda jerk" coupled with 30 years of drugs and sundries 'know how' has made Bains Fountain and Gifts, with Pud Bain behind the fountain and Alyne taking care of the drug store side, a landmark on highway 287 between Amarillo and Wichita Falls.

Alyne and Pud (James) Bain began their married life in Clarendon working in Bain's Cafe, owned by the Bain brothers. Pud learned the secret of 'the best hamburgers in town' 50 years ago and already had a reputation to uphold when he and Alyne married.

Although the cafe sold soon after they were married and for some years Pud was in the cattle buying and selling business, the knack of short order cooking remained with him. Pud makes his malts and shakes with real ice cream and still butters the bread for his sandwiches. The meat he uses for hamburgers is bought and used up each day and the meat patties are turned once on the grill to keep the flavor and moistness in.

Bain's Fountain and Gifts is known as far away as California. One tourist family discovered the store by accident when they stopped in Clarendon enroute to Dallas from California. For the past three years they have come to Clarendon to enjoy "Americas favorite" a hamburger and a malt, and the nostalgia of the old time fountain.

Alyne first worked in the drugstore owned by George Norwood and located on the site now cated on the site now occupied by John's. When Norwood sold to Mike Thornberry Alyne stayed and worked on the drug side for Thornberry as she had Norwood.

When the drug store sold again to Steve Owens of Wellington, Alyne was made manager of the store for Owens and held the position for 19 years. About five years ago Pud retired from the cattle business and came into the drugstore to help.

Owens moved his store out in 1971 and Pud and Alyne Bain bought the fixtures from him, moved into the present location and went into business for themselves. They already owned the building, known to Clarendonites as the Latson Building.

The decision not to have a pharmacy, enabled them to spend a great deal more on the gift department of the store by enlarging the stock, and to add to the list of patented medicines in the store. Bain's features Du Barry cosmetics, the brand Alyne has sold for 30 years and still likes best. A full line of greeting cards, the only outlet in Clarendon for Pangburn's Candy, a complete line of men's gifts, stationary, toys and jewelry make gift selection or personal shopping pleasant and rewarding at Bain's.

True to the tradition of a drugstore, a stock of magazines and books of young and old is available. Toys are carried the year around and are of the birthday variety, nice enough to be special and inexpensive enough to be practical for the buyer.

Listing all of the gift items would be impossible, however several are noteworthy. Frances Denney colognes are carried in the cosmetics line and Fenton glassware is being offered in the gift department. Fenton glassware is handmade, some of the

DONLEY IN COTTON HARVEST

Cotton harvest is well on the downhill side of the season this week as cool, clear weather favored the scores of mechanical cotton pickers and strippers in Donley County cotton fields.

Almost 4,000 bales of the estimated 5,000 bales to be harvested in the county have been ginned with most of the balance of the crop to be out of the fields by January 1, weather permitting.

Because of the unseasonable rains back in July, the crop is about 40 percent less than nor-

mal this year. However fall, weather was ideal for cotton and the cotton that was left in the fields is producing good yields.

Cynthia's Clever Clues

After holiday dinners, the table cloth may seem 'doomed' -- but if stains are treated while still fresh, generally they can be removed.

Methods for treating common holiday-type stains depend on what the stain is. A few general hints are:

--Test any stain remover on a corner of fabric first.
--Do not add chlorine bleach to an enzyme pre-soak product.
--When blotting stains, blot from the outside toward the center of the stain to prevent it from spreading further.

Treat stains from the back of the fabric. Place the spot downward on some paper towels so that the stain will come off the fabric instead of going through it.

Turning to specific stains, for fruit, where boiling water can be used, pour it through the cloth. If stains remain, sponge with lemon juice solution or hydrogen peroxide. If boiling water cannot be used, sponge well in cool water. Work glycerine into stain. Let stand several hours, then add a few drops of white vinegar and rinse thoroughly. Launder.

For gravy or milk, use an enzyme pre-soak with cool water or make a paste of detergent and water and work that into the stain. Then launder. If the stain remains, use a dry cleaning solvent.

Sponge wine or soft drink stains immediately with cool water, then glycerine and water. Rinse with vinegar water followed by a clear rinse. Launder.

Some drink stains are invisible after they dry but turn yellow with aging or heating. And this yellow stain is impossible to remove.

For coffee or tea stains, if safe for fabric, stretch cloth and pour boiling water through. Launder, using bleach or an enzyme pre-soak.

When candle wax has dripped on the tablecloth, scrape off as much as possible, then place the stain between paper towels and press with a warm iron. Next, place fabric stain side down on paper towels and sponge the back with a dry cleaning solvent. Let dry, then launder. If stains remain, launder again with an oxygen bleach.

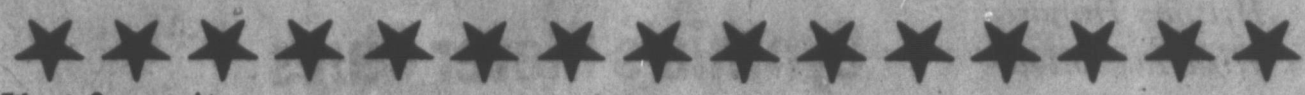

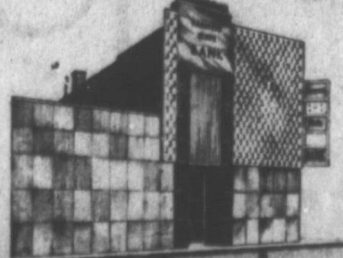

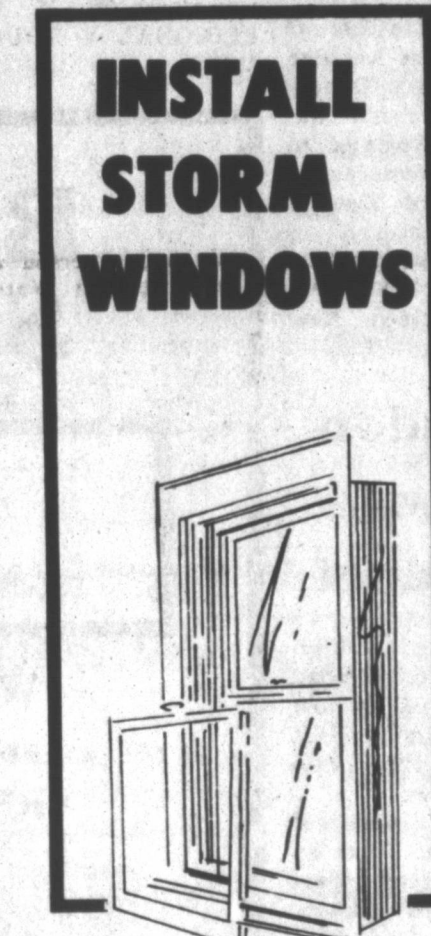

Victories For CC Seen In Spring

Clarendon College women's basketball team traveled to Altus, Oklahoma December 5 to face earlier beaten Western Oklahoma. In a thrilling finish Jewell Waggoner, in the last nine seconds sank a 12 footer to lead the women to a 74-73 victory over W.O. Those scoring in double figures were Ann Vincent high point with 21, Teresa Condren with 12, Mickey Henderson with 11 and Debra Culpepper with 10. The team selected Ann Vincent outstanding players for that game. This evened CJC season record to two wins and three losses.

On December 11 Clarendon faced Howard County in their second conference game of the year. To defeat them, Micky Henderson led the team with 17 points and Clarendon outscored their opponents 86-43.
