

Press launches Bicentennial project

Clarendon pictorial history planned

An official bicentennial photographer was named and plans made this week for the most ambitious presentation of Clarendon, Texas USA in history -- "Clarendon 1976."

This pictorial and narrative publication will provide the most exhaustive study of a community in Texas during the Bicentennial Year.

Launched this week by the Clarendon Press, the project will include the most complete photographic coverage of Clarendon ever attempted.

Named as official Bicentennial photographer is Jim Vaughan, owner of Webb Studio of Childress who operates one of north west Texas' most sophisticated color photography services.

Working through the Clarendon Press, Vaughan will spend the next five months photographing every aspect of Clarendon life.

The proposal is to photograph every business and industry, church, social and civic organization, city and county officials, as well as schools, farms and ranches.

The Clarendon Press will be seeking the cooperation of all the community to obtain the photographs which will be used in the voluminous Bicentennial Edition and

then maintained in a special historic file for posterity.

The photographs will be made at no charge to any of the participants and only their time and cooperation will be requested. The Clarendon Press will arrange for scheduling for the photographs which will be made both in color and in black and white. Vaughan said that special arrangements will be made for the color portraits and photographs to be made available to any who might want them.

The only limit on the number of photographs to be made will be the time and Vaughan said that he and his associates will be available to make photographs at a special studio here or "on location" anywhere in the community.

Sunday school classes, official boards of churches and in many cases entire congregations will be photo-

graphed for posterity.

The publishers of the Clarendon Press pointed out that "1976 is an historic year and in a real sense we are making history. In future years the records gathered and the pictorial scenes of the community will provide invaluable source material for other historians as they attempt to reconstruct life in Clarendon this Bicentennial year."

Another Bicentennial project getting underway this week is the gathering of data for the honor roll of Clarendon High School graduates through the years and the current addresses of as many graduates as can be located.

A file card of more than 4,000 graduates will be made

and local families as well as other readers of the Clarendon Press here and around the world are urged

to call in addresses for our files.

While telephone calls are solicited, the newspaper would prefer a post card or letter with the correct information written to help eliminate error.

Along with the Bicentennial Edition, a directory of Clarendon High School graduates will be published and given free to every subscriber of the Clarendon Press.

Suggestions for possible photographs are being accepted and letters from readers are sincerely solicited.

The Bicentennial Edition and the other Bicentennial material will be published on July 1 to coincide with whatever county-wide Independence Day Celebration is planned.

New semester begins for Clarendon College, activities outlined

Classes for Clarendon College's spring semester got underway Tuesday with enrollment figures not completely tabulated but pointing towards possible the largest spring enrollment ever for CC.

Enrollment was up both on campus and in the college's extension classes offered in area towns, according to Dean of Students Loyd Waters. "Right now we're very optimistic about our enrollment figures," he said.

Waters said total enrollment could even approach the 560 figure set last fall. Spring enrollment is traditionally less than the fall in colleges and universities.

In addition to the regularly scheduled classes, the col-

lege is offering 47 night classes including out of town classes offered in Pampa, Memphis, McLean, Shamrock, Wellington, Valley and Childress.

For the first time this semester, four day classes

will also be offered in Pampa.

Clarendon college dorm space was filled near capacity, Waters said. As of Tuesday, only twenty rooms remained to be occupied out of the 190 available in three dorms.

The first week back for CC students will culminate Friday night with the traditional rivalry game between the Bulldogs and Amarillo College. The game is set to begin at 8 p.m. in the college gymnasium.

All upcoming college events have not been scheduled completely, Waters said, but two major productions by the college drama and fine arts departments are set including a Bicentennial production March 11 - 12. A spring drama production scheduled for April 29 - 30 is also currently in the planning stages.

George Stewart, chairman of the fine arts division and drama instructor, said planning for the Bicentennial production is currently underway. The show will involve all students participating in the fine arts at CC, including the drama department, the stage band and members of both the choir and the smaller singing

group. The production will use an original script based upon both historical material and traditional American folklore.

The drama dept. will also present their annual spring play April 29 - 30. Stewart

said a work had not been selected yet for the production.

Fine art events will end this semester with an end of school concert May 4 by the Music Dept.

Other college activities set

for the coming semester include the resumption of golf competition for the CC team Feb. 27.

Next vacation for Clarendon College students will be a ten day spring break beginning April 9.

Bank figures up in 1975

Statements of Condition released recently by both Clarendon Banks show a general increase in the three major areas of banking liabilities generally considered to be the strength of a bank: capital stock, surplus and undivided profits and reserves.

The statements were figures of Donley County State Bank and Farmers State Bank's resources and liabilities from January till December 1975. Increases noted are over the banking year dating from January till December of 1974.

In addition to these three areas, total amount of deposits also increased in both the Donley County State

Bank and the Farmers State Bank.

A local bank spokesman said all these increases were particularly remarkable because, in terms of banking, 1974 was an easier year to make a profit because of the higher interest rates required on loans and the high return on investments. Despite conditions not as favorable, area banks still generally managed to increase their surplus and undivided profits and reserves.

Banking figures of the surplus and the undivided profits and reserves reflect basically money made by the bank through investments and services. Surplus figures

for Farmers State showed an increase of \$50,000 over the \$400,000 1974 figure. Donley County State Bank's surplus figures were up to \$314,000 in 1975 as compared to \$300,000 in 1974.

In the undivided profits and reserves category, Farmers State was up \$448,507.90 in 1975 from their \$374,812.51 worth in 1974. Donley County State figures dropped in 1975's total of \$277,025.26 from the 1974 amount of \$327,175.44.

A compilation of the three major areas of monetary strength of both banks shows a total capital account figure for Farmers State of \$1,098,507.90 and \$991,025.26 for Donley County

State Bank.

Deposit totals were also up for both banks. Farmers State showed an increase with their current \$13,520,828.14 total over the previous year's sum of \$11,956,181.61. Donley County State Bank's 1975 total was also up with deposits of \$7,761,437.29. Previous year's total was \$6,769,334.69.

A spokesman said local bank increases could be attributed in part to the diversity of business and agriculture in the Clarendon area. If one particular facet has had a bad year, chances are good another area of business will be doing well, thus balancing the economy.

Bradshaw's Country Kitchen profiled in business feature

Looking for a partner in the restaurant business in 1969, Sibyl Cash found Ola Bradshaw interested and they combined to open Sibyl's Country Kitchen on Highway 287 in October of that year.

The location chosen was a building owned by John Jones and was part of the J. & W. Lumber Co. A section of the lumber yard space was remodeled into quarters for the new restaurant by Jones and the business was begun.

Sibyl Cash had been in the restaurant business before and had some equipment and fixtures for the building. Ola's family reacted with shocked surprise upon learning of her decision to go into the business, however, once they recovered from their surprise they supported her and she supplied her share of other needed fixtures for the opening, Oct. 18, 1969.

Ola Bradshaw was prompted to begin work by several things. The children were grown, Brad, her husband, had sold his Borden milk business of 25 years and now she had little to keep her constructively occupied.

Hardly 16 months after the opening of Sibyl's Country Kitchen, Ola bought out Sibyl's interest and it became Bradshaw's Country Kitchen. Selma Kennedy, Ola's sister, had come to Clarendon from Lakeview about a month after the business started and began helping Ola when the restaurant became Bradshaw's Country Kitchen. She has stayed and is now irreplaceable Ola said.

Food as a business seemed natural for Mrs. Bradshaw. "Cooking is always a

pleasure," she said, "I don't know of anything I enjoy doing more."

Serving the noon buffet was Ola's idea when the Country Kitchen opened and has always proved to be popular with patrons. Ola said about 65 per cent of the noon customers are served from the buffet. Other popular food items are the homemade bread, fresh every day, pepper steak and Fridays, fish. Mexican dinners are a specialty of the house and Ola said are a great favorite with her customers.

From the opening to the present time business has been good at the Country Kitchen. The location has been one factor, Ola said. Tourists also help the business.

Ola said she feels extremely lucky with her current help, most of whom have been with her for about three years. Staff members include Katie Phillips, Mary Moore, Peggy Smith, Georgia Robertson Speed and Mrs. Lee Muse.

In addition to the regular employees Bradshaw's Country Kitchen also hires college and high school girls.

Part of the pleasure of the job for Ola is meeting the variety of persons who come in as well as seeing familiar faces often she explained.

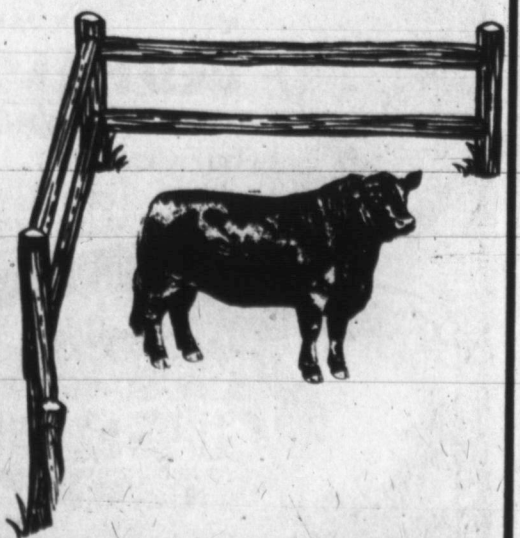

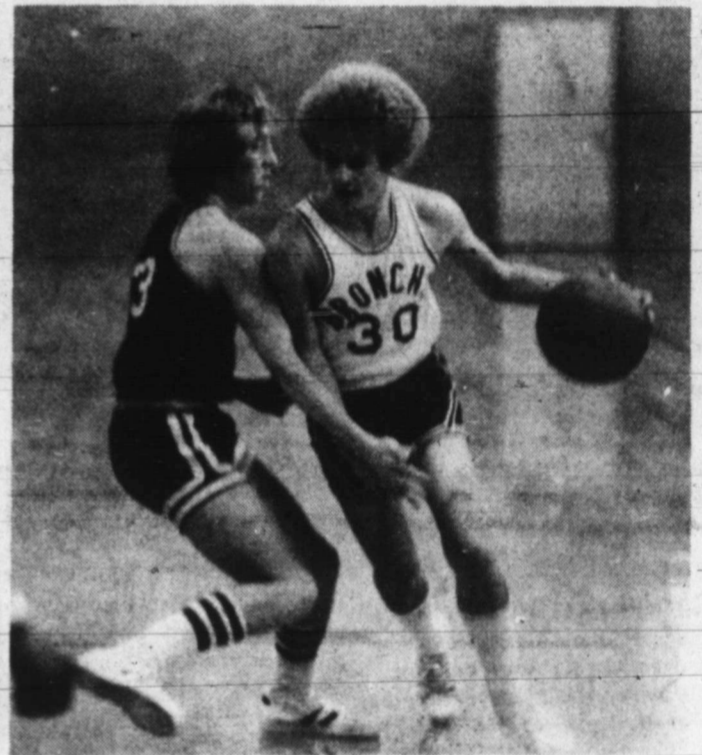
Clarendon's freshmen basketball team traveled to

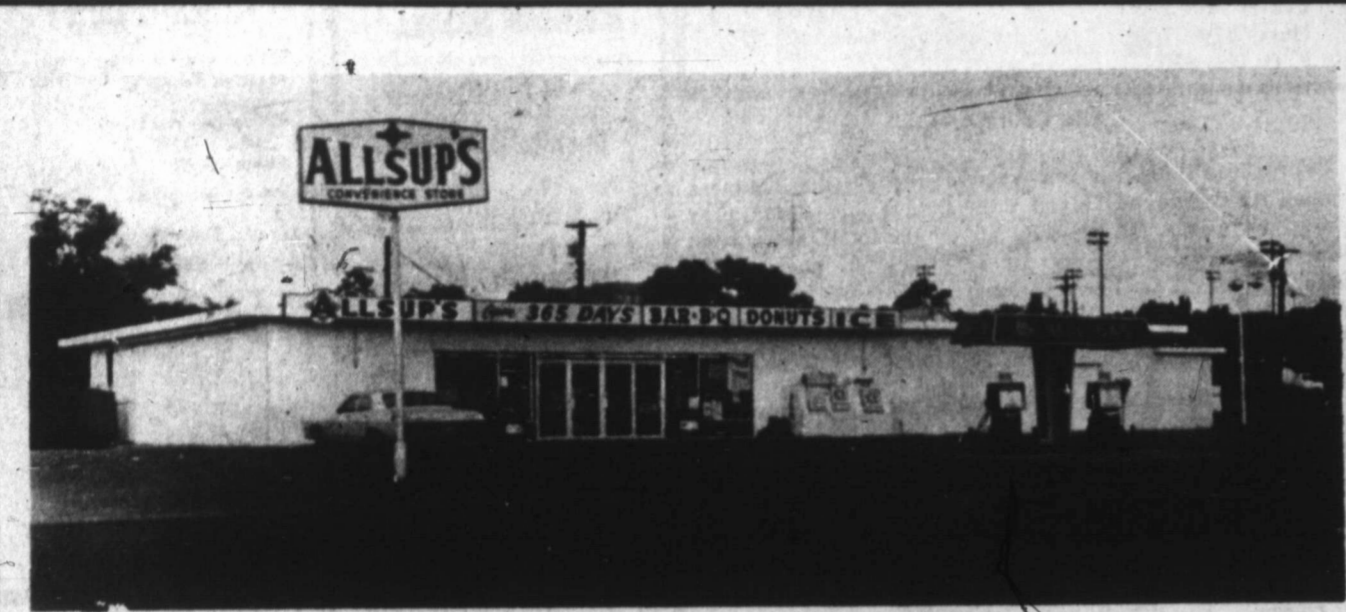
