The Texas Highway Patrol inrestigated two accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of February, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$3,-

155.00. The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the first two months of 1964 shows a total of two accidents resulting in no persons killed, five persons injured and an estimated property

damage of \$3,155.00. "Fantastic? Yes, but true," stated the veteran patrol supervisor of this area. In all of its glorious history Texas reached its darkest hour in traffic fatalities during 1963, with the preliminary death count now standing at 2,703, which is 282 more lives lost than in 1962. Also, this is 92 greater than the previous all time high of 2,611 in 1956. It is estimated that when all reports are received for the year 1963, the death figure from traffic accidents in Texas will reach

a staggering count of 2,725. "The death count for the year 1964 now exceeds 400 which is an 11% increase over the same period for 1963. With these facts in mind, we wish to appeal to all Texans to recognize the seriousness of the traffic situation with which we are faced. If the present 11% increase continues we will kill in excess of 3,000 persons in traffic accidents in the year 1964," said the patrol super-

Livestock Producers Aid In Program

If any screwworms have survived in the winter in Texas, they should be appearing soon, say officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program. But it appears that if any did overwinter in the state they are few in number, they add.

The weekly report on the was identified. This compares with 157 confirmed screwworm cases in January, 1963. There were over 62 million sterile flies released in Texas during the last week of January, according to the report.

The biggest problem facing the eradication program during 1964 is preventing the migration of fertile flies out of Mexico into the southwest, the officials say. Since funds are limited this migration must be checked by placing the flies in areas where infestation is most likely.

This is where information obtained from livestock producers becomes valuable. Their reports of confirmed screwworm cases will pin-point areas where sterile flies must be dispersed, and prevent releasing flies where they will be of little benefit.

Because livestock producers are the key to the release of sterile flies they are minded that the eradication program is not yet over and their cooperation is vital to its success. Producers in counties bordering Mexico are advised that their area will be the first hit by migration of screwworm flies from the south, though help is needed from livestockmen everywhere.

Screwworms are nearly "licked," say the officials. But they solicit continued help from
