

Precinct commissioners meet

Clarendon's Commissioners Court had their regular monthly meeting Monday with commissioners from all four Donley County precincts in attendance along with Judge Billy Cristal.

New business dealt with at the meeting included guidelines for the spending power of each precinct commissioner; establishing rates for public use of county employees services and equipment; and setting the County tax rate for 1976.

Guidelines were set concerning the amount of money county commissioners can spend without obtaining an order from the commissioners court. The court voted to set the purchasing power of each commissioner without the court's approval at \$3,000 or less. The court also voted to allow commissioners to sell county equipment valued under \$500 without obtaining an order from the

commissioners court.

The court set rates to be charged when county equipment or employees were used to perform work contracted by private individuals or businesses. These prices were set at a rate that would not be competitive with private contractors who perform similar work. Rate prices will be \$25 an hour for public use of County maintainers and \$15 an hour for use of County backhoe excavating machines.

The tax rate for Donley County was retained at the same rate as 1975 by the commissioners. Tax rate total is \$1.39 per \$100 evaluation of taxable property for each resident of the county. This figure breaks down to 95 cents for the general fund; 30 cents for the maintenance of county farm to market roads; and 14 cents for the maintenance of

Highway 287 from Clarendon to Memphis.

In other business, the court decided to:

--authorize Judge Cristal to notify the State Dept. of Welfare that space is currently available in the County Courthouse for the offices of the local welfare representatives.

--decided to stop maintenance of a dirt road near Hedley.

--appointed three people to serve on the County's grievance committee.

--authorized the sale of a county car which had belonged to Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Jr. Sealed bids for the car are current being accepted by the county.

The next regular meeting of the commissioners court will be March 8, however, there will be a special meeting Feb. 23 for the opening of bids on the car to be sold.

Clarendon Hatchery business changed with the years

In its heyday, Clarendon Hatchery hatched and shipped 50,000 baby chicks a week, but now, according to hatchery owner Frank White Jr., "It's not a paying business."

White's not complaining, however, for in the meantime he's branched out his

business interests to include a ranch in South Dakota, the Clarendon grainery elevator plus a flourishing fertilizer and farm chemical business where the hatchery used to be. He stopped shipping chicks in 1955, but he still calls his business the Clarendon Hatchery. "I guess I ought to have that

changed," he said.

Perhaps he leaves it the way it is in memory of the business that gave him his start. In the late twenties White was told by a friend about the financial possibilities of running a baby chick hatchery. As a result, in 1929

he opened up the Clarendon Hatchery. "It wasn't all gravy," he said. "Through the early thirties we had some hard times, but eventually it got to be a flourishing business."

At one time, White said, the Hatchery mailed out over 20,000 catalogues advertising its chicks throughout the United States. He owned three large chick incubators in Clarendon plus one more in Shamrock. Each had the capacity to incubate 56,000 eggs every three weeks.

In the beginning, these incubators were heated by a steam process. Temperature inside them must remain at a constant 99 degrees. The steam heating was later replaced with electrical heating.

Chicks were shipped all over Texas from Clarendon in addition to numerous other states including California, Oklahoma and Louisiana. White said 100 chicks could be shipped in a ventilated cardboard box. A baby chicken can live for 36 hours after birth without food or water because of the amount of yolk left in its body. White said some have lived as long as 48 hours.

"But then the hatchery business got to where it just wasn't a paying deal

anymore," White said. White phased out the chick business and devoted more time to his other business interests. In 1956 he built the Clarendon grain elevator. The hatchery business now is mainly the selling of grain and seed and farm chemicals and fertilizer.

Longtime employees at the hatchery are B.R. Mears, who started work for White when the Hatchery first opened in 1929, and White's brother Glenn, who joined the Clarendon business in 1959.

Other employees at the store include Stanley Wilson, who has worked there for the past two years, and V.T. Maxey, a part-time worker in the store.

White and his wife Dorothy have one son, Frank White III, a chemical engineer currently living in Houston. White attended the University of Texas at Austin and Clarendon College. He received his BA degree from West Texas State in 1936. "Out of all those graduating ceremonies," White said, "one thing a man said stuck with me. He said 'the guy that's going to get the raise is the one that does more than he gets paid for. That's what I've tried to do.'"

CC spring enrollment up

Enrollment at Clarendon College is up 23 per cent over spring of 1975 according to final figures released by the Registrar's Office at the college.

A total of 512 students are enrolled this spring com-

pared to 418 last spring. Figures indicate that enrollment increased both in on-campus and off-campus programs, of the 512 students, 322 are enrolled in classes at Clarendon and 190 in off-campus locations.

Academic programs have an enrollment of 431

students, and increase of 13 per cent over last spring, and vocational - technical programs are up by 17 per cent with 81 enrolled.

Clarendon College has off-campus classes in Pampa, McLean, Valley High, Childress, Memphis, Shamrock and Wellington.

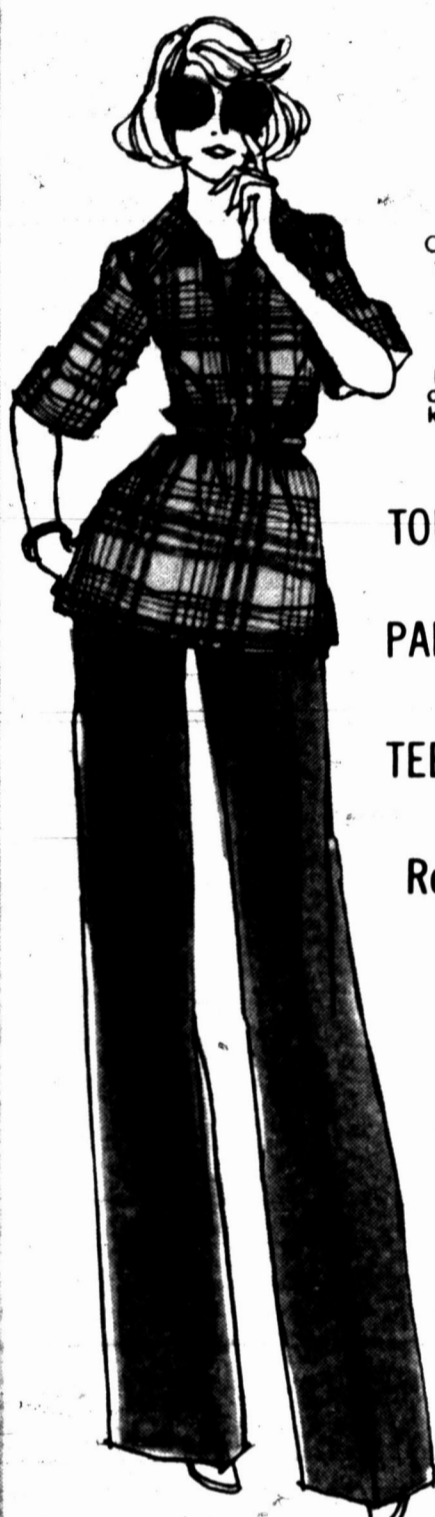



History researched by college instructor

Scouting in Clarendon dates back to late 1900's

The first Boy Scout Troop in Clarendon was formed in 1912 or 1913. The troop scoutmaster was W.J. (Bill) Stubbiefield. The troop was sponsored by The Methodist Episcopal Church South; the Methodist minister was H.M. Long. The troop committee was composed of Dr. Stocking, J.M. Stubbiefield, and H.M. Long. There were seventeen members in this troop. Some of the members were: Forrest Sawyer, Barcus Antrobus, Bill Clifford, George Clifford, Roger Stone and Collis Stocking. The first scoutmaster, W.J. (Bill) Stubbiefield, presently lives in White Deer.

Another Boy Scout Troop in Clarendon was formed in 1924, 1925 or 1926. Troop number was Troop 2 and was directed by Brother Hamblin. The scoutmaster in 1929 was Dentil R. Davis. There was no assistant scout-

ter. Homer Estlack of Clarendon was a member of this troop in 1929-1930.

A Theory concerning the origin of Troop 2 in Clarendon is that around 1925 or 1926 Boy Scout headquarters were established in Memphis. Theory has it that Troop 1 was in Memphis, Troop 2 in Clarendon and Troop 3 in Wellington.

There have been five scouting troops in Clarendon. There were no troops from the late 1930's up until 1945. In 1946 Troop 37 was sponsored by the American Legion. The scoutmaster was Reverend Charlie Robinson who was the minister of the St. John's Episcopal Church. Reverend Robinson served as scoutmaster for about one year until Warren Fry took over. He was the rector of the St. John's Episcopal Church. This troop fizzled in 1947. There was no active scouting in Clarendon until Lee Bell

took over from 1949 till 1950. Around 1951, Paul Schull took over Troop 37. Clydie Price was assistant scoutmaster for both Bell and Schull.

Sometime during 1952 and 1957 Troop 38 was formed with Truett Behrens scoutmaster and Donald Smith, assistant scoutmaster. Troop 38 was sponsored by the Methodist men. In 1951 and 1952 Troop 37 and Troop 38 were both active in Clarendon. Sometime during 1953 Troop 37 gained the remaining active members of Troop 38 to become members of Troop 37. The scoutmaster was J.B. Melton. This troop became inactive in 1954. In February of 1956 Clydie Price, Oliver J. Able and C.A. Pitts, all experienced scout men, reorganized the scouting program. The Methodist men sponsored Troop 37. Pitts' two sons, Donald and David, had been awarded the Eagle rank

because of scouting work in Mason. This gave the Clarendon Troop two Eagle Scouts who served as junior leaders.

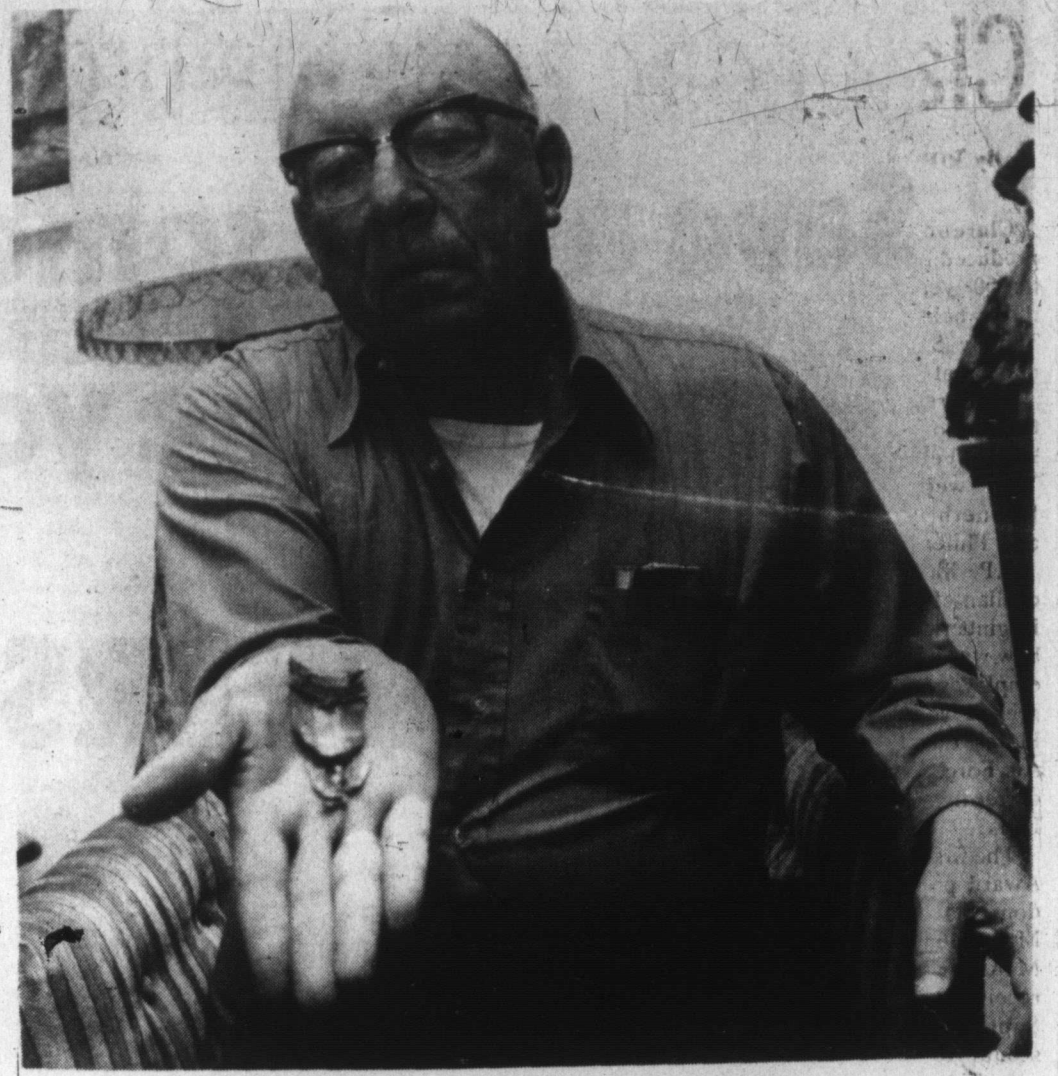
Oliver Able became the scoutmaster of Troop 37 in 1956, and Gene Long and Clydie Price were assistant scoutmasters with C.A. Pitts chairman of the Troop Committee. Up to this time no modern day Eagle Scouts had been produced by Clarendon Scouting. In 1957 Able turned the troop over to Gene Long. Gene Long acted as scoutmaster, assisted by Jay Gould. Able re-assumed the job as scoutmaster in 1958.

The next scoutmaster was Billy Jack Land. He was the scoutmaster from 1959 through 1965. He was assisted by Hubert Kidd. When Billy Jack Land's troop members aged, the membership divided and this troop was phased out in 1966. In 1960 Troop 38 was reorgan-

ized and was sponsored by the Lion's Club Scoutmaster was Mike McCully. This troop was active until 1964 when it ceased operation.

In November 1962, Troop 33 was organized and sponsored by the First Christian Church of Clarendon. The scoutmaster was Paul Hancock. He was assisted by E.H. (Curly) Monroe. In November 1963 E.H. (Curly) Monroe was scoutmaster and was assisted by Tommy Saye until Tommy Saye took over in November 1966. Tommy Saye is presently scoutmaster of Troop 33, assisted by Allen Estlack, Terry Ashcraft and Claude Thomas.

Early Eagle Scout J.P. Rhoades

Clarendon man among first Eagle Scout honorees in Panhandle

Clarendon was represented by three Eagle Scout awardees at the first presentation of that rank in the Panhandle back in the late 1920s.

One of those first Eagle scouts has now returned to live in Clarendon, J.P. Rhoades, called 'Jake' or 'Dusty' Rhoades, depending upon when and where you knew him. Rhoades has done a lot of traveling, mainly as an engineer in the Army's Corps of Engineers. His jobs with the Corps. have taken him from Japan, to France,

to Greece, to Crete, to Turkey, and now back full circle to Clarendon.

Rhoades was presented the rank of Eagle Scout in Amarillo along with a large group of other Panhandle scouts in the Ballroom of old Amarillo Hotel.

"Of course, that was over fifty years ago," Rhoades said. "It taxes the memory a little to think back that far." He said he remembers hitch-hiking to Amarillo with another Clarendon Eagle Scout, Kenneth 'Pinkie' Kerbow. Phifer Estlack was the third Eagle awardee.

When the Eagle medals were presented, Rhoades

said, the presentation committee discovered they were one badge short. "Of course I was the one who they didn't have a badge for. I was always tail-end Charlie."

Because the replacement badge would be sent to Amarillo, an Amarillo scout leader persuaded one of his boys to give his Eagle award to Rhoades. He still has the medal some fifty years later.

About the ceremony, Rhoades said he remembers the passing out of badges and having to line up for the group picture. "In my mind I can still see that picture," he said. "There were four rows of boys with about four or

five in each row. There must have been fifteen to twenty kids, I guess."

The presentation of the Eagle rank was the end of Rhoades' scouting.

"In those days, scouting taught you a survival program," he said, referring to the basic scouting skills he had to learn to earn his Eagle rank. Twenty-one merit badges were required, each involving some basic task related to surviving alone in nature like camping, cooking, life saving or pathfinding. "I was kind of hardheaded in those days," he said. "I always went after the hardest merit badges

first." It was this same attitude of "hardheaded" survival which characterized Rhoades' career after he left scouting behind. At one time or another he has been a Navy Cee Bee, a military academy graduate, a wrestler and a clarinet player in the Simmons University Cowboy Band.

He spent 34 years in the Army Corps of Engineers, working in six foreign countries. When he retired Rhoades has spent 8 months in the United States since 1939.

His memories of Clarendon scouting include early camping trips to places like

the Bairfield Ranch, Trouble-canyon and a ranch owned by the Indian chief Quannah Parker. He was a patrol leader of the Wolf Patrol.

"We didn't have a full scout uniform in those days," he said. "Most of us just had the shirt. We carried our supplies in blanket rolls

carried across our chests." One outing Rhoades remembers in particular was to the area around Bairfield Ranch.

"I was sleeping besides Brother Hamlin (an early scout sponsor) and this old cook we'd taken along with us," Rhoades said two fellow scouts, one of them Hamlin's

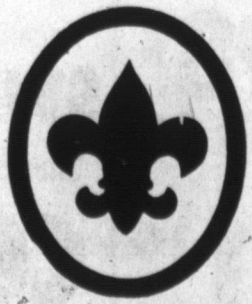

Clarendon scouting produces 36 boys who have made Eagle

Clarendon scouting has produced 36 Eagle Scouts in its 50 year history, 27 of those being installed since Tommy Saye became troop master of Troop 33.

The first Eagle Scouts in Clarendon received that honor February 21, 1927. They were J.P. Rhoades, Kenneth (Pinkie) Kerbow and Phifer Eastlake.

J.P. Rhoades is a retired civilian of the Army Corp of Engineering. Kenneth Kerbow was a longtime highway employee in Clarendon and presently lives in Amarillo. Phifer Eastlake is a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel currently living in Wichita Falls.

The first modern era Eagle Award presented in Clarendon was to Bobby Cain on May 26, 1963. Freddy McAnear and Kenneth Price received the Eagle Award on Sept. 4, 1963. The next scouts to earn the award were Tim Caldwell and Mike McCully. The received their Eagle Award on May 13,

1964. In June of 1968, Bruce Bush was presented the Eagle Scout Award.

In 1964 Bobby Cain was chosen to work on the conservation staff at Valley Forge during the National Jamboree. His experience there prompted him to write a theme on conservation which he submitted to the Bureau of Land Management in Washington. Because of this he was one of four Senior Eagle Scouts in the United States to receive an appointment to work for the Bureau of Land Management during the summer of 1965. After receiving his degree from Texas A&M, he took a job as Assistant Park Superintendent in Monmouth County New Jersey where he is still employed.

Freddy McAnear, Sept. 4, 1963, is a CPA in Midland. He is a graduate of Texas Tech University with a degree in accounting.

Kenneth Price, also Sept. 4, 1963, attended Clarendon College, the University of Houston and received his law degree from the South Texas School of Law at Houston. He

is presently an attorney in Azle, Texas.

Tim Caldwell, May 13, 1964, has graduated from Southwestern Medical School. He received the highest academic honors in his graduating class and he is at present an intern at Parkland Hospital in Dallas. On July 1, 1975 he will start his three year residency at the University of California Medical Center at San Francisco.

Mike McCully, May 13, 1964, attended St. Edwards

University in Austin. Presently he is serving as an extern in the Groom Hospital. On March 9, he will finish his studies at Groom. He will be graduated at Kirksville, Missouri May 24 this year.

In June 1968, Bruce Bush, who had completed most of his scouting work in Anson, Texas, completed his Eagle work in Clarendon. He was presented the Eagle Award while living in San Saba. Bush graduated from Tarleton State College and is

presently teaching and coaching in Crosbyton.

Since 1965 Troop 33, led by Tommy Saye, has achieved 42 God and Country Awards, 27 Eagle Scouts, 42 O.A. Members, 10 Brotherhood O.A. Members, 6 Scout Life Guard, 22 Mile Swimmers, and 7 Bronze Eagle Palms. A total of 212 boys have earned 1,287 merit badges.

The 27 Eagle Scouts in Troop 33 have been: Tim Saye, Steve Pointer,

Ike O'Neal and Jim Simmons in 1969.

Jeff Campbell, Micky Grady, Pat Robertson and Ricky Woody in 1972.

Calvin Burrow, Donnie Putman, Barry Doane, Larry Doane and Dewey Ford in

1973. Donny Garman, Paul Hermesmeyer, Wade Porter, Billy Price, Irvin Thomas and James Thomas in 1974.

Jon Nichols, Steve Rives, Dean Hawkins, Dan Sawyer, Terry Putman, Butch Black-

burn, Gary Thomas and Chris Ford in 1975.

Eagle Scouts who received the Bronze Palm in 1975 were: Donny Garman, Dewey Ford, Paul Hermesmeyer, Irvin Thomas and James Thomas.

Cubmaster, Claude Thomas reports that Clarendon Pack 437 currently has 32 boys registered.

There are two dens of eight year olds that are working to complete 12 achievements to earn their Wolf badges. This enables them to work on "Electives" to earn gold and silver arrow points. One newly registered boy is completing the requirements for his Bobcat badge then he will work on

his Wolf achievements.

One den of nine-year olds is working on 12 achievements to earn their Bear badge and then on "Electives" to earn arrow points. The achievements and electives are more advanced for the 9 year olds.

One den of ten year olds that are called Webelos work on projects to earn activity pins. A total of 15 pins may be earned. Three months prior to a boys 11th birthday

they work on all skills that are required to pass their Tenderfoot Scout exam. Thus the boys earn the "Arrow of Light" or Webelo Badge. This is the only Cub Badge that is allowed to be worn on the Boy Scout uniform. Two boys are currently being prepared for their entry into Boy Scouts this month.

Each den meets weekly for about an hour, then once a month there is a pack meeting with families encouraged to attend so the boys can show off their handiwork for the month and to receive any award they may have earned.

The highlight for Cubs is the Blue and Gold Banquet held each year in February. Special guests with a guest speaker give a formal "air" to the Cubs celebration of Scout Week. This year the Banquet will be in the school cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 27. A special film on Wildlife will be shown by Gary Hunt our local Game Warden.

Den leaders for our Cub Pack are: Den 1 Henrietta Richardson and Beatrice Burleson; Den 2 Sara Kennedy and Laqueta Cox; Den 3 Shirley Hicks and Peggy Smith; and Webelos, Claude Thomas and James Burleson.

Points of religion discussed in 'Religious Thoughts' column

In the Book of Hebrews, Chapter 1:2, the Bible tells us that God has spoken to this world. He spoke through the fathers in times past. He spoke through angels who came from heaven and made God's will and work known to men. But in these last days, God has spoken to us through his Son.

This is a manifestation of God's will by degrees. God spoke in "sundry times." God spoke one final last word, one final manifestation, to us through His Son, Jesus Christ. The revealing through his Son, is a one time, once for all thing. A distinction is made in God's revealing. In His Son, God has

revealed all He is going to reveal. The whole counsel of God to this world was made known when Jesus Christ was here in the flesh. Jesus said, "All things that I have heard of My Father, I have made known to you" (John 15:15).

The author spoke of "in these last days." This is a contrast with "times past." The ministry of Christ marked "the last days" for the world. The earth has been here for many years. Man has been upon it for many, many years; but in the last days of time, the last part of time, God has allotted for the planet earth, He has spoken to us through His Son, Jesus Christ. That which God is pressing upon us is the finality of the Gospel revelation to this world. God has nothing else to say to the planet earth. He has already said it. He has said all that He is going to say. It is written in the Bible, revealed by and through the life of Jesus Christ. There is no other message from heaven than that which we already have.

The idea is that God in the latter part of the time allotted the planet Earth spoke to us "in his Son." God tells us: "God

was manifested in the flesh. The word "in flesh," refers to that which characterized the Divine manifestation. God became a man and dwelled among us in Jesus Christ.

The announcement from Heaven as soon as the Son was revealed was: "Unto you is born a Saviour which is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:11). The character in which God "spoke" was in the person of His beloved Son who brought to this planet the knowledge of a world beyond. This knowledge, this way of life, God's will for mankind, is written in the Bible.

Ask of Me, and I shall give Thee the heaven for Thine inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for Thy possession" (Ps. 2:7,8).

The Bible declares that Jesus Christ not only owns the world in which we live, but that He is the Creator of it: "By whom also He made the worlds." The word "worlds," is the Greek word, "aiolas" from which we get the word "ages." It also denotes time and the Universe of matter.

A literal idea is that Christ made this "time" and all "times" that exist any and everywhere they exist or whenever they have existed.

Jesus didn't become the Heir of the Universe when he came here. The Bible declares that: "He was in the beginning appointed Heir of all things because He was their Creator" (Col 1:16).

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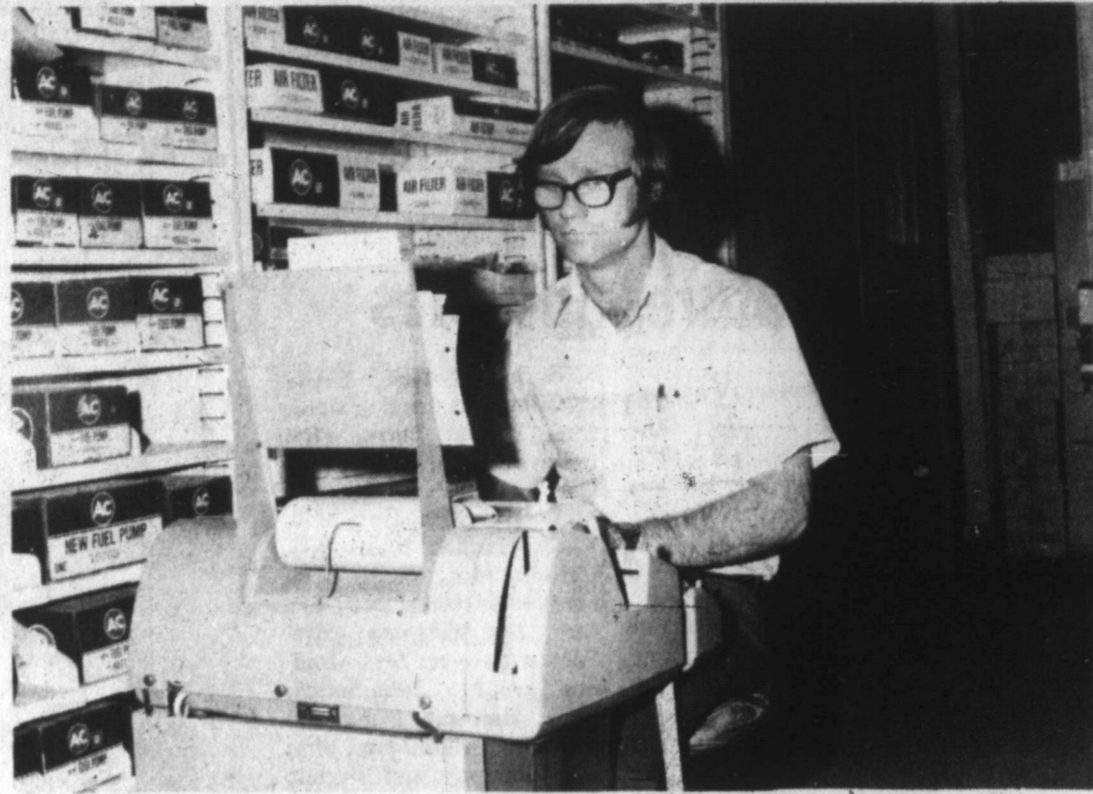
