Both the boys and girls basketball team at Clarendon High School under the direction of Carl Irbeck won their fourth game of the season in play at the local high school gymnasium Tuesday night. Their opponents were Panhandle teams. Clarendon boys set the pace in each quarter leading in the first 18-13 and at the half 36-24. In the third quarter Clarendon led by 59-33. The game ended with a score of 72-50 in favor of Clarendon. Archie Smith hit 28 points, Odell Louis 15, Rishard Thornberry 14, and David Mooring 12 for Clarendon. David Maddox was high point man for Panhandle with 23. The girls played a close game all the way. They led in the first quarter by a score of 14-13 but fell behind at half time 23-27. In the third quarter they were still trailing by one point with 39-40. The game ended with a one point difference in our favor. Clarendon won by a score of 50-49. Cheryl Fedric set the pace for Clarendon with 29 points; Sue Hill hit for 8, Judy McAnear 7, and Sandra Longan 6. Janie Deddingfield was high point girl for Panhandle with 26 points. In a B game local boys won by a score of 37-35. Everett Monroe set up 8 points for Clarendon as did Donnie Mooring. Bryan Elliott racked up 18 for Panhandle. In season play both the Clarendon teams, boys and girls, hold a 4-0 record. Clarendon boys defeated Hedley 62-37; Claude 61-30; and Shamrock 55-36 prior to the Tuesday night game with Panhandle. Clarendon girls defeated Hedley 38-23; Claude 38-26; and Shamrock 38-26 prior to the Panhandle game. Fans are really missing something when they miss these games. A complete schedule will be available in next week's paper so check when and where our teams will be playing. Both teams will play in a tournament at Shamrock beginning Thursday of this week and continuing through Saturday. Voting To Be County Wide

All regular voting places in the county will be open today so all eligible voters can cast their ballot in the College Expansion Election. As this will effect all taxpayers in the county, voting is expected to be heavy. If the issue carries, the college district boundary will be extended from the present 293 square miles to an approximate 900 square miles. If the issue fails, the district will remain as is with the same tax rate. If the issue carries, then it will be necessary for the county commissioners to canvass the votes and declare the results. The college board of regents will then call an election to set the tax rate for the new district. The anticipated rate will be 60 cents per \$100 valuation which will be 25 cents under the present rate. Those eligible to vote in this election are people who are 21 years of age and own a poll tax or over 60 years of age and who have been a resident of the state one year, and the county six months. It is not necessary to own property or have property rendered for taxation. Up until Wednesday noon, a total of 15 absentee votes had been cast which is a pretty fair indication that voting will be heavy. If you want to voice your opinion in this election — and you should — then be sure to go vote.

Outcome of Election Today Is Vital

(Editorial) In summing up the college election being held today, Thursday, December 2nd, it is a must for those living within the boundary of the present district to go vote if you want your college tax reduced.

It has been rumored by the opposition that if this election is defeated, the college will have to close and then there would be NO tax. This rumor is wrong. The tax rate would remain at 85 cents per \$100 valuation and the college would continue to operate as it is now. Your taxes would not be lowered.

This expansion election will not bring in sufficient added revenue to support a new building program but perhaps would allow the college to purchase some much needed modern equipment and meet salary specifications set by state agencies and allow for additional instructors as needed with the growth of the college. The college is only striving for a sound footing at this time.

If a building program is proposed in the future which necessitates the calling of a bond issue... it will be up to you voters whether you vote for the bond issue and an additional tax at that time.

If the election carries, it will mean that all of the county will be supporting the college at a lower tax rate, instead of the small area at the present time. It is only natural that a majority of those who have not been paying the college tax would prefer to stay outside the college district but on the other hand those who have been paying a high rate would appreciate the reduction in their taxes.

If a majority of voters choose to vote the issue down, then the college must accept the verdict and remain in its present status and those paying the 85 cent rate will have to do the same until a time in the future when a majority prefers to vote differently.

Whatever the outcome may be, it is most logical that every qualified voter in the county should go to their regular voting place and cast their ballot. In many instances it takes a full count to win or defeat an election. Only one negligent voter can change the picture.

Who Can Vote? Everyone living within the boundary who is a qualified voter regardless of whether you have rendered personal or real property for taxation or not. You do not have to be on any tax roll, county or school — just only have a poll tax or be over 60 — so exercise your right and be counted on one side or the other.

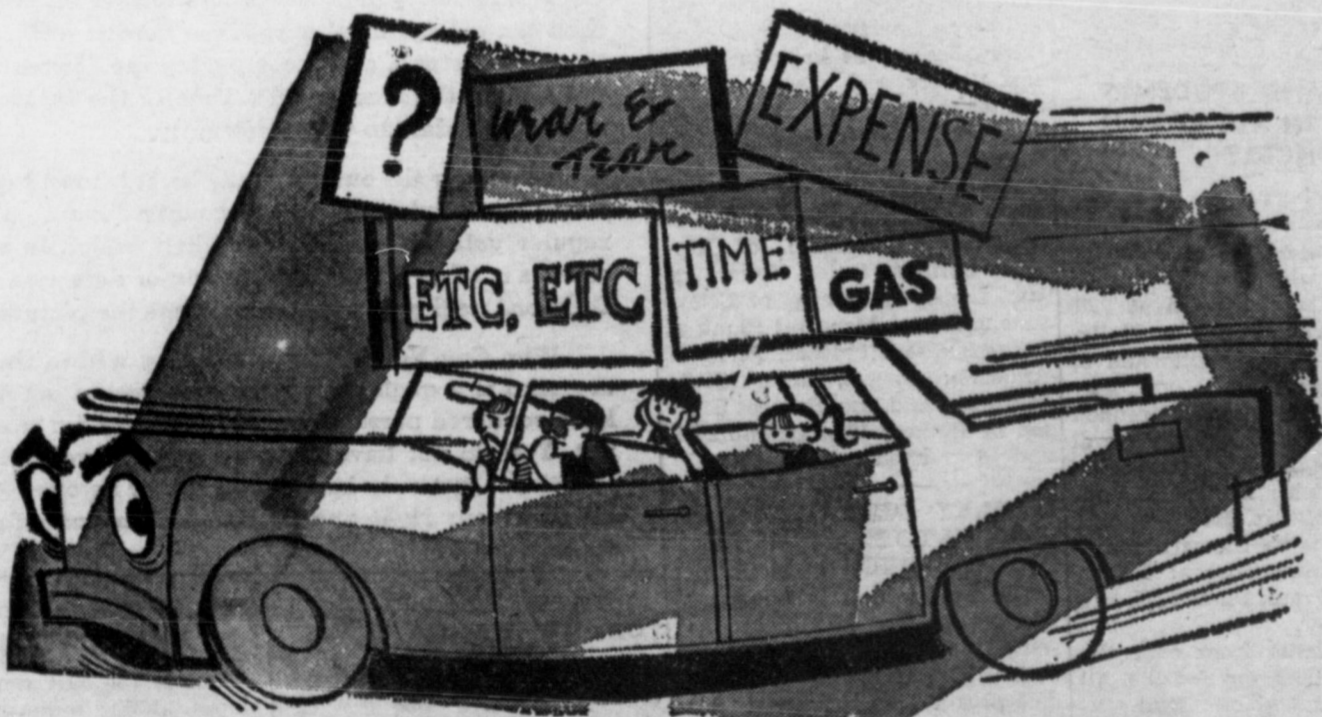

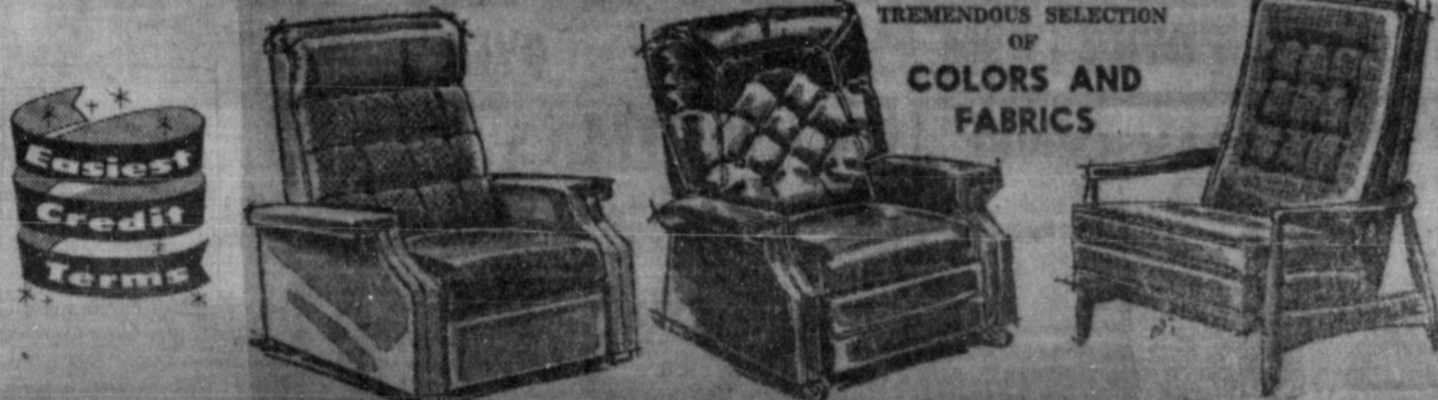
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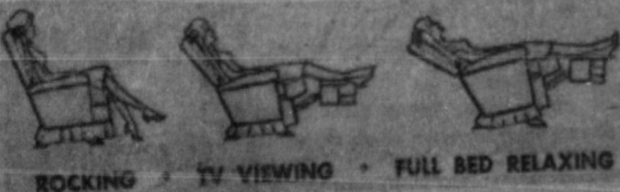

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Texas' first major state government program for widespread coordination of public service activities is being activated

Gov. John Connally soon will reveal his initial plans for the project that will "range across the entire spectrum" of governmental services.

PAST, the Planning Agency Council for Texas, was authorized by the 1965 Legislature—primarily to implement the statewide water program. However, Connally wants to broaden its scope into many other areas.

Legislation authorizing a central state planning agency cited the need to coordinate state efforts in the fields of water supply, recreation, transportation, highways and other programs financed with federal, state and local funds.

Eight major agencies—health, highways, parks and wildlife departments, industrial commission, soil conservation board, Texas employment commission, railroad commission and water development board—were designated by the Legislature as members of the initial PACT.

Connally's office was named administrative head of the planning agency and placed in charge of coordinating its activities.

Growth of government and a steadily-increasing number of federal programs requiring the attention at state and local levels call for a "monumental endeavor" by public officials, Connally noted.

PRESS CONFERENCE — At a recent press conference Governor Connally said:

He may ask the 1967 Legislature to again submit to the voters a proposed constitutional amendment calling for four-year terms for certain elected public officials holding statewide offices. But this time not at a special election.

He would call an early special session of the Legislature if federal court orders require legal action in congressional and legislative reapportionment cases and the suit to repeal poll tax.

He felt called on to make a statewide pitch for Texas as the site of the \$340,000,000 atom smasher, because of the competition among Austin, Dallas-Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston, Amarillo, Lubbock, and Odessa for the key scientific facility. He assured site-seekers from the Atomic Energy Commission that all of the state's resources would be available to support whichever Texas site might be chosen.

MORE ON REDISTRICTING—Next year Texans may be able to elect House members under the new redistricting law.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr will urge a federal court at Houston to let voters elect the members, even though the court may be before the floridial districts are not constitutional.

If the court will allow such action, the 1967 Legislature could pass a redistricting law without floridial districts.

This year's redistricting law includes 11 floridial districts resulting in a situation where small counties share representatives with large counties.

Judges believe this discriminates against sparsely-populated counties.

Court could declare the entire law unconstitutional and a special session of the Legislature would be needed to pass a new law.

Except for the floridial districts, Court indicates new law is constitutional.

AIRPORT AID — Texas Aeronautics Commission is urging cities on the lookout for airport equipment to let them do the looking as part of the government surplus property program that began 14 months ago.

Presently the Aeronautics Commission locates the surplus at military air bases and effects the transfer. Then the equipment is given to needy cities and towns free.

So far, 41 Texas cities have received surplus property worth more than \$120,000 for use in the development and maintenance of local airports.

Grants totaling \$64,500 have been approved. This money went to Caldwell (\$10,000), Comanche

(Hallettsville (\$10,000), Hearne (\$2,000), Kountze (\$7,500), Lampasas (\$8,000), and Pineland (\$15,000).

Six others may get an additional \$68,000 if they finalize acceptance during the next three months. They are Cameron (\$10,000), Clarksville (\$12,000), Floydada (\$12,000), Gatesville (\$12,000), Jacksboro (\$10,000), and Post (\$12,000).

AG RULES — Trial and state's attorneys fees in Justice of Peace courts are abolished by the new code of criminal procedure, but an offender may be assessed other incurred costs, says Attorney General Waggoner Carr. Opinion was requested by Goliad County Atty. Wayne B. Davis.

In other opinions, Carr held that: Law enforcement officers may seize unstamped cigarettes when they have the legal right to arrest a person possessing them.

Cigarette tax is a valid use levy, and distributing agents must pay and fix stamps to packages before they leave warehouses except on those to be delivered to certain persons designated to sell unstamped cigarettes.

Person cannot hold office of constable at same time he is deputy tax collector and truant officer of independent school district.

Lamesa school teacher who spent 10 months teaching in Germany did not lose Texas resident classification for college tuition purposes.

OIL ALLOWABLE HIKED — Texas oil production may hit a six-year high in 1965. This thanks to a jump in December allowable to 31.4 per cent of potential.

December production maximum is 3,084,545 barrels daily. Railroad Commission increased the percentage factor from 30 per cent for November. Firm markets and low inventories are given as the reason for the increase.

COURT SPEAKS — Billie Sol Estes' swindling case landed back in the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals after the U. S. Supreme Court reversed the conviction. Court here is expected to send it to Tyler for retrial, without television coverage.

In a case involving student demonstrations against war in Vietnam, the Court of Criminal Appeals refused to say whether a district civil court judge can prevent enforcement of a city parade ordinance. Issue now is moot—no longer a timely legal question—opinion concluded.

State Supreme Court found British-American Oil Producing Company owes \$3,866 in sales taxes on the purchase of a computer system.

Supreme Court consented to review a case alleging fraudulent collection methods by an Amarillo loan company.

Attorneys for Longview oilman Clark Sample Jr. argued before Supreme Court that State Railroad Commission is without power to cut future oil production

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

By Congressman Walter Rogers

Once again, by a very narrow margin, the United States has prevented Communist China from gaining a seat in the United Nations. Over the years the fight has been a tough one; since 1950, the votes cast in favor of the U. S. position have steadily diminished. Backed almost unanimously by both houses of Congress, our Government is committed to continue every effort to bar Peking from U. N. membership just as we are opposed to extending diplomatic recognition, and I believe these policies will be maintained.

The U. N. membership issue will not come up again for another year although, as the world is aware, many Americans in and out of government feel that should Peking be given a seat the United States must withdraw from the organization. The U. S. position is that any constructive purposes served by the U. N. as a forum for world debate would be destroyed by the Red Chinese.

Questions affecting China are of great importance in U. S. foreign policy considerations because of two primary reasons—first, the deepening conflict in Viet Nam and the degree of material and moral support being given the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong by their Red Chinese neighbors to the north; and, second, the continuing ferment in the relations between the two Communist giants, Red China and the Soviet Union, and Red nations seeming to be ideologically aligned with each. Communism is bent on destroying freedom.

In any discussion of Red aims and objectives. It must be remembered that the Soviet Union, with its massive military force and nuclear capability, is our No. 1 adversary and will continue to be for the foreseeable future. And, despite angry gestures toward Russia, the Red Chinese regime regards the United States as its prime enemy, employing its propaganda apparatus to revile the United States at home and

abroad. The evidence is plain that the Red Chinese are busy in every corner of the world exporting their own virulent brand of anti-U. S. subversion. It is the announced purpose of the Mao Tse-Tung regime to bring about the "encirclement" of the United States and Free World nations by the underdeveloped "have not" countries, and Red Chinese anti-American subversion in Africa and Latin America has been apparent for several years.

Despite its subversive activities and posturings and despite its possession of budding nuclear capability, Red China remains one of the world's most backward countries. Its industrial capacity is negligible. Famine stalks the land from harvest to harvest. Mao Tse-Tung and his Red henchmen have failed repeatedly in efforts to find answers to the nagging problems of gearing the economy to the needs of a rapidly growing population now numbering some 700 million.

Because of the aggressive enmity of the Red Chinese I feel very strongly the United States must avoid any action that would strengthen the Mao regime in any manner. As I have through the years of my service in Congress, I will continue to oppose the sale of strategic materials to the Red Chinese as I will continue to oppose any move toward diplomatic recognition or grant of a U. N. seat. Red China is truly an outlaw among nations and it is contrary to our interests to help her in any way.

In my opinion, Red China is now and has been the guiding light behind the conflict in Viet Nam. If and when this is resolved as a local conflict, there is no doubt in my mind that Red China will foment and support another outbreak in whatever area appears to be most fertile for trouble at the time. Until this policy on the part of Red China and the Soviet Union is reversed, the possibility of world peace will continue to be dim.

COTTON CLASSING NEWS

According to the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Memphis and K. E. Voelkel, cotton harvesting in the area has been accelerated this past week. Voelkel reported 10,000 samples classed through his office the past week compared to 3,000 the previous week.

White grades showed 27 percent, Light Spotted 65 percent, and Spotted 8 percent. Grade was reduced due to bark which was attributed to defoliation and method of harvesting.

Staple length showed 65 per cent 15/16. Micronaire readings were lower with 70 per cent in the desirable range of 3.6-4.8. Prices ranged from 26.90 to 25.25. Cottonseed ranged from \$45 to \$50 per ton at gin points.

Knowing range grasses, like knowing livestock, is the foundation of the ranching business. A ranchman is in the grass business according to Gooch and livestock and wildlife are his salable by-products. Good palatable grass is the cheapest feed that can be grown. Certain pasture grasses are indicators like signs on the highway.

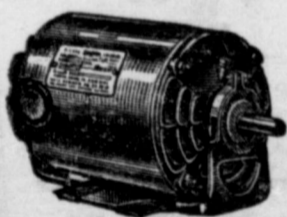

The first freezing temperature was recorded on November 14th with a low of 31 degrees and 30 degrees on the 22nd but these did not do the job. A low of 24 on Friday night, 22 on Sunday night and a right cool 20 degrees Monday night put the finishing touches on the vegetation killing job.

Many local residents were able to still gather items from their gardens Thanksgiving day which is very unusual.

In the moisture department, our official weather observer reported a total of only .05 inch for the entire month of November. Now that the foliage on the cotton has been killed, the moisture may show up to hamper the big gathering job.

**FARM NEWS**

from County ASCS Committee

**1966 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM**

Basic provisions of the Feed Grain Program for 1966 have been announced. Farmers will be asked to divert at least 20% of their base acreages to be eligible for price support payments and loans.

These changes in the payment provisions are being made: (1) No diversion payment will be made for minimum diversions, except for those bases of 25 acres or less; however, payment for the additional diversion will be higher than in 1965; (2) Price support payments will be higher than in 1965, but will be limited to 50% of the base acreage. This payment in 1966 will be 53c as compared to 35c per cwt. in 1965; (3) The loan rate will be lowered but total support at maximum participation will be higher—\$1.52 loan rate in 1966 plus the 53c price support as compared to \$1.65 plus 35c in 1965.

Special small farm benefits are included in the program. A producer with a feed grain base of 25 acres or less may divert all of his acreage and receive diversion payments on all of this acreage.

As in the 1965 program, a producer who signs up for both the wheat and feed grain programs can substitute acreage. Diversion payments in such cases will be based on the actual crop reduced.

The individual farm yields for each commodity will be released as soon as possible. Signup will be in early spring.

**COTTON REFERENDUM**

Only sixty-one counties in Texas and one in the Golden Spread area voted to transfer cotton allotment from their counties to other parts of the state. This means that allotments in Donley County can be transferred within the county only. None of the cotton will be taken out of the county. Cotton can still be transferred into this county, however, from the sixty-one counties even though we voted to keep our cotton here.

Marketing quotas will be effective for 1966. By passage of the marketing quotas, the new cotton program automatically becomes effective also. The vote on quotas carried in our county as well as across the nation.

**1966 CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM**

We still have not received detailed information about the new CAP Program. This is the program which provides 5 to 10 year contracts for participants. It is our understanding that the sign-up period has been changed to begin in January and run into March of 1966. It was originally scheduled to begin December 1.
