# County Superintendent's race, profile of position, candidates

This is the second in a series of articles featuring Donley County political races for the upcoming May 1 Democratic primary election. This week the 'Press' profiles the three candidates running for County School Superintendent and gives an overview of the job itself. Generally, superintendent's job is to act as a coordinator between the two schools systems in Donley County, Hedley and Clarendon. Specifically, these duties include assisting in school problems that might arise in areas of health, truancy or transportation. Other problems arising in the schools would also be attended to by the County Superintendent along with each school superintendent and the County School Board of

Trustees. Other duties include overseeing the investment of \$20,000 which the county obtained from the sale of 17,000 acres of land in the early part of this century. This base sum of \$20,000 is invested each year and the profits and interest derived from these investments during a one year period is put into the County permanent school fund each year. The remaining \$20,000 is then reinvested the next year. According to incumbent County Superintendent Maurice Risley, approximately \$1,200 was earned last year. The office is also involved with the purchasing of school textbooks, approving bus routes, making school census records available to the Social Security Administration and the recording of

teaching certificates for Donley County teachers. The Superintendent also presides over the monthly meeting of the County School Board of Trustees, composed of five members. Money to finance this office comes from tax money collected from each Texas County rather than tax money collected only from Donley County. Money to finance the superintendent's office is taken from the money paid to school system by the state for each child they have enrolled in their schools the past year. The amount of money taken out, however, is paid back to the individual schools by taking money from a school fund designated for maintenance and operations of all state schools. This fund is derived from tax money collected from every county in Texas. If the office did not exist, Donley County schools would not receive more school funds from the state. There would be more money left in the state-wide maintenance and operation school fund, however. A base salary for the County School Superintendent is set by Texas laws. This base salary is figured according to three things: Amount of education the superintendent has received; the number of years he has been in office; and the population of the county. This yearly salary can be increased by a vote of the County School Board of Trustees.

As an example, base pay for a superintendent with a masters degree would be \$292 per month. For each year he had taught in public schools he would receive an additional \$6 per month. In Donley County, with a population of less than 4,000, he would receive an additional \$50 per month. According to a finance officer for Texas Education Agency, most County School Superintendents receive much more than this amount, however. There were 105 County Superintendents in Texas during the 1974-75 school year out of 254 counties. Current yearly salary for the Donley County School Superintendent is \$17,592, according to the 1975-76 budget submitted a TEA spokesman said this salary was "about average" compared to other county Superintendents, to the Texas Education Agency. Other items on the budget include a \$7,200 yearly salary for an office secretary; \$1,080 for office and travel expenses; and \$360 paid to the County Board of Trustees for attending yearly meetings. Total expense in the office was \$26,232. If a new superintendent was elected, he would not automatically receive the present salary and his yearly pay could be reset by the Trustees Board. State financial support for the County School Superintendent's office will not be terminated as long as the Hedley School's average daily attendance stays below 150 pupils, according to current Texas laws. The office could be abolished if a bill was passed through the Texas legislature or if enough names were secured on a petition to call a county election. Incumbent County Superintendent Maurice Risley, 52, has served in that office since 1966. He is a graduate of Clarendon High School and later attended Clarendon College, graduating from there in 1943. He received his undergraduate degree in

## Clarendon High basketball teams end season

Clarendon High School wrapped up its basketball season Feb. 10 in Shamrock against the boys and girls senior varsity and the girls junior varsity Irish teams. Only winning Clarendon team of the three outings was the senior varsity girls who pulled off a narrow 45-42 win. Boys varsity final score was 37-35 in favor of the Irish, and the Clarendon girls junior varsity sustained one of their worst defeats of the year, 67-17. Both senior varsity girls and boys games were characterized by Clarendon leading most of the game. Two team-mates were responsible almost solely for

Clarendon senior varsity girls scoring. Of the 45 point total, Pearly Butler hit for 33 of those and Fuzz Davis contributed 10. The local girls were trailing after first quarter action with the Irish, 15-11. Pearly Butler turned in a 12 point scoring binge in the second quarter, however to help Clarendon pull into a lead it maintained for the rest of the game. At half-time, the score was 27-23 in favor of the Clarendon girls. Clarendon increased its lead in the third quarter to a comfortable 37-30 margin. From there, according to head basketball coach Doug

Keeney, his team played conservatively, forcing the Irish to come to them for the ball. Fouling totals showed Shamrock with 15 compared to 8 for Clarendon. Ballgame story for the boys senior varsity was similar, the difference being the winning score and who possessed it. After leading the entire game, the Clarendon Bronchos failed to sustain their lead in the closing moments and lost 37-35. By quarters, Clarendon led 14-8, 20-17 and 32-29. Fourth quarter action prom-

quarter action prompted Coach Keeney to direct his team into conservative offensive play. "We stalled," he said, "but just couldn't hit the shots." The Bronchos faltering offense fell behind and the Irish managed to pull ahead and stay there to win. Clarendon's Gary Jack was high point man for the game with a 12 point effort. He was just ahead of two Broncho team-mates to total offensive points. Andrew Turner shot for 11 and Howard Weather-ton hit eight. The Clarendon girls junior varsity team found the going rough at the hands of the Irish. Only highlight of their 67-17 defeat was the

shooting of Lori Phillips, who made 14 of Clarendon's 17 point total. Shamrock's girls junior varsity had an 18-2 winning record going into the contest. Clarendon's four high school basketball teams win-loss record for the '75-'76 season broke down to nine wins and 14 losses for the boys senior varsity; a 10-15 record for the senior varsity girls; a 3-13 record turned in by the junior varsity boys; and an even 8-8 win to loss statistic for the junior varsity girls.

## Mulkey Theatre is 'more than selling popcorn'

Gary 'Barney' Barnhill has been in the movie business over twenty years in Clarendon, beginning with the Sandell drive-in west of town, then later purchasing Clarendon's walk-in theatre, the Mulkey. He built the Sandell in 1955, naming it after his two daughters, Sandra, Now Mrs. Bill Davis, and Adell, Mrs. Bill Sherr, both of Amarillo. "We put the two together and came up with Sandell," he said. The Mulkey was purchased in 1960. Barnhill said his brother Harry got him interested in the movie business. Harry Barnhill owned and operated theatres in Turkey and Quitaque. Barnhill said running a movie house involves more than running a projector and selling popcorn. Booking movies is the first complication. You must decide which movie local patrons are going to come and see. Barnhill said he reads trade magazines to help make this decision. These include "Box

Office" and "The Exhibitor," both trade journals. These publications contain facts about recently released movies, including how well they are doing at the box office, movie reviews and a general story outline. After he has selected movies to book, he contacts a booking exchange, which is a subsidiary of a major movie studio. These exchanges lease the movie films to theatre owners. Barnhill said he generally uses the booking exchanges in Dallas or in Oklahoma City because they are the closest in distance. A feature length motion picture is usually divided into six reels of film, and these reels are delivered to Barnhill's theatre every Tuesday and Sunday by an express delivery van. He said he books most movies 60 to 90 days in advance. Because the film is essentially in six different parts, two projectors must be used to run the movie. While the first reel is being shown,

the second reel is loaded on the other projector. Reels usually take 20 minutes to run. Barnhill said the projectionist is notified when to begin running the second reel by six white dots which appear on the upper right corner of the movie screen for about a second. In this way the two projectors are utilized back and forth until the entire feature is shown. Drive-in movies offer a special problem because their screens are often damaged because of stormy weather. To insure against damage, Barnhill said he designed and built his screen using 80 tons of steel I beams. He estimated the screen would remain undamaged in winds up to 120 miles per hour. The Sandell drive-in theatre has 300 car speakers. The Mulkey's seating capacity is about 600, he said, counting the balcony area. Barnhill said a recent innovation in movie theatres was the "four-walling" concept currently used by

some movie producers. Rather than have the theatre owners lease films, the producers lease the movie theatre to play their film. The term refers to the producers renting the "four walls" of the theatre. The recent "Life and Times of Grizzly Adams" was a four-walled movie. Barnhill said probably the best attended movie he has ever shown in Clarendon was "Ben Hur" in the early sixties. The best attended movie for a regular four-day run was John Wayne's "North to Alaska." "You've got to sell tickets and you've got to sell popcorn," he said, "but it also gives you a good feeling when you see people walking out of the place laughing, and you know they had a good time. That's the part I enjoy." Barnhill, who also owns Barney's Marine in Clarendon, employs two projectionists, Danny Hill and Larry Brackett. Other employees include Theola Leeper, Pat Trout and Cathy Kidd.

and store foods to conserve the nutritional value and for food safety.

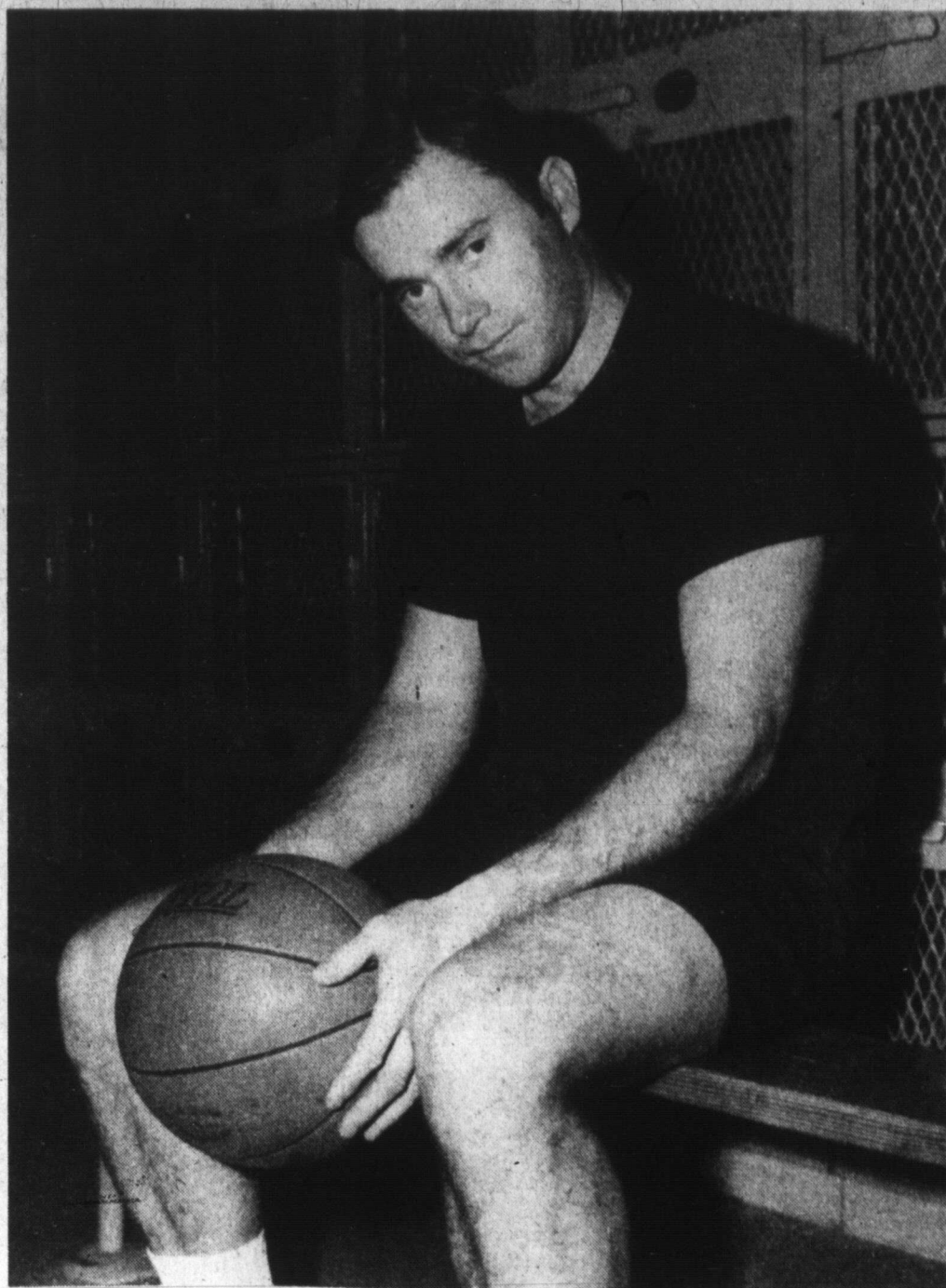

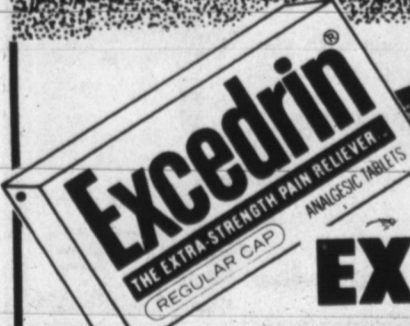

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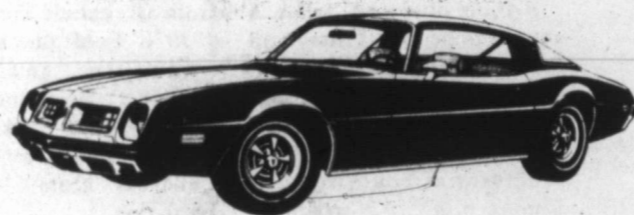
