

Commissioners Court regular meeting

Donley County's Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday for a meeting characterized by one board member as fairly routine.

Precinct Commissioners Gene White, Junior Hill, Olace Hicks and County Judge Billy Christal were in attendance. Precinct Commissioner Jess Finley missed Monday's meeting because of illness.

Morning session of the court was taken up with routine business including the approval of the previous session's minutes and of expenditure of all county bills for the previous month.

First business after a lunch adjournment was the opening of bids for a 1972 Mercury automobile previously used by the County Sheriff. Two bids were submitted, all rejected by the court as too low.

A large portion of the meeting was taken up with presentation by persons with

business to discuss with the court. Visitors were Bill Johnson, representative from the State Dept. of Welfare; and Donley County Sheriff Frank Lindsey.

Johnson discussed the possibility of setting up a permanent fund for the Donley County Day Care Center. The Center is currently funded by contributions from various non-profit organizations. The plan, as outlined by Johnson, would have the County bear 30 per cent of the Center's cost with the State Dept. of Welfare financing the remaining 70 per cent. The suggestion was discussed by

court and tabled for further consideration.

Sheriff Frank Lindsey next talked with the court about a request made by Hedley residents for some type of full or part time deputy in that community. The court agreed to look into possible ways to fund the position.

The court also filled a vacancy on the county grievance committee's ten man board. Walter Lee King's name was selected at random from the list of last year's grand jury to fill the position.

A request by District Judge Robert Montgomery

was also considered. Montgomery had requested a typewriter and stand, a telephone and a filing cabinet for use at the courthouse when court was in session. The commissioners authorized the purchase of a typewriter and discussed the possibility of using existing office supplies including a typewriter stand, lights and filing cabinet to fill the request.

Construction bids for sidewalks to be built on the east and west sides of the Courthouse Annex were also opened and approved. The bid was awarded to local contractor Buddy Ford at a cost of \$892.80.

The final court action, the commissioners approved a request to build a dike along the east side of a farm owned by R. R. Dingler. The dike would be built to stop water flow which had washed out part of a county road beside the farm.

Next regular Commissioners Court meeting is April 13.

Six file for expiring alderman posts

A political race is developing for three city alderman positions to be filled in the April 3 election here.

Four candidates filed for city alderman seats March 3, the last day candidates could file for that position, and positions up for re-election on the Clarendon College Board of Regents and the Clarendon School Board.

Friday is the filing deadline for four positions on the Medical Center Hospital Board due to expire. As of Tuesday, all four incumbent candidates on the board had filed for re-election. They are Bud Hermesmeyer, C.C. Ayers, Ansil Adamson and Vernon Berry.

Incumbent W.O. Mooring on the College Board of Regents did not file for another term. Fred Chamberlain filed as a candidate for the board membership and will run unopposed. All other positions up for re-election April 3 were filed for by incumbent candidates only.

Kenneth Casteel, Jerrel Grant, Jimmy McElroy and Tex Selvidge filed for the three alderman seats with terms expiring this year.

Dave Croslin did not file for re-election to his alderman position. The other two incumbents, Charles E. Deyhle and Bob Kidd, both filed for re-election, making it six names on the ballot for the three positions.

Candidates who will be running unopposed at the April 3 election are two Clarendon Independent School District trustees, James McAnear, Sr. and Gene Alderson; and two members of the Clarendon College Board of Regents, R.E. Drennan and Delbert Robertson.

Indictments handed down by grand jury, guilty pleas entered

Donley County Court in session here most of last week

Donley County's Grand Jury for the new six-month term met March 1 and handed down five indictments.

The jury will be on call for the next six months to decide if significant evidence is present to indicate a crime has been committed. Their term officially begins March 1 and will continue through Sept. 31.

Indictments recommended by the grand jury included one aggravated assault charge, charges of passing forged checks and burglary, and one charge of theft over \$200.

Members of the grand jury are John Sarich, appointed jury foreman, C.H. Kennedy, Mrs. Doug Burgess, Clifford Alexander, Ralph Hill, Ramon Sanchez, Wes Henson, Tex Naylor, Bob Haven, David Brown, Barry Fyler and Elmer Dishman.

Later in the week, three persons waived their right to a trial by jury and pleaded

guilty to indictments brought against them in Donley County.

District Judge Robert E. Montgomery passed sentences in each of the three cases Friday which involved two charges of theft and one charge of aggravated assault. District Attorney Charles Darter acted as prosecutor for the State in each hearing.

New owners now at Tunnell's

Paul and Elmonette Bivens, new owners of Tunnell's Pharmacy, officially took over operation of the long time Clarendon business Monday.

The Bivens, both registered pharmacists, recently purchased the main street store from Richard and Vonna Tunnell, owners of the pharmacy for the past 15 years.

Both Paul and Elmonette received their Bachelor of Science degrees in Pharmacy from Southwestern State University in Weatherford, Oklahoma. They met while attending school there.

Elmonette is originally from Memphis, graduating from high school there in 1966. Paul is a 1964 high school graduate of Seiling, Oklahoma.

Both have been working in the Dallas - Fort Worth area for the past four years as pharmacists for the Skaggs Albertson drugstore chain. Paul worked in the Arlington store and Elmonette in Hurst. According to Bivens, however, working for a large chain store wasn't what he and his wife really wanted. "We've been talking about owning our own store for the past four years," he said.

The Bivens said they surveyed possible pharmacies for sale all over Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. A pharmacist in Memphis, John Fowler, told them the Tunnell's might be interested in selling their store. John Fowler was also the man who told Richard Tunnell 15 years ago he might be able to buy the store from Bob Moss.

Elmonette said various reasons contributed to their decision to begin business in Clarendon. "Pharmacy work is very confining," she said. "When someone needs a prescription, you have to be available to fill it." Because of this, she said, they wanted to live somewhere with recreation nearby. Clarendon with Lake Greenbelt only five miles away seemed a good choice, she said.

"And we also wanted our son to grow up in a small town." Their son, Stephen, is now 19 months old. "Both Elmonette and I grew up in small towns, and we like it,"

Bivens said.

The Bivens said they don't plan to make any major changes in the current Tunnell's Pharmacy. Working hours will remain from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Delivery of pharmaceutical supplies will also be continued, along with Tunnell's traditional complimentary coffee in their back coffee shop.

As for immediate plans, the Bivens are currently in the process of buying a home. "Other than that," Paul said, "we just want to settle in and meet the people."

First case on the docket was the State against Cleveland Turner, who was charged with breaking into a local store last March 16 and taking a 20 gauge shotgun. According to County Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Turner apparently took the shotgun to be used in retaliation for what Turner described as an attempt on his life earlier that evening outside a restaurant located in North Clarendon. Lindsey said Turner had been wounded that night but investigation into who fired the shots had proved inconclusive.

Clyde Slavin, Turner's appointed attorney at the hearing last week, said his client did not deny his guilt in the theft but requested "an investigation into who shot him" be carried out.

Judge Montgomery passed sentence on Turner after he had waived the ten day waiting period. Sentence was passed at not less than two nor more than eight years imprisonment in the Texas State Penitentiary at Huntsville.

In further court action, a local woman pleaded guilty

to an aggravated assault indictment brought against her in connection with an incident at a restaurant in Howardwick. Judge Montgomery waived her prison term and placed her on probation for a five year period citing her record of no previous felony convictions and her responsibility as sole financial support for her children.

Final case brought before Judge Montgomery last week involved a charge of

theft over \$200 against James Klock. Klock pleaded guilty to the theft of merchandise and a \$1,500 check last month from a Clarendon Motel. Including the check, total value of the items stolen was valued at \$4,600.

Klock was arrested in Garden City, Kansas Feb. 24. County Sheriff Frank Lindsey said most of the other merchandise stolen by Klock had been recovered. Judge Montgomery passed sentence as not less than two nor more than ten years in the State Penitentiary in Huntsville.

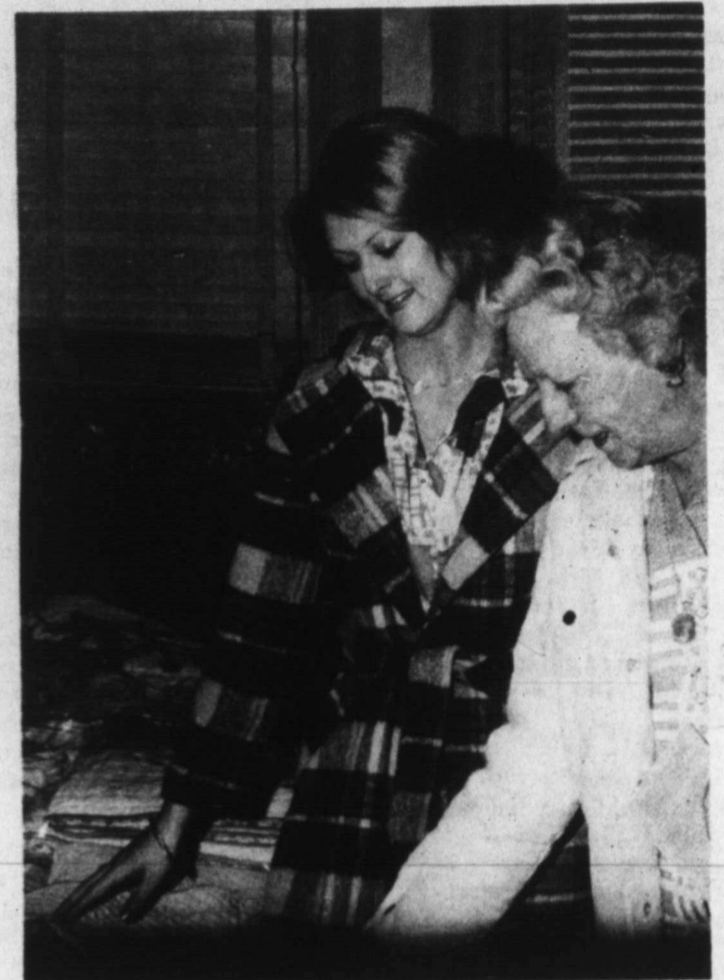

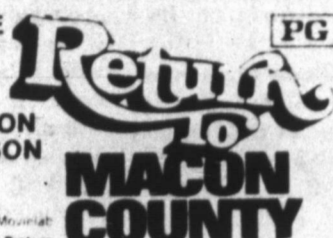

Religious Thoughts

THE CHRISTIAN AND HIS LIFE STYLE
By DR. JAMES O. BRANDON

Life style refers to the manner of life -- values, purposes, conduct patterns, activities, and standard of living. The Christian is a unique person. He is redeemed by Christ Jesus. He is a "new person." He is to have a new set of values. Someone has said that Christianity is not a way to do certain things. It is a way to do everything. The Christian life style calls for a bold acceptance of Christ as Savior and an equally bold commitment to follow Him as Lord in all of life. Christians live in the midst of people dominated by un-christian attitudes and values. Because the Christian life style is supposed to be different, the Christian must accept a different standard of living. There are pressures on believers to conform to the ways and patterns of the leadership of the Holy Spirit in the world. The believer must rely on developing a Christian life style pleasing to God.

Just how different the Christian's life style is to be is a hard question. It is one, however, that must be answered by every Christian. The life of Jesus Christ is the example. The author of the Book of Hebrews in the Bible used Jesus Christ as an example of the type of life style the believer is to develop. He discusses life from the aspect of a race. Call it the race of life if you will. The illustration is that of an open stadium where a large crowd has gathered to watch the Grecian races. Everyone is pressing in upon one another to see the races and other athletic contests. The Greek athletes have been in training with weights on their feet and legs. They now remove those weights to run this race. The author illustrates the Christian life here. You can carry along a lot of useless things in the race that will hinder your running and your winning. Useless burdens and weights are indicated. Priorities are involved. He says that we should lay aside all the useless things that would keep us from running the race of life with patience. The Christian in his life style is to keep his eyes upon Jesus Christ who is the author and the finisher of the faith. (Heb. 11:1-2).

The author of Hebrews becomes more practical in his presentation of the Christian life style as he says that the Christian is to live by faith. He illustrates the believer's relationship with God with a parent-child relationship. It is a relationship of Father-son or Father-daughter. As the earthly parent disciplines the child when he does wrong, so the Heavenly Father disciplines his children when they do not conform to the type of life style that he desires. He doesn't cast his child aside any more than we would ours. He just spans him (Heb. 12:8). It becomes more practical as he illustrates the Christian life style with Esau. Esau was a very materialistic gentleman who lived in the world 3,000 B.C. He was hungry one day and sold his birth-right for a bowl of soup. Many Christians sell out the same way. They sell their heavenly birthright for material things, worldly things, and fail to put priority on the things of God. Their heavenly birthright is not a valuable thing to them.

The Christian life-style is involved with others. The Christian is to be a brother. This is illustrated by the difference between being a brother and a neighbor. Many Christians today have the concept of being a neighbor, but God says we are to be a brother. There is a big difference. A list of various things are stated in Chapter 13 concerning the Christian manner of living. We are to remember to be kind to strangers for thereby some have entertained angels unaware (v2). We are to remember those in jail. Many Christians were in jail for their faith. We are to watch our manner of speaking (v5). We are to remember those who suffer adversity (v3). We are to live without covetousness, content in this present world. He mentions the sacrifice pleasing to God is "praise to God" from the mouths of obedient children (v17). As obedient children we are to submit ourselves to those who rule over us. This means government (v17). We are to submit ourselves to parents. We are to be considerate to the elderly. The believer is to live honestly in this world that he may have a good conscience. This do my brother, and you will be well pleasing to God.

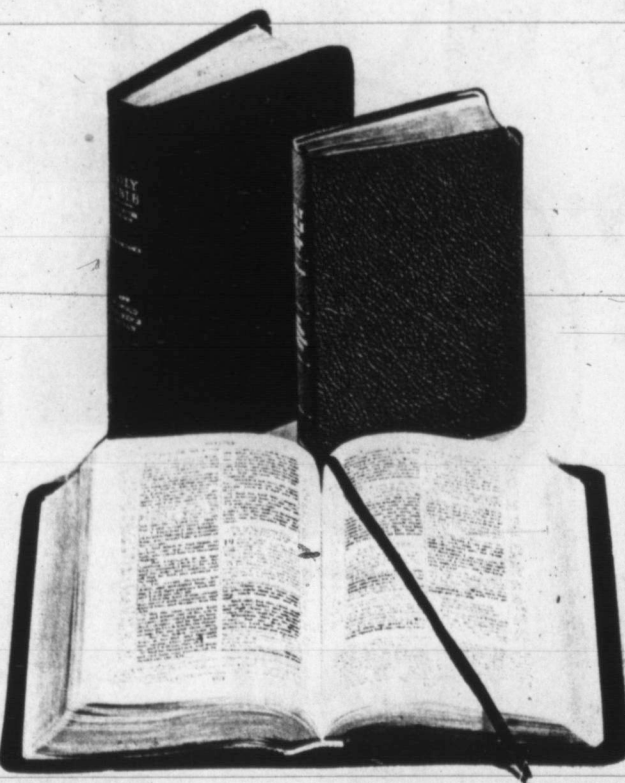

Religious Thoughts

THE CHRISTIAN AND HIS LIFE STYLE
By DR. JAMES O. BRANDON

Life style refers to the manner of life -- values, purposes, conduct patterns, activities, and standard of living. The Christian is a unique person. He is redeemed by Christ Jesus. He is a "new person." He is to have a new set of values. Someone has said that Christianity is not a way to do certain things. It is a way to do everything. The Christian life style calls for a bold acceptance of Christ as Savior and an equally bold commitment to follow Him as Lord in all of life. Christians live in the midst of people dominated by un-Christian attitudes and values. Because the Christian life style is supposed to be different, the Christian must accept a different standard of living. There are pressures on believers to conform to the ways and patterns of the leadership of the Holy Spirit in the world. The believer must rely on developing a Christian life style pleasing to God.

Just how different the Christian's life style is to be is a hard question. It is one, however, that must be answered by every Christian. The life of Jesus Christ is the example. The author of the Book of Hebrews in the Bible used Jesus Christ as an example of the type of life style the believer is to develop. He discusses life from the aspect of a race. Call it the race of life if you will. The illustration is that of an open stadium where a large crowd has gathered to watch the Grecian races. Everyone is pressing in upon one another to see the races and other athletic contests. The Greek athletes have been in training with weights on their feet and legs. They now remove those weights to run this race. The author illustrates the Christian life here. You can carry along a lot of useless things in the race that will hinder your running and your winning. Useless burdens and weights are indicated. Priorities are involved. He says that we should lay aside all the useless things that would keep us from running the race of life with patience. The Christian in his life style is to keep his eyes upon Jesus Christ who is the author and the finisher of the faith (Heb. 11:1-2).

The author of Hebrews becomes more practical in his presentation of the Christian life style as he says that the Christian is to live by faith.

He illustrates the believer's relationship with God with a parent-child relationship. It is a relationship of Father-son or Father-daughter. As the earthly parent disciplines the child when he does wrong, so the Heavenly Father disciplines his children when they do not conform to the type of life style that he desires. He doesn't cast his child aside any more than we would ours. He just spans him (Heb. 12:8).

It becomes more practical as he illustrates the Christian life style with Esau. Esau was a very materialistic gentleman who lived in the world 3,000 B.C. He was hungry one day and sold his birth-right for a bowl of soup. Many Christians sell out the same way. They sell their heavenly birthright for material things, worldly things, and fail to put priority on the things of God. Their heavenly birthright is not a valuable thing to them.

The Christian life-style is involved with others. The Christian is to be a brother. This is illustrated by the difference between being a brother and a neighbor. Many Christians today have the concept of being a neighbor, but God says we are to be a brother. There is a big difference.

A list of various things are stated in Chapter 13 concerning the Christian manner of living. We are to remember to be kind to strangers for thereby some have entertained angels unaware (v2). We are to remember those in jail. Many Christians were in jail for their faith. We are to watch our manner of speaking (v5). We are to remember those who suffer adversity (v3). We are to live without covetousness, content in this present world.

He mentions the sacrifice pleasing to God is "praise to God" from the mouths of obedient children (v17).

As obedient children we are to submit ourselves to those who rule over us. This means government (v17). We are to submit ourselves to parents. We are to be considerate to the elderly. The believer is to live honestly in this world that he may have a good conscience.

This do my brother, and you will be well pleasing to God.

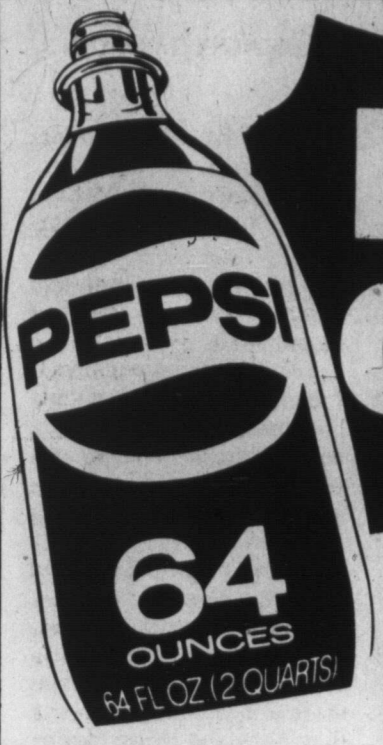

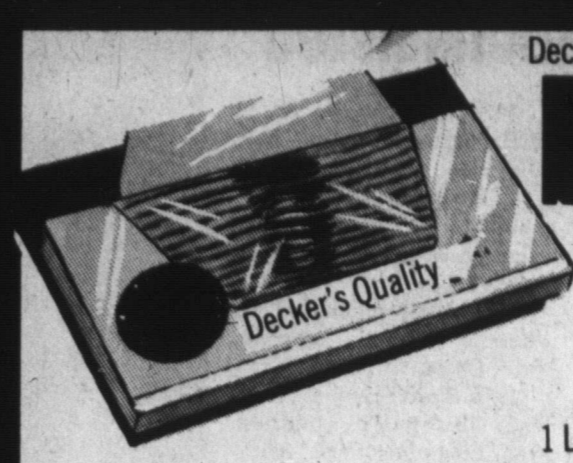

Eating well stressed during nutrition month

Nutritionists will join the nation in celebrating the Bicentennial year during March, Nutrition Month. The theme "1776-1976" Improving Nutrition for a Nation" emphasizes the need for good nutrition obtained from eating a balanced diet according to individual food needs.

Even in the fifteenth century Benjamin Franklin recognized the need for Americans to eat in moderation, to exercise and relax as shown by the following quote from the sayings of Poor Richard in the Almanac of 1742:

"Eat to live and not live to eat."
"To lengthen the life, lessen thy meals"
"They that study much, ought not to eat so much as those that work hard, their digestion not being so good."

Today nutritionists recommend moderation in eating to prevent obesity - one of the most common problems of man. Obesity - an excess of 20 per cent over your desirable weight - predisposes one to diseases of the heart, diabetes, digestive disturbances and other difficulties.

Obesity is basically a problem of eating too much and exercising too little. Daily exercise is necessary to burn up calories and keep muscles in condition. Besides exercise, also cut down the amount of food eaten at each meal. There is no advantage to skipping meals completely, because more is eaten at the next meal.

In selecting foods from the Basic Four Food Groups, choose foods with fewer calories. In the Milk group, buttermilk, nonfat dry milk, dry curd cottage cheese and iced milk are among the lower calorie choices. Lean meats, meats canned in water, baked and broiled meats are the lower calorie possibilities in the Meat Group. Try whole wheat or enriched breads and cereals.

with no added sugar to meet daily food needs of family members from the Bread and Cereal Group.

Some of the lower calorie foods in the Fruit & Vegetable Group are fresh and frozen fruits and vegetables, and fruit canned in water rather than in syrup. Season vegetables with bouillon and use vinegar, lemon juice and herbs on salads rather than rich salad dressings.

Celebrate Nutrition Month by cutting down the amount of food you eat, eating a lower calorie diet than usual, and exercising regularly to lose weight and stay healthy.

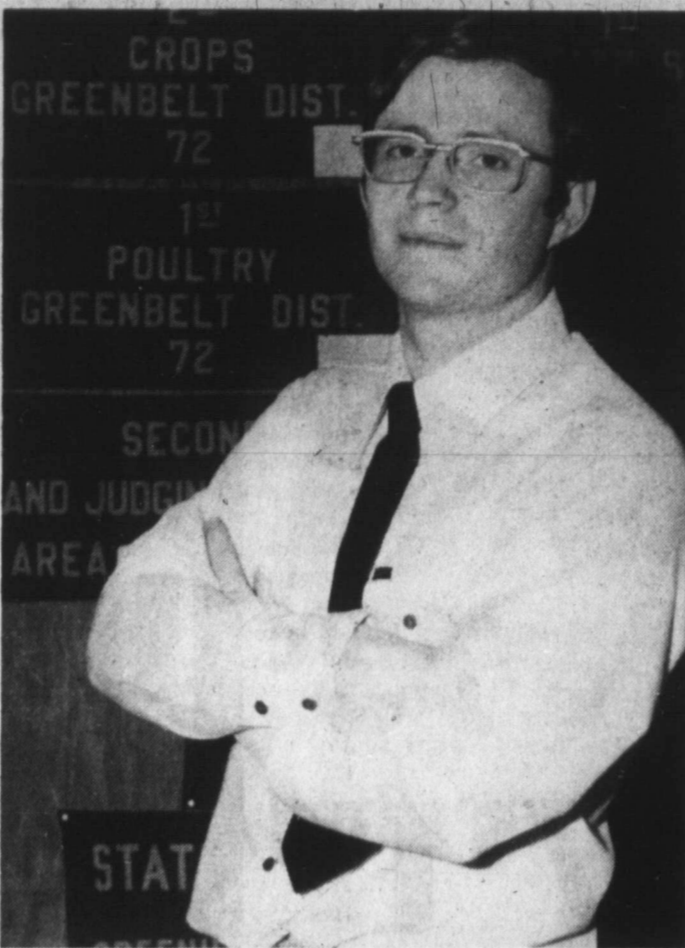

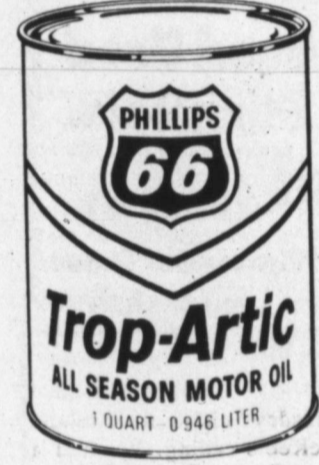

Hostess, Mrs. E.W. Barbee served delicious homemade sweet rolls, hot coffee and cocoa to the following members: Mesdames Trey

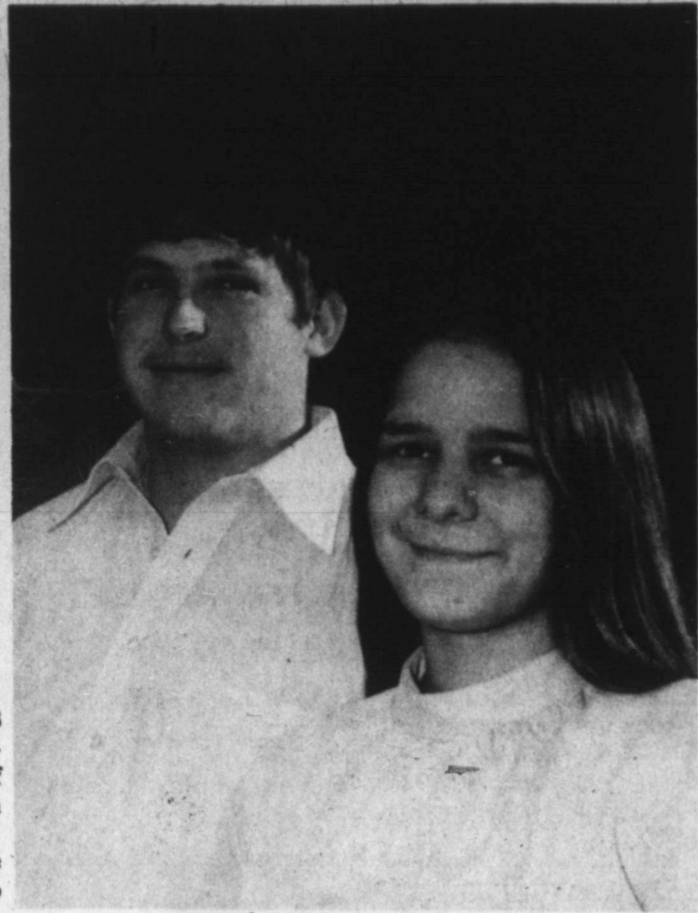

Greenbug populations could cause wheat problems

Small grain producers need to be on the lookout for rapidly growing greenbug populations in their fields, says Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Gooch said a spot check last week of several fields in the county indicated some damaging populations of green bugs in wheat fields. Heaviest populations were found in fields which had not been grazed. Some fields have already been sprayed, he said, and others will probably have to be sprayed.

The bugs, which are about 1/16-inch long and light green with a dark green stripe down their back, inject a toxin into plants while feeding on them. This causes the plant to turn yellow and

eventually die. Any type of stress such as lack of moisture will increase the damage done by greenbugs. "In some cases," says Gooch, "greenbugs have become resistant to insecticides. Insecticide control failure may be due to application, temperature or coverage problems."

Gooch advises checking fields at regular intervals during the growing season and at least once a week if the greenbug population is increasing.

Before using an insecticide, a producer should consider such things as plant vigor, moisture conditions, stage of growth and the presence or absence of parasites and predators. Irrigated small grains can withstand greater populations of greenbugs than those grown under dryland conditions.

Effective insecticide controls of greenbugs on small grains are methyl parathion, parathion, malathion, disulfoton (Di-Syston) and dimethoate. With parathion and

methyl parathion, fields should not be grazed for 15 days after use. Malathion is less toxic and grazing can commence after seven days. Dimethoate should be used for wheat only and grazing can start after 14 days. Disulfoton should not be used on small grain fields which are grazed with livestock.

Since greenbug populations can increase rapidly, regular field checks are the key to heading off severe damage, points out Gooch.

Effective insecticide controls of greenbugs on small grains are methyl parathion, parathion, malathion, disulfoton (Di-Syston) and dimethoate. With parathion and

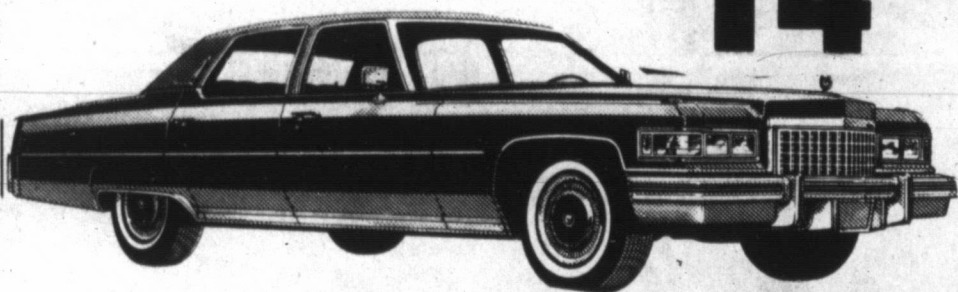

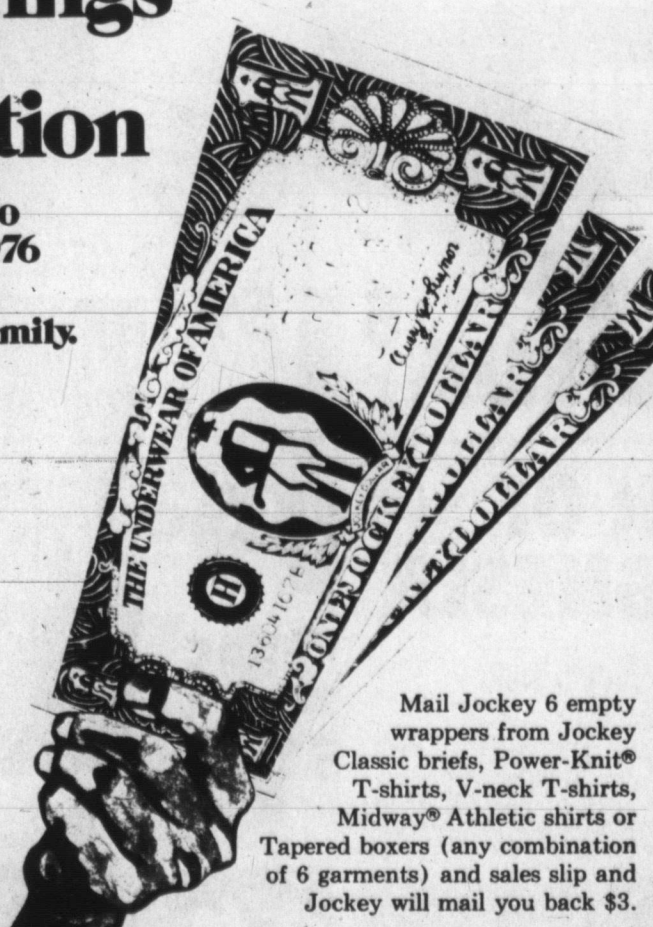
