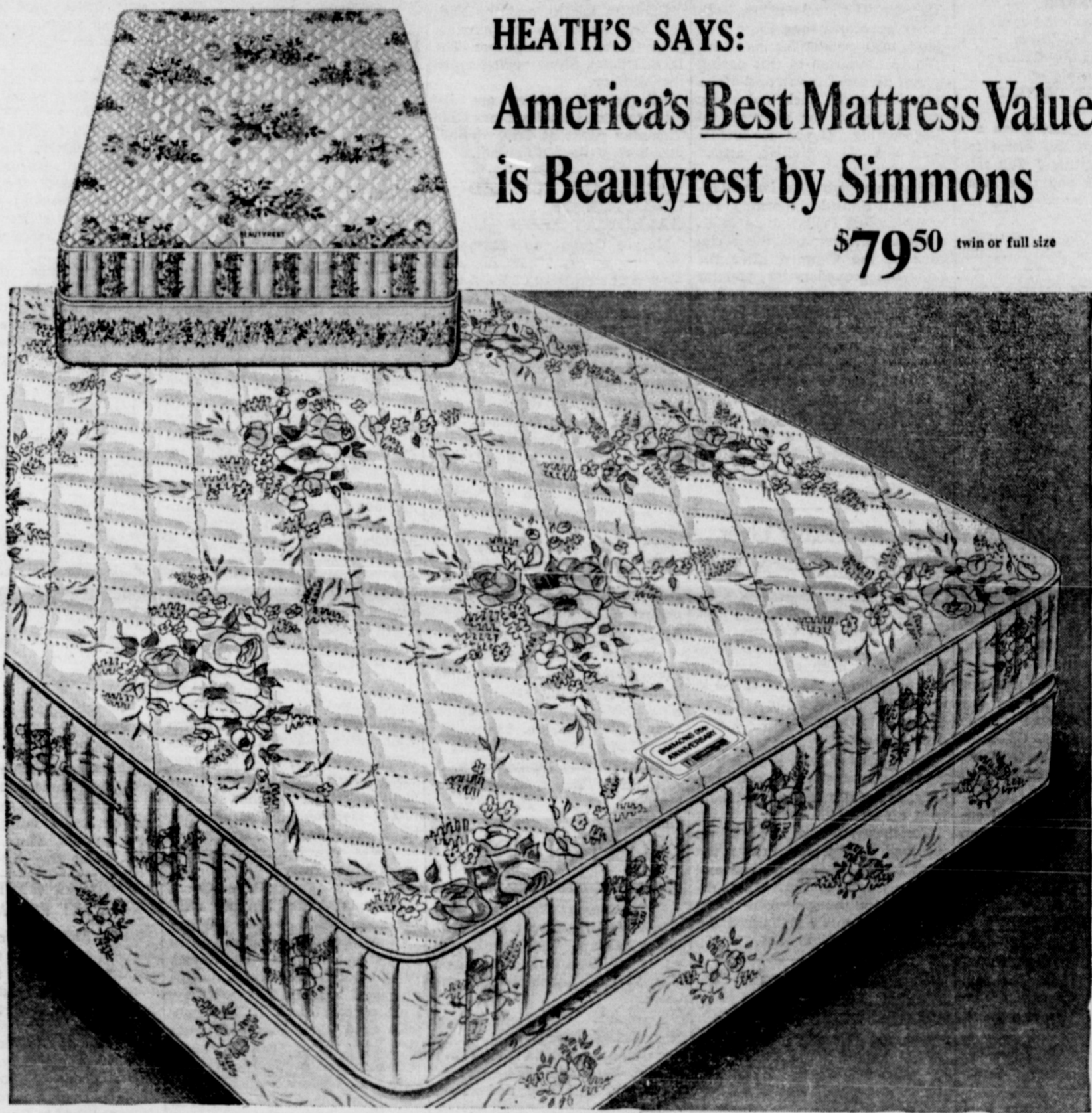

One of our friends gave us Herman Wouk's "Don't Stop The Carnival." You may be thinking so what's so unusual about that—this book is still on the best sellers list, the donor bought the book, read it in a matter of a few days and brought it right on down. Folks forget that most of us like to read a book while every body else is reading it, while it is still new! The library gets too many books of fiction years after it has been published. We have a few readers who read out of the old section but very few. Most of us like our books fairly new just as we care very little for last month's newspaper.

"Intern" by Dr. X jumped from nowhere to number two in a matter of days after its publication. Quoting: "The week-by-week diary of a young doctor during his year of hospital internship. Frank, sometimes shocking, and completely honest, it is the first inside account of modern medical and hospital practice that has ever been . . . presented to the American public."

"Intern" gives the reader a gripping picture of hospital routine, of the exhaustion that round-the-clock duty inflicts, of the conflicts, incredible blunders, frantic improvisations, heroic efforts that occur every day. It answers questions that have met only silence before: What makes a doctor a doctor? How can his competence be assured? Why do doctors rally behind a colleague accused of malpractice? 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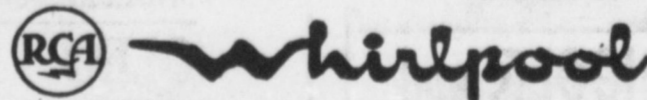

COASTGUARDSMAN SERVES IN PHILIPPINES

Kenneth E. Fincher, husband of the former Judy Johnson of Brice, is serving as a hospitalman at the U. S. Coast Guard station in the southern Philippines. His wife and children are living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Johnson at Brice while he is overseas.

In addition to the regular duties at the guard station, Fincher treats the pains, injuries, and disease of the Palawans. He reports that he averages treating a hundred people a month who arrive at the station by boat, cart, and even on hand carried litters. He reports it is hard to tell these people that he is not a doctor.

Fincher is one of 15 officers and coastguardsmen who man this station and during their year's tour of duty few of them see any white men. These men are forbidden to receive any pay for their treatment of natives yet many grateful Filipinos still try to give presents.

Treatment of the natives has become a tradition at this station having started with the first coastguard hospitalman's landing in 1949. And here at this station Fincher is realizing one of his life's ambitions—to help others and to study tropical diseases for he is a frustrated doctor who dropped out of pre-med school when he ran out of money.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the DPS has job opportunities in the uniformed services for over 70 young men interested in a career in law enforcement.

"The positions include opportunities for advanced education, excellent physical conditioning and a chance to participate in an outstanding public service," Garrison said.

Those who qualify will receive a salary while in training. They will undergo training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, studying such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many others.

Upon graduation from the 16-week training course at the Academy, the trainee is commissioned into one of the DPS uniformed services. Assignment is based on talent and ability as well as the desire to serve in a particular branch. The services include: Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Drivers Licensing, and Motor Vehicle Inspection.

"The work of a patrolman is challenging," Garrison pointed out, "but the rewards are many. Each man answers the call to serve with the best of opportunities for participating in the constantly developing effort to curb the dual menace of increasing crime and traffic accidents.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; \$10 per month longevity added to his salary at the end of each five years; modern liberal retirement privileges based on age and years of service; traveling expenses as prescribed by law. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

"Applications for these positions should be made as soon as possible," Garrison stated. "The deadline for applications for our next patrol training school is November 29, 1965. Those who are

SIX RURAL TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS IN DONLEY COUNTY IN AUGUST

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six rural traffic accidents in Donley County during the month of August, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,695.00.

The rural traffic accident summary in Donley County for the first eight months of 1965 shows a total of 40 crashes resulting in no persons killed, nine persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$21,913.00.

September 1, 1965, marked the

beginning of the new motor vehicle inspection period for all Texas motorists. "With the hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked for the winter months ahead", the Sargeant said.

The Patrol Supervisor called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13% to 3%. "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident," he pointed out.

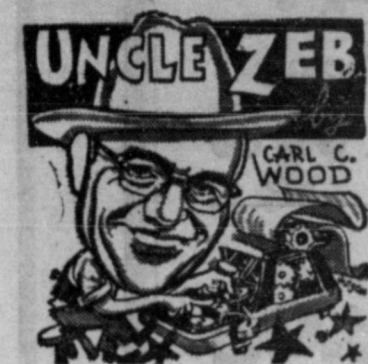

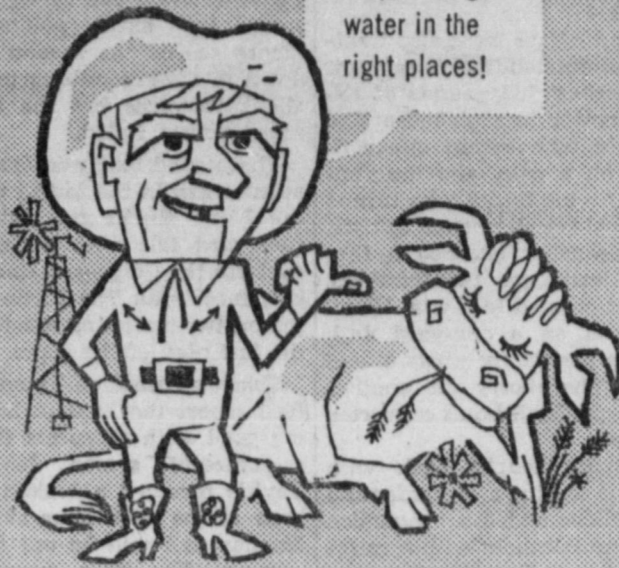
