Landfill discussed

Howardwick citizens met with their city council Monday night, July 12, to discuss possible solutions to either reopening the landfill previously maintained by Sherwood Shores or establishing some city operated landfill.

Approximately 20 citizens attended the meeting.

Several possible solutions to the landfill situation were discussed at the meeting, however, the only direct action taken was the appointment of two council members to discuss with the Clarendon City Council possible costs to Howardwick if the city begins using Clarendon's landfill as a garbage refuge.

According to council member Margaret Berry, acting mayor pro tem at the meeting, Clarendon city officials have said Howardwick citizens may use their landfill for a month without any costs to them or the city.

Councilman Will Corgill and City Secretary Jimmy Dunn were selected to discuss possible costs if Howardwick continues to use Clarendon's landfill.

New club manager arrives

New manager at the Clarendon Country Club is Mrs. Jean Hilton, manager of the Brownfield Country Club for the past three years.

Mrs. Hilton has worked with clubs of similar size to Clarendon's since 1966. She began at the Lone Cedar Club on Lake Leon in Central Texas, staying there for five years.

In 1971, she managed the Kingsland Country Club on Lake LBJ. She left there in 1972 to join the Brownfield Country Club.

She and her husband Hall

Possible methods of transporting the garbage to Clarendon's landfill were also discussed. A letter submitted to the council by Secretary Jimmy Dunn suggested a centrally locating some type of trailer at Howardwick in which bagged garbage could be placed and transported to the landfill.

Howardwick citizens would be charged for this service, but no final decision was reached concerning what this charge would be or how it could be equally figured for all Howardwick citizens.

Council members also discussed advertising for individual contractors to provide this service if this method of trash disposal is adopted by the city.

Another possible solution discussed by the council was renewing negotiations with Sherwood Shores to re-open the landfill previously maintained by them.

The Sherwood Shores landfill was ordered covered up by Corporation President George DeArmond June 26 when city officials rejected a proposal by him concerning the landfill because of legal reasons.

City officials said

they refused DeArmond's offer based upon legal advice they received that if they took over the "service" of maintaining the landfill they could be in violation of a property contract binding Sherwood Shores to maintain certain "recreational and common facilities."

To act upon part of a contract rather than the entire contract is illegal. The legal question still unanswered, however, is whether Sherwood Shores is legally bound to maintain the landfill. If this is not part of a legal contract, the question of landfill maintenance does not apply.

DeArmond proposed that Sherwood Shores would maintain the landfill for five years if Howardwick would apply for a landfill permit through the Texas Dept. of Health. Deadline for these applications was April 1 this year. All landfills not granted permits or not complying with state standards could be liable to state fines or injunctions.

Included in his offer was the guarantee that Sherwood Shores would donate the land on which the landfill would be dug plus

an agreement that Howardwick had the option to buy the required land surrounding the landfill at, according to Mrs. Berry, "a reasonable price."

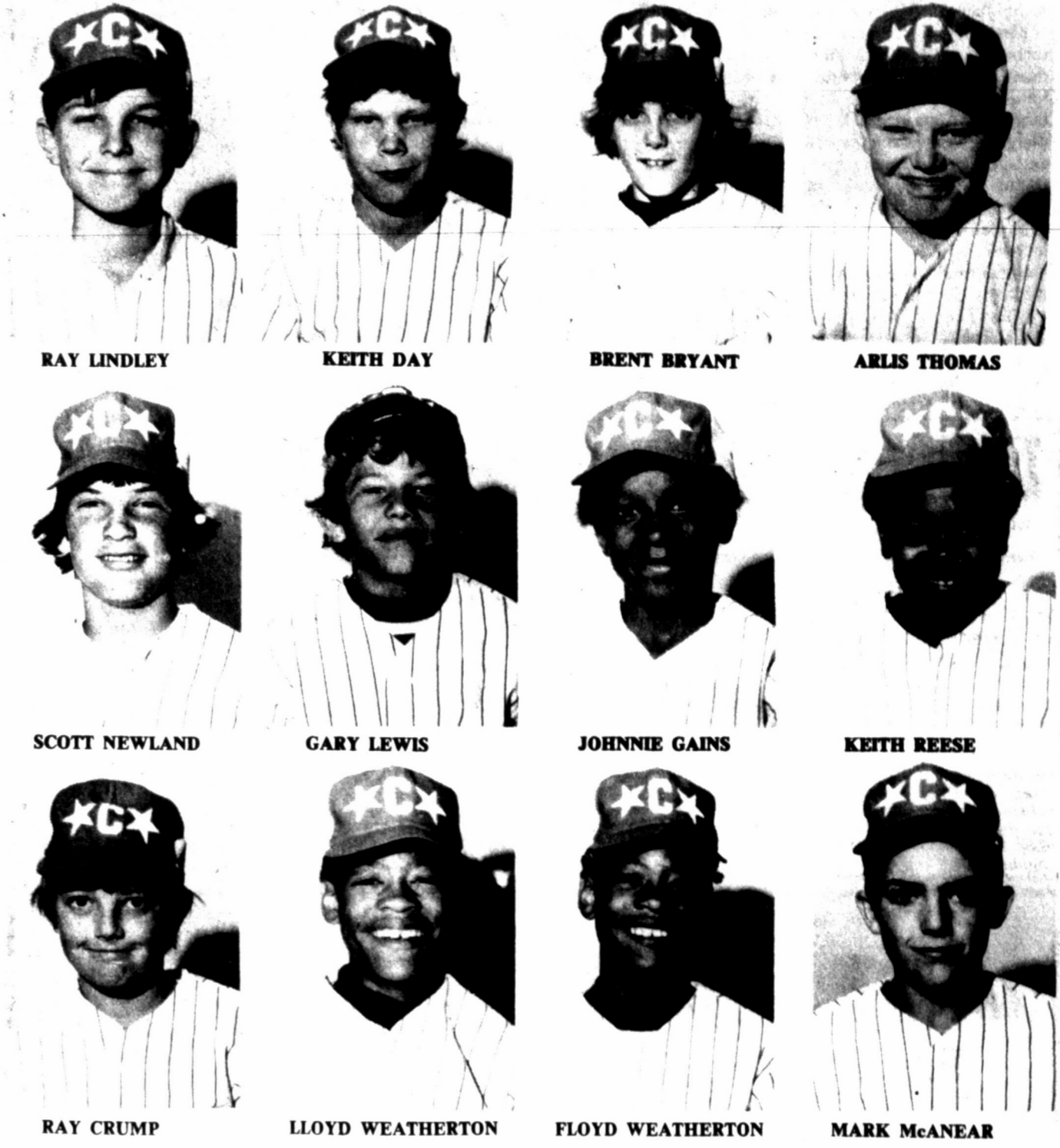
DeArmond's offer was also rejected in part because he and the city could not agree which of them would build a state required chain link fence surrounding the landfill.

Reopening negotiations with DeArmond was suggested at the meeting. Discussed was the possibility of two council members plus some local citizens either traveling to meet with him or contacting him by phone. No final decision was reached concerning the negotiations.

In other business, former Councilman George Howard resigned his position as of Monday's meeting. Howard's letter of resignation was read towards the end of the meeting.

The council voted to appoint a new council member. They had the option to either appoint or call a city election to replace the vacancy.

Possible successors were discussed with appointment announcement probably due by next council meeting.



'76-'77 College budget approved

Clarendon College's 1976-77 budget was approved by board members Friday, July 9, with an across the board salary increase included for all faculty and administrative personnel.

College President Kenneth Vaughan estimated the salary increase would amount to an additional \$70 per month for both faculty and administrative members.

Budget total for the coming year is \$850,236. The college's budget for '75-'76 was \$824,670, a difference of \$25,566. Vaughan said the extra monies came from increased support money from the state and the elimination of two teaching salaries for the coming year.

Vaughan said a full-time English teaching position will possibly be replaced with a part-time instructor. College Vo-Ag teacher Jerry Hawkins will also relinquish his teaching salary after he takes office Jan. 1 as Donley County School Superintendent. Hawkins has agreed to continue to teach at the school after Jan. 1 part-time and without pay.

In other business Friday, the board voted to retain the college district's tax at the

same rate as last year's. Rate is one-third of 60 cents per \$100 cash market evaluation of all taxable property. Seventeen percent of this is used towards the bond indebtedness of the district and 83 percent goes towards maintenance of the facility.

The board also voted to increase from three to seven years the necessary time needed for future CC professors to be eligible for tenure. This change would not apply to college instructors currently employed by the school.

President Vaughan said he is currently interviewing applicants for a college counselor. A new fine arts instructor has been tentatively approved, he said, but final board approval for the hiring has not come to a vote.

Tax increase set by court

Donley County Commissioners Court voted a 25 percent across the board tax increase for county property owners at their regular session Monday, July 12.

The measure carried with a majority of three commissioners voting for it. Pct. 1 Commissioner Gene White voted against the increase.

To the county tax payer, the assessed value of real property (ie. land and improvements) will be increased 25 percent for taxing purposes.

The board also voted to discontinue the \$2 increase

on rural land voted in during last year's tax equalization hearings. City property was not increased last year. This means the 25 percent increase will be over the 1974 assessed value of both rural and city properties.

For example, a \$4,000 evaluation on a piece of land will increase by one-fourth or \$1,000 to be taxed. For all county tax funds combined, Donley County property owners pay \$1.39 per \$100 evaluation on that property. The state of Texas adds another 12 cents per \$100 evaluation, making a total of

\$1.51. Using the original example, tax on the \$4,000 property when increased to \$5,000 for tax purposes, would be \$75.50.

The court will meet for the second equalization session July 30 at the courthouse annex. All taxpayers wishing to confront the commissioners concerning the tax rate may do so at that time.

In earlier meetings, the court made some evaluation adjustments for some city properties. Tax payments will be due Oct. 1 this year.

Chamber has meeting

Reorganization of two local committees prompted the majority of discussion at last week's meeting of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

Directors met Thursday, July 8, after their regular meeting the first Monday of the month was postponed due to the long July 4th weekend.

They voted to reorganize Clarendon's Industrial Committee's structure with the appointment of three Chamber Directors to serve along with other committee members. The committee is designed to investigate and encourage the location of industrial interests in Clarendon. Currently the Chamber sends out approximately 30 letters each month to industry prospects encouraging them to consider Clarendon as a location site.

Clarendon's Airport Board is also currently reorganizing. Chamber discussion centered on current projects of the board including moving a metal building leased from the Greenbelt

Water Authority to the airport to house bathroom facilities and a telephone. The building could also be used as storage space.

Airport Board members are currently in contact with the Texas Aeronautical Commission to obtain a non-directional beacon at the airport. Equal share financing may be obtained through the state commission. The beacon is used for instrument-only airplane landings.

In other Chamber business, Director Walt Knorpp announced the near completion of a brochure the chamber has been preparing

as a tourist guide to the Donley County-Greenbelt area. Knorpp said the brochure is now ready to print.

Chamber Manager John Sarich also discussed a meeting he and directors Jimmy Kuhn and Bright Newhouse had recently with representatives of Amarillo's Chamber of Commerce.

Among those attending was Don Hillman, executive vice-president of the Amarillo Chamber. Sarich said they discussed possible methods of improving Chamber business and projects.

May sales of bonds listed

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$7,205 in Donley County were reported today by County Bond Chairman Bill Lowe.

Sales for the five-month period totaled \$15,549 for

31% of the 1976 sales goal of \$50,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$23,323,639 while the year-to-date sales totaled \$118,488,815 with 44% of the \$272.4 million 1976 sales goal achieved.

Herbicide application requires permit

Hormone-type herbicides are highly effective and essential for broadleaf weed control in grain crops and grassland according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Most broadleaf crops, such as cotton, are highly sensitive to these chemicals and can be injured by low

chemical rates or drift.

Donley County is under the regulations of the Texas Herbicide Law and farmers must obtain an application permit from the Texas Department of Agriculture for applying hormone-type herbicides and pay a permit fee of 10 cents per acre.

The penalties for violation of the Herbicide Law are: Any person violating any provision of the Texas Herbicide Law is guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$2,000.00 or confined to jail not more than 30 days or given both such fine and jail sentence.

Hormone-type herbicides include three major groups: (1) Phenoxy compounds (2,4-D, 2,4,5-T, MCPA and silvex); (2) benzoic acids (dicamba, Bonvel) and (3) picolinic acids (picloram (Tordon)). Phenoxy com-

pounds are sold under numerous trade names such as: Formula 40, Dacamine, Weed Rhap, Chiptox, MCP Omine Weed Killer and many others.

Gooch urges all farmers using hormone-type herbicides to follow all regulations of the Texas Herbicide Law and to use extreme caution to avoid crop damage and possible lawsuits from neighbors.

A copy of the Texas Herbicide Law is available at the county Extension office along with other information on herbicides, Gooch said.

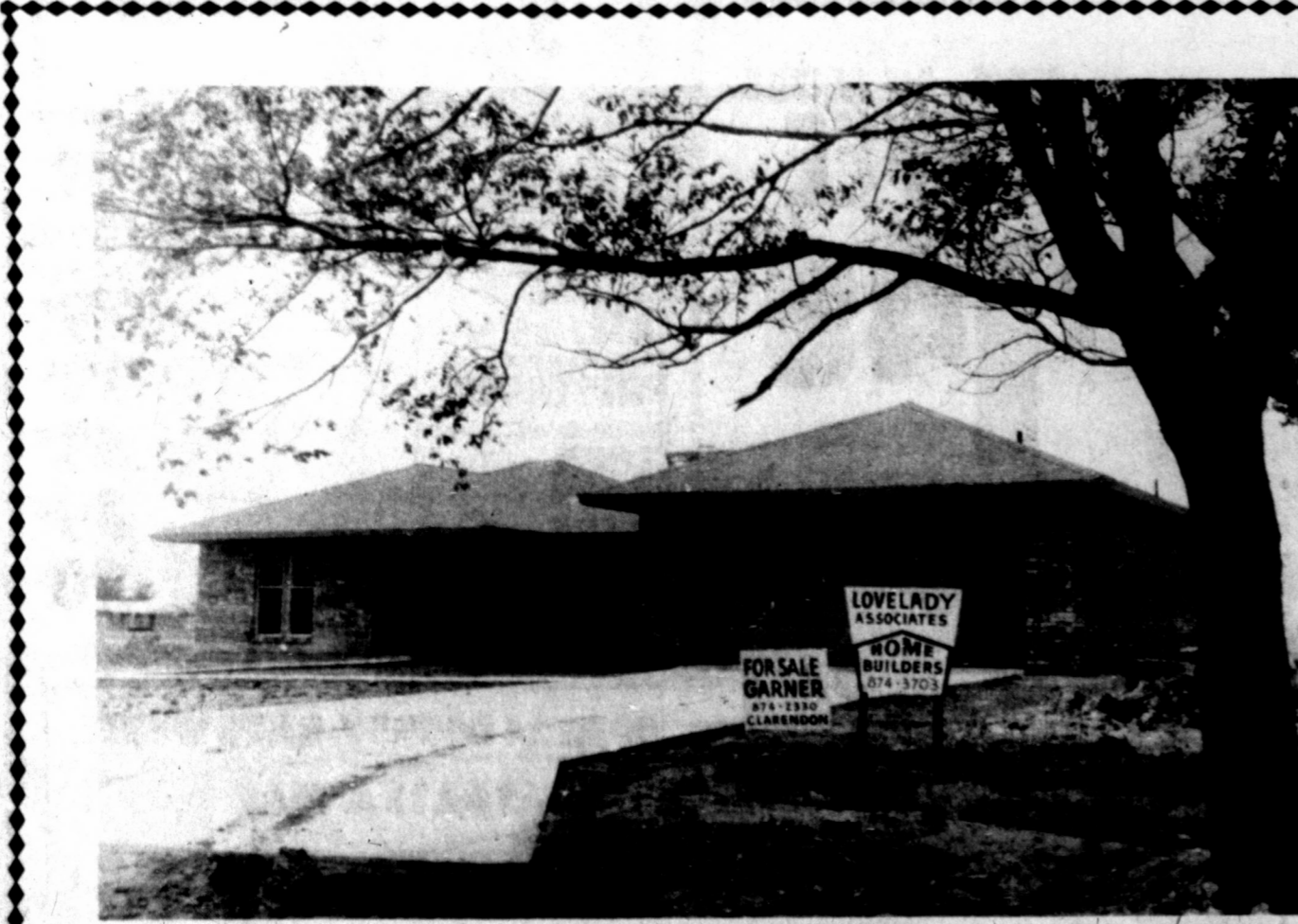

Summer for water enjoyment

Water play, just as other types of play, is a learning experience for children. It need not be feared nor hazardous, but does take close supervision by an adult.

Many possible experiences with water are available in the average home—without going to a swimming pool. One idea is to let children bathe in water at times other than their regular bath time of early morning or bedtime. Bathing in a tub outdoors with close adult supervision or a babysitter is an experience many children enjoy. Care should be taken to put the bathtub in a

shaded area so that the child isn't exposed to intense sunlight.

And while outdoors, the child may enjoy being wet and playing with soap bubbles—another water activity. Bubbles and blowing are developmental lessons that a child can learn.

Bubbles help develop muscles used in talking. And in addition, blowing bubbles controls the child's breathing as well as teaching shapes, colors and weight.

Water play doesn't have to be all outdoors nor does the child have to be wet to enjoy a water activity. Many children enjoy painting with water on different surfaces, seeing it dry in the sun or

seeing the painting stay longer in a shaded area. Also, scrubbing with a damp mop, sponge or even dish cloth are part of water play. Learning to wring out the cloth or mop teaches a child coordination. Absorbing water with a large sponge, cloth or paper towel, teaches a child about science and the principle of absorption.

Pouring water and filling containers of various sizes teaches a child the principle of full and empty, warm and cold, or liquid and solid. Dropping objects in pails of water or into pools of water is another activity children enjoy. Watching patterns being made when the objects drop into the water is an experience in mind stretching and creativity. Floating different objects, light ones and heavy ones that sink or float, wading or even swimming are activities children enjoy in shallow water. Mixing substances such as clay or powdered paint with water is another water experience.

Out of these kinds of experiences, a child builds knowledge of some of the properties of water. He can begin to predict what will happen when he becomes associated with water. He knows that water has certain principles and characteristics. Water play is a means by which a child can explore another aspect of his environment. A child will learn to appreciate water for what it is and will learn that water play, in general, takes close supervision by adults or child-care workers.

Screwworms in Dalhart

Lab identification proved this week that screwworms now exist in the City of Dalhart. The flesh eating parasite was last known to be in Dallam County in September of 1972.

Proof came with identification of five samples taken from wounds in two dogs, two horses, and one brand in a bovine, says Dr. Robert Miller of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Miller is acting veterinarian in charge of the Screwworm Eradication Program which is operated by USDA by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). Dr. A.S. Abdullah, D.V.M., collected three of the samples and sent them to the lab for identification.

Screwworms are larvae of the screwworm fly. Adult females of this species deposit their eggs on wounds in warm blooded animals. As eggs hatch worms enter

the wound to feed on live flesh until about half an inch in length. They then drop to the ground where they pupate for about a week before emerging as adults.

The Screwworm Eradication Program is based on: (1) Owner care of animals to prevent a large population buildup; (2) Prompt submission of samples of all worms found in wounds; and, (3) Release of APHIS reared sterile flies to mate with wild flies.

Female screwworm flies mate only once in their lifetimes. Eggs they produce after mating with a sterile male will not hatch--ending the life cycle.

Dr. Miller urges livestock owners to watch their animals for signs of screwworm infestation, to treat all wounds with an approved smear, and to submit samples. Sample kits are available from Ronny Gooch, county agent in Clarendon.

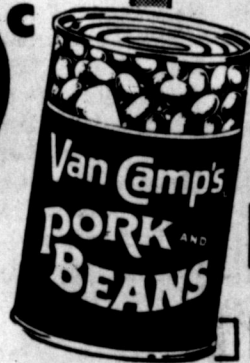

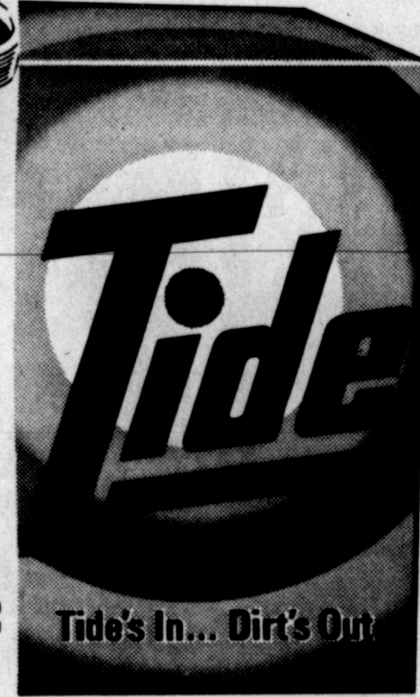
