Clarendon College enrollment for the second summer session concluded last week with 57 students enrolling for 4,128 contact hours. Second session enrollment last year totaled 48, but only 2,958 hours were taken. Dean of Students Loyd

Waters said a greater number of students enrolled this term for a full class load of six hours. The figure brought total summer enrollment at Clarendon College up to 154, 48 more students than last summer's enrollment.

Hospital conversion approved

Board of Directors for Donley County's Hospital District gave the go-ahead Tuesday night, July 13, for a state application to convert the now vacant hospital wing of the Medical Center to a nursing home. The application, called a "Certificate of Need," must be approved by the Texas Health Commission, according to Medical Center Administrator Gerry Knight. The commission has 90 days to reach their decision after the certificate of need has been submitted. The board has been considering the move since May this year, but final approval was not granted until their regular meeting Tuesday.

and leave it as a nursing home." The move is designed to increase monies coming in to the Medical Center and use the other half of the Center's building which is now vacant. Board plans are to phase out the nursing home addition if the hospital facility can be re-opened in the future. To do this, the facility would stop accepting new home clients. Enlarging the entire facility has also been considered by the board if a re-conversion to a hospital was necessary. Both Barbee and Knight have speculated the move will increase Hospital District profits from their current "break even status." Estimated costs of the change-over if approved by the Texas Health Commission is \$300. Knight said the commission requires current certified audit information con-

cerning the facility when the application is filed. He said an audit is planned during August, speculating that final approval or disapproval would come in the fall. If approved, Knight said, the conversion could possibly be completed by Jan. 1, 1977. In other board business Tuesday, a plan to join World Wide Health Consultants, a doctor recruiting service, was tabled. In their June meeting, the board discussed the service which places doctors in hospitals for an approximate fee of \$4,500. The board instructed Knight to contact the service for clarification of certain points in the placement agreement. "Basically," Knight said, "we found out that World Wide Health would offer no guarantee as to the quality of placed physicians. They also re-

fused to negotiate the costs to the district for the placement or even pay travel expenses for the doctor to visit." Knight said he thought the board had tabled rather than rejected the idea to leave it open as a future possibility. A decision to join the Texas Assn. of Homes for the Aging was also reached by the board at the meeting. Cost per year for membership is \$165. Members of the association receive current information about legislation passed which might effect medical facilities in Texas. Knight said. All board members attended the meeting including Ernest Barbee, Bud Hermesmeier, Billy Ray Johnston, Lacy Noble, C.C. Ayers, Vernon Berry and Ansil Adams. The Hospital Board meets the second Tuesday of each month at the Medical Center.

Sheriff/Tax Assessor office topic of petitions

A group of Donley County citizens are currently circulating several petitions designed to show public attitude towards separating the County Sheriff/Tax

Assessor office into two positions. Nine petitions are being circulated in the county with space for 30 signatures on each. According to County Attorney John Knorpp, who

circulated one petition, the documents have no legal binding power. He said the signed petitions would be submitted to the County Commissioners Court at their next meeting "to bring it to their attention."

Separation of the two offices must be legally decided in an election of the people. Knorpp speculated such an election could be held on a separate ballot in conjunction with the general election Nov. 4.

Knorpp said most counties with separate tax assessor offices pay them a salary comparable to the county judge or county attorney. Generally, this is approximately \$7,000 per year. Salary amounts are set by the Commissioner's Court.

New Highway patrolman now working in county

Doug Wright, 31, began as new Department of Public Safety Highway Patrolman in Donley County July 15.

served with the Highway Patrol in Pampa, Wellington and Amarillo. He is a 1963 graduate of Samnorwood High School. He graduated from the D.P.S. academy in Austin in 1966. He and his wife Rosie have three sons: Creed, aged 10; Craig, seven; and Clay, two. He and his family are now in the process of moving to Clarendon.

Girl's arrest undercover work

Ex-Clarendon High School student Camille Mann was involved with a series of related drug arrests during June as part of her work as an undercover narcotic agent for Hale County's Major Crime and Narcotics Division. Ms. Mann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jiggs Mann of Clarendon, was working undercover for the division when she was "falsely arrested" June 26 for possession of marijuana and cocaine by her own division head Benny Clifton.

Clifton said her arrest was set up by the division to insure the safety of her cover at that time as a narcotics dealer in the Plainview area. "She was close to being blown," he said, "and we were trying to re-establish her cover." Facts concerning the arrest were not to be released to the news media Clifton said, but an unrelated arrest two hours later involving three pounds of marijuana was reported by

Plainview and Amarillo newspapers and television. "Then," said Clifton, "we had a problem." Because of the later arrest, he said, the media also found out about Ms. Mann's arrest. "To let them release one and not the other would have been like hanging a sign saying 'Narc Agent' around her neck."

Such an election would have to be called by the Commissioner's Court. The two offices were combined when the population of Donley County dropped below 10,000 in the 1940 census. "I'd guess that 99 percent of the Sheriff/Tax Assessors in Texas would welcome having the office separated," Knorpp said. "A Sheriff doesn't have the time to do a decent job at both of them. People vote for a good Sheriff, not a good Tax Assessor, so that job gets neglected." If separating the office was passed by a majority vote in an election, the Commissioner's Court would

Arrested pair face Georgia charges

Donley County Highway Patrolman Doug Wright arrested two men faced with auto theft and burglary charges Friday night, July 16, west of Clarendon. Friday was Wright's third day to be on patrol in the county. He transferred here July 15 from the Amarillo Highway Patrol.

A call to the Atlanta Police Dept. with descriptions of the two suspects and the truck serial number identified the truck as one stolen from the sash and door company in a July 11 robbery.

One of the men, Ronald Lord, is also wanted in Orlando, Fla. in connection with an auto theft and burglary charge there. The men face a total of eight charges including auto theft, burglary and possession of a controlled substance.

Local law enforcement personnel said the two men probably would not be extradited until the end of this week or the first of next.

The two men, identified as Robert Lee Thomas and Ronald W. Lord, both of Georgia, face auto theft and burglary charges in Atlanta, Georgia. Both were arraigned Monday and waived extradition rights. Currently, they are in custody waiting transportation back to Atlanta. The arrest occurred at 8 p.m. Friday 10 miles west of the Clarendon city limits on Hwy. 287. The men were driving a truck registered to the Shafer Sash and Door Company, a business based in Atlanta, Georgia.

Wright said he stopped the two men for a speeding violation. During his initial investigation at the scene he discovered seven identical Gulf credit cards and items sometimes used as drug paraphernalia. A radio assistance call by Wright brought Donley County Deputy Eddie Hammons and Texas Cattle Inspector John Topper to the scene. Both Hammons and Topper assisted Wright in bringing the men and the truck back to the Donley County jail.

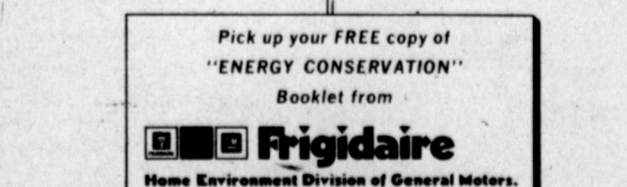

ORDER NO. 76-06244

AN ORDER OF THE TEXAS WATER QUALITY BOARD establishing a Regulated Area within the drainage area of the Greenbelt Reservoir, promulgating rules and regulations for the control of sewage discharged into this area, delegating the licensing function and the administration of the licensing system to the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, and providing for review and enforcement of the actions taken hereunder.

PREAMBLE

Greenbelt Reservoir is a 1,990 acre surface reservoir on the Salt Fork of the Red River and its tributaries in Donley County, Texas. The reservoir is an important source of water for municipal and industrial use. The reservoir is also utilized for recreational purposes, such as boating, skiing, swimming and fishing.

Among the potential sources of pollution which may be controlled in order to maintain water quality in the reservoir is sewage from subdivisions, individual dwellings, parks, motels, restaurants, marinas and other developments situated on the area within the Reservoir. Sewage discharged into organized sewage collection and treatment systems is regulated through the permit system of the Texas Water Quality Board. Therefore, this Order is concerned with the regulation and control of private sewage facilities not operated under a permit issued by the Board. This regulation and control is needed to protect the quality of the waters of Greenbelt Reservoir. Now, therefore, BE IT ORDERED BY THE TEXAS WATER QUALITY BOARD:

I. Definitions

A. "Authority" means the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

B. "Board" means the Texas Water Quality Board.

C. "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the Texas Water Quality Board.

D. "Greenbelt Reservoir" means the reservoir located on the Salt Fork of the Red River and its tributaries in Donley County, approximately five miles north of Clarendon, Texas.

E. "Organized disposal system" means any system for the collection, treatment, and disposal of sewage operated in accordance with the terms and conditions of a permit from the Texas Water Quality Board.

F. "Private sewage facilities" means all facilities, systems, and methods used

for the disposal of sewage other than disposal systems operating under a valid permit issued by the Board.

G. "Sewage" means domestic sewage or other domestic waste.

H. "Subdivision" means (a) a subdivision as defined in the Texas Water Quality Board rules and regulations; or (b) a lot or tract in excess of one (1) acre in size.

I. "Use" is the abbreviation for Mean Sea Level.

II. Restricted Area

A. The Restricted Area is designated as all the area bounded by a line parallel to and not less than 75 feet from the 2,674.0-foot above msl contour line, measured horizontally away from the reservoir. The Restricted Area also includes all of the area of the lake bed to the 2,674.0-foot above msl contour line, and all islands.

B. To protect all fees necessary to recover all the costs incurred in meeting the requirements of this order:

1. The Authority shall have the following responsibilities:

a. To make annual reports to the Board on all actions taken concerning this order;

b. To perform all the duties necessary to meet the requirements of this order;

c. Upon a showing of necessity, the Board may assume all of the powers and responsibilities delegated to the Authority by the Board.

III. Licensing Requirements for New Private Sewage Facilities

A. A new private sewage facility which is substantially or materially altered, to be located within the boundaries of the Regulated Area or within an existing subdivision in the Regulated Area, must meet the following requirements:

1. A license must be obtained for the use of these facilities for a term of five (5) years.

2. The lot or tract in question must be large enough, considering soil and drainage conditions and appropriate waste handling, to permit the use of a private sewage facility without causing water pollution, nuisance conditions, or endangerment to public health.

3. All private sewage facilities to be installed or constructed after the effective date of this order shall meet the minimum standards as contained in the latest edition of A Guide to the Disposal of Household Sewage, published by the Texas Department of Health Resources, which is available from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

4. A sewage discharged into an organized waste disposal system or other facility operating under a valid permit issued by the Board:

G. "Sewage" means domestic sewage or other domestic waste.

H. "Subdivision" means (a) a subdivision as defined in the Texas Water Quality Board rules and regulations; or (b) a lot or tract in excess of one (1) acre in size.

I. "Use" is the abbreviation for Mean Sea Level.

III. Licensing Function

A. The Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority is designated by the Texas Department of Health Resources and licensed by the Authority, or C. Sewage discharged into a private sewage facility existing at the effective date of this order and not causing pollution or injury to public health or to the environment shall meet the following requirements:

1. A license must be obtained from the Authority for each private sewage facility and:

a. Each lot or tract in the subdivision must be at least one-half (1/2) acre in size.

b. Terms of License for New Private Sewage Facilities:

1. Any license issued under the authority of this order will be transferred to a succeeding owner and such license will continue in existence for the unexpired term of the license provided the new owner applies to the Authority for a license.

2. Application forms for license shall be obtained from the Authority. In order to initiate an application for a license, the completed application form, together with the appropriate fee, shall be filed with the Authority.

3. The Authority will perform as soon as practical such inspections and tests as may be deemed necessary.

4. Upon a finding by the Authority that the use of the private sewage facility will not cause pollution or injury to the public health and is not in conflict with the terms and regulations of this order, a license effective for a term of five (5) years will be issued. At the end of five (5) years, the system will be reinspected and an inspection fee assessed; and

B. A new license issued under the above terms may be renewed for successive terms of five (5) years.

5. Upon a finding by the Authority that the private sewage facility will not be causing pollution or injury to public health, the Authority shall require licensing in accordance with Section VIII, Effective Date.

6. All private sewage facilities to be installed or constructed after this order must be licensed as a new facility if the facility is substantially or materially altered.

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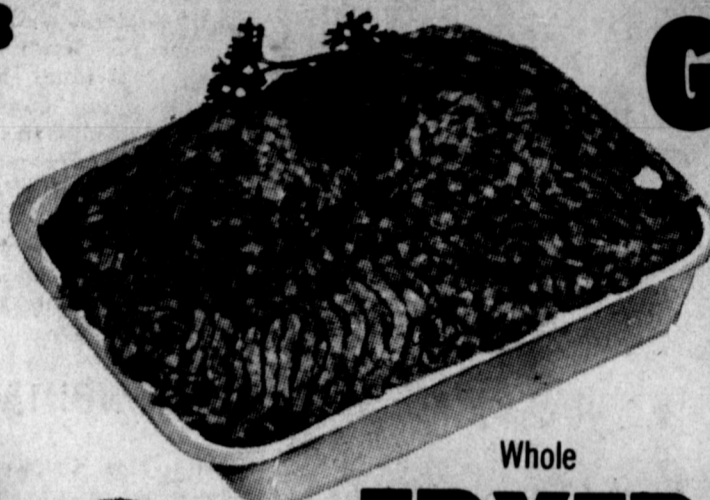

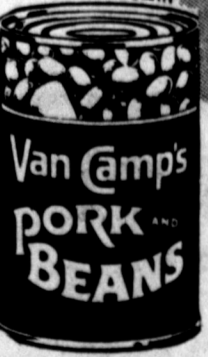
