Fall Harvest Gets Underway In Donley County

High, dry skies set the stage for the beginning of the fall grain harvest in Donley County but left weather-wary farmers and ranchers keeping an anxious eye on the moisture prospects this week.

Grain Sorghum was moving to market with a good low moisture content as producers reported yields ranging from tops of 3,000 pounds per acre on dry land fields to 6,000 pounds per acre from irrigated land.

More than twenty-five percent of the milo had been harvested this week with another 25 to 30 percent expected to come in before inclement weather

and the balance of the late crop stopped the combines.

The milo market continued a bit erratic with the price dropping from a high of \$4.50 to \$4.30 per pound this week. Since the market is much higher than the government loan guarantee, all of the grain is expected to go on the market with about half going into storage and the other half being sold across the board.

In the meantime, the county's some 17,000 acres of wheat is beginning to suffer from lack of moisture. Most of the wheat has been planted

New Agent City Firemen For Donley County Get New Garage

Cynthia Manning, the new County Extension Agent-Home Economist for Donley County is due to assume the position beginning November 1, and is in the process of moving to Clarendon.

Currently Cynthia is finishing a seven weeks training course in Hereford and with the completion of this part of her training will be in residence here.

Donley County has been without the services offered by Miss Manning's office for many years and she will be welcomed by the 4-H girls, their families and residents of the county.

For the past four years the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department has been handicapped by a lack of space, and it is now being taken care of by the erection of an addition to the existing building.

At present there is storage room for four of the six vehicles. A new Ford 750 pumper was added to the equipment about four years ago and a year ago the rural truck was built for the department by the county. The rural truck has an 1800 gallon capacity and is used for fighting grass fires and

out of city fires where fire hydrants are not available.

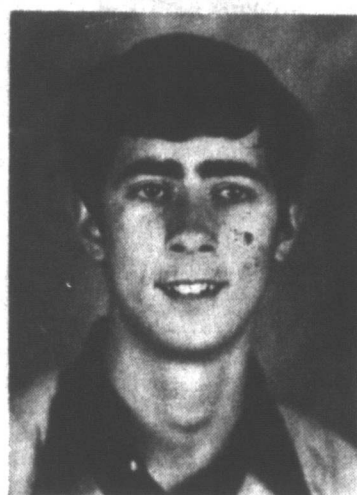
With the extra floor space an alternate power source can be utilized in the case of a shut off of electrical power. This extra power source will lower the key rate on insurance. There will also be room for the cleaning, drying and rolling of the hoses and the filler pipe can be moved inside to prevent freezing in cold weather. The filler pipe is used to fill water trucks for stock and for other uses of water not handled by the city water system.

Measuring 24x50 feet, containing 1250 square feet, the building will cost the city \$3,000 and the firemen will raise from 700 to 1000 dollars from their department. Members of the Fire Department leveled the lot, the city furnished equipment and many persons have volunteered their time for the project.

This week the masonry construction probably will be completed by Kenneth Morrow and his father. The remaining work will be done by the firemen as time permits.

Erected in 1918 the old City Hall building was built by Mrs. Adair of the J.A. Ranch and was the U.M.C.A. building for some time, furnishing a swimming pool and a gym for Clarendon's use. Some of the materials in the newly added portion of the building have a history too, coming from the old hospital building site behind Crutchfield's Texaco. Some cement blocks and the sheet metal were used from that building after fireman Jerry Hawkins razed the building this past summer.

Jerry Gage, president of the Fire Department, Fire Chief Billy Jack Land and Fire Marshall Clyde Price join all of the members of the Fire Department in expressing appreciation for the help from individuals to the department.



Thornberry Receives Scholarship

Mac Thornberry has been chosen as the Clarendon High School winner in the Bicentennial Seniors scholarship competition. This Clarendon High School competition is part of a nationwide scholarship program for high school seniors currently being conducted by the National Association of Secondary School Principals with funds from the Shell Oil Company. The runner-up is Jack Bell.

Mac Thornberry's winning composition consists of a "Bicentennial Minute" and a commentary discussing the relevance of this "minute for today and for America's future. He also scored high on a current events test.

Mac will now compete with other high school winners to become one of the two state representatives to the national competition. Two winners from each state and the District of Columbia will receive a scholarship of \$1,000 and an all expense paid trip to Williamsburg, Virginia from January 16-19, 1976 to attend seminars on educational and social issues and to be on hand for the selection of the national winner.

The grand prize winner receives a \$10,000 scholarship and will have his/her "Bicentennial Minute" presented on the CBS television network.

MEMPHIS TO INVADE BRONCHO STADIUM

The Clarendon Bronchos take on the big winds of Memphis this Friday night at Broncho Stadium. The Bronchos are coming off a 62-0 rout over the Silverton Owl boosting a 3-0 record in District play and 4-1-1 for the season. The Cyclones stand 2-1 in District play and 3-3 for the season.

Gridmaster of the Memphis Cyclones, Clyde McMurray will bring a highly organized team to town this Friday night. McMurray believes that football games are won in the off season. Who would disagree when you go 12-1 for the season.

The Cyclones could be considered a state contender this year with six All-District selections returning. But it has been hard for the Cyclones to replace such standouts as Don Davis and James Beck.

Overall, however, the situation looks very encouraging.

Part of that encouragement comes from the fact that three starters return in the backfield. They are Ricky Miller (6-1, 165, Senior) quarterback, halfback Charles Bryley (5-10, 165, Senior) and fullback Fred Alexander (5-10, 175, Senior). Alexander received a severe neck injury early in the season and has been out of action. The other half-back position will be fielded by either Dick Hutcherson (5-10, 165, Senior) or Spruill (5-10, 165, Senior). Both were '74 defensive starters.

Other reasons for optimism are line strong boys Ken Fields (5-11, 210, Senior) and J.D. Evans (6-1, 190, Senior). This should give Memphis a pair of guards on par with any AAAA team.

Also, returning from last year's forward wall is tackle Matt Monzingo (5-10, 160, Senior). His partner should be Joe Reyes (5-9, 165, Senior) who started at linebacker for the Regional Champs last fall.

Expected to anchor down the line at center is Mike Murphy (5-10, 165, Junior) who saw Junior Varsity action last fall.

McMurray's biggest worries are quality depth and no proven ends. Trying to solve the end situation are a couple of six foot, one hundred and sixty pound Seniors in Doyal Smith and Ted Phillips.

Memphis lost to Childress 28-20, to Crowell 13-7, to Wellington 23-7 while defeating Lubbock Christian 20-6, Shamrock 20-7, and McLean 60-0.

In a post game interview Coach Wilson stated, "I think who ever wins the trenches will win the game. It will be a battle of the lines."

Shirley Clifford's Green Thumb Fills Greenhouse

Amateur gardener extraordinaire Shirley Clifford's hobby has outgrown the house and filled her new greenhouse.

About ten years ago Shirley Clifford's 'Green Thumb' ability made its embryonic appearance when she bought house plants to cultivate, and began a hobby that literally outgrew its self. Shirley bought "one of everything you could buy," and to her delight and to the consternation of her husband Jack, the house was soon filled to overflowing with the fruits of her endeavor. Friends and acquaintances profited greatly from the abundance of plant life and Shirley's flowers found a home for the asking in houses all over town.

Four years ago she decided to expand the plant growing to the outside variety and the entire yard has been dug up and redone in that length of time.

One year Mrs. Clifford bought the bedding plants left from the Clifford Grocery Store stock home, after the time for transplanting had passed, and put them in the flower beds in the back yard. Thriving with the care given them, healthy peppers, tomatoes and one unidentified plant began to fill the space allotted. Since the store had not bought another variety of plant, Shirley tried to fit the strange plant into one of the known category before it obviously became an eggplant. There were enough of them in the Clifford backyard to furnish the neighborhood.

Going all out in everything she does Shirley added more and more flowers to the yard each year. "I filled the front yard with them before I read in a magazine that you should have just a few flowers and a clean expanse of lawn in the front of a home," Shirley said. Anyone fortunate to view the results would not agree. The splendid marigolds in shades of yellows and oranges, pansies, snapdragons and petunias spread a riot of unrivaled color in the summer.

More varieties of house plants appeared and cuttings of the plants from the yard came into the house in the fall to fill every room, the glassed in back porch and the basement, until the only answer seemed to be a greenhouse. Jack Clifford encouraged the idea to maintain enough living space "for people in the house."

An order for a 10 x 14 greenhouse was made and it arrived in the middle of a snowstorm this March.

The directions said it could be put together in 24 working hours by two or three people. With the assistance of Fred Day, Shirley had the greenhouse erected in about two months. There were eight sections for the sides and two for the roof. The greenhouse was erected in the back yard with enough space around it to have flower beds encircling it except for the doorway. Equipped with airconditioning it also has an overhead sprinkler system for proper humidity. A heater has yet to be added but plans are to have one installed before freezing weather arrives. The heating system must have a blower and a thermostat to prevent overheating.

Nearly all of the plants in the greenhouse are started from seed and a miniature vegetable garden is in its infancy with Little Fingers carrots and Tom Thumb lettuce growing amidst other small varieties in the flats. On the opposite side of the greenhouse seed flats of more flowers are just popping up toward the sun.

Shelves are filled with containers of cuttings for give-aways and pots of numerous varieties of succulents, begonias, ferns, geraniums and other flora hang or sit on shelves and crowds the floor space. A nansome sceneria is a very long plant and a Blood Leaf adds deep red color to the wide spectrum of greens all about and pots of moss rose, belonging to Ben Clifford, share honors with his mother's flowers.

If empathy is the quality that stimulates growth in plants, Shirley Clifford must have complete understanding of her plant life. From the bachelor buttons, galdias, lantana, asters, cannas and stock ringing the greenhouse and bordering the backyard fence to the grapevine beside the back door, the effect is that of a professional gardener.

Inside a decorator quality is evident in the exhibit of potted plants on the glass shelves of the back porch and the creeping charlie, coleus, yarrow, impatiens, African violets, German and English ivy, velvet plant and Angel Wing begonia attractively banked on a tier planter in the kitchen.

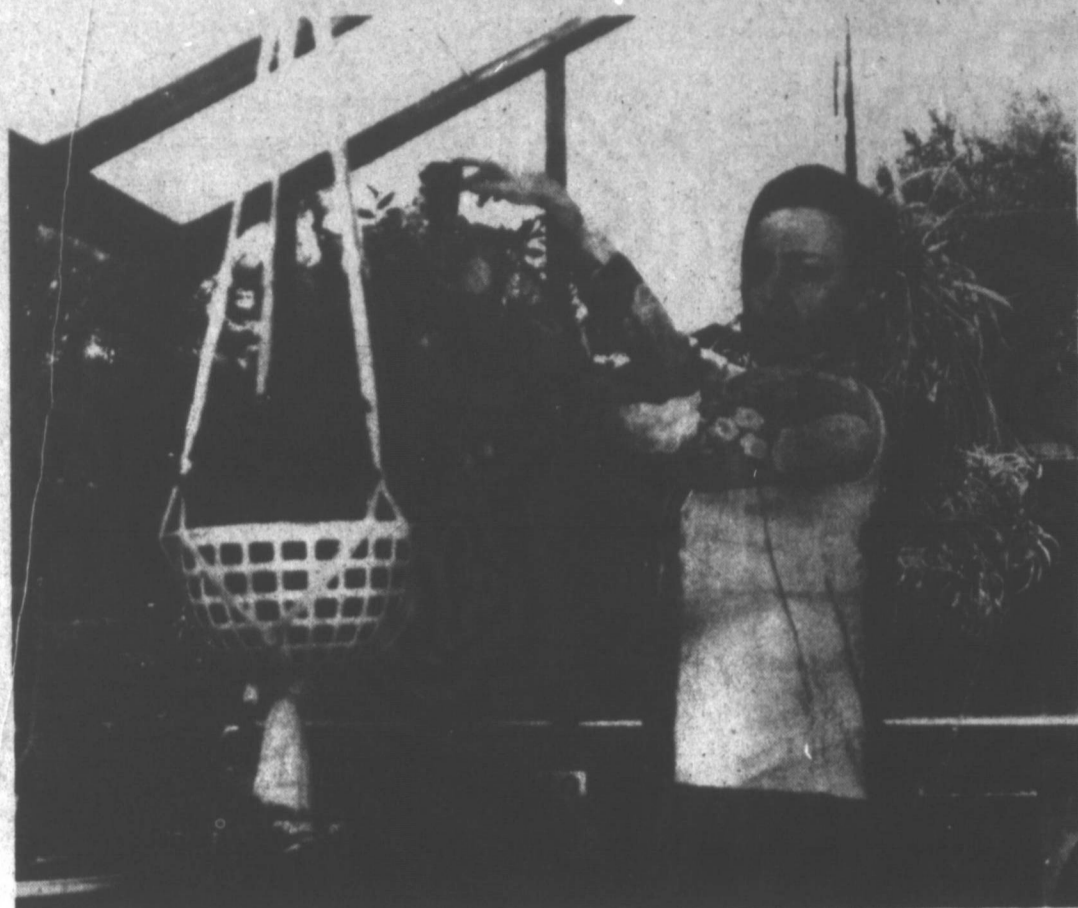
More greenery is distributed in the dining and living room giving a fresh woody atmosphere to the entire house. Gorgeous arrangements of deep red mums interspersed with dark orange marigolds, and others with impatiens foliage and wild dried flowers of soft grey are the result of one small red mum plant a year ago.

"I plan to go in for roses next year," Shirley explained. "Marigolds got no class," she quipped, "and besides I was afraid to start out with them. I don't know much about them."

"I don't keep the same plants in the house all of the time," Shirley explained, "the air is too dry and too hot in the winter time. I alternate them so they can be rejuvenated in the greenhouse before they come in again." It is scarcely noticeable: though with the selection to choose from in the greenhouse.

Without doubt Shirley loves plants and derives great pleasure from sharing them with others. Possessing a knack for arranging them also, she does centerpieces and bouquets for brides, receptions and for friends who delight in receiving them. Her "Green Thumb" efforts give pleasure to friends and acquaintances.

As a wife and mother Shirley is married to Jack Clifford, co-owner of Clifford Grocery, is the mother of John, age 14, and a student at NMMI in Portales, New Mexico; Virginia, 10, a fifth grade student in Clarendon and Ben, eight years old who shares his mother's interest in flowers. She enjoys her wife mother role and expects to remain an amateur gardener.

Religious Thoughts Discount Days

THE HARVEST

Harvest time is a busy time. The fields are bustling with activity. The normal routine is laid aside in order to gather the harvest which has ripened. Delays can be disastrous. When the harvest is ready, it must be gathered. To tarry when the field is white unto harvest may be to lose the harvest completely. The same elements which were employed in the producing of the harvest can also destroy it. The rain which made the bumper crop can also destroy the harvest.

The Lord Jesus liked the harvest season. He used this time of the year to illustrate eternal truths. He said, "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal..." (John 4:35-36). Our Lord was speaking of people. He was saying that there are those who are ready to love God. There are those upon whom the elements of Divine providence have worked to produce a harvest of souls ready to be gathered.

Jesus was concerned about this harvest of souls. He feared lest there would be sufficient reapers to gather this harvest. He said to his disciples: "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few... Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth labourers into his harvest" (Matt. 9:37-38). Those of you who have experienced the field white to harvest can well appreciate the Lord's concern. The grain is ready to be gathered, but you can't find anyone to help gather it. The task is bigger than you. Time is important. You are racing against the elements of destruction. You can understand the Lord's concern. The harvest can be lost.

Jesus spoke of God's great harvest day. He told a story about a farmer who planted his crop. During the night an enemy came and sowed weeds in the field. Both the grain and weeds came up. The hired servants reported the matter to their boss saying, "Sir... do you want us to go remove the weeds?" The farmer replied, "No! You might destroy some of the good with the bad. Let them both grow together until the harvest: and in the time of harvest, I will say to the reapers, gather first the weeds, bind them in bundles to burn. Put the grain in my barn" (Matt. 13:24-30).

The Apostle John saw the great harvest day. He saw the Son of God with a golden crown on his head and a sickle in his hand. At his command, an angel shouted with a loud voice, "Thrust in the sickle and reap, for the time is come for you to reap: for the harvest of the earth is ripe" (Rev. 13:14-20). Jesus explained, "The harvest is the end of the world; and the reapers are the angels. As the tares are gathered and burned in the fire, so shall it be in the end of the world. The Son of man shall send forth his angels and they shall gather out of his kingdom all things that offend, and them which do iniquity..." (Matt. 13:39-41).

This great harvest day has to do with sowing and reaping. Every farmer knows that if he sows sparingly, he will reap sparingly; therefore, he sows and abundance of good seed. It is thus on God's great harvest day: "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly, and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully" (II Cor. 9:6). The Apostle Paul is discussing the quantity of the good you do. The quantity of good you do here in this life will result in what you reap there. The Lord also indicates that what you sow you reap: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Gal. 6:7). If you sow cotton you will reap cotton. On God's great harvest day, if you have sown good here, you will reap the same there. You reap what you sow. If you have been faithful to God here, if you have loved God here, He will be faithful to you there.

We shall all be gathered in on God's great harvest day "that everyone may receive the things done in the body whether they be good or bad" (II Cor. 5:10). What are you doing?

Follow A Mule To A Mill?

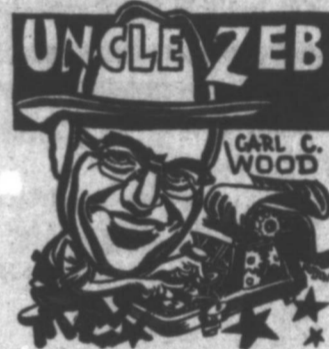
Did you ever follow a mule to a sorghum mill?... If the answer is YES you may be in the group that still goes into a barber shop on Saturday evening to get your shoes shined. It has been a long time since we have seen either one in practice... Country sorghum is still made some way, and one can get his shoes shined in a Shine Parlor. In the latter case one may have to have an appointment... You can't get a shine in my hometown anyway....

One of my favorite cousins wrote me last week that she remembered my father as being the one in the community that owned a sorghum or molasses mill. She remembered that the mill was used to mash the juice from sugar cane and as she says; "A mule was driven round and round with a Thing-a-my-bob and hitched to a pole."...she didn't use many words but the description is about as good as one can give.

We remember that a large pole went across above the thing-a-my-bob that mashed

out the juice. The mule was hooked to the end of the pole with a single tree and he was guided round and round by a Thing-a-my-bob that came across in front of him. The old yellow mule we used ran the mill more evenly, in my father's humble opinion if I

followed behind with a small whip. I don't know what the old mule thought but the whole round and round procedure held little promise for the future to me as a barefoot teenager. It helped my feelings a little that every so often I could wallop the mule with the whip. Anyway, the sweet tasting

fly attracting juice worked out at the bottom and trickled its way into a large vat.

There was just the right fire under the vat for cooking and about every 10 inches was a partition that held the juice except for a gate at each and where one could work the cooking syrup toward the end that the good stuff eventually came out at-ready for the cooling and the table.

I remember that we did our own cane, and that some of the batches came off better...These were sold to the neighbors at better prices, and we ate the from bad to worse renderings that the smart neighbors backed down on. Once my hopes were raised when my father traded some of our worse than average sugar cane syrup, for some ribbon cane that had come off even worse for another maker...I couldn't hardly sleep on the bed where these six gallons of Ribbon Cane were stored for the winter.... My, My, but some of it turned out SO GOOD, and with butter stirred in evenly, and eaten with Mother's Home Grown Biscuits, it was absolutely YUM YUM GOOD.
